Many of our local residents have expressed themselves by stating that Clarendon was in a rut and needed to progress along with other communities. If our taxpayers think this issue over and investigate each proposition carefully and then go vote what they think is right, then we should have the answer.

Many think of a Bond Issue as an extra burden regardless of the benefits to be derived. About the only way a town or city can keep up with present progress is to vote bonds or raise taxes to a very high point. This can be done by following various methods. In our particular case here in Clarendon it is our understanding that no blanket tax raise will be made. Voting this Bond Issue may solve many of our problems - - so think it over.

### To The People of Clarendon:

Your Mayor and City Commissioners, by a unanimous vote on May 29, passed the following resolution:

**"A RESOLUTION**

by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Clarendon, Texas, calling an election for the issuance of \$23,000.00 Waterworks Improvement and Extension Bonds, \$30,000.00 Sewer Improvement and Extension Bonds and \$47,000.00 Street Improvement Bonds."

If YOU, the people of Clarendon, are to have and enjoy a water system adequate to serve your needs and the needs of your Fire Department in its protection of your property; if your general health is to be safeguarded by a modern, scientific germ eradication and treatment plant of your water supply; if your sewer system is to be improved and extended so that the general community health is adequately protected against epidemics and communicable diseases to the greatest possible degree; if your streets are to be paved and improved so that you can hold up your heads with a degree of self-respect and pride from a civic view point, then these bonds must be approved by you at the June 21st election.

It may well be said that these proposed bonds are a "meat and bread" issue. They provide for no frills, they provide for nothing that Clarendon has not needed for a long time. This bond issue provides only for the bare essentials necessary for the City of Clarendon and the civic welfare and the general health of its people.

This proposal is being submitted to YOU, the people of Clarendon, because it contains the things you have said you wanted. In the 'community clinic' recently conducted by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, these above items of Civic Improvement were given top priority by an overwhelming number of people.

The redemption of this bond issue, both in principal and interest as they come due, will not cause an across-the-board or percentage increase in your city taxes as is so often the case when cities vote bond issues. Studies by your Mayor and City Commissioners have shown that if you, the people, really want your streets paved and improved and your water and sewer facilities improved and extended IT CAN BE DONE by merely adding FIFTY CENTS PER MONTH to the water bill of each meter in the City of Clarendon. This is the method by which your City Commission proposes to retire this indebtedness and it will not be liquidated by a general increase in city taxes.

We, your Mayor and City Commissioners, unanimously pledge ourselves that the improvements permitted by the passage of these bonds will commence as soon as possible and we believe that they will be almost completed during the coming summer; and we further pledge ourselves that no reallocation or transfer of these bond funds to any other project will take place.

We sincerely believe that you, the people of Clarendon, earnestly desire that your City Commission accomplish the projects for which this election is being called; and that in approving this bond issue you will be removing a great and deterring handicap from the future development and progress of Clarendon.

The Roundup will be officially over after breakfast on June 11.

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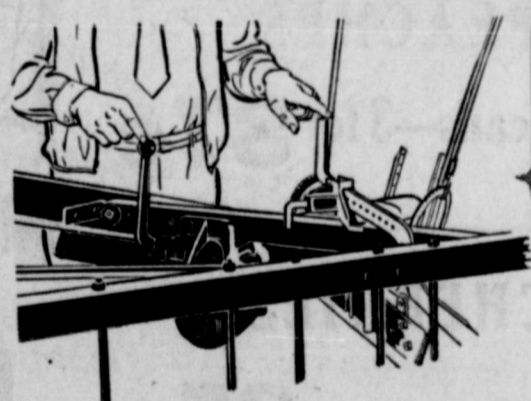

