Time To Be On Watch For Young 'Hoppers

County agent Breedlove says that this is the time of year when farmers and ranchers want to be on the lookout for young grasshoppers and hatch areas that need poisoning.

Green grass has just started and the young hoppers feed on the tender grass and that is sure the time to get them say the county agent. Poison is very effective before the hoppers begin to migrate, and if we wait until they are big enough to migrate, then they are very hard to kill and often times the cost is three or four times as much as when they first hatch out.

The young hoppers can be poisoned by spraying and using toxaphene, aldrin, dealdrin or chlorodane. The proportions to use are shown on the container or you can come by the county agent's office for help in spraying.

Breedlove urges that the main thing is to start the poisoning program when the hoppers are small and still concentrated in the hatch area. The only way to get the hopper at this time is to keep a close watch over the ranges and farm land and get an early start on the control program.

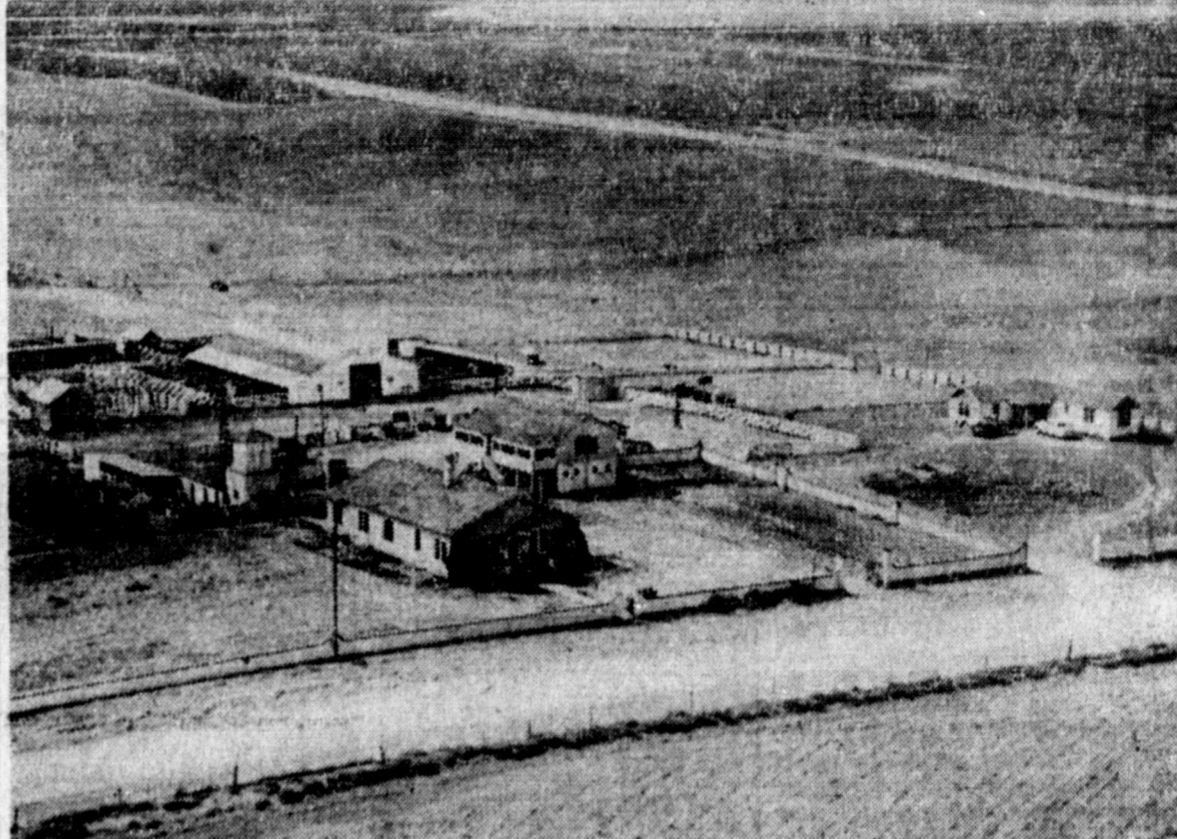

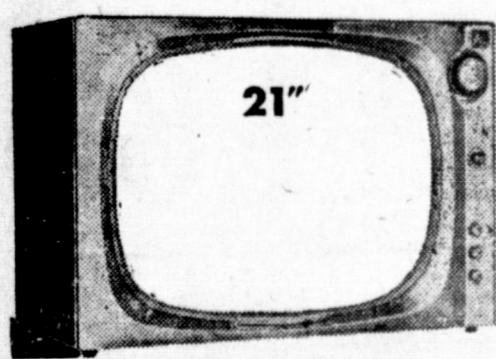

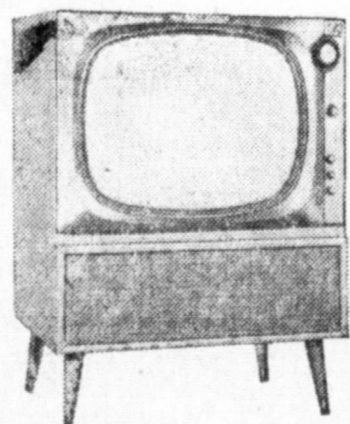

DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

The spring grass planting season has arrived, and those interested in planting the native grasses should be getting their seed in the ground. It is important that the planted grass get an even start with weed growth, and so should be in the ground about this time of the year, or at least before we get a rain.

One of the most popular mixtures for the heavier soils this year is King Ranch bluestem, an introduced grass that spreads exceptionally well; Blackwell switchgrass, an improved strain of the native switchgrass; and sideoats grama and bluegrama, both native to a wide variety of soils in this area. The SJ Ranch and John Knorpp are planting this mixture on a total of over 500 acres. For the sandier soils, a mixture of Blackwell switchgrass, Indiangrass, sand lovegrass, and sideoats grama, all native grasses, is more popular. J. B. Masterson and Fred Watt are planting this mixture.

