Christmas Decorating Rules Announced

Jimmy Faulkner, Chamber of Commerce manager, made public this week complete details concerning the "Residential Christmas Decorating Contest" and the "Commercial Front or Store Window Decorating Contest" as formulated by the Committee.

"The rules are simple and we hope that a lot of people will decorate this year during the Yule Season. Not with real expensive, elaborate displays, but just in a fashion to show our neighbors across the street and in the surrounding towns that 'We've got the Christmas spirit and a lot of civic pride in our town'," Faulkner commented.

The rules, as laid down by the committee, are:

- (1) Three prizes will be given in each contest division.
- (2) Judges will be from out of town.
- (3) All awards will be made on the basis of attractiveness and originality, without regard to financial outlay involved.
- (4) Entries must be left intact till December 25, (in both divisions of the contest).
- (5) Awards will be announced in the December 27th issue of the Leader.
- (6) All judging will be done at night.
- (7) All entries must be completed by December 18th.
- (8) All entrants, in either division, must fill out and mail, or bring, to the Chamber of Commerce office, an official entry blank as printed below on or before 6:00 P. M., Dec. 18, 1951.

Fire of Freedom To Be Lit Here Friday Night

Charlie Gibson, Department Commander of the American Legion, in a letter this week to Commander Pete Kunz of the local Legion Post, stated, "The only good 'ism' is Americanism and I am asking that the Legionnaires of Clarendon and Donley County join with the Legionnaires of the 777 Posts in Texas in observing the tenth anniversary of the most infamous day in our history, December 7th, Pearl Harbor Day."

Commander Kunz stated that Clark-Brock Post 126 in Clarendon would join with the 777 American Legion Posts in the state of Texas in marking the anniversary of Pearl Harbor Day with an appropriate program and the lighting of a FIRE OF FREEDOM. He appointed Past Post Commander Jack Gray and Jimmy Faulkner, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, as co-chairmen of arrangements.

Commander Kunz stated, "The program will commence promptly at 6:30 P. M. in front of the Legion Hall and in case of inclement weather it will be moved inside. We are going to join with the other Texas Legion Posts in lighting a FIRE OF FREEDOM and the entire public is especially invited to this patriotic observance in memory of our dead at Pearl Harbor and as a warning to the aggressor, communistic nations in the world today."

Secretary of State, John Ben Shepperd, Lions Club Speaker

John Ben Shepperd, Secretary of State, was the guest speaker at the Lions Club Tuesday luncheon and gave club members something to really think about.

He started his talk by saying, "I want to say a few things that have occurred to me both as a public official and as an American who has known the American way of life, and who is afraid that that way of life is perishing little by little, as though it were a living thing bleeding to death drop by drop. What I say is not said in a spirit of pessimism or alarm, but in a spirit of frankness, with a desire to face the issue as I see it." Then he added: "In all the issues of life there is a good side, a bad side, and an indifferent side - there is optimism, pessimism, and the middle ground of complacency. There is morality, immorality, and between them, moral irresponsibility. A great many people do not know the difference between optimism and mere complacency, and a great many do not know the difference between morality and moral indifference. As long as they are not bad, they think they are good." He went on to explain his views in regard to the above statements and closed his talk by giving his 1952 creed of American citizenship and asked everyone to join him in keeping it.

Chaplain To Speak At Brotherhood

Chaplain (Capt.) Carl D. Moorhead of Sheppard Air Base is to be the guest speaker at the Monthly meeting of the Brotherhood at the First Baptist Church Thursday evening at 7:00 o'clock. P. T. A. Completes Health Tests

The Sims P.T.A. has completed the health tests for the children of the Elizabeth Stevens School, and each child's report has been mailed to the parents. These tests include a hearing and visual skill test and Dr. Humphrey's medical examination.

Most parents do not realize the default in their child's physical handicaps unless these handicaps are outstanding ones; therefore the child is not taken to a doctor for these examinations. We do not say that these tests are perfect, but it will be best if the parents who have been advised to take their child to the doctor, do so. If your child is not making satisfactory grades in his studies it may be because of his physical handicap. If the child did not pass the hearing test, he was given the second test. A cold will cause him to make a lower grade on hearing.

The first grade children were not given the hearing and visual skill test as they do not know their numbers and letters well enough to understand how to use the machines.

Mrs. Homer Bones, P. T. A. Health Officer, wishes to express her appreciation for the cooperation that the teachers, room health mothers, and children have given in order to accomplish this work.

"Especially do we thank Dr. Humphrey for his time and work that he has so willingly donated," Mrs. Bones said.

JOHN BEN SHEPPERD
 Secretary of State

At 55 years of age, Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd is one of the youngest members of the Texas Official Family, and one of its most economical, efficient, and able administrators.

