EDITOR'S NOTE: Ozella Huddleston is my guest columnist this week. She has rekindled some memories of true incidents that tell a remarkable story about a young man. Vanda King, Editor.

"A Gift of Love"
is a true story.
The questions are my own.

In the early nineteen hundreds a wagon freighter and his twelve-year-old son left their home in central Texas for the northern most part of the panhandle.

As they traveled, the man became ill, his fever rose and he grew very weak. When they reached their destination, he called the boy to his side and told him he was going to die.

What instructions did he leave? Did he express his love?

Can that kind of news be broken gently to a child?

When the boy awoke the next morning, he found his father's lifeless body. He had no friends to comfort him with gentle hands and tender voices. There among strangers, far from home he laid his dad to rest

from home, he laid his dad to rest.

What were his thoughts as he stood beside the grave?

How many lonely days were spent enroute home?

Did he travel alone?

How did he tell his mother her husband was gone? She had grown ill during their absence and before too many days passed, she also died.

Once again he found himself standing beside a lonely grave, though this time not alone. Four younger, frightened children huddled by his side.

That fall they picked cotton. "We'll buy flour and potatoes," he said. "They will help feed us this winter until I work again."

while snow fell and wind blew, he cooked, washed dishes and clothes and

was there time to stop and think?

Time to plan the future?
Was he able to grasp the enormity of his undertaking?

Concerned neighbors gathered a few coins together and presented them to the boys but their fierce pride refused to let them keep them. They walked to a meandering stream, tossed the money in, brushed off their hands and

What happened to the wagon and horses?

walked proudly home.

Did an older alcoholic brother sell them to supply his need? He abused the children and left home; before or after his mother's death is not known.

There is a tombstone on the mother's grave. No one knows where it came from. Many years later, it is believed, perhaps, the boy sold the horses, took the money and bought her one last gift.

Sometime later a married sister took two of the boys, and so the other three cw. vagabonds, until the man mard and the woman helped in the final years of rearing.

Bits and pieces of this tale have come from different sources and several people.

Why couldn't the man share all this with his children? Why couldn't he speak of the problems and privations, the pain and joy the orphaned family shared?

Did he have a feeling of guilt? Did he feel failure because he had not been able to keep them together through those long, hard years? So many questions, all unanswered; no way now to know. But many times I've wept for the frightened boy who stood beside a grave and turned away; a man.

but condemns violence.

The following recommendations are listed on the petition sheet:

The denial of bail or bond to an individual who is accused of committing a violent offense while on parole. We respectfully request that Governor Clements place this issue on the agenda of the special session in November,

Review current state statutes and policies regarding the parole revocation process of individuals accused of committing a new offense or harrassing the victim of his/her previous offense.

The passage of a constitutional amendment to insure that the victims of crime have the right to be informed of, present at, and heard at all critical stages of the criminal justice process.

Callahan Divide SWCD Announce Fish Stocking Program

"With the temperatures cooling off and recent rains having filled up several ponds, now is the time to safely handle and stock fish." says Tony Baeza Range Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Baird.

Baeza said that in ponds less than one surface acre, channel catfish generally do best. One hundred channel catfish per surface acres is a good stocking rate. A commercial available catfish feed can be fed, or fathead minnows can be stocked for the catfish to eat. Unlike the common minnow, the fathead minnow is a slower swimmer which allows the catfish to catch the fathead minnow and get enough to eat and also keep the minnows from overpopulating a pond.

If bass are desired, they should be stocked in ponds greater than one surface acre. This will allow bass to have enough room so they do not overpopulate and eat out their food source, which will result in small stunted bass. Bluegill sunfish should be stocked with bass in order to provide food for the bass. Since bluegills have small mouths, they do not compete with the bass for food like some of the the other sunfish do.

"Stocking of bluegills should be done in the fall, and then come back in the spring and stock the bass," says Bacza. This will allow the bluegill to reproduce and put on some size so the bass will only eat the offspring and leave the original sunfish as breeding stock."

