## Hedley Residents Complimented On Holding Successful Cotton Festival

The First Annual Donley County Cotton Harvest Festival was held in Hedley last Friday and Saturday with many Clarendon firms and people participating. Bob Harris, General Chairman of the Festival, stated, "While some disappointments were experienced by the General Committee due to failure of promised exhibitors to respond, we feel that the event was highly successful and that everyone had a wonderful time; plans are already underway for next year's event which we know will be even bigger and better."

County Agent H. M. "Flip" Breedlove reported that over two hundred interested farmers and ranchers saw the films on cotton, livestock and poultry, shown in the special theatre set up in the rear of the Hedley Barber Shop. Much interest was also shown in the home made grass seed drill that Breedlove exhibited.

Among the Clarendon firms exhibiting at the Festival were AAA Motor Company, Palmer Motor Co., Palmer Machinery Co., Noblitt Sales and Service, Estlack Machinery Co., Thompson Bros. Hardware and Implement Co., and Risley Implement Co. Theme of the Festival was to show Donley County residents that they can buy in Donley County anything that they can get anywhere else. Local exhibitors have expressed their appreciation to the people of Hedley for making such an event possible.

Highlighting events Friday were the concert by the Hedley School Band, greased pig contest, the Kiddie Parade, a square dance team exhibition, greased pole climbing contest, and the coronation of the Queen of the Festival at the high school auditorium Friday night. The Queen was crowned by Milton "Buff" Morris, Lion Club District President of Canyon.

Saturday's events included the Festival parade featuring floats of both commercial and non-commercial themes, marching bands including Hedley, Memphis, Panhandle, Groom, and the Salvation Army Band of Amarillo; numerous farm equipment and commercial entries, including Clarendon exhibitors.

A special exhibition was presented by the Amarillo Air Force Band. Climaxing festivities Saturday night was the Queens Ball at the Hedley Legion Hall.

## Irrigation Meeting Set For Nov. 13th

Irrigation is fast coming to the front in Donley County and farmers need information on irrigation and what to expect if they get an irrigation well. H. M. Breedlove, county agent for Donley County has arranged for a county-wide meeting on irrigation on the night of November 13 at the county court house in Clarendon in the district court room at 7:30. Mr. R. V. Thurmond, irrigation specialist for the Texas A&M College Extension Service will be present to talk on irrigation. He will discuss basic fundamentals on irrigation and development of ground water. He will also show some color slides on irrigation practices and discuss them. He will try to answer any question that you might have on this question. Breedlove is urging that everyone interested in irrigation to attend this meeting.

"We are having one meeting because we could only get Mr. Thurmond for one night in the county; therefore we thought a night meeting at the court house in Clarendon would be about the best for the entire county," the County Agent stated.

President-elect Eisenhower

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower won the presidency of the United States by a landslide in Tuesday's election and polled the largest popular vote to ever be cast for any candidate for this high office. Latest tabulations Wednesday gave Ike 29,124,000 to 23,470,000 for Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson. The American public stayed with their radios Tuesday night until Gov. Stevenson conceded at 12:45 and Gen. Ike gave his reply shortly after 1 a. m.

In addition to carrying the nation, Gen. Ike scored in Texas with a total popular vote exceeding \$14,000. Gov. Stevenson received over 700,000 Texas votes. Narrowing the area down, Gen. Ike carried the majority of Panhandle counties including Donley County. People were voting for a change and against President Harry S. Truman. Gen. Ike carried 39 states with 442 electoral votes. Stevenson carried 9 with 39 electoral votes. It looks like the Republicans will also have control of both houses.

Gen. Ike received a total of 1,145 votes in Donley County with Gov. Stevenson receiving a total of 889 votes. The votes from the 10 voting boxes in Donley County were as follows with the first figure named for Gen. Eisenhower: Absentee, 68, 32; Goldston, 14, 22; Court House, 417, 207; Lelia Lake, 77, 76; City Hall, 268, 210; Hedley 164, 272; Ashola, 40, 22; Jericho, 27, 9; Glenwood, 18, 24; Skillet, 22, 8; Martin, 33, 17.

