Both the Union Pacific and Northern Pacific are bringing them by the train load; but the most of them stop in Washington, some in Oregon, and Idaho is getting a liberal share. When I first came here, five years ago, we had five neighbors; now there are nearly fifty. This is not a very good farming country; it is too rough and rocky. The people, that are here, are here mostly for the timber, and it is going at a rapid rate. As I write this, I can see six large booms of logs lying in the bay. Logging is to this country what cattle raising is Amarillo; it is the life of the country. I have seen as high as five steam-boats in the bay at once, and all seem to be doing a good business. Timber will scon be getting scarce around the edge of the lake, and then they will have to go back into the mountains. 