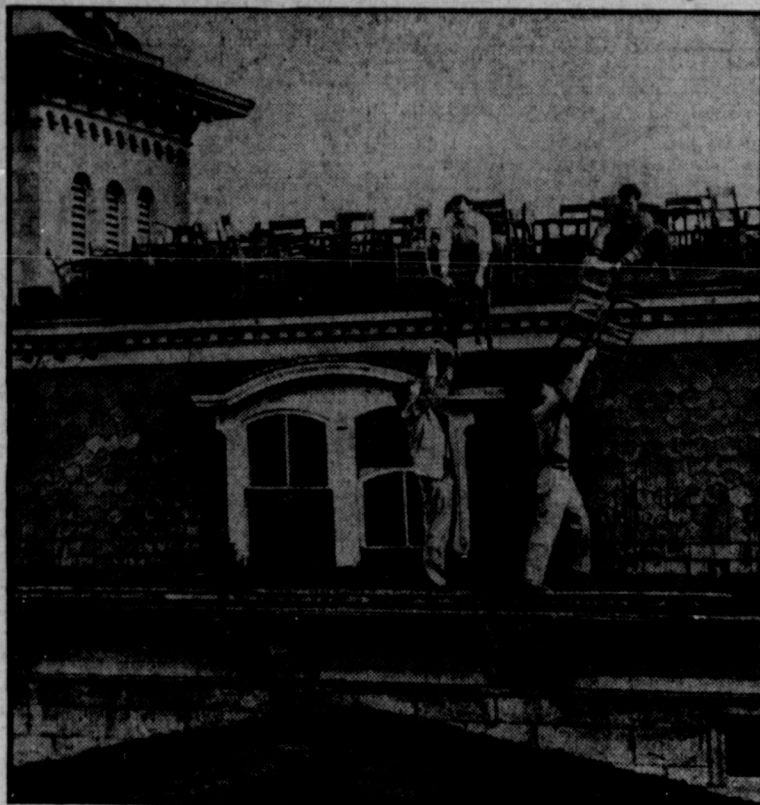

**To The People of The 18th District**

**THE TIDELANDS:**

The tidelands issue has been misrepresented. When I first came to Congress, I was surprised at some of the statements that were made to me by other members concerning the tidelands question. Many of them had a complete misconception of the real issue involved. I did my best to explain it at every opportunity and to point out the mistaken beliefs that had been created. Many of the members were grateful for the explanation and sincerely appreciated enlightenment on a subject that was completely foreign to them. I feel that we gained a number of votes by the work that was done by the members explaining the real issue to those members from the inland states. Many of the members had

been misled by just such stories and comments as are now passing around the country. After the House of Representatives passed the tidelands bill recently, the big papers up in this section of the country came out with stories that made no explanation whatever of the issue involved or how it was handled. The stories merely stated that Congress was trying to GIVE OIL-RICH COASTAL LAND AND WATERS TO A FEW STATES. All of you know that nothing could be further from the truth. In the first place, Congress was not undertaking to give anybody anything. It was merely trying to do its duty in correcting a grievous wrong that was committed by the Federal Government and the Supreme Court when these lands were stolen from the states by legalized larceny. In the second place, the use of the term "oil-rich" was a misleading half-truth and wild guess. There is no assurance

whatever that the tidelands of Texas will produce oil. It is at most semi-wildcat territory. However, there is pretty good assurance of great oil production on the continental shelf off the coast of Texas, which is owned by the Federal Government and which does not belong to Texas and never was claimed by Texas. This continental shelf extends about 135 miles out into the ocean. The tidelands that are in dispute consist of a strip of land only 10 1/2 miles off the coast of Texas. So, you see the State of Texas only owns 10 1/2 miles, while the Federal Government owns approximately 125 miles, and if there is oil off the coast, the Federal Government would get about 12 1/2 times the potential production accruing to Texas, assuming that our 10 1/2 mile strip of tidelands is restored to us as it should be. On the other states, with the exception of a part of Florida, the tidelands strip is

only three miles. But the people who want the Federal Government to take over these lands are willing to mislead and misrepresent the actual truth and thereby lead the people to believe that if the tidelands are returned to the several states, the Federal Government will be knocked entirely out insofar as income from oil and gas production of the coast of the United States is concerned. Such tactics are nothing less than the use of bare-faced propaganda. It is our duty and we should never miss the opportunity to tell the truth about the tidelands to everyone we meet. If the people in this country knew the truth about the tidelands, we would have had them back long ago.