When it was all over, both candidates pledged unity and cooperation to bring about lasting peace and sound government.

Mr. Davis who was 65 years old, died Wednesday in Ennis, Texas. He had lived there for the past year and until that time had made his home in Donley County. He was born in Cold Springs, Ark., Sept. 30, 1887.

Survivors include his wife, four sons, Henry of Amarillo, Howard of Muskogee, Okla., Gene and Charles stationed in California with the US Air Force; four daughters, Mrs. J. J. Tulas of Dalhart, Mrs. Arlie Barnard of Amarillo, Mrs. Jesse Ryan and Mrs. Virginia Geddes; his father, J. L. Davis of Houston; two brothers, seven sisters, six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

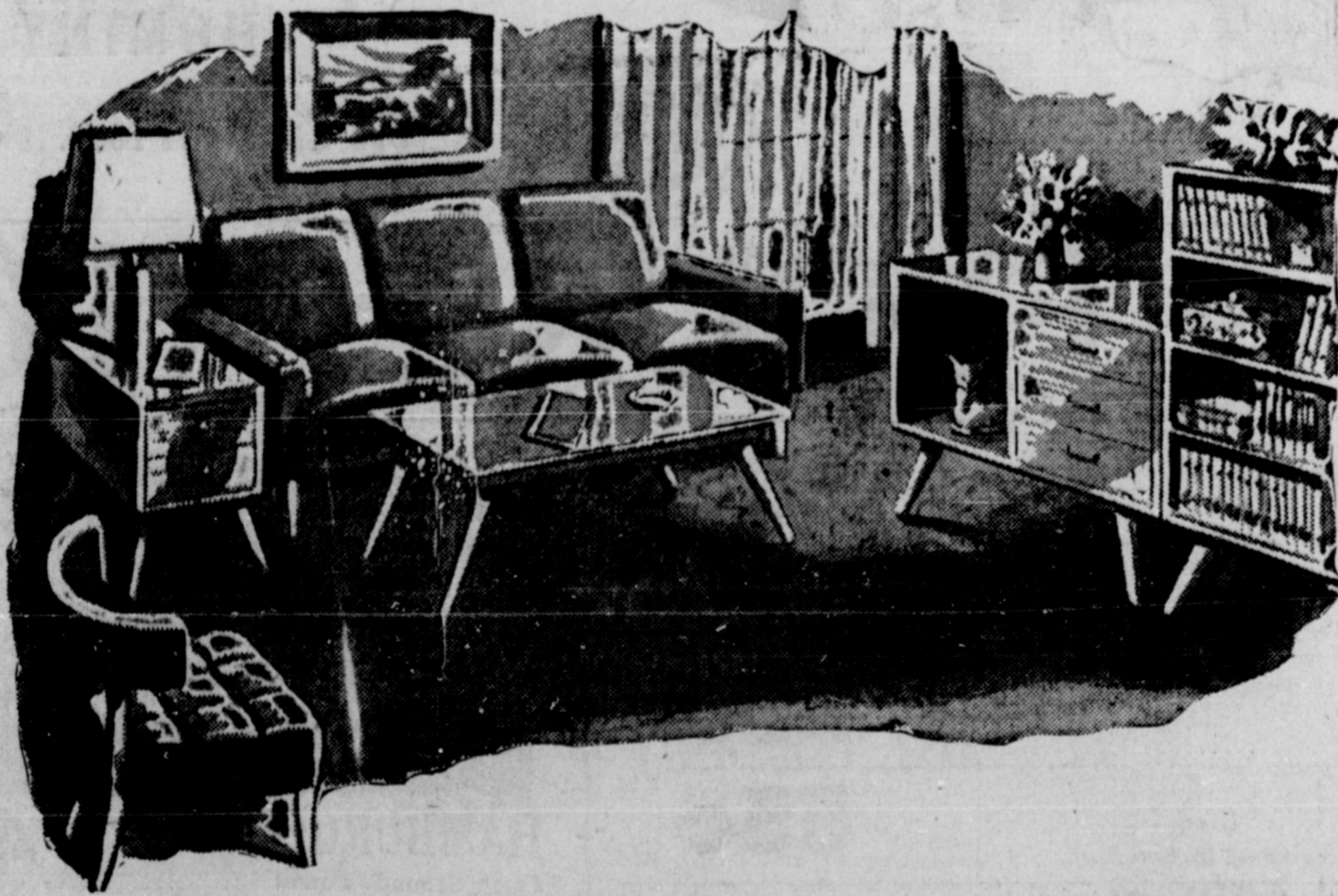

**Hastening The Advent Into The Glory World**

No other animal has the facilities for fast travel is possibly the reason the human animal has a desire to travel like a demon. The writer noted in the San Antonio Zoo last week that out of thousands of the monkey tribe from the giant gorillas down to the cute little spider monkeys, not a cripple was noted. Monkeys do not drive autos is likely to cause the more verdant to fall a victim to protection from this fast age. Not so with the human animal. He or she is often a victim of the impulse to lamb the bunion on the accelerator and drive the old bus as rapidly as the motor will turn the wheels.

The report of the State Highway Department for the year down to September 30th, offers no encouragement that the human animal is profiting from the deluge of deaths of the other fellow.

Only 23675 were crippled by autos in our towns and cities so far this season as compared with 12,604 the same date last year. Whoop 'em up boys—and girls! Only 718 have been killed during the same period by cars, as compared with 774 last year. What are we coming to?

Out in the urban belt or country side 564 have been killed as compared with 622 for the same period last year. Of this number, 66 in town and 30 in the country were killed in a mad race to beat the train at the crossing. Racing is a lot of fun, we are told, unless the car and train happen to get to the crossing at the same time.

