

> main under the GCPR does not have to notify OPS. The retailer who makes the election simply lets that deadline go by without filing a chart. In the event OPS asks for information, however, the retailer must be prepared to show that he was entitled to make the choice.

Meanwhile, the district OPS officials called attention to the new Ceiling Price Regulation covering service trades. It is estimated that several thousand establishments in the Lubbock district, which includes Donley County, have been removed from the GCPR and placed under the regulation (CPR 34.) It became effective May 16.

The new order will benefit the public by making prices clearly visible in every retail service place. The establishments must post their ceiling prices in a prominent position by June 16. The regulation also requires that ceiling prices must be filed with the district office by that date, too, with adequate descriptions of each service. The mailing ad-