A number of farmers have been waiting for the Soils Bank Bill to be passed before seeding any grass because of a provision in the bill being considered to encourage grass planting by leasing the land from the farmer for a period of from 3 to 15 years. If and when this bill is passed, it is thought that considerable more grass will be seeded. It is not likely that the bill will be passed early enough to allow the grass to be seeded this year—with the possible exception of those grasses seeded late on a clean seed bed, like weeping lovegrass and blue panic. However a person should plan what he wants to seed next spring and prepare a suitable seedbed for it this year. The most satisfactory seedbed is a firm one which has a good cover of some close growing drilled crop like a sorghum or millet. The ACP office in Clarendon is offering financial assistance for this seedbed preparation as well as for the purchase of grass seed. The Donley Soil Conservation District has grass drills for rent, and the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the District offers technical assistance in selecting a grass mixture most suitable to the individual soil conditions and grazing needs.

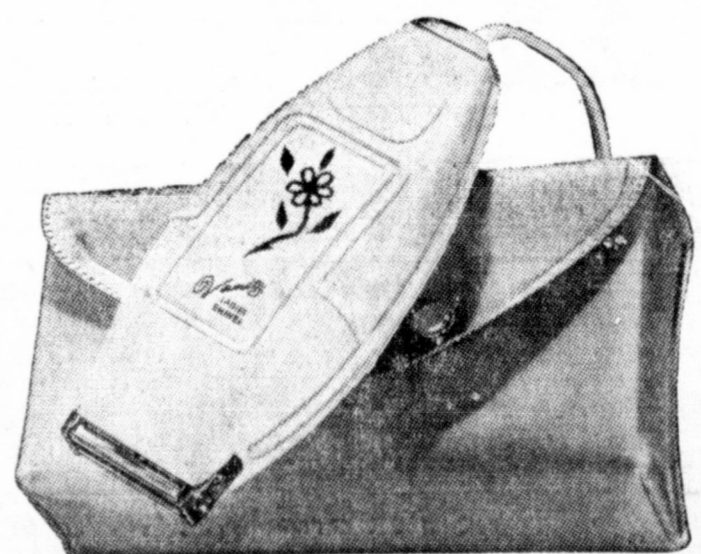
Finally, Buck hit on the obvious solution. He just made a deal with the hotel switchboard operator that whenever she called them she'd use two

**SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION**

It is good business to check your social security account at least every three or four years, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security District Office, reminds all persons covered by the social security law. By checking your account, you can be sure that all your earnings that count toward old-age and survivors insurance were reported and credited correctly. If you find that all wages or self-employment income that can be are not credited, you should then notify the local social security district office and the necessary action will be taken to correct your account.