Only 13 have been killed and 795 injured so far this year by driving into abutments, bridge railings, trees and such like in the towns. Out in the country is where we glory in such pastime. During the same period this year 115 were killed and 832 crippled by trying to knock down trees, concrete bridge banisters and abutments.

Head-on collisions! You bet we like 'em. Of all the killed in the battle of autos, it is said that almost half of them escape death after a thrilling head-on smash. Whole families often engage in this sport.

We still are reminded of the free, easy, safe life of the monkeys in the zoo.

Do our autos ever hit a cow or horse? You tell 'em we do. Last year 3 were killed and 82 injured by trying to push old bossie out of the way at high speed. This year we only killed one passenger but we succeeded in crippling 184, most of whom spent weary weeks in a hospital where they had plenty of time to think matters over. Did they?

Another cute trick is to "flop over" on the highway or roadway. Last year 53 were killed and 488 injured while this innocent pastime was in progress. This season we are improving our technique by killing 62 and injuring 548 in this non-parlor sport of entertainment. Can you feature a parent's happiness while dragging the mangled remains of a son or daughter from an auto wreck? More especially when the wreck is on fire. Will the adults become more sensible and civilized? We wonder and when!

The "flop over" is often accompanied by sliding which has a tendency to mangle the bodies of the innocent child victims as well as the guilty adults. Now in the rural belt it seems they go in stronger for this form of sport. From this report of the Highway Department for September we read that out in the urban section where there is plenty of room to turn, back up or cut most any kind of caper, the turning over idea of celebrating resulted in the death of 52 this season so far, while 383 were injured. Of that number, quite a number will be injured for life and display their

