J.E. Boatwright Killed By Train.

The Grim Reaper has been busy in Callahan county the past week. J. E. Boatwright was killed early Sunday morning at Cisco. It is supposed that he tried to catch the early morning train that arrives at Baird at 4 o'clock a.m., and accidentally fell under the train and was killed instantly.

John Boatwright was a son of W.K. Boatwright, a well known stock farmer, on Lower Deep Creek.—Baird Star.

Steady drilling has marked the progress of the Harris well, near the Vestal No. 1, since it was recently placed in charge of a new drilling crew. At late reports it was drilling at a depth of 3250 feet, and everything indicates its completion will be made within the next two or three weeks.

It is reported that the Harve Vestal has struck promising sand at 2685 feet, and they are now inserting the last, or six inch casing, preparatory to bringing it in.

The scarcity of water, which caused a temporary shut down at the Odom, has been overcome and we are informed that drilling has been resumed.

The Texas-Arizona Co. is preparing to begin drilling again on the Adams well, located on the Payou southwest of Cross Plains. This well was 2700 feet at last drilling.

The Roxana people, we are informed, have not succeeded in getting lease extensions on their holdings in this territory. Their original leases on this land expire in about one year from now.

The greatest developments in the Hilburn field continue in the direction of Cross Plains.

Renerick Clark of this city, who has been attending A. & M. College at College Station, was taken with a severe attack of appendicitis the latter part of the past week. He was immediately carried to a sanitarium at Bryon Texas, where an operation was performed. Renerick is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Clark of Cross Plains, Mr. Clark received notice of his son's illness and rushed to his bedside. Mrs. Clark informs us that she has received a message stating that the operation was successful and that an early recovery is expected.