Since all survivor and retirement benefits are based on your covered earnings, it is important that all wages and self-employment income are correctly credited through the years.

Sanderson pointed out, however, that the earnings statements for the year 1955 are not available at this time since the posting of wages is not completed until six or nine months after the wages were paid. Therefore, a record of wages paid through the last week in December 1955 will not be available before July 1956.

Sanderson stated that the local security office, located at Amarillo, has available a postcard form for those who wish to obtain a record of past earnings credit-

ed to their social security account.

**RESOLUTION**

# FARM NEWS

## GRASS AND LEGUME SEED SUPPLIES ARE MORE THAN AVERAGE

With spring just around the corner, it's time to take a look at the supply of 21 grass and legume seeds, especially this year with the talk of a possible "soil bank" plan.

If the entire available supply of the 21 grass and legume seeds were sown in 1955-56, there would be enough seed to sow nearly 83 million acres and still leave a carryover of each seed equal to the smallest carryover during the last 10 years. Last season, there were almost 52 million acres sown.

Because all the seed of certain kinds or varieties would not be suitable for sowing in some sections, or is suitable, might not arrive on farms in time for sowing this spring, actually not more than 16 million acres above the average of 57.5 million acres might be sown.

As the spring season opens, supplies of the 21 grass and legume seeds are in largest supply relative to average requirements for alfalfa, ryegrass, Sudangrass, lespedeza, tall fescue, timothy, and Kentucky bluegrass.

On the other hand, supplies are shortest for redtop, sweetclover, crested wheatgrass, white clover, and smooth brome. But if imports of sweetclover and smooth brome Canada after January 31 are as large as expected, supplies of these seeds will exceed average requirement.

The supply of these 21 seeds for planting during the 1955-56 season—made up of 1955 production, carryover last June 30, and imports from July 1, 1955, to January 31, 1956—totals 1.1 billion pounds. This supply is about a fourth larger than last year and a fifth more than the 1950-54 average. The latter periods include imports for 12 months instead of the 7 months for the current season's supply.

An estimated 57.2 million acres were planted annually in the United States between the fall of 1949 and the spring of 1954 with seed of the 21 grasses and legumes covered by Crop Reporting Board estimates.

**STORM WARNING SYSTEMS FOR MOST OF TEXAS**  
AUSTIN—Texas will meet the 1956 tornado season with one of the world's most complete storm warning systems, and with a well-oiled disaster relief organization.

Radar storm warning sets are in operation in 16 of the state's 20 first-order weather bureaus. All state highway patrolmen have been carefully schooled in the wily ways of the weather and are keeping a sharp eye on the sky as they patrol the state.

A patrolman is credited with sounding the first warning of the awesome San Angelo storm of 1953.

Texas "local severe weather warning system," the first established anywhere in the world, is made up of sets operating around the clock in Amarillo, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Midland, Lubbock, Abilene, San Angelo, Waco, Austin, Port Arthur, Galveston, Houston, Corpus Christi, Victoria, San Antonio, and Brownsville.

Only four of the state's first-order weather bureaus—El Paso, Laredo, Del Rio, and Dallas, are without warning networks.

All stations are connected by teletype and radio. Any station is able to instantly appraise all other stations of a tornado traveling in their direction. When such a warning is given, the weather bureau in the storm's line of approach immediately notifies local communities in the area.

The sets were offered to local areas by the U. S. Government

from war surplus stock. Each one was converted into a storm warning set, at a cost of \$10,000, borne by the cities.

Louisiana and Oklahoma are cooperating in the southwestern warning network by operating limited networks of their own.

"We now have what we consider one of the best local severe weather warning services possible to render at this time," said the U. S. Weather Bureau's regional office in Fort Worth.

Dallas is reported to be considering installing a set. Heretofore the set in Fort Worth has served both cities. A set is said to be badly needed in Del Rio.

State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle said his department stood ready to provide vac-

and public health engineering and emergency nursing know-how to stem the threat of disease in event of weather disaster.

