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

If such a person works on 24 different days in a calendar quarter and earns \$50 or more in cash wages, the employer files a quarterly return with the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The report form is simple and easy to prepare. It calls for the worker's name, social security number, and amount of wages paid during the quarter.

Both the employer and the worker should be certain that the worker's social security number appears on the return and that it is correctly shown. Incorrect or missing numbers mean additional ers under the Social Security Act, work for the Government and the employer to insure that the worker gets credit for the wages.

## All-Texas Methodist

DALLAS-The All-Texas Methodist Evangelistic Mission has become a Revival in churches across the state, headed by Bishops A. Frank Smith, Houston, and William C. Martin, Dallas.

It is expected that some 50,000 persons will be won to Christ and church membership in the two weeks in October.

Oct. 5-14 preachers from the northern section will be in the Houston - San Antonio section. Oct. 26 to Nov. 4, the procedure will be reversed.

Plans include combining preaching and visiting. "This is the first time in Texas that preaching and visiting have been featured at the same time," said Bishop Martin of the Dallas-Fort Worth Area.

High points in the program will be the schools of evangelism in each district, youth rallies at 20 central points on Saturday night, Oct. 6, in the southern section and mass meetings at 20 key cities Oct. 14 as a climax to the All-Texas Methodist Revival.

In the north part of Texas 27 youth rallies are scheduled for Oct. 27 and mass meetings Nov. 14, with schools of evangelism for pastors Oct. 29 through November 2nd.

Involved in the plans are 58 2,221 churches with 635,200 members. These include the Mexican and Negro churches in the eight Annual Conferences.

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
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
