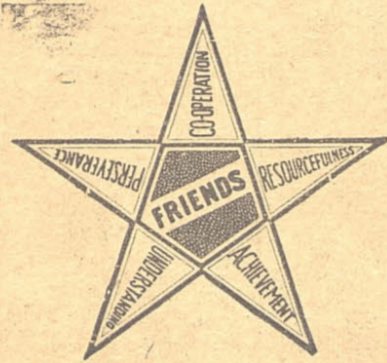

FATHER'S SLAYER HELD AS BURGLAR

(Star Telegram)

Coleman, Oct. 2.—Indicted Friday on a charge of murdering his father, freed in nominal bond because of circumstances surrounding the killing, D. F. Sanderson Jr., 18, was Saturday named defendant in a true bill charging burglary. He was arrested, placed in jail and later in the day released on \$1,000 additional bond. His mother was named as one of the sureties.

The charge against Sanderson is that on Aug. 29 he entered a house occupied by a negro here and took a phonograph, pistol, electric fan and a purse.

Two days later, Sanderson killed his father in the Sanderson home. Sanderson had been detained the previous night by peace officers following complaint of a disturbance at the residence. He was released from jail before noon and enroute home, learned that his wife during the morning, had filed suit for divorce. Sanderson, Jr., shot his father to death with a pistol a short time after, claiming the elder Sanderson was beating Mrs. Sanderson. She showed marks about the face.

Sanderson collapsed after surrendering and was under a physician's care in a private home guarded by a deputy sheriff until bond was furnished. He was given a preliminary hearing, and after being indicted Friday, trial was set for Oct. 19.

STREET WORK ON WEEK'S PROGRAM

FIRE BOYS MAKE GOOD RECORD TUESDAY

A short time after the fire alarm was sounded here Tuesday afternoon the Volunteer Fire Department was extinguishing a fire in south part of town. Quick response and efficient work soon had the flame under control.

The fire, which was at an oil well in the city was threatening adjacent property.

This box is placed on a brick, stone, or concrete setting and a fire built underneath. Anyone interested in building such a sterilizer can secure free plans and directions from the Bureau of Dairy Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.
