Bulldogs Win One And Lose One In Conference Play

Clarendon won an important game here Saturday night against Howard County 73-60 to stay in contention in the conference race; but the Bulldogs were unable to cope with Amarillo's height and dropped their Tuesday night game 79-68. This loss virtually eliminated the Bulldogs from a trip to the state tournament which goes to the two top teams in the zone. The Bulldogs have one more game against Odessa this coming Saturday night here in the local gym.

The victory of Saturday night was particularly satisfying since it was the first time Clarendon had defeated the strong Howard County school in four years, except the forfeited game earlier this year. The Bulldogs were extremely hot with Fielding, Dorman, DeGaish and Peoples hitting from all angles. The team set a new game percentage record making 65 percent of their shots from the field. High point man was Garland Fielding with 23 points followed by DeGaish with 17 and Peoples and Dorman with 13 each. The entire team played well defensively and out-rebounded the taller team from Big Spring.

Against Amarillo, the Bulldogs tried everything. The whole story of the game was Amarillo's 6'-8" pivot, Tom Boyd, who scored 41 points over the heads of the Bulldogs who just didn't have anything to stop him with. High point man for Clarendon was Fielding again with 18 points and scoring was well distributed as Peoples got 15, Dorman 14, Alexander 11 and DeGaish 7.

The last home game for this season will be played this Saturday night, Feb. 13th at 8:30 in the college gym. It will be the second game of a double-header attraction which brings the finals of the District 1-A High School tournament plus the Junior College basketball game to fans of the area in one package. This should be a good week end of basketball. Come out and support the high school and college teams every time you can. They appreciate your interest and support.

