## BIG CAMPAIGN ENDS NEXT SATURDAY AT 9:00 P. M.

## 3 AUTO ACCIDENTS RECORD FOR SUNDAY

Last Sunday seemed to be the open season for auto wrecks and personal injuries from that source of travel in this part of the country.

Sunday morning about 3 o'clock a Chrysler coupe, occupied by six negroes, three men and three women, twice the number that seems possible a capacity load, while enroute from Coleman in this direction added another bad wreck to the half dozen or more that have happened at the dangerous curve on the highway just this side of Burkett. It is reported that the car was traveling at high speed and in attempting to round the curve landed in the deep ditch which circles its north point. The car turned over, as the scene seemed to indicate, two or three times, resting bottom-side up in the ditch. Three of the negroes were more or less seriously injured, but no deaths have been reported from the mishap.

A new Ford coupe, occupied by Bill Milligan of Cross Plains, and three young ladies, daughters of Nathan Tyler, were informed, while returning from a trip late Sunday afternoon went into the ditch at one of the dips on the highway a short distance this side of the Lacey filling station. This car also turned completely over, landing on its top, and it seemed impossible that all occupants of the vehicle could have escaped with more than a frightful shaking-up and minor bruises. One of the young ladies fainted after being removed from wreck, but the attending physician, who was called to immediately following the scene the accident, stated that it was caused from severe fright and the accompanying shock.

In the third crash of the day, occurring within the city limits on North Main street late Sunday evening, Bruce Magness, youth about 13, was injured when struck by a car driven by another young boy. The injured boy was riding a bicycle at the time of the accident.

Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Fulton, living on their farm a short distance northwest of Cross Plains, attended the big meeting of the Brazos Valley Pecan Growers Association at Cisco last week. They reported an interesting and instructive meeting of about five hundred prominent pecan growers from all parts of the State. The members of the association paid honor to J. H. Burkett, originator of the famous Burkett pecan. The mother tree, of large and expanding foliage, stands near Putnam, and a banquet was served the members of the party beneath its spreading branches by the ladies of the Baptist church of Putnam. Demonstrations in budding and grafting were given under orchard conditions, which were followed closely by the hundreds in attendance. Mr. Fulton has a fine pecan orchard on Turkey creek that runs through a section of his farm, and has great faith in the future of the pecans in this section and will try to prove the value of the industry through his own grove.

Special musical numbers will be one of the features of the special service. Those attending are urged to wear a white flower if mother is deceased; a red flower if she is living.

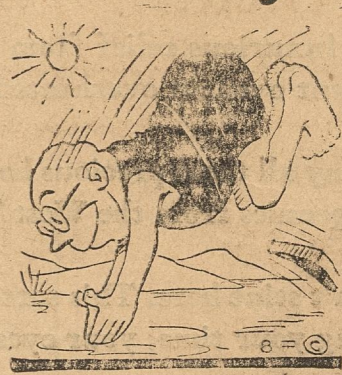
If not attending elsewhere you have a cordial invitation to come and enjoy this service.

### SLIGHT GRASSHOPPER DAMAGE ANTICIPATED

The drone of the grasshopper hasn't had that menacing twang for the last few years because they've come to Texas in such small numbers as to be of little importance, and it is not anticipated that any general damage will be done this season. They were found laying their eggs in a few places last fall, however, and farmers in scattered sections may soon find that something needs to be done about it. These eggs begin hatching in April, as a rule, especially if a period of warm rain occurs.

"Poisoned bran mash will be found effective wherever damage becomes serious," says R. R. Reppert, Entomologist in the Extension Service, and gives this formula: Mix up 20 pounds of bran, one pound Paris Green, two quarts cane molasses, and six lemons, using both the juice and the rind. The lemons should be run through a meat grinder. Mix up with enough water to make a thoroughly moist but not sloppy mash. Five pounds of this mixture should be enough for one acre of infested field applied broadcast. Usually it is necessary to poison an entire field but only the edges where the infestation is worst. Grasshoppers generally invade fields from adjoining pastures or woodlands and where they are found there in large numbers, it's wise to scatter poison along the fence rows or borders of these places, sometimes taking in a considerable margin.

**CROSS PLAINS-RISING  
STAR COUNTRY CLUB**

Club members of the Phil-Pe-Country Club seem to have regarded Sunday as the opening day of their golf course and it has been lined with players since that time. The course is one of the most beautiful ones to be found, and is ideally located. Starting at the club house, the first drive is made across a small ravine, to the uppermost part of a hill. Shooting to the second hole, one may drive with all his might to the second green below, located only a few feet from the lake's edge. As one proceeds from hole to hole, he finds plenty of hazards, to the right, to the left, and before him. It takes a skillful player to par the third hole as the wrong drive will place his ball in the neck of the lake over which he must drive. When once you have played the full nine holes, the desire increases to again pursue your former footsteps. The course has a par of 34, having two 3 and seven 4 holes.

They are of a nice size, plenty large to get an and yet not so big that you have to use your mid-iron to get in the hole after you get on. Markers have not been placed near the greens yet but will be in a few days.

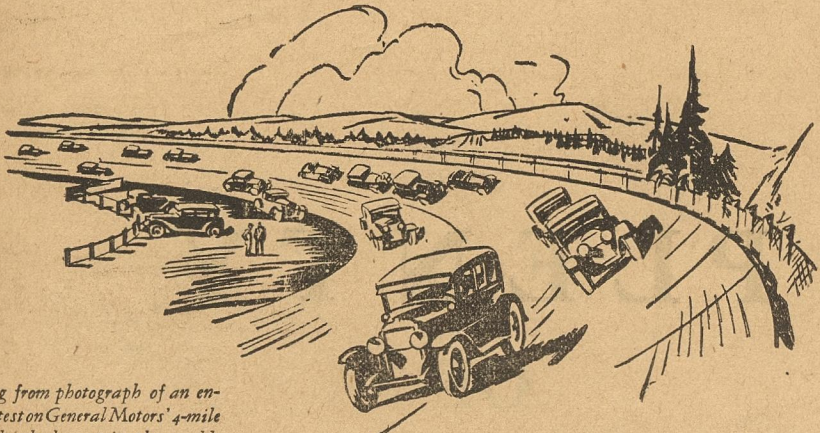
