## Veterinary Hospital To Open Officially Sunday, June 10th

H. M. Breedlove, county agent announced this morning that Clarendon veterinary hospital would be officially opened this Sunday, June 10th with an open house from 2 p. m. until 5 p. m. Everyone is invited to call by and look over the hospital and meet Dr. Chas. E. Deyhle and family who are coming to Clarendon to start his practice.

The hospital was built by the ranchers of Donley County so that a good veterinarian would come to the county to practice and serve Donley County and surrounding area.

The officials elected by the ranchers for the building of the hospital were Forrest Sawyer, trustee, Emmett Simmons, treasurer; H. M. Breedlove, secretary.

The entire unit is now complete and located in the east part of Clarendon on highway 287. Dr. Deyhle will be equipped to handle large and small animals at the hospital or make calls into the country. This veterinary hospital is a big help to the livestock industry of this section says Breedlove and every one is urged to patronize the local veterinarian. Dr. Deyhle will make additions to the hospital as his practice progresses. Dr. I. B. Boughton, dean of the school of veterinary medicine of Texas A&M College says that Dr. Deyhle is the top senior in his school of veterinary medicine and Donley County and surrounding area is lucky to have this man and his family to locate in Clarendon. Their home will be in the H. T. Warner apartments.

## Year's Rain Total Still Growing

At the present time, according to the official weather station at the airport, the year's total for moisture received since January 1st stands at 6.68 inches. The June total so far thru Wednesday noon stands at .57. On June 1st .40 inch was recorded, .11 inch on June 3rd and .06 on June 5th.

The amount of moisture has varied over the county with some sections receiving considerably more moisture than the above total and some less. The west part of the county has received much more than this amount and around a half inch was received Monday night. Farmers have been using the skip and jump method of planting—just whenever it would get dry enough to possibly get in the field. The weeds are getting the jump on quite a few and right at the present those fellows need plenty of sunshine. The forecast is for more showers.

**FARM NEWS**  
From the County PMA Committee

**TERRACES UNDER THE 1951 PROGRAM**

At the present time there have been 28 farmers to build Large Ridge Terraces under the '51 Program. The total length of these terraces is approximately 43 miles.

A total of 38 farmers have completed the Diversion Terrace practice moving approximately 53,000 cubic yards of dirt.

Don't forget that a little money is left in the budget for both the Large Ridge and Diversion Terrace practice. Be sure to get an approval before you start the practice or you cannot earn assistance.

There have been 305 farmers and ranchers to complete practices this year. Some have completed more than one and some only one. Most of the producers carried out the deep plowing practice, but there has been some of every practice completed except mesquite spraying.

If you need some Terraces or an Earthen Dam, come by the office and make application for it, but don't forget to get the approval before you go to work.

**PRODUCTION FOR TODAY AND TOMORROW**

How much higher can farm production be pushed? How much more can our acres be made to yield?

The prosperity and strength of our country depends on the answer, for as agriculture is kept strong and productive can the Nation be strong and growing.

The national emergency which calls for all our production from our farms emphasizes more than ever the urgency of doing all we can to make sure our land will keep on producing an abundance of the food and fiber required for a strong defense and a strong country. Even greater production will be needed in the future to keep pace with an increasing population. Next year defense requirements may well be greater than for this year.

All of this adds up to the necessity of more and better soil and water conservation as a foundation for the other things which can be done to step up farm production. Land that has been denuded of its topsoil or cut to pieces with gullies is in no condition for the kind of production needed. Neither will land that has the organic matter worked out of it be in as good a condition for this needed production as land that has been built up by green manure and rotation pastures.

The need to push production higher, only emphasizes the need for expanding conservation work, and the efforts under the Agricultural Conservation program are in this direction. The program encourages and assists farmers in carrying out practices that check erosion, restore fertility to the soil and makes more efficient use of water. The program is in operation in every agricultural county and community in the country.