Meanwhile, the Commissioner urged these precautions if and when a tornado is sighted:

Take shelter in a storm cellar, cave, or underground excavation. When underground protection is not available, take protection along the inside walls on the lowest floor of a strongly reinforced building, or against the southwest corner of a house.

In open country, move away at right angles to the path of the storm. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or depression to avoid flying debris.

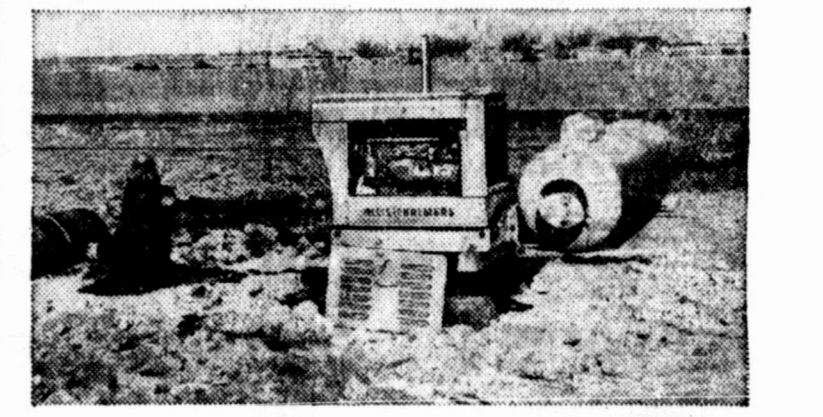

### THE DANGER OF PROPAGANDA

There are several kinds and forms of propaganda. It is simply a technique of influencing people to believe certain ideas. It could be called concentrated advertising. Its powers can be used for

both good and bad purposes. The recent developments in Russia concerning the condemnation of Stalin proves how completely people can be absorbed and controlled when they refuse or fail to think for themselves and accept at face value those things that they are told. Stalin had been built into a living God in the eyes of the Russian people by the mechanics of false propaganda. His death afforded the propagandists an excellent opportunity to increase the devotion of the Russian people to this man. They placed

him in the tomb with Lenin and promptly proceeded to build him up to a more exalted position, if such was possible. This was clearly evident to those of us who visited in Russia. We could joke with the Russians on any subject except Lenin and Stalin. The minute any of us made a statement that could be interpreted, through the most strained construction, as an indirect reflection on either of these men, their abilities or their accomplishments, we were promptly called down and advised in a very

pleasant but firm manner to cease and desist.

Now we are being told, in effect, by the heads of the Russian government, that Stalin was a scoundrel, a rogue and a black-guard. There is no reason to believe that the present Russian officials, who now have charge of the propaganda machine, will not be successful in tearing this man to pieces. Their success will definitely prove how completely effective propaganda can be. It seems to me that they have made one mistake in picking on Stalin, alone. If they follow their past procedures, their success in destroying Stalin will require the destruction of all material things commemorating him. The entire country and several of the satellites are literally loaded with statues and tremendous portraits of Stalin and Lenin shaking hands with their arms enfolded or otherwise embracing each other. If they had included Lenin in their purge of the deceased, they could destroy the whole statue or the whole portrait, and the expense would be much less than destroying Stalin without marring Lenin. Incidentally, they will have to change the name of their top automobile, which is known as the "Zis". The "s" stands for Stalin. There will prob-

ably be a hot debate as to whether or not the name will be changed to the "Zib" for Bulganin or the "Zik" for Khrushchev.

The most effective weapon against bad propaganda is "truth". That is the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. In order to utilize this weapon to the best advantage, each individual must use his own thought process with which God has endowed him, and very carefully weigh those things that he sees and hears. Otherwise, we, too, could easily become the victims of this insidious practice.

### POLITICAL PREDICTIONS

I pointed out in a previous newsletter that certain forces in this country had decided to limit the Democratic Party to three possible nominees, namely Harriman, Kefauver and Stevenson. These forces proceeded to build up these three men as potential candidates of the Democratic Party and to promptly discount the chances of others who might aspire to this position. The truth of this prediction is becoming more evident each day. The obvious purpose is to cause a three-way split in the Democratic Party. My prediction is that in the final analysis, these practices will fail and the Democratic Convention will name a nominee

other than these three. There is a possibility of one of them being on the ticket as Vice President, but the man leading the ticket will be none of these three.