School Cafeteria Receives \$400 Gift

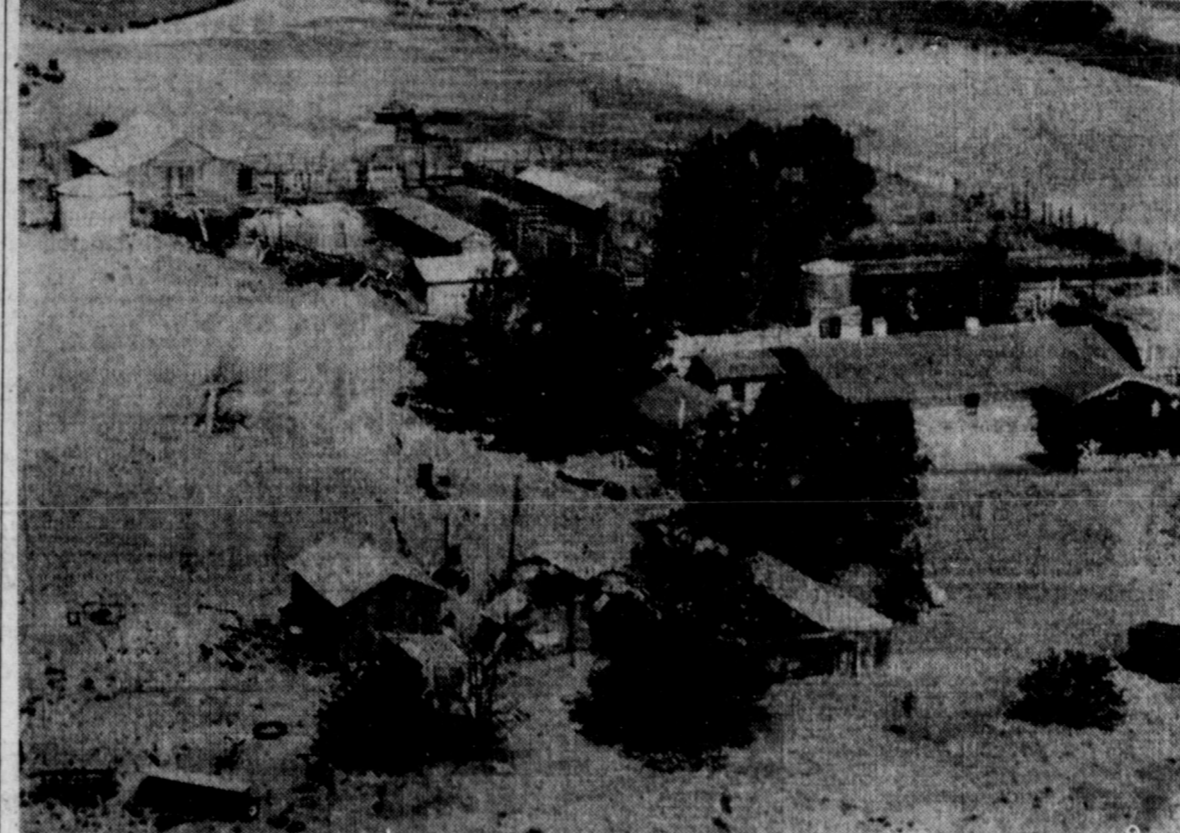

PREMIUM MONEY FOR ANNUAL FAT STOCK SHOW ANNOUNCED

Local Dairymen Hear Marketing Expert

"You've got to have accountability and stability in your milk market", W. L. (Bill) Matthews told a group of 25 Donley and Hall County dairymen at a meeting in the County Agent's office here last Friday afternoon. With Mr. Matthews was Louis G. Hinders, president of the Tri-State Milk Producers Association, with headquarters at Canyon, Texas.

These men included Clarendon in a series of meetings over the area to educate dairy farmers on the advantages of the Federal Milk Marketing Order.

Mr. Matthews outlined the procedure for obtaining a Federal Marketing Order for the milk producers. This is an agency established by Congress in 1937 expressly for the purpose of aiding farmers in getting a fair price and fair grading system for their milk. Among the advantages listed were strict government supervision of the milk through processing and distribution in the milk plants, control of surplus milk in the milkshed, protection to the farmers against surplus milk coming in from other states which would create surpluses in the locality covered by the Federal Marketing Order, protection to small milk plants from unfair practices of the larger companies, and protection of the consuming public from inferior milk and milk products.

Mr. Matthews told his audience, "A Federal Marketing order is a fine thing but it is not the answer to all your problems. You need a strong milk producers organization to enable you to bargain with the milk plants. The Federal Order guarantees you only a minimum price, or a floor. There is no limit on how high the price can go." He urged them to support the newly organized dairy association and cooperate with its leaders.

The Tri-State organization has launched the educational program to pave the way for the Marketing Order. "It takes 66 2/3% of the dairymen to vote it in and only 51% to vote it out. It may take six months to get the order but only one day to get rid of it," Matthews stated.

Similar meetings are being held over the Amarillo Milkshed, which extends from Clayton, N. M. to Wellington, Texas and from Tulia on the south to Guyton, Okla. on the north.

Mr. Matthews is from Tulsa, Oklahoma. He has been associated with the dairy industry all his life, and has spent several years in this type of work, having helped to organize several producer cooperative organizations.

County Agent H. M. Breedlove was host to the group and has pledged his whole-hearted cooperation in working to improve the dairymen's position in the agricultural economy of this section.

Another visitor for the meeting was Lefty Thomas, Collingsworth County agent, who came over for information to take back to milk producers in his area.

COUNTRY CLUB DIRECTORS ELECTED TUES. NIGHT

The annual stockholders meeting of the Clarendon Country Club was held Tuesday night at which time three new directors were elected to serve a three year term. Those elected were W. W. Sandifer, Bob Moss and John Head. The three going off the board were Willard Skelton, Gene Baxter and Willard Hudson. Officers for the club will probably be selected at the first meeting of the board.

A new slide for the swimming pool and other play-ground equipment were approved by the group and the board was authorized to rewrite the constitution and by-laws of the club. It was also announced that the club was free of debt at the present time.

Thursday, February 18th is the Donley County Fat Stock Show date says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. This is the day that 4-H and FFA boys from over the Donley County will exhibit their fat calves and sheep. Registered breeders from Donley and near by counties will exhibit breeding cattle at the show.

All cattle will be in the barns by nine o'clock in the morning and remain in place until four o'clock in the afternoon at which time they will leave for the Amarillo show.

The premium money was donated by business firms and individuals from Donley County. In the steer division there will be two classes with three monies in one class and four in the other; the prize money is \$25.00 first, \$15.00 second, and eight dollars for third; the other steer division is \$25.00 first, \$15.00 second, \$8.00 third and \$5.00 fourth. The prize of \$25.00 for the grand champion will be donated by the Clarendon Lions Club; the reserve champion will receive \$12.50. A prize of \$5.00 for the best showmanship will be given by the Thomas Feed Store of Clarendon. The American Legion is buying one of the smaller steers at the local show at thirty cents per pound and will have a barbecue in the Spring of good club beef. In the sheep division there will be ten places with first prize of \$6.50, \$4.00, \$3.00, and all the rest in this class at two dollars each. The grand champion lamb will bring \$6.50 in premium and the reserve champion \$4.00. The judge of the show will be J. P. Smith of Pantex Experiment Farms.

