



Constitutionality of the act of the Thirty-Seventh Legislature fixing a standard weight for a loaf of bread is attacked in an appeal filed in the Court of Criminal Appeals in the case of C. H. Ford, from Aarris County, convicted of violating the statute and fined \$110.

A total of \$315,887 tax on gasoline was paid the State in August by the Gulf Refininy Company, the Texas Company, the Magnolia Petroleum Company, Pierce Petroleum and Humble Oil and Refining Company. This is \$277 less than the amount paid by these companies in July. . . .

As a result of a shake-up in the State Industrial Accident Board, three long-time clerks will retire on Oct. 15. Two of them are men and the other a woman. The clerks who are to be displaced are said to have long been recognized as among the most efficient employes of the State government.

Peanuts grown in China are imported into this country, pay a duty and then are transported half way across the continent and sold in Dallas at a cent per pound cheaper than Texas-grown peanuts, according to testimony adduced before the Railroad Commission by peanut experts, who declared that the local rates are choking the Texas industry.

While banks desiring to become State depositories have until Oct. 15 in which to make application for State funds, nearly all of the funds which can be placed in State de-cositories have already been applied for, according to State Treasury W. Gregory Hatcher. The applications came from banks in every section of the State, Mr. Hatcher sadi.

Robert Lee Daniel, newly appointed Commissioner of Insu: ance, has been in Austin and announced that few, if any, changes will be made in the office force when he assumes charge. He authorized the statement that T. L. Werkenthin will continue as deputy commissioner and that Miss Vera Swann, stenographer, will be made his secretary.

It has been learned here that Dr George Pendleton Day of Madisonville is to be the next assistant State health officer of Texas. This place had not been formally filled by Dr. H. O. Sappington, State health of ficer, and while he was out of the city it was understood from other sources that Dr. Day will accept the place and assume his duties at once.

Fees for freshmen students at the University of Texas will vary from \$43 to \$60, according to a state ment from the University registrar's office. The imperative need of additional funds led the board of regents to make & new service and maintenance fee of \$20. The matriculation fee of \$15, the library fee of \$7 and a gymnasium fee of \$1 make up the \$48.

No artist ever worked with a larger and more itinerant "gallery" observing than Miss Margaret Brisbine of Houston, who is making a large reproduction of Huddle's famous painting of the surrender of Santa Anna at San Jacinto. The original hangs in the main corridor of the Capitol and, perched some dozen feet above the floor, Miss Brisbine is copying the painting.

The Railroad Commission granted the petition of the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad and certain connecting lines for the storage of butter in transit when moved in carload shipments. Elaborate rules are prescribed for the single stop allowed for storing and reshipment within "twelve months." This might seem to make stale butter, but cold storage

The teachers' college of Columbia University, New York, has written Gov. Ferguson requesting full information about the budget system used in this State, and reply will be made by the Board of Control, which builds the budget every two years. The college advised that it is making a survey of the entire United States. The inquiry was addressed to "Governor M. A. Ferguson," and the salutation was written "My Dear Sir," evidently the writer not knowning that Texas had a woman Governor.

INTEREST RATE IS STICKING POINT IN FRENCH SETTLEMENT

Difference Is Not Great Enough, However, to Suggest Break.

Washington.-Alternating waves of optimism and pessimism rolled over the French debt negotiations, but after a series of meetings between the negotiators two more suggested plans for settlement were visible.

Two joint sessions of the commissions representing the United States and France were held and each produced a proposal-the first, by France, suggesting terms regarded by the French as more acceptable than the original offer calling for a \$25,000,000 first payment, and the second a counter-proposal by Secretary Mellon containing figures described as perhaps more favorable than those accorded Great Britain.

M. Caillaux, after sending his statistical experts in the Treasury to confer with Undersecretary Winston, made an agreement with Secretary Mellon to talk matters over personally, a method which the French apparently have favored from the beginning.

The American commissioners frankly admitted there was still a great difference in the view of the two groups, and the French entered the conferences apparently doubtful, but later seemed more cheerful.