As head of the Texas Department of State, Shepperd acts in many official capacities, and performs both formal and informal official duties for Governor Allan Shivers. As Secretary of State he directs the workings of five ma-

for divisions in the State Department, which include the Administration of all state corporation laws; the administration of franchise tax, securities and election laws; the supervision of all persons granted executive clemency from the Texas prison system; and ministerial duties in connection with labor unions and labor organizers. Shepperd is custodian of the Great Seal of Texas and of all official papers and legislative bills.

The Texas Economy Commission, a 600 citizen group which is studying methods of increasing economy and efficiency in state government, was created through Shepperd's efforts.

His campaign for a more economical, efficient government has had its effects on his own office which has been virtually reorganized since he took office one and one-half years ago. New measures which he has instituted are saving the state thousands of dollars and man hours.

Shepperd submitted a budget to the 51st Legislature which showed a decrease of \$37,212 over the Department of State's last budget. In marked contrast to this decrease in expenditures is the \$2,000,000 increase in revenue, in the form of franchise taxes, charter fees, etc., which

Shepperd's office is now collecting for the State.

The revision of the state's ambiguous, inadequate election laws, for which Shepperd has been fighting for years, has finally been realized. The Secretary of State drafted the bill which created the corporation law interim committee, and because of his interest in modernizing the state's corporation code, Governor Shivers appointed him committee chairman. He has also been named Texas' administrator of the Interstate Compact for the supervision of parolees and probationers. When Shepperd became Secretary of State, there were 600 delinquent parolees in the state, but at present there are only 60.

Because of Shepperd's suggestion to curtail the unnecessary distribution of House and Senate Journals and Session Laws, the state is being saved \$20,000 on the Journals and from \$60,000 to \$70,000 on the Session Laws.

Secretary of State Shepperd, as the Junior Chamber of Commerce's youngest national president of that organization, made a "Fifth Freedom Flight" around the world in 1948. For five years, he was elected as outstanding citizen of his hometown of Glade-water; three times he was chosen one of the five most outstanding young men of Texas; and was recently selected one of the nation's "Ten Outstanding Young Men" by Future Magazine.

Shepperd has served on three advisory committees for the President of the United States and on 12 national commissions and councils. He is the originator of the Glade-water Plan or "Democracy Beats Communism Week," which has been adopted in communities throughout Texas and in many other states. In June, North Texas State College awarded him an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Shepperd was born in Glade-water and practiced law until his appointment as Secretary of State and before entering the

Paris, Council President, announced this week. Principal speaker for this meeting will be Mr. Harold W. Lewman, Regional Scout Executive of Region IX—an area comprising the states of New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, and parts of Arizona and Arkansas.

The meeting will be held in two parts—the first of which is to be a banquet, starting in the Pampa High School cafeteria at 7:00 P. M. Following the banquet all present will move to the auditorium for the main portion of the meeting. Tickets to the banquet are being sold at the Council office in Pampa, and all District Scout Executives. It is during the main part of the meeting, in the auditorium, and open to the public, that Mr. Lewman will speak, Silver Beaver Awards will be made, and the Annual Report of the Scout Executive will be heard.

He first became a Scout Executive at Helena, Arkansas, in August, 1924; then continued as Deputy Regional Executive in Region Five in 1925. He was

made Regional Executive of Region Five in January, 1927, Deputy Regional Executive in Region Nine in September, 1938; Regional Executive of Region Eight in April, 1939. In March, 1945, he moved to Philadelphia where he served as Regional Executive for Region Three, and returned to Dallas as Regional Scout Executive for Region Nine in April, 1946, where he has served ever since.

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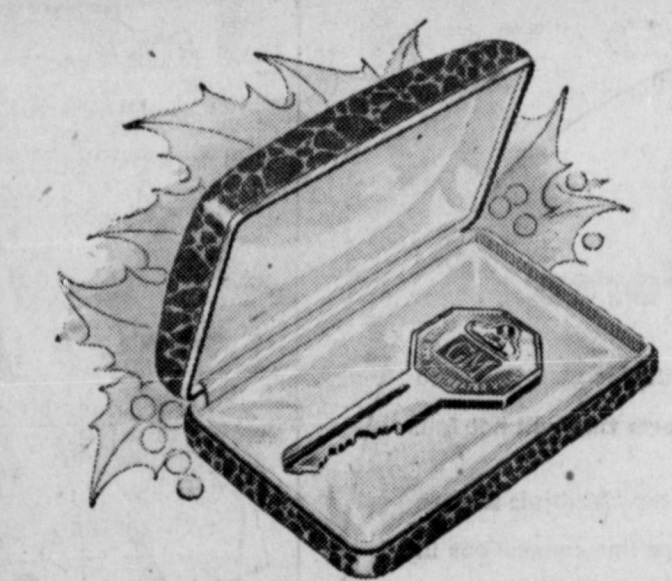