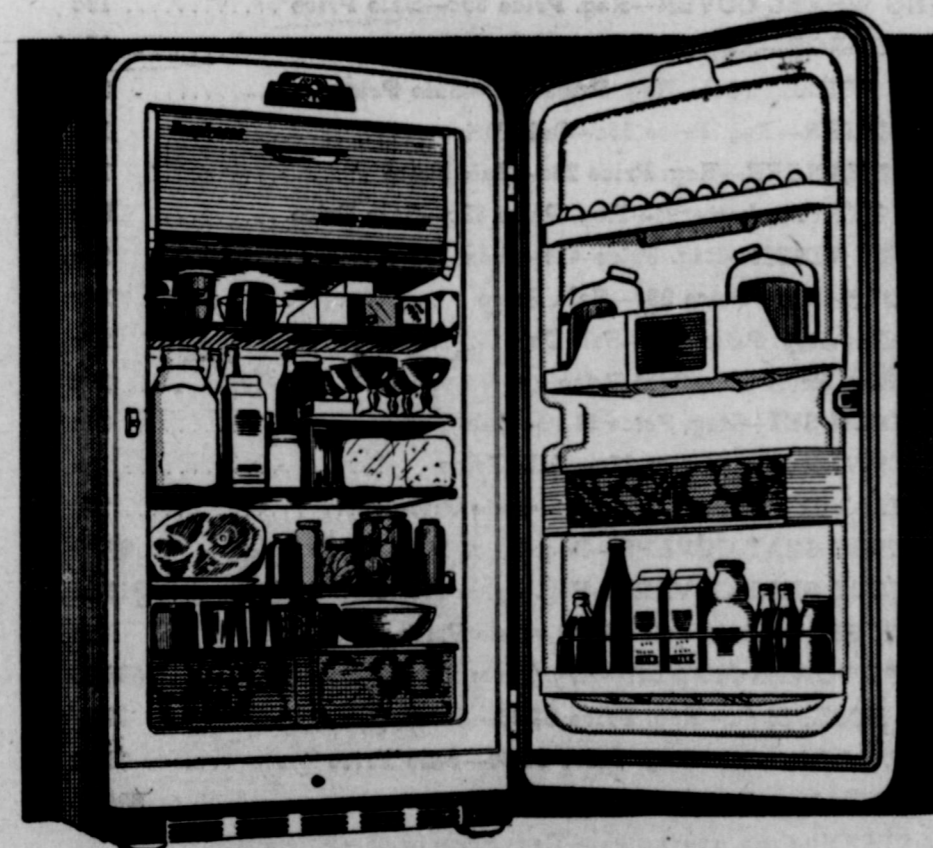

### FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

#### ACP CONTINUED FOR TWO YEARS UNDER USDA

The House passed without amendment S. 2569, to continue Federal Administration of the Agricultural Conservation Program (PMA) for two additional years beyond December, 1952. This bill will now be sent to the President since the Senate had passed it some time ago. The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 provided for administration of this program to be turned over to an agency of the State after 10 years. It has been continued under Federal Administration by Congress extending the time by two years since 1948.

#### 1952-CROP UPLAND COTTON PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

Details of the price support program for 1952-crop upland cotton were announced April 25th by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The program differs from previous programs principally in that it gives greater encouragement to the use of local lending agencies and local administrative committees in the granting and servicing of loans on cotton, and makes purchase agreements on cotton available for the first time. Equity transfer agreements also will be available to producers.

The Department announced on November 29, 1951, that 1952-crop cotton would be supported at 90 per cent of parity. On February 21, 1952, the Department announced that the average loan rate would be not less than 30.91 cents per pound, basis Middling 7/8-inch cotton, or 90 per cent of parity at the beginning of the marketing year (August 1, 1952),

whichever is higher. The final loan rate will be announced about August 1, 1952.

#### 1952 FALL SEEDED WINTER LEGUMES AND RYE UNDER 1952 ACP

The State Committee of the Production and Marketing Administration: at their regular monthly meeting held in College Station, Texas last week decided that any Agricultural Conservation Program assistance that may be offered in connection with the seeding of winter legumes or rye in the fall of 1952 must be offered under the 1952 ACP.