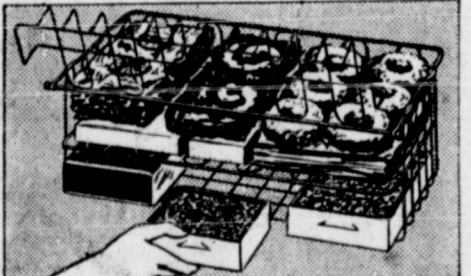

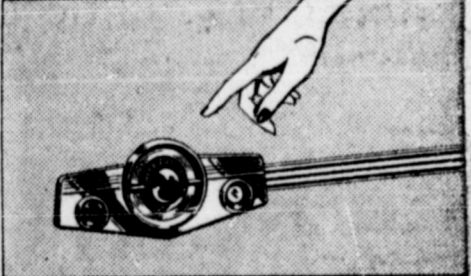

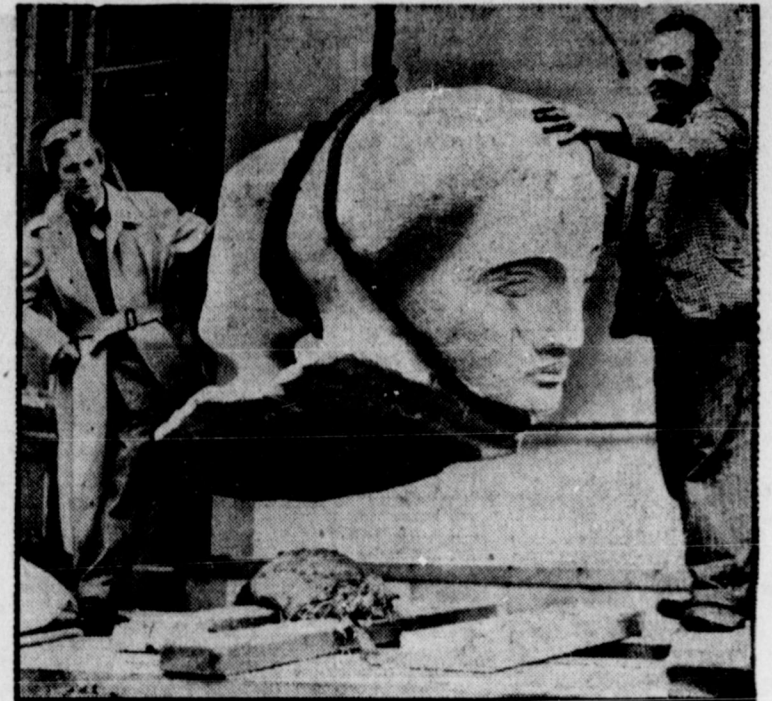

**FARM NEWS**  
From the County PMA Committee

**HAY PROGRAM:**

The emergency hay program is still in full swing. The way it appears at the present time, the hay program will go in the same full swing all during the winter months. More and more producers are realizing that they are in worse condition than they had thought of being. Since the last report, some legume hay has been received and also some grass hay. Clyde Slavin received the first car of legume hay and Forrest Sawyer and Frank White received the first two cars of grass hay. The hay was said to be good. There is still hay ordered, still hay coming in, and still more orders to go out. If anyone else wants to put in applications for this emergency hay, come to the county office and put in your order.

**1952 PROGRAM YEAR:**

The 1952 program year is certainly drawing to a close rapidly. There is still money left in the 1952 budget that is ready to be used to help out your producers who need this money to improve your land for better production purposes and to save the soil from wind erosion. There is a great deal of money remaining for deep plowing, but due to the weather and the reports of contractors, it is still too dry for deep plowing. If by chance your land is in condition for deep plowing, there is money left to help you out. If you producers plan to carry out many more practices under the 1952 program year, you had better be deciding on what you plan to do and when you plan to get started. The time is going by very rapidly.