The Donley County Farm Bureau has reserved and paid for two cabins in Amarillo for lodging for the club boys during the Amarillo show. This is the second year that the local Farm Bureau has done this for the club boys.

Twelve bales of bedding for the calves was donated by Frank Hommel of Clarendon.

The judging of the steers in Amarillo will start at 12:00 noon Monday the 22nd.

ATTENTION! ALL DOG OWNERS

Mayor Major B. Hudson announced this week that with this notice, a campaign is being started to handle the dog situation in Clarendon. Vaccination and tagging of dogs comes up at this time each year, but due to numerous complaints and the rabies scare that is enveloping many sections, it is more important this year that all dog owners take notice of the following information.

All dogs must be vaccinated for rabies and possess a 1954 dog tag by March 10th as dogs without the vaccination and dog tags will be picked up and disposed of as strays. Owners are cautioned to keep dogs under control and around own premises as numerous complaints have been reported regarding property destruction and disturbance.

City officials met with Dr. Deyhle, local veterinarian, and he agreed to vaccinate all dogs for \$1.50 at his place of business. Dog owners who have no conveyance or other possible means of taking their dog to his place of business, may call Dr. Deyhle and he will drop by and vaccinate their dog at the same price. After having your dog vaccinated, you will receive a receipt which must be presented at the City Hall to receive your city dog tax tag which costs \$1.00.

"In order that your dog may not be considered as a stray, it will be a good idea for every dog owner to put a collar on his dog and attach the tags," Hudson stated.

If everyone will cooperate, we believe we can lessen our dog troubles in this manner without taking more drastic steps, the mayor added.

Someone has said; "I want to work hard so that my children won't have to face the hardships of life. I want to leave them a large estate." By going on and on we can see that in many cases should the farm product be free there would still be high prices to the consumer. It would be good if everyone knew these facts.

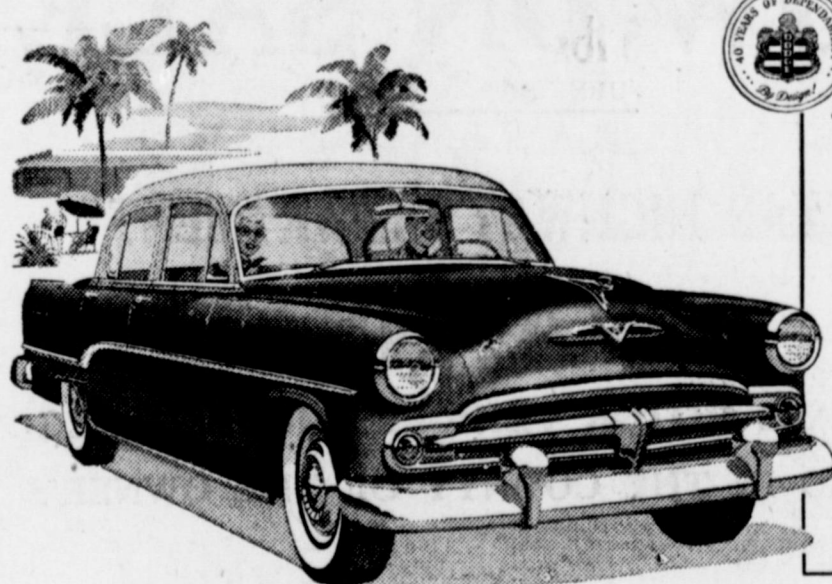

WHEREAS, it is required by law that before such District shall incur any indebtedness other than for its organization and the holding of an election, the Board shall pass an order calling an election within and for such District for the purpose of confirming the organization thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Donley County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 has adopted a plan for improvements by the purchase of a waterworks system, and that said District has expectancy for net revenues from the operation of such improvements; and

WHEREAS, it is now found necessary and advisable to acquire a waterworks system for the District; and

WHEREAS, there is available for purchase by the District a complete waterworks system, at a price deemed reasonable by the Board of Directors of the District; and