Notwithstanding that the negotiations thus far have brought no definite announcement of results. Treasury officials held to their stand that such a situation might be evident in negotiations of such a serious nature and could not be regarded as representing a stage where a break was threatened.

By some of the American commissioners, however, the French offer was viewed as not departing sufficiently from the first proposal, which was found unacceptable, and they expressed no optimism over the progress of the discussions.

Another joint session of the commission has been called for but the indications are that henceforth more of the negotiations will be carried on by small groups. It was the belief that the private talks between M. Caillaux and Secretary Mellon, as well as between other members of the two commissions were likely to provide the methods by which an understanding would be reached, if a settlement is to come from the present conferences.

PRISON HONOR FARM HAS BEEN ABOLISHED

Neff Project Thing of Past After 45 Take French Leave.

Houston, Texas.-The Pat M. Neff honor farm at the Imperial State prison farm, near Sugarland, has been abolished by the Prison Commission.

Prison Commissioner Walter Sayles, immediately after the meeting went to the farm and there the order for abolition of the honor system was issued.

It was learned that thus far this year there have been forty-five escapes from this farm, seven or eight of the men returning voluntarily and the rest being recaptured.

Immediately after issuing the order, Commissioner Sayles set about preparation of a statement covering the

board's action. The honor farm was launched during the Neff administration.

The farm was started with about thirty-five picked men as inmates, but this number was quickly increased to over 100.

As explained by telephone from the farm, it has been abolished as far as new men is concerned. The seventynine men remaining at the farm will stay as trusties and will have all the privileges heretofore accorded them.

The large number of escapes is said to have brought about the action by the Prison Board. There have been fourteen escapes during Septem-

Recapitulating the honor farm operations, Capt. W. J. Flanagan, in general charge of the farm, said:

The Pat Neff honor farm was established just twelve months ago with 117 white men. Since that time 173 additional men have been sent to the honor farm, making a total of 290 men placed on the honor roll. Of these forty-two have been transferred to work at the State parks and on other public work. There have been discharged, paroled or pardoned, 122 men, of which there were twentynine pardons and six furloughs. Forty-nine men have escaped from the honor farm since its was started."



The general woodwork was white, and the doors were painted deep blue, bright yellow, one sage green and one was a sort of mauve. On each was a pretty knocker of brass or polychrome, and above the knocker was the occupant's name in a little frame. into the wrong room or have some one



The whole scheme was a decorative and convenient one for giving individuality to an upper hall, which is usually as impersonal as a hotel

The Beautiful Luminor

Have you happened to see it yetthis newest and most artistic form of movable lighting fixture, rivaling the shaded living room lamp in beauty, if not in lighting power? It is called a "luminor," and in its rich combination of black and gold and its antique design, suggesting dim cathedrals, it is truly a charming accessory of any room which seeks to express dignity. sedate good taste, and quiet elegance.

The luminor, which comes in many variations of the same general form and materials, gives out a soft glow which is very lovely on a small table in a corner, in the center of a carved cnest, or on the console in a hall. The cylinder in the center, which contains an electric bulb, is made of gold brocade lined with mica, giving a mellow golden light. On either side are small torch lights, with pointed bulbs, shaded by tiny shields of mica-lined brocade. Such, at least is the luminor illustrated in the sketch There are other designs, all in the same general feeling.

Some of these exquisite black and dull gold lamps are called "torcheres," having tall candelabra-like groups of



lights with black and gold bases. There are pedestal torcheres also, and some tall standing luminors which would be beautiful in a hall or in a richlyequipped drawing room or library.

Don't ask me if these luxurious things are inexpensive. Far from it! But they are modern developments of this age of beautiful lighting, and we women ought to know about them even if we can't afford them. They would assuredly make charming wedding gifts, provided they fitted in with the decorative scheme of the newly-weds. Of course they are all equipped to connect with the lighting switch in the baseboard, and each is a work of art, from reading lamp to small table decoration. They are the "last word" in lovely lighting.

PAUL IN CORINTH

LESSON TEXT—Acts 18:1-11.