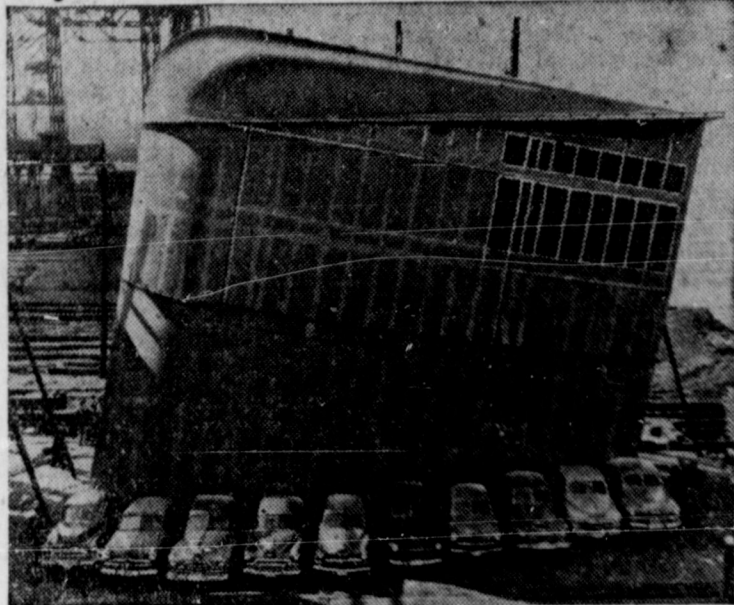

### News From The Office of Price Stabilization

LUBBOCK—Hundreds of small retail stores in the Far West Texas district of the Office of Price Stabilization will be given the option of continuing to price under the general ceiling price regulation, rather than under the retail regulation, CPR 7, the Lubbock district office announced.

The office said many small retail stores with limited book-keeping facilities and clerical help would get this option under the amendment which was scheduled for issue early this week.

The Office of Price Stabilization, in announcing that the amendment was forthcoming, reminded that all other retailers selling items controlled by CPR 7 and its amendments must file their pricing charts by May 31 if they want to continue to sell

legally after that date. There will be no extension of that deadline, OPS emphasized.

The amendment, according to advance information, will provide that stores selling housewares, notions, sporting goods, silverware, china, glassware, jewelry, watches and clocks may elect to price these particular items under the GPCR under either of two conditions:

1. The first provision, designed to help the smallest stores, gives the election for these items to any retailer whose overall net dollar volume of sales of everything in his store is less than \$100,000. Total dollar volume for this purpose, OPS emphasized, is figured on the sales not only of the housewares, notions, etc., but of the store's entire stock of goods.
2. The other provision, which will meet the situation of the store doing a relatively small volume of business in housewares, notions, sporting goods,

silverware, china, glassware, jewelry, watches and clocks gives the election to price those articles under GPCR to any retailer whose net dollar volume from sales of those items is less than \$60,000 annually, irrespective of his volume of sales in other lines of merchandise, and even though his total volume of sales is over \$100,000.

A third provision, which retains a principle incorporated in CPR 7 as first issued, gives the option to any retailer whose sales of apparel, apparel accessories, shoes, beds and bedding, furniture, yard goods, floor coverings, lamps, radio and television sets, phonograph records, musical instruments, luggage, etc., (all CPR 7 and a few amendment 2 items) are less than \$20,000 annually in net dollar volume.

The retailer who elects to remain under the GPCR does not have to notify OPS. The retailer who makes the election simply lets that deadline go by without filing a chart. In the event OPS asks for information, however, the retailer must be prepared to show that he was entitled to make the choice.

Meanwhile, the district OPS officials called attention to the new Ceiling Price Regulation covering service trades. It is estimated that several thousand establishments in the Lubbock district, which includes Donley County, have been removed from the GPCR and placed under the regulation (CPR 34.) It became effective May 16.