WHEREAS, there has been filed in the office of the District a report of the District's engineers covering the plan and the improvements to be purchased together with maps, plats, profiles and data fully showing and explaining the same and containing a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements, including the cost of property to be purchased and showing that said system is completed and ready for operation, so that service therefrom can be commenced at once, all of which plans and estimates have been and are now on file and open to public inspection in the office of the District, and

WHEREAS, said Engineers estimate of the cost of the pur-

chase of such water system and the cost of the organization of the District is itemized as follows:

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary and advisable that the Board forthwith call an election on the confirmation of the District and issuance of bonds;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF DONLEY COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER ONE:

1. The estimate of the cost of purchasing the improvements and cost of organization of the District as contained in the engineer's report, referred to in the preambles herof, is hereby approved and adopted by this Board of Directors as the total amount required to cover such improvements and property.

2. That an election be held within said District on the 1st day of March, 1954, for the purpose of voting on the propositions hereinafter set forth.

3. That the election shall be held at the Boyd Rogers residence within said District and the following named persons are hereby appointed officials of said election:

Boyd Rogers, Presiding Judge, Virginia B. Rogers, Judge.

The Board of Directors officially finds that the above named persons appointed as officers of said election are the only persons residing within said District and qualified to act as officers of said election.

4. That at said election only qualified resident property tax-paying voters of such District shall be permitted to vote as to proposition No. 1, and only resident qualified electors of Donley County, Texas, and of Donley County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote as to Proposition No. 2.

At such election, two propositions shall be submitted, each to be voted upon by the voters qualified to vote thereon.

PROPOSITION NO. 1

"Shall the organization of Donley County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 as established by the Commissioners Court of Donley County, Texas, on December 11, 1953, be confirmed?"

The said District is described by metes and bounds as follows: BEGINNING at an iron pipe located in the West line of said Section 58 which iron pipe is 2611.11' north of the Southwest corner of Section 58;

THENCE East 1847.22' to an iron pipe;

"Shall the Board of Directors of Donley County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 be authorized to issue waterworks revenue bonds of said District in an amount not to exceed \$460,000.00. Maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, the maximum maturity being not more than Forty (40) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Six (6%) per cent per annum, payable annually or semi-annually for the purpose of acquiring a complete waterworks system and to provide for the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds by pledging the net revenues of the District and by mortgaging and encumbering all of its properties and facilities and the franchise and revenues and income from the operation thereof and everything pertaining thereto acquired or to be acquired, but in no case to be paid from money to be derived from taxation."

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LIEN ON PHYSICAL PROPERTIES TO SECURE PAYMENT THEREOF"
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LIEN ON PHYSICAL PROPERTIES TO SECURE PAYMENT THEREOF"

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. The election officers above named shall make and deliver the returns of said election in triplicate, one being retained by

the Presiding Judge, one delivered to the President of the District and one delivered to the Secretary of the District. The ballot boxes and other election records and supplies shall be delivered to the secretary at the office of the District and shall be preserved in said office as provided by law. The Board of Directors will meet at Ten o'clock, A. M., on the 8th day of March, 1954, being not less than five full days nor more than seven days after the date of said election for the purpose of canvassing the returns of said election.

6. The Secretary of the Board of Directors is hereby directed to publish a substantial copy of this resolution or notice containing the same, signed by said Secretary and the President of the Board, once a week for four consecutive weeks in the "Donley County Leader", a newspaper having general circulation in Donley County, Texas. The first of said publications to be made at least 28 days prior to the date fixed for said election. Said publication shall constitute notice of said election. Notice of election shall also be posted by the Secretary at public places within said District and one such notice shall be posted at the door of the Courtthouse at least 28 days prior to the date fixed for the election.

7. Said election shall be held in accordance with the laws of Texas for state and county elections, except as otherwise modified by Chapter 25, of the General Laws, Regular Session, The Ninth Legislature 1925, as amended.

