





This law was passed June 25, 1948, and became effective Sep-

tember 1, 1948. I have just introduced a bill amending the paragraph above quoted, which has to do with the punishment of offenders. My amendment, if passed, will take the place of the language above quoted. It provides that anyone who advocates the overthrow of the government in the manner and under the circumstances out-