**1953 ACP FARM-BY-FARM CONTRACTS:**

Yes, it is the 1953 farm-by-farm contracts that are being mentioned again. Perhaps everyone thinks that he knows everything about these contracts that are taking place, but evidently a great number of you farmers haven't understood that if you don't sign up with your community committee by December 1st, 1952, you won't be among the producers in the county to get

PMA assistance during the 1953 program year. This is quite different from the previous years, but the outcome of this project will be the same if everyone will see his committeeman and sign up with him as soon as possible. Make up your minds on the practices that you want, because the time is running short.

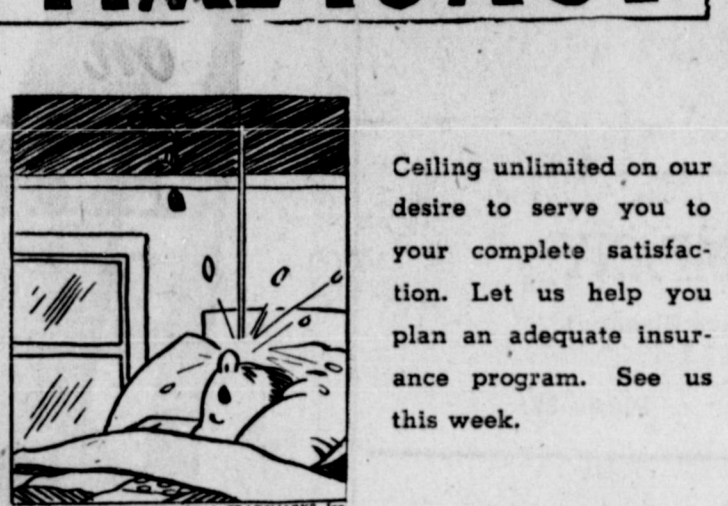

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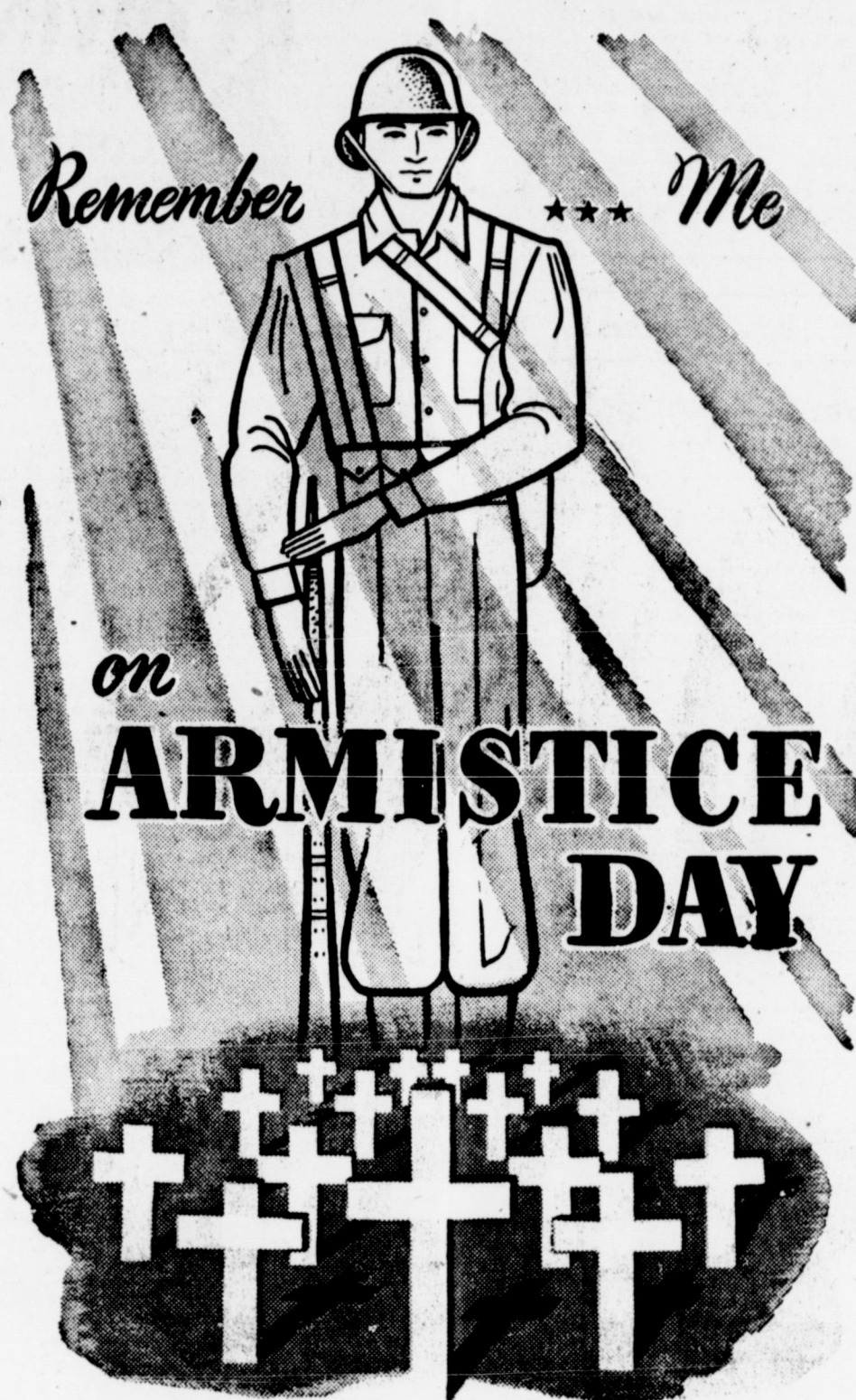