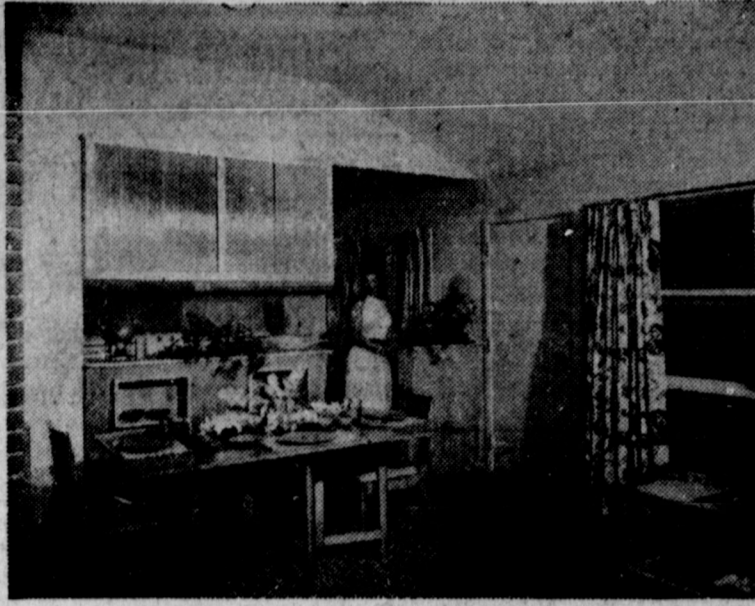

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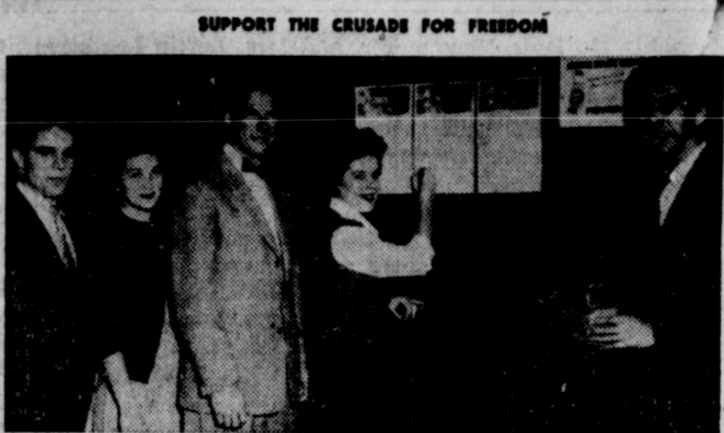

ADVOCATING OVERTHROW OF GOVERNMENT
Section 2385 of Title 18 of the United States Code is the present law that prohibits advocating the overthrow of the government of the United States or the government of any state, territory, district, or possession thereof, or the government of any political subdivision therein, by force or violence. This same statute provides the punishment for engaging in such activities. This law says that anyone engaging in the enumerated activities

"shall be fined not more than \$10,000.00 or imprisoned not more than ten years, or both, and shall be ineligible for employment by the United States or any department or agency thereof, for the five years next following his conviction."

This law was passed June 25, 1948, and became effective September 1, 1948.

I have just introduced a bill amending the paragraph above quoted, which has to do with the punishment of offenders. My amendment, if passed, will take the place of the language above quoted. It provides that anyone who advocates the overthrow of the government in the manner and under the circumstances outlined in the present law,

"shall suffer death, or shall be fined not more than \$10,000.00 or imprisoned not more than ninety-nine years or both; and shall be ineligible for employment by the United States or any department or agency thereof."

Criminal laws have two major purposes. One is to provide punishment for those who offend, and the other is to act as a deterrent against a person engaging in activities that would be a violation of the law. Under the

FARM NEWS

from the County PMA Committee

The information given below with reference to Cotton is quoted from a memorandum received from the State ASC Office, on February 8, 1954: AMENDATORY COTTON LEGISLATION

As is generally known, the Congress has passed legislation that has been signed into law by the President under which 1954 State and farm allotments for upland cotton are increased. The Texas allotment has been increased by 1,342,320 acres.

The provisions of the new law are such that the State Committee in each state decides how the increase in the 1954 State allotment shall be apportioned in order to comply with the intent of the Act and to correct inequities and prevent hardship.

During its meeting on January 29, the State Committee decided to apportion the State allotment increase directly to farm under a 65-40-47 formula. A 65-40-50 formula would cause the State total of increases in farm cotton allotments to exceed the State allotment by approximately 70,000 acres; the State Committee wishes to use a formula that will apportion nearly all of the State allotment increase and leave a small amount in the State reserve for corrections, later, and reconstructions.

The amendatory legislation provides for the voluntary release and re-apportionment of farm allotments for both upland and extra long staple cotton. The release and re-apportionment of upland farm cotton allotments will be accomplished after the 65-40-47 amendment has been applied to individual farms. Instructions on release and re-apportionment will be issued in about three weeks.