### THE PRESENT STATUS OF THE FARM LEGISLATION

The heavy thinkers on the House and Senate Agriculture Committees are getting their heads together to try to analyze the bill that was finally passed by the Senate. The conference between the two Houses should be in full swing when you receive this letter. It is hoped that the many controversial issues in the legislature may be solved and

that an acceptable compromise will be prepared and ready to submit to both the Senate and the House of Representatives not later than the 10th of April.

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

AUSTIN—Texans are going to have their way, if candidates have their way.

Most candidates seem to be falling into the same pattern. They want letters from the "folks"—telling them to run for office.

Some want 10,000 letters—some 25,000. Some just want letters.

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It's a new way to solve the postal deficit.

Sen. Price Daniel said he received, within a week, more than 25,000 letters.

Another "letter man," W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel, says he's been getting them by the basketful.

Ralph W. Yarborough reports that he has received reams of unsolicited letters urging him to run.

Another gubernatorial candidate, J. Evetts Haley, had this to

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say, "I didn't have to ask a single soul—much less 25,000 people—if I could run."

### Johnson Challenged

In a fiery verbal blast, Texas Press Association president Russell W. Bryant of Italy told more than 100 newspapermen and women at a North and East Texas Press convention in Tyler that C. T. Johnson of Austin is ineligible to become a candidate for Lt. Governor.

Bryant distributed copies of a deposition taken in the 126th District Court at Austin on Oct. 1, 1955 in which Johnson testified under oath that he spent only \$125 in traveling the length and breadth of Texas while campaigning for Lt. Governor in 1954.

According to Bryant, Johnson testified he had driven 12,000 to 15,000 miles and that his total traveling expenses for the entire campaign period, as reported by him to the Secretary of State, amounted to \$125—for gasoline, oil, tires, repairs, batteries, lodging and meals.

Filing of an inaccurate campaign expense report excludes Johnson from becoming a candidate, under state laws, Bryant said.

isn't a standard make automobile on the road today that doesn't cost nearly two cents a mile for gasoline alone," Bryant told the convention delegates.

### Capitol Area To Grow

Texas Capitol area soon will take on a new look. Gov. Allan Shivers showed the Austin City Council plans for the expansion, and addition of two ultra modern buildings, plus nearly three blocks of additional grounds.

Sites, maps and architects' sketches for the new State Office Building and Supreme Court Building were presented to the council. Both will be three million dollar structures. The Court Building will be located a block northwest of the Capitol, and the Office Building a block northeast. They will face the Capitol and be joined by a 1½ block mall across Congress Avenue. Space for additional parking areas also is included in the plan.

Shivers also announced that the granite quarry near Marble Falls, from which granite used in construction of the Capitol was taken, has been re-opened. It is planned to use granite from the same source, for the new buildings.

Shivers is chairman of the state building commission which plans to begin immediately to acquire the necessary sites for the expansion. Contracts probably will be awarded next fall.

Financing of the building project, largest in the state's history, was made possible by a constitutional amendment allocating the surplus from the Confederate

### pension fund for state buildings.

### Law Enforcement Needs Studied

Vigorous action on many fronts is needed to combat Texas' climbing crime rate, said speakers at the Attorney General's Conference on Law Enforcement in Austin. Some conclusions, after the four-day conference:

By Attorney General John Ben Shepperd: Travis County should have an extra district court, two grand juries and a special appropriation for the district attorney's office.

By Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr.: Since soaring juvenile delinquency can be principally laid to parents' failure to provide good citizenship training, Texas should have a law holding financially responsible, parents of youngsters who wantonly destroy property.

By Prison Board Member Dr. George Beto: Texas Prison System needs \$8.5 million to build housing for increased number of inmates, and must find additional profitable industries to offset upkeep costs.

By James P. Economos, director of the American Bar Association's traffic court program: All persons charged with a moving traffic violation should be required to appear personally before the traffic court judge.

By Author-Attorney Earle Stanley Gardner: Law enforcement has suffered from the outmoding of corporal punishment in the home and school.