I. The True Missionary Method (vv.

Paul came to Corinth a stranger in a strange city. He did not have an advance agent to do his advertising. His method in gaining a foothold in Corinth was as follows:

1. Finding a Home (v. 2). This he found with Aquila and Priscilla, Jews. who were recently expelled from Rome by the cruel edict of Claudius.

2. He Toiled for His Daily Bread

(v. 3). He was of the same craft with them, being a tentmaker. Every child among the Jews was taught some trade by means of which he could gain a livelihood, should occasion re-

II. Preaching in the Synagogue at Corinth (vv. 4-8).

1. Though Compelled to Toil for a a Living While Getting a Foothold in Corinth, He Did Not Lose Sight of His Main Work (v. 4).

He reasoned in the synagogue every Sabbath, persuading the Jews and Greeks. While the missionary should not be above honest toil when necessity arises, he must not allow toil to interfere with preaching the gospel. 2. His Activity Was Increased When Silas and Timothy Came (v. 5).

This resulted from three causes: (1) They brought good news from the church at Thessalonica (I Thess.

3:6) To hear of the steadfastness of those who had confessed Christ under his ministry, put new vigor into his la-

(2) They brought pecuniary gifts from the Macedonian church (Phil. 4:15; II Cor. 11:9).

Being relieved from the necessity of toiling for a living, he could now devote more time and energy to the preaching of the gospel.

(3) Silas and Timothy became sistants to Paul in the work.

3. Paul Opposed (v. 6).

His increased activity was met with increased opposition. As the Lord's ministers become more aggressive in their work, the ministers of Satan put forth corresponding efforts in opposi-

4. Paul Announces His Purpose to Turn to the Gentiles (v. 6).

Because of their blasphemy and opposition, he ceased to work among the Jews. There is a time when good judgment causes one to abandon work where efforts have been fruitless, but is difficult to know just when to do it. Oftentimes lasting harm is done to the work by pressing efforts when people have turned against truth. Paul's declaration, "I am clean," was a most solemn one.

5. He Nid Not Go Far Away (v. 7). He remained sufficiently near those whose hearts God had touched that they could easily find him. It is likewise true that although Christ is obliged to depart from the soul that refuses Him entrance. He lingers with vearning love around that heart,

6. His Success (v. 8). Crispus, the chief ruler of the synagogue, was converted. Perhaps Paul's severe action in turning away from them moved Crispus to act.

MOST ECONOMICAL PRODUCER OF FOOD

Although the statement that the dairy cow is the most economical proucer of human food of all the different c'asses of live stock, is a fact, it does not hold true for each individual cow. The one most important factor in profitable milk or cream production is the ability of the individual cow. It does not matter what breed you own a what family within the breed, there are always certain individuals that are more economical producers than others. According to the latest available figures, the average milk production for the dairy cows in the United States is 4,260 pounds of milk, points out J. P. LaMaster, chief of the dairy division at Clemson college.

South Carolina has just recently started developing its dairy herds, and although we have no available figures on the actual production of all the cows in the state, it is very obvious that the production is much lower than this average for the United States. This means that if we are to make dairying a profitable farming operation, we must not only get more cows, but we must especially improve the average production of all of our cows. The individual farmer can do this in three ways:

First, by keeping records on the cows he now owns, and this does not mean official records, but the actual weighing of the milk each produces at each milking. Totaling this record each month and also keeping a record on the feed each cow consumes in a month, he can in a few months tell which of his cows are the best.

The second way by which the farmer can improve the producing ability of his herd is by buying cows which have already made creditable records proving that they do have this ability to make a profit on feed consumed. This is a rather expensive way because the farmer who has made this record on the good cow wants to keep her and in order to buy her, it is necessary to pay a premium. Also, in buying cows, there are chances for loss in bringing in diseases and other troubles of which you have no knowledge when you make the purchase.

The third way is a combination of the first and the use of a bred-for-production dairy sire on the cows you now own and which are selected from your herd as being the best, judging from the records they have made.

