W. E. GILLILAND RECALLS LONG LIFE IN CALLAHAN CO.

Seventy-one years ago today, Nov. 28th, the writer, the editor of the Baird Star, was born on a small farm in Washington County, Texas, the cradle of Texas Liberty, worked on a farm for 34 years and did all the hard and light work usual on a farm.

My father, Haynie A. Gilliland, moved to Brown County in 1860 and my mother died there in 1861 and was buried on the old McCain ranch, near Byrd's store. The Civil War having begun we moved back to Washington county and my father, though 62 years old, enlisted in Co. F. Nelson's regiment, 10th Texas Infantry in 1861 and was later first stationed at Galveston. Later the regiment was ordered to Arkansas and my father came by home and spent seven days with us and that was the last time we ever saw him. He died at Camp Nelson, near Austin, Arkansas. Col. Nelson, for whom the camp was named, also died there and Col. Mills, Lieut.-Col. was made Colonel. The regiment surrendered with the Confederate army at Arkansas Post.

In 1870 I came to Brown county, worked on a cow ranch in 1871. I married Dicie Windham, youngest daughter of the late Dr. J. D. Windham in March, 1872. Moved to Callahan County in 1882 and worked in the sheriff's office, Capt. J. W. Jones, sheriff, in 1883. I moved to Tecumseh that winter and ran the store for J. D. Windham & Son, the largest country store in west Texas for four years.

Thirty-two years ago today I bought the old Callahan County Clarendon from M. H. Allen, moved to Baird, and on the 8th day of December 1887 issued the first number of the Baird Star and have owned and published the Star since; hot or cold; wet or dry; hard times; good times and all kinds of times, I have personally edited The Star.

This merely touches the high places along a career that while it is mostly common place, yet it had some thrills on the frontier, where there were plenty of Indians, bear, buffalo, deer and all kinds of game. I killed lots of all but the Indians, and never saw a wild Indian in all the 14 years that I lived or traveled along the frontier from here to Austin from 1860. The last battle with the Indians in Brown county was fought by a company of Rangers, commanded by the late Captain W. J. Maltby of this county, in 1873.

It might be of interest to some readers of the Star to know that I killed my first Buffalo in Eagle Cove in this county in 1875 and that winter I killed my first bear just across the mountain from where H. Windham lives. There was not a cow ranch or a settler in the entire western part of the county at that time and only two or three ranches in the east part of the county. Jess Hart's father settled on the head of the south fork of the Bayou, but that and the Ramsey ranch were abandoned before or during the civil war.

In the early 70's wild game of all kinds roamed the prairies of Callahan county almost unmolested as there were few hunters. It was not safe for a small bunch of hunters to come out on the buffalo range even as late as 1879 though occasionally some would go even as far as the Clear Fork of the Brazos.

The Indians killed the wife and baby of Bill Williams in Brown county in 1872 near the Mullins ranch. Indian raids did not cease in Brown county until about 1874. For five years after I came back to Brown county I never left the house without being fully armed. I cut poles and split rails enough to fence a fifty acre farm on Hog Creek in 1873 and wore a six-shooter every minute except when about the house, and would hide my Winchester near by. The present generation has no idea of what the Texas frontiersman had to go through yet we got used to it and did not mind.

Talk about hard times, we did not know what the term meant. With plenty of wild game, wild honey, milk and butter and mast to fatten the hogs and cattle as fat as mesquite grass could make them, no one need go hungry. Sometimes the bread would run short, in fact, I went without bread three months in 1861 and about two months in 1872, both times in the summer. As everybody was in the same fix nobody kicked because we had plenty of vegetables, milk, cheese, curd, butter and plenty of roasting ears and

we didn't bother about bread. My, what a howl the people would raise now if they did not have bread for a week, even if they did have all the things we had to eat besides bread.

I have, as I said, just touched the high places and spun out at greater length than I expected. Brown and Callahan counties and all west Texas have changed wonderfully in the 50 years and even in 49 years, the time I have lived continuously in the two counties, 12 years in Brown and 37 in Callahan.

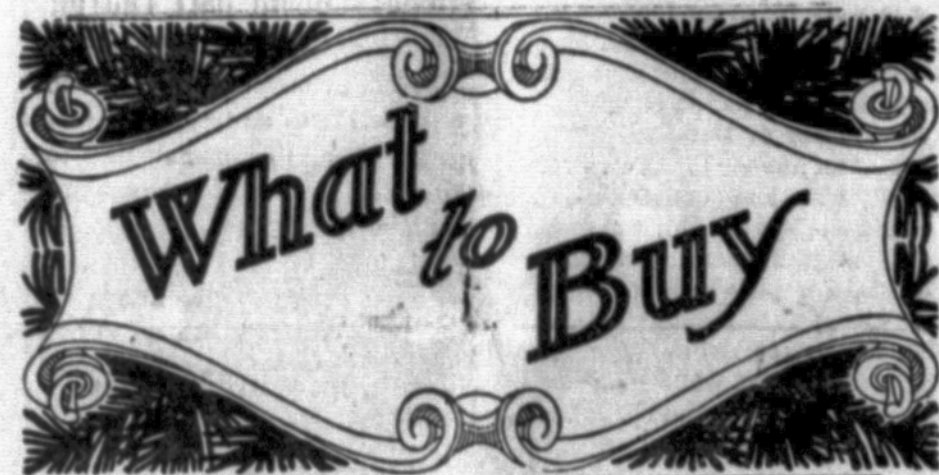