For the convenience of people who want to stock the pond, the Callahan Divide Soil and Water conservation District is sponsoring a fish stocking program. Information concerning types and cost of fish, and proper stocking number can be obtained at the Soil Conservation Service in Baird. Orders should be placed before November 3, with delivery of fish being on November 15, 1989 at the Callahan County Courthouse.

The services of the Callahan Divide SWCD and Soil Conservation Service are available to anyone regardless of race, creed, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

All three finalists will attend the TFB Legislative Development Seminar in Washington, D.C. next April.







What Is Chapter I?

Chapter I is a federally-funded program that provides extra individual help for children in the subject areas of math, reading, and language arts. It is the largest federal aid program for our nation's schools.

The program at Cross Plains this year has 38 students in reading and 23 in math. Children are selected based on their scores on the CAT test they take in the spring.

There are three teachers who work with the Chapter I Program. Nora Odom, who teaches reading and language arts; Brenda Connor, who teaches math, and Wesley Ingram is the aide for the teachers.

Chapter I is held in, what most people know as the Betty Browning Building, on the north end of the elementary building.

The local program of Chapter I is reviewed each year by administrators, teachers and parents. If goals have not been met, then the plans must be revis-


Ms. Odom, Mrs. Connor, and Mrs. Ingram have many different methods and techniques they use to teach Chapter I students. A few of these include, controlled readers, computers, and digitors, and they use a variety of hands on methods.

Policy Statement

It only happens once every five years, and you'll never see the school in better shape for the Texas Education Agency to conduct the Accrediation Audit of the Cross Plains Independent School District. A team of four people will arrive on October 16 and be here through the morning of the 20th prodding, probing, and asking questions and checking records, etc.

According to Lee Thompson, superintendent, six main areas are being covered by the T.E.A. Audit. They include central administration, school campuses/principals, teachers. counselors, librarian, and nurses.



Galileo

Galileo Galilei was born in Pisa, Italy on February 15, 1564. As a child, he showed unusual skill in building toys. His father, a merchant and musician, taught him music. But he encouraged his son to become a doctor. Galileo studied medicine and the philosphy of Aristotle at the University of Pisa.

As a young scientist, Galileo made his first important scientific contribution, at the age of 20, when he was a university student. He discovered the law of the pendulum while watching a great lamp swing from the ceiling of the cathedral in Pisa.

Galileo left the university in 1585 because he lacked money. He abandoned medicine for research in mathematics. During this time, Galileo invented the hydrostatic balance, an instrument that is used to find the specific gravity of objects by weighing them in water.

Galileo returned to the university at the age of 25 as a professor of mathematics. During this period, he is credited with discovering a famous law of falling bodies. He reasoned that gravity pulls all bodies to earth with the same acceleration, regardless of their weight. According to an often dis puted story, he dropped two unequal weights from the top of The Leaning Tower of Pisa. People who saw the experiment believed that Galileo's theory was correct. The story, however, was thought by many to be untrue. Followers of Aristotle who said heavy bodies fell faster than lighter ones bitterly opposed Galileo's new theory. Galileo was then forced to leave the university because of his



A Look At The Celestial

By KIM WEBB

In the sky, far beyond the reach of the human hand lies a burst of fire known as a star. One of the many mysteries of the universe, the star creates an interest that drives people and scientists both to research the contents and mysteries surrounding them. One of the most famous group of stars is known as the Halley's Comet. This group of stars comes into vision every seventy-five years, and this creates a huge interest into the existence and characteristics of this particular star

The Halley's Comet was last seen spinning on its axis every 10.3 hours.

The mass of the Halley's Comet is 40 percent water and ice, 10 percent of other relative substances, as well as 50 percent of solid material consisting of dust and stone. The components are said to be well mixed so that the vapors can collect dust as they retract from the comet as it enters the heat of

Last April and May astronomers from the European Southern Observatory (ESO), using the Danish telescope at La Silla, Chile, captured images of the comet. The comet was then about 1,225 million kilometers from the earth or where the planet Saturn lies. It was so faint, the scientists needed to combine more than sixty images obtained over nineteen wondering nights, an exposure totaling nearly twelve hours to see details

Halley's Comet is portrayed as a snowball five kilometers in diameter, weighing at least sixty-five billion tons, holding behind it an enormous three million mile tail, while