Heretofore assistance for seeding winter legumes and rye in the fall has been paid from program fund for the following year. This change was made necessary because of other changes in the operation of the 1953 Agricultural Conservation Program wherein each farmer in the county must be visited by a PMA Community Committeeman in order that a determination may be made that 1953 program assistance will be given as only the most needed conservation practices on each farm before any assistance is authorized for any farm.

## An Explanation To The People of Clarendon of The Bond Election Called For Saturday, June 21

**PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE**  
For the issuance of Waterworks and Extension Bonds—\$23,000.00. The passage of this proposal will allow and authorize the City Commission to: (1) repair or replace some forty (40) underground control valves which the Fire Inspector of the State of Texas recently recommended, (these valves are worn and obsolete, having been installed from 25 to 40 years ago); (2) install a water supply germ treatment plant that will conform to State Health Laws, (our present method has been found insufficient, inadequate and obsolete); (3) extend some existing water mains and install additional fire plugs so as to give fire protection in residential areas now completely unprotected, (this will tend to reduce certain fire insurance rates); (4) replace the present 30-year old air lift pump at the city pump station with a new, deep well turbine pump; (5) re-locate certain water service lines and fire hydrants so as to make ready for street paving and improving; (6) install a master meter in the discharge lines from the booster

pumps so as to accurately record water pumped into the system and check it against consumption and thereby control line losses and leakages which are very costly to the city, and (7) replace certain 3/4 inch mains with larger mains so as to (a) increase available water supply to these points and (b) remedy over-loaded mains.

**PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO**  
For the issuance of Sewer Improvement and Extension Bonds—\$30,000.00. The passage of this proposal will allow and authorize the City Commission to: (1) install a sewage disposal plant capable of taking care of the needs of the City of Clarendon for the next forty years and one that will

meet the specifications of the State Health Department. (Note: A letter now on file in the City Office from the State Health Department notifies city officials that the present sewage disposal system is inadequate and obsolete and will have to be condemned if corrective measures are not taken within a reasonable period of time) and (2) re-locate certain sewer service lines so as to make ready for street paving and improving.

**PROPOSITION NUMBER THREE**  
For the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds — \$47,000.00. The passage of this proposal will allow the City Commission to: (1) share one-third of the cost of paving, curbing and guttering thirty (30) blocks of streets in the residential areas of Clarendon, (with property owners bearing an equal share of the cost); (2) widen the thoroughfare on which Highway No. 287 and No. 70 pass through Clarendon so as to dis-

mission from making a by-pass route around Clarendon for these Highways, (widening on the east of town will be from Carhart Street to Wells Street and to the west of town from Jefferson Street to Bugbee Avenue); (3) raise presently improperly placed curbing and guttering and install new curbing and guttering along Highways No. 287 and No. 70 so that it will be in condition for the State Highway Department to accept the responsibility of completely paving the street to wider width along this highway.