The new order will benefit the public by making prices clearly visible in every retail service place. The establishments must post their ceiling prices in a prominent position by June 16. The regulation also requires that ceiling prices must be filed with the district office by that date, too, with adequate descriptions of each service. The mailing ad-

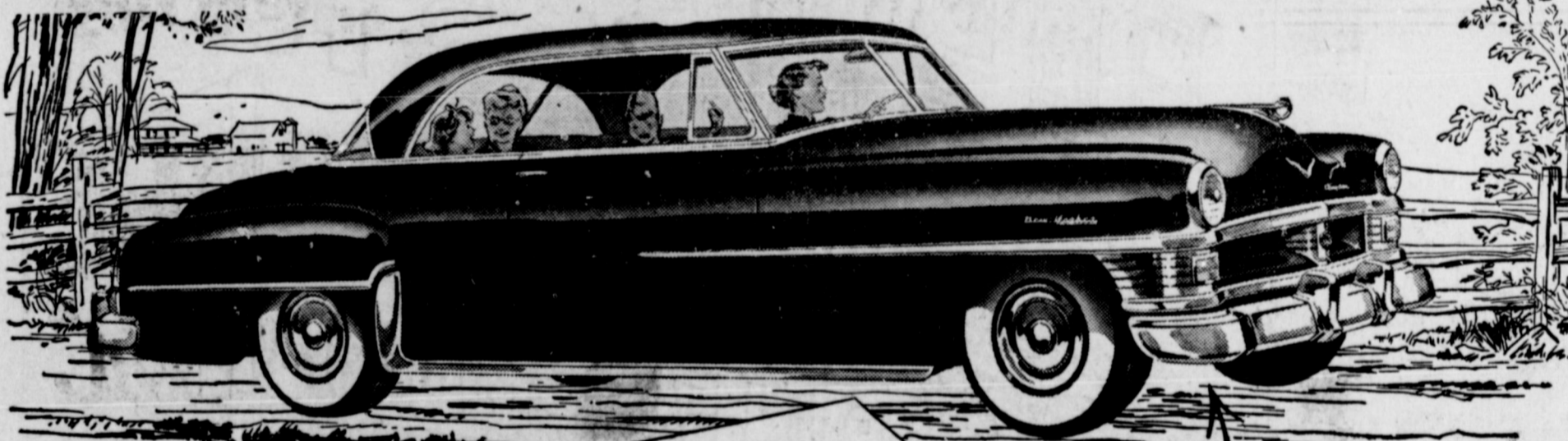

### Texas Oil And Gas Giant Benefactor To Texas Education

ABILENE—The giant-sized business of education in Texas has found its principal benefactor in the petroleum industry, according to an article in "West Texas Today," West Texas Chamber of Commerce magazine, which has devoted its May issue to that region's oil and gas business.

R. B. Anderson, Vernon, chairman of the State Board of Education and president of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, said that oil production taxes from West Texas counties, about \$45,000,000 in 1950, constituted about half of the total state revenues from oil production taxes.

"Texas oil and gas has stimulated the growth of Texas educational institutions far more than any other business or economic development in the history of the state," Anderson said. "The drilling rigs that search for oil in the wide spaces of West Texas are building a legacy for the education of Texans for generations to come."

Anderson wrote that 48.2 per cent of all state government expenditures, exclusive of federal aid are now devoted to public schools, junior colleges, state colleges and special schools.

"This growing development of West Texas oil production has not only raised the standards of education in this progressive sec-

tion of the state for its 475,000 public school children, but has contributed state-wide to the financing of education for the state's more than 1.6 million students," Anderson wrote.

The author said Texas oil and gas operators paid in 33 per cent of all the money that was spent from the Available School Fund, one of the state sources of funds for local schools. Another fund, the Foundation School Fund (which the Gilmer-Aiken Laws last session created to insure all schools a basic standard of teacher salaries and facilities) received \$42.7 million from the omnibus tax clearance fund. The petroleum industry paid more than 53 per cent of the taxes which went into that fund. About 54 per cent of the Teacher's Retirement Fund comes from oil and gas taxes. About one-third of all the money accruing to the State College Building Fund comes from property taxes against the petroleum industry.