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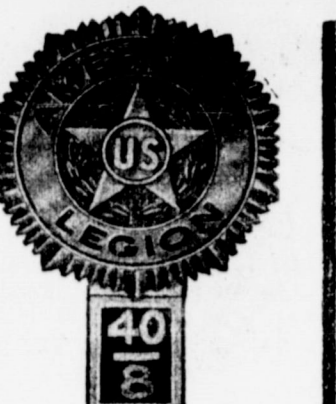

**Left Ham Sandwich -40¢**

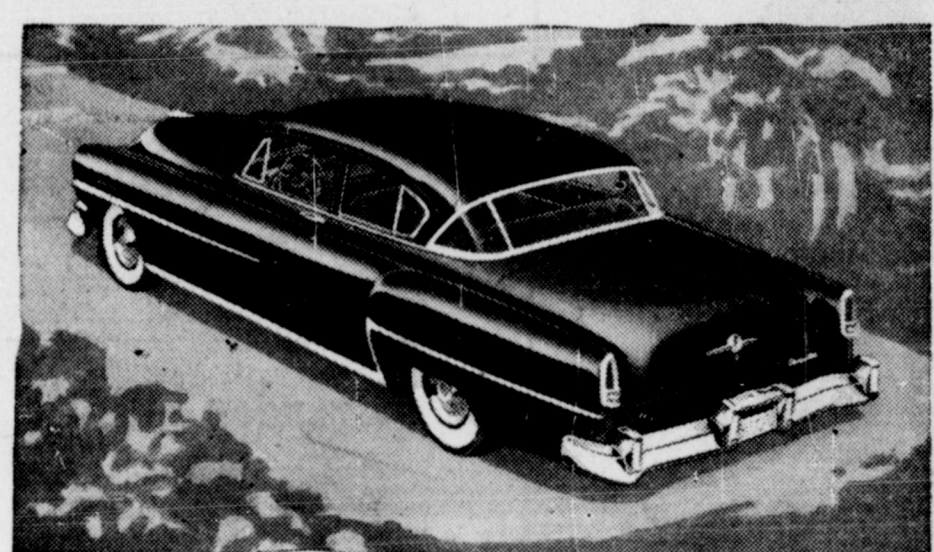