Uncle Billie And Texas Newspaper Women

1891 TPA Picture Stirs Memories Of Pioneer Texas Newspapermen

A far cry from the clean-shaven, sports-collared newspapermen of today were those gentlemen of the press of 1891. Their pictures, enshrined in antique gold, were on display at the 1954 Mid-Winter meeting of the Texas Press Association held recently in Austin. The picture was the first reminder of the TPA Diamond Anniversary observance to be celebrated this year. It will be highlighted by a 75th birthday convention in Fort Worth, June 18-19, and by a Diamond Anniversary edition of The Texas Press Messenger the same month.

Bearded and bow-tied, high-collared and sometimes mustache-waxed were the press pioneers who attended the TPA convention in Corsicana May 12, 1891. The interesting picture, arranged in an oval shape, showed some 80 old-time newspaper editors and publishers. In the center was a larger picture of their president, Juan S. Hart. Hart, who retired later to enter, very successfully, the mining business, was a gifted public speaker and long-time owner of The El Paso Times.

Battleground Discussed Elected to succeed him at the 1891 convention was J. F. Mitchell, known as one of the ablest writers in the state at that time and publisher of The Greenville Banner, one of the best weeklies of the day. The Banner now is published as a daily by the Houston Hart interests. Mitchell was strong for the editorial page, which, in those days, resounded of crusades and fine writing. If there was too much matter for his news paper, he would leave out the leading news item of the week rather than an

editorial paragraph. Mitchell died in 1901. Texas Press Association members were in session for the week-end time at the 1891 convention. During the business meeting, a committee was appointed to memorialize the legislature in behalf of a movement to have the state purchase the San Jacinto battleground and make it a state park. On the committee were such distinguished old-time press members as Judge A. B. Norton, Dallas Intelligencer; W. A. Fields, Hillsboro Reflector; R. M. Johnson, Houston Post; A. C. Scurlock, Cleburne Chronicle.

Newspapers represented at the convention and still publishing under the same masthead today were El Paso Times, edited by J. S. Hart; Greenville Banner, J. F. Mitchell; Huntsville News, F. B. Robinson; Galveston News, H. Stewart; Rockwell Success, H. W. Manson; Gatesville Star, J. D. Nall; Hallettsville New Era, William Blakely; Carrizo Springs Javelin, F. M. McCaleb; Carthage Watchman, T. E. Boren; Center Champion, R. S. Bryarly; Marshall Messenger, W. A. Adair; Dallas News, George M. Bailey; Iowa Park Texas, D. C. Kolp; Palo Pinto Star, J. C. Son; Baird Star, W. E. Gilliland; Austin Statesman, C. A. Edwards; Alvarado Bulletin, F. E. Ballio; McKinney Democrat, F. C. Thompson; Dangerfield News, J. F. Robinson; Jacksonville Banner, J. E. McFarland; San Antonio Light, T. B. Johnson.

Just as today, many of the Texas publishers brought their families with them to the TPA meeting. In the 1891 picture were nine women and three children. Many of the wives helped their husbands, even then, on the small-town newspapers. Thirty-three women

are owner-publishers in their sole right in Texas today, and many more help their husbands in printing offices.

Excursion Taken

It was common practice in the old days of TPA conventions for the newspapermen to take an excursion after the meeting adjourned. They were known to travel as far as California, Mexico City, St. Louis, New Orleans, New Jersey, Denver, and Chicago on special trains.

In 1891 the group of bearded editors took a short trip only, traveling from Corsicana to San Antonio, as guests of the citizenry. From there they visited Rockport and Aransas Harbor, upon special invitation of Governor T. B. Wheeler.

Pressure trips, such as these excursions, are not on the agendas of the TPA conventions today. Meetings are devoted to business discussions and educational speeches. Very few trips are made. Those which are taken are usually to industrial plants, military establishments, newspaper offices and educational institutions.

This year, for example, a tour was offered convention goes at the Mid-Winter meeting the day before the convention officially convened. Members were escorted through the new plant of the Austin American-Statesman.

Speakers at the 1954 convention were such outstanding men as Palmer Horts, publisher of The Denver Post; Attorney General John Ben Sweeney; and Dr. George S. Benson, president of Harding College at Searcy, Ark.

Presiding over the sessions were TPA President Arthur H. Kowert, publisher of the Fredericksburg Standard, and Vice-President W. R. Beaumier, general manager of the Lufkin Daily News. More than a dozen other Texas newspapermen took an active part in the one-day program held in Austin in January of this year.