Last week was the first week that I have missed sending out a news letter, the reason being that I was in the district visiting among the people to get firsthand information as to what you want done. The visit was short and I did not get to see as many as I would like, but I thoroughly enjoyed it and look forward to another visit in the near future.

**Price Rollback On Live Cattle:**  
The Office of Price Stabilization is running into a great deal of difficulty on most all fronts and especially in the directives issued rolling back the price of live cattle. Although the Administration has stood pat on this matter, so far, it is no secret that they are experiencing grave concern. It is my opinion that the OPS either failed to gather correct information on the subject or failed to honor the correct information that was gathered. Mr. DiSalle has made several references to beef producers engaging in a strike. This reference is not only unwarranted but it is definitely unfair. The

beef producers of this country have never engaged in a strike and do not intend to. If they fail to produce beef, it will be because they have been put out of business by unreasonable and unwarranted Federal regulations, and I certainly intend to do all I can to prevent it. The OPS is attempting to lead the people to believe that this rollback order is going to help the consumer and that the cattle people are interested in doing away with it for a selfish reason. If such a statement was true, I would certainly not be condemning the actions of the Administrator. In the first place, the cattle people have done an outstanding job in the production of beef without Federal control and without Federal subsidy, and I take exception to any and all remarks reflecting upon the cattle people. In the second instance, the consumer is not only going to pay higher prices for beef in the long run, but is going to be faced with a shortage of beef that would not have come about if the cattle business had been left alone. The housewives of this country decided in 1948 that beef was too high and broke the cattle market by merely refusing to eat beef. That same procedure of supply and demand could be employed again without

any Federal interference and you wouldn't hear one cattleman complain. But when the Federal Government interferes in his business with unwarranted, unreasonable and unsound regulations, you will hear him complain, and rightfully so. The program of the cattlemen anticipated an increase of the cattle population by 1955 to 95 million from the present population of approximately 84 million. The result of DiSalle's order will ultimately reduce the cattle population by several million and these animals will be a poorer grade of beef than would have been the 95 million. I have gathered a lot of factual information on the subject which I expect to get to the House in a speech this week and which I hope will open the eyes of many of the Representatives who are not familiar with the cattle business nor its problems. Most of them think they are protecting their consumers by these price controls, but I intend to show them that they are following a false hope. **This Shrinking World.**  
We sometimes wonder just how small the world has grown, and this was brought to mind very forcibly last week when I received a letter from a war correspondent in Korea with which he

enclosed a clipping regarding a statement that I had made in a news letter to you folks about the rumor circulating in Washington that John Foster Dulles would replace Dean Acheson. The following is a copy of the letter and clipping:

"Seoul, Korea  
May 12, 1951.  
Dear Mr. Rogers:  
"If we needed proof that the world is shrinking, I think we have it here.  
"You write a letter to your constituents in Texas. Someone hears about it in Belgian Congo and puts it on the air. It's picked up in Tokyo, reprinted in Mainichi on May 8, and finally it's read by Americans fighting in Korea, some of whom undoubtedly would have read it in Texas if it weren't for the war.  
"I thought you might be interested.  
Sincerely yours,  
Jim G. Lucas  
Scripps-Howard War Correspondent."  
(Clipping):

BRAZZAVILLE (Radio), May 6.—A United States Congressman told his constituency today that it was hinted in Washington that Secretary of State Dean Acheson was to be replaced in the near future by John Foster Dulles, the Republican Presidential adviser.  
"Representative Walter Rogers, Democrat of Texas, made this statement in a weekly news letter to his home state. Reports that Secretary Acheson would be replaced have circulated for months but have been denied repeatedly by President Truman."  
I certainly wish that the clipping referred to could have been read in Texas by the American fighting boys rather than in Korea, and I am sure that the war correspondent agrees with me.