Feed for Calves Where

Milk Is Not Available

Where milk is not available for calves, give the following: Take 50 parts finely ground corn, 15 parts\linseed oil meal, 15 parts finely ground rolled oats, 10 parts dried blood flour, 10 parts skim-milk powder, one-half part salt. Stir up with warm water at the rate of one pound of the meal mixture to about six pounds of water. Increase gradually as the whole milk is decreased, until at the time the calf is 50 days old it should be getting only the gruel. At this time one and onehalf to two pounds of the meal mixed with the water will constitute a day's feed. The total quantity of milk used is about 300 pounds; if less is fed the calves are likely to be unthrifty.

Better Dairy Practices

to Increase Production

By increasing the average production of his cows about one-fourth, and at the same time reducing his production costs one-seventh, Arnold Graue of Jackson county, Minnesota, has increased the profit from his cows, above cost of feed and labor, more than 70 times

He increased the production of his herd by culling out the poorer cows of his herd and replacing them with higher-producing heifers of his own breedcosts by installing an engine to run his cream separator and by building a milk house close to the barn, thus reducing the labor of handling his milk

Egg Shipping Business

Allied With Creamery

A good many of the co-operative creameries as well as the smaller private creameries are planning on handling the ergs of their patrons. The reason for this is the feeling that the egg-shipping business is closely allied with the creamery business.

Some of the creameries which have tried this line of work are voting to continue it during the coming year. The reason which is advanced is that it is unnecessary to set up two organizations to handle two products which are so closely related and which may be more economically handled by one organization.

EXTENSION OF RAIL ROAD IS OPPOSED

Panhandle Line to South Plains Not Needed, Says Denver.

Washington.-Declaring that the application of the Texas Panhandle & Gulf Railway Company for authority to construct a railroad from Fort Worth to Tucumcari, N. M., presents a moot case to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Fort Worth & Denver has filed its brief in opposition. The Panhandle's application is one of four to build into and through the South Plains country. The poison used by certain South The protest of the Denver was joined by the Wichita Valley lines and the Quanah, Acme & Pacific.

The Denver's brief does not agree that the Texas Panhandle & Gulf can be financed, and says anyone familiar with railroad financing, construction and operation and having proper conception of the policy and laws of the country must reach the conclusion from the record that the Texas Panhandle & Gulf is neither economic nor justified from any standpoint. If the road is built, says the Denver's brief, it could net continue to crist by its own resources, and would inevitably and quickly become a substantial burden on inter-

state commerce. The commission is told that there is no public necessity for construction of the line and that it should not be permitted even if it could be Ananced, the brief adding that if public necessity requires additional mileage in that area of Texas it is the right of the existing lines to furnish it. The fact that the Texas Panhandle & Gulf has filed an application to construct mileage does not give that company a vestel right, neither does it displace or subordinate such right in favor of existing railways, the Denver declares.

Session of Interparliamentary Union Opens in Washington

Washington.-A move for world disarmament was urged on President Coolidge at the opening of the Interparliamentary Union, held in the House of Representatives.

Paul Lobe, president of the German Reichstag and one of the first speakers, declaring Germany already ell's charge of "amateur bungling" by had disarmed, urged that the arms limitation program of the Prosident

Europe, he continued, had retrogressed since 1914, while the United air board, Commander Rodgers, with. States had gone forward with a speed that to him was terrifying. He doubted if Europe ever would attain that stage of development already reached in the United States.

The meeting, attended by representatives of thirty-eight nations, was opened with an address of welcome by Secretary Kellogg, who warned against forces which he said were at work for the disintegration of orderly representative government and for the establishment of class rule.

"I am not an alarmist and I have absolute confidence in the intelligence and patriotism of the people of all those nations who have reared and maintained the marvelous institutions of the twentieth century," he said, "but I can not be blind to the forces which are working in many of the self-government countries for the disruption of really representative Governments and the establishment of class tyranny."

Almost coincident with Secretary Kellogg's address Senator Borah of Idaho transmitted without recommendation to Senator McKinley, president of the conference, a protest from Shapurji Saklatvala, the British Communist, who was denied entry to the United States.

