As one county agent wrote, it is impossible to determine the contest's full value to the boys who participate.

But reports from the 1963 winners help. A boy from Coleman, for example, bought a calf from his rodeo winnings which eventually won \$250 in prize money, then sold at a profit.

A boy from Cross Plains showed a profit of \$632 on his calf, while another made \$104.40—both big steps toward helping the boys plan for college or start their own herds.

Not all 15 boys who won in last year's scramble made money. Some even lost a little. But, in the long run, they all profited.

While the scramble will be absent from this year's rodeo events, you can bet it will be back in 1965.

Band Concert Is Tuesday Night

The annual concert of the Baird Public Schools instrumental department will be given this Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium.

Participating will be the stage band, the Cub Band composed of fifth and sixth graders, and the high school band. A varied program.

Tickets are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

Among numbers planned by the stage band will be "Everything's Coming Up Roses," "Mood Indigo," and "Sugar Blues." Featured by the Cub Band will be a sacred medley and "Drummer Boy March."

Baird's swimming pool will open for the season at 2 p.m. May 3, it was announced Wednesday. After the opening day, the pool will be open on Saturdays and Sundays until school dismisses for the term.

Thursday Parade Will Signal Opening of Rodeo Activities

A traditional parade, featuring bands and riding groups, will kick off the annual Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo next Thursday. The march will begin at 5 p.m.

The parade will officially open the three-day rodeo, with performances scheduled for 8 p.m. next Thursday, Friday and Saturday in the arena east of Baird.

Although the activities won't begin until next week, Baird took on the rodeo look this week with erection of colorful flag decorations all along Market St. and other spots.

Some 15 area riding groups are expected for the annual parade. Invitations have been sent to area bands requesting their participation, too.

Also scheduled to march are the Shadows, a drill team of high school girls from Abilene. Some six units from the Abilene Emergency Service are expected.

Karen Bearden and Vicki Finley will be flag bearers leading the parade.

The line of march will begin on Market St. near the Texas and Pacific depot, will head

north to the Callahan County courthouse, and return back down Market to disband in the depot area.

Anyone wishing to participate in the parade is invited to contact China Allphin, chairman, at UL 4-1230.

The second rodeo booster tour, this one with an even dozen stops scheduled, will leave Baird at 8:30 a.m. Saturday. Anyone interested in promoting the show is invited to participate.

Morning stops for the tour include Clyde, Abilene, Merkel, Anson and Stamford. Basket lunches, to be taken by each participant, will be eaten during the Stamford stop. Lunch will begin about 11:30 a.m.

During the afternoon the delegation will visit Lueders, Albany, Breckenridge, Ranger, Eastland, Cisco and Putnam.

The return to Baird is expected about 6 p.m.

The auto caravan will form on Market St. before the 8:30 a.m. departure time.

Reserved seat tickets for the rodeo's three nights are on sale at the Baird Chamber of Commerce office.

Besides the usual rodeo events which have been favorites with West Texans, this year's program will include an act by Earl Whorton and his sheep dogs.

Whorton, from San Saba, has travelled over 100,000 miles in the last three years while exhibiting his dogs in 21 states. All three dogs have won championships in the American International Field Trials, largest event in this country for working sheep dogs.

ABSENTEE VOTING DEADLINE NEARS

Absentee voting for the May 2 primaries has been light in Callahan County to date—and the deadline is only days away. Absentee ballots must be cast by April 28.

Six absentee votes have been cast in person in the office of County Clerk Beatrice Deal, and two ballots mailed out have been returned. Several additional ballots have been mailed but not returned.

Absentee ballots for both the Democratic and Republican primaries are available in the county clerk's office.

Postal Changes To Begin May 4

Limited adjustments in some postal services ordered in Washington March 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save \$12.7 million will begin to take effect in Baird and other cities May 4. Postmaster Roy Gilbreath said Wednesday.

Service changes planned locally include:

1. Parcel post deliveries. There will be no parcel post deliveries in town on Tuesdays, however parcel post will continue to be delivered on Rural Route 1 and Star Routes 1 and 2 six days a week.

2. Window Services. There will be no money order service or postal savings business on Saturdays. Patrons are urged to transact as much of their postal business as possible on weekdays.

The postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under this order. There will be no change in home delivery or special delivery for example. Regular business mail deliveries will continue as usual. Letters and other first class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

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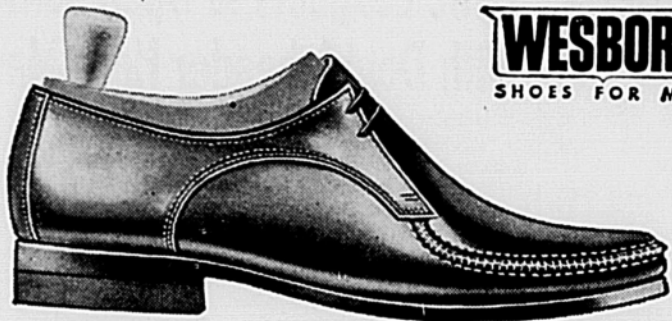

OMAR BURLESON

INCOME TAX REDUCTION

The income tax reduction bill that became effective in April of 1964 had the vote and support of OMAR BURLESON who has long felt that tax relief for the public was one of the most important issues before Congress.

LIMITED BEEF IMPORTS

OMAR BURLESON introduced a bill in Congress to limit the imports of beef from foreign countries. With a 25% wholesale price decrease caused by foreign imports this bill would provide a broader market for the ranchers and cattlemen. Retail prices remain high.

REDUCE FEDERAL BUDGET

Long an advocate for lower federal spending, OMAR BURLESON, in his 18 years in Congress, has voted to reduce the federal budget from three to 13 BILLION dollars each of his nine Congressional terms. He has never voted to reduce defense expenditures.

CUBAN EMBARGO

During the Cuban affair OMAR BURLESON introduced a bill for a complete embargo on trade with that country. He voted against the sale of wheat to Russia, recognizing that it would encourage our allies to sell to Cuba which they have done in fact.

CIVIL RIGHTS

Because the present form of the Civil Rights bill contains provisions to limit the freedoms of all Americans, he voted against it. He is for the constitutional guarantees for all Americans regardless of status.

LIMITED OIL IMPORTS

In 1949 OMAR BURLESON introduced the first bill to limit oil imports, and then voted for the bill that gave the President of the United States power to limit or abolish all imports.

REDUCE COMMITTEE BUDGETS

As chairman of the House Administration Committee, OMAR BURLESON has consistently reduced the spending of congressional committees. He reduced Adam Clayton Powell's committee spending budget by 50%.

FOREIGN AID

OMAR BURLESON has voted against foreign aid since the late 1940s. The recent reaction in Congress as to drastically reducing foreign aid and discussion about abolishing it proves him correct.

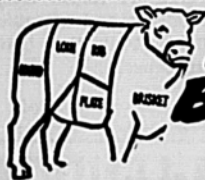
Hi neighbor. We still have March with us although it is April 20th. The wind has been

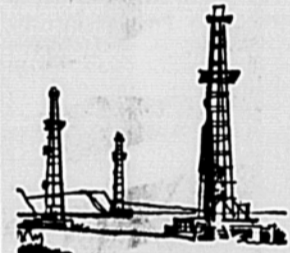

Farm Bureau Aid Praised For Opposing the Forced Pooling

Sponsored by Mr. Gibbens

Noting that the Texas Farm Bureau at its state convention in San Antonio passed a strong resolution supporting property rights, the Texas Landowners and Independent Oil and Gas Producers Association commended the organization for its stand.

The Landowners resolution praised the leadership of Farm Bureau leader C. H. DeVaney, Legislative representative Charles Huff and Ed McKay for their help in defeating House Bill 510, the compulsory oil and gas pooling bill at the last session.

The Farm Bureau was also cited for making a valiant effort to pass legislation that would give the land owner the right to

try cases involving appeals from the Railroad Commission in district courts where the land is located.

"The Texas Landowners and Independent Oil and Gas Producers are very grateful for the help furnished by the Texas Farm Bureau," the resolution states.

Although the pressure continued for consideration, it was finally conceded by the bill's author Representative Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge and its co-authors Reps. George Cook of Odessa and Maurice Duke of Wichita Falls that theirs was lost cause.

Gibbens-Authored Forced Pooling Bill Threatens Free Enterprise

What is Forced Pooling?

Under a forced pooling law, the owner of a lease may make application to the Railroad Commission for the creation of a "pooled unit" by which all persons owning any interest in the oil or gas thereunder would have their properties forcibly pooled or combined.

Compulsory pooling is sought in Texas by the major oil companies. House Bill 510 by Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge would create such a law under which any part of a tract of land could be forcibly pooled with the lands of others and without the consent of all parties concerned.

A compulsory pooling statute, such as House Bill 510, would force additional government controls upon the people. It would actually permit the confiscation of one's property for the benefit of a few wealthy out-of-state corporations.

Would you stand by and permit your property to be seized without warning or proper notification under due processes of law? Of course not! Yet, at this very minute in Austin, plans are being made to confiscate oil and gas rights in the State of Texas.