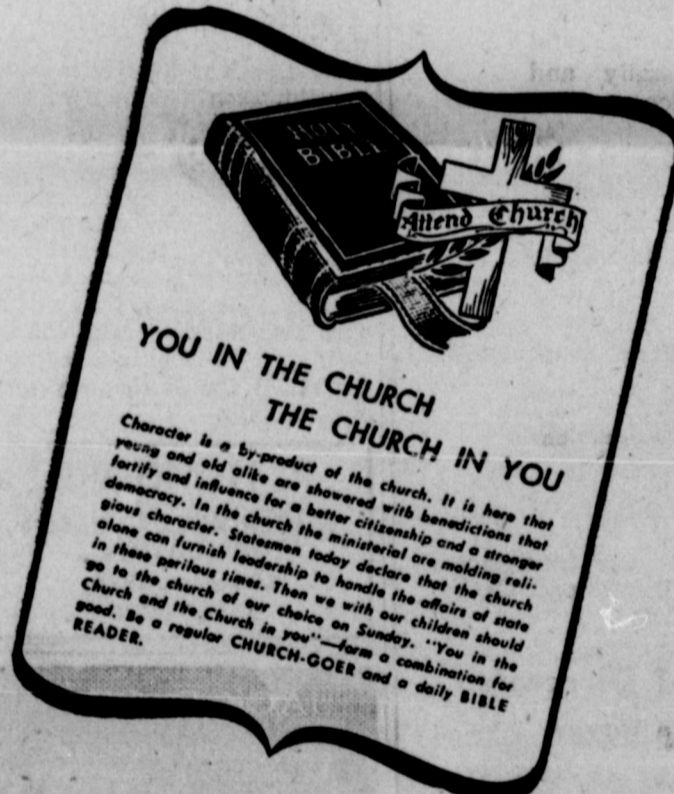

### Soil Conservation District News

Much has been written in this column about the operations and activities of the Donley County Soil Conservation District.

Some may be interested in more information about the What, When, Who, and Why of our local Soil Conservation District.

WHAT: A soil conservation

district is an area of land in which the owners and other interested people have become alarmed at the rate of soil erosion and loss in productivity of its agricultural land and have organized to fight this menace under the provisions of the State Conservation Act of 1939. The boundaries of the Donley County Soil Conservation District are the same as those of Donley County. A district is entirely independent and is in no way subservient to

any agency of the Government.

WHEN: Our District was voted in by the farmers in Donley County in September, 1945. It was given a certificate of organization by the State in November of the same year. The Soil Conservation Service opened an office in April, 1947, and the District began operation.

WHO: The District is governed by a Board of Supervisors of five local land owners elected by the farmers. In our District, these men are J. R. Porter, Chairman; W. P. Doherty, Vice-Chairman; C. E. Bairfield, Secretary; Joe Tollett and T. C. D'Spain, members. This board meets regularly on the second Thursday each month to carry on the activities of the District.

Technical assistance is furnished the District by the Soil Conservation Service. The SCS personnel are as follows: Richard Finch, Olmon Sweet, James Gould, and Carmon Rhode.

WHY: The Program of the Soil Conservation Districts are based on these four principles: (1) Sound Land use. No idle, unproductive acres. Every acre used for what it is best suited—row crops, drilled crops, grass, trees; (2) The right combination of practices. There is no one conservation practice that will adequately check erosion and restore and maintain the soil's productive power. A coordinated plan worked out for each farm contains a number of practices that dovetail together, one supplementing

the other in solving the variety of conservation problems; (3) Improvement and maintenance of soil productivity. Control of erosion alone is not enough if our farm and ranch land is to produce year after year. Plans to replace minerals and organic matter must be provided; (4) Economically sound conservation farming. Conservation is not an end in itself. It is only a means to the end of better living and greater security for all our people. All conservation plans must take this into account.

These principles applied to the agriculture in Donley County will mean a stable, dependable source of food and raw materials. They will lead to an economically secure farm family. The supervisors of the Donley County Soil Conservation District are working toward this goal.

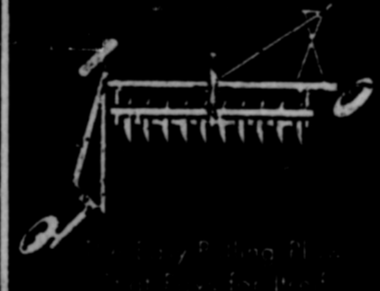

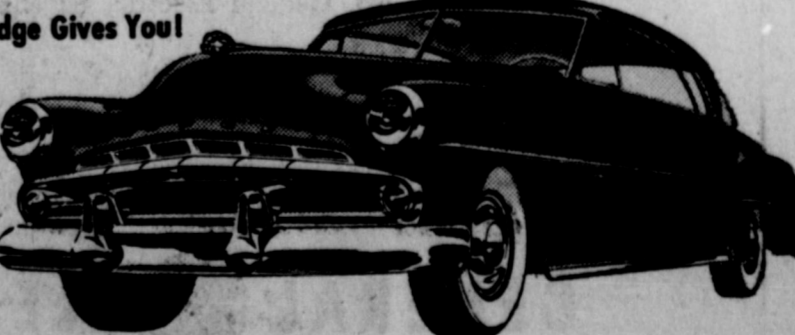