"The interference with the presence of any or all the delegates was not modify the Versailles treaty nor entirely uncalled for," the letter to Senator Borah said, "as any such complaint would have received the most careful consideration by the governing body of our conference, and even, failing that, the United States officials could easily have controlled my residence or activities in their country outside the conference

"I submit without anger or vindictiveness that the action taken against me was from other motives, and I offer to present myself to any investigating committee of nationals not involved in this dispute before your conference finishes, anticipating of course, that the parties responsi ble for enforced exclusion would take the necessary steps for the re moval of any bar against my coming

TURKS ARE CALLING MEN TO COLORS

Nothing Significant is British View, But Move Fleet East

London.-The report from Constantinople that the Turks are calling further troops to the colors and the announcement in London that the British will maintain a strong fleet in Near Eastern waters for the next few weeks are explained in British official quarers as being merely a coincidence and as having no significance.

As far as the fleet is concerned, it is only engaging in maneuvers, the officials said

Official spokesmen pointed out that the Turkish move is nothing to cause uneasiness, but is merely in accordance with Turkish military policy for safeguarding the frontiers.

Unofficial observers, however, express the opinion that the Turks in calling up four classes to the colors, are making a gesture-possibly a bluff-with the idea of getting a fayorable settlement of the Mosul question. These observers also express the belief that the British fleet maneuvers in Eastern Mediterranean waters may not be unconnected with a desire to "call" the Turkish hand. All quarters in London, however, agree that there is no danger of a clash of arms.

WAR MUST REST **UPON GERMANY**

Versallies Treaty and Judgement of Past is to Remain Unchanged

London.-German responsibility for the great war must remain fixed upon her; the coming European security conference can not modify the Ver sailles treaty nor alter the judgment of the past.

Great Britain and France have sent this notification to Germany in replying to that country's note of acceptance to the conference for a security pact which will open in Locarno, Switzerland, Oct. 5.

The German note accepting the al-I invitation and the replies from London and Paris were made public here recently.

Germany, according to her note of acceptance, "entirely shares the allies' view not to protract negotiations for the pact and also trusts the final settlement of the problems will be expedited by the meeting."

However, simultaneously with the delivery of the note in all the allied capitals, the German Ambassadors made verbal declarations denving that Germany was solely responsible for the war, inquiring as to Germany's status with regard to the League of Nations and asking when the Cologne zone would be evacuated.

The British reply notes with satisfaction that Germany has accepted without reservations and declares that the verbal declarations have no relation to the security pact. With regard to German responsibility for the war, it is the British attitude that this has been demonstrated by the need of the forthcoming conference.

"The question of Germany's responsibility for the war," the note says, "is prefaced by the pact and this government is at a loss to know why Germany raises the question at this particular moment. The Government is obliged to observe that the negotiations for a security pact can atler Britain's judgment of the past."

With respect to Germany's entrance into the league, Britain simply notes with satisfaction that Germany rases no objection to this condition to any mutual pact.

Germany is agreed that evacuation of the Cologne depends solely on her fulfillment of the disarmament obligations.

The French have replied silimarly, Foreign Minister Briand informing Cerman Ambassador that his verbal observations should not be considered as conditions or reservations to the preliminary negotiations.

MANY COTTON PICKERS HAVE BEEN PLACED

U. S. Employment Service Directs More Than 40,000 to Fields.

Fort Worth, Texas.-By the end of United States Employment Service will have directed 50,000 or more cotton pickers to employment, it is estimated by C. W. Woodman, assistant director of the division, in charge in Texas and the Southwest. A check of the activities so far this month reveal that more than 42,000 pickers have been directed through the main ofice here and suboffices ii. other parts of the State. From San Antonio office 25,000, mostly Mexicans, were directed to Louisiana, Mississippi and West Texas. This service is rendered by the Federal agency without charge to either employed or employers.

Chambers of Commerce and other organizations in other States are being advised by Mr. Woodman that Texas now has no more cotton pickers than are needed to gather its own crop. Many calls for pickers have been received during the last

few days from Oklahoma points. Orders are now on file in the division office here for approximately 34,000 pickers for West and North Central Texas, and this demand can be filled withir the next three weeks, in Mr. Woodman's belief. Many of the orders are not urgent, while others are wanted immediately.



With a nod, he dismissed them all, and once again Drummond was alone with his two chief enemies.