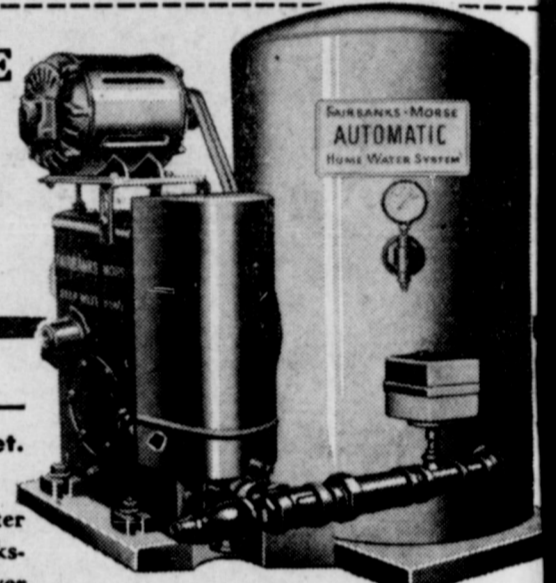

From the County PMA Committee

ADDITIONAL PRACTICE APPROVED FOR 1952

The State Committee approved the additional practice, Control of Bindweed, for Donley County for 1952. The assistance rate is as follows:

- A. By continuous cultivation during the entire growing season (cultivating at intervals not to exceed 14 days)—\$7.50 per acre.
- B. By treatment with sodium chlorate or calcium chlorate—7½¢ per lb.
- C. By treatment with formulations of 2, 4-D—\$1.40 per lb. of 2, 4-D parent acid.
- D. By treatment with carbon bisulphide—\$1.40 per gallon.
- E. By treatment with Borasuc—1.6¢ per lb.
- F. By treatment with Concentrated Borasuc—3¢ per lb.

G. By treatment with Polyborchlorate—5¢ per lb. SPECIFICATIONS: No assistance will be given under A if a crop is taken from the land.

The practice may be approved only if the county committee determines that it is a necessary step in soil or water conservation on the farm and the farm operator carries out approved bindweed control measures on all the land under his control, including roadways and turn rows.

Where control is by use of 2, 4-D under C above, the area should be sprayed with a solution containing not less than ¼ lb. of 2, 4-D parent acid per acre. The area should be sprayed as often as necessary to control regrowth, in no event less than twice.

CAUTION: Care should be exercised not to let the 2,4-D spray or mist get on susceptible plants, such as cotton, legumes, truck crops, shrubs, fruit trees, and other valuable trees.

Where control is by carbon bisulphide, a chemical injector should be used and 2 ounces should be injected at 18-inch intervals.

Mr. Walter I. Lowe, regular Member of the 1952 County Committee, resigned Friday. Mr. Ross Springer, 1st Alternate Member, will take Mr. Lowe's place on the 1952 Committee to help administer the 1952 ACP Program.

CASTOR BEAN PROGRAM EXPANDED

A big boost in the production of castor beans is sought under the 1952 program. Castor oil continues in demand in military purposes. Farmers in Texas will be encouraged to grow about 80,000 acres of castor beans in 1952, compared with about 27,000 acres in 1951. The price to be paid farmers will be the higher of 10 cents per pound, hulled basis, or the market price at time of delivery.

The program for 1952 is a national defense project, similar to the one in operation this year, and will be available to farmers who enter into contracts with the Commodity Credit Corporation, or with private companies, farmer cooperative associations or others under contract with CCC, in areas within designated States and for which adapted planting seed is available. The States include Arizona, Arkansas, California, Oklahoma, and Texas.

Nationally, the program seeks the planting of about 200,000 acres, of which about 56,000 acres will be irrigated and the rest dry land. About 84,000 acres were planted under the 1951 program. Estimates are that the '52 acreage will produce from 113 million to 155 million pounds of castor beans, from which 50-70 million pounds of castor oil would be obtained. The acreage would also provide an adequate supply of seed for planting in 1953.

CCC will contract with manufacturers or others for the purchase of farm machinery and other equipment needed in connection with the program and may contract for the purchase of planting seed for sale to farmers in areas where the seed is adapted.

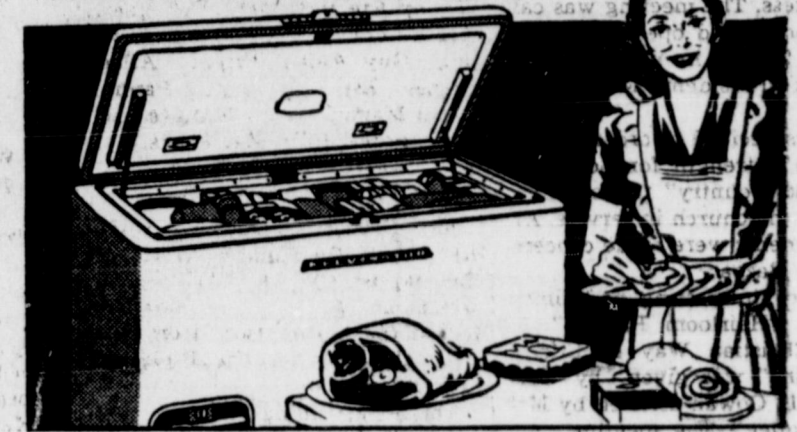

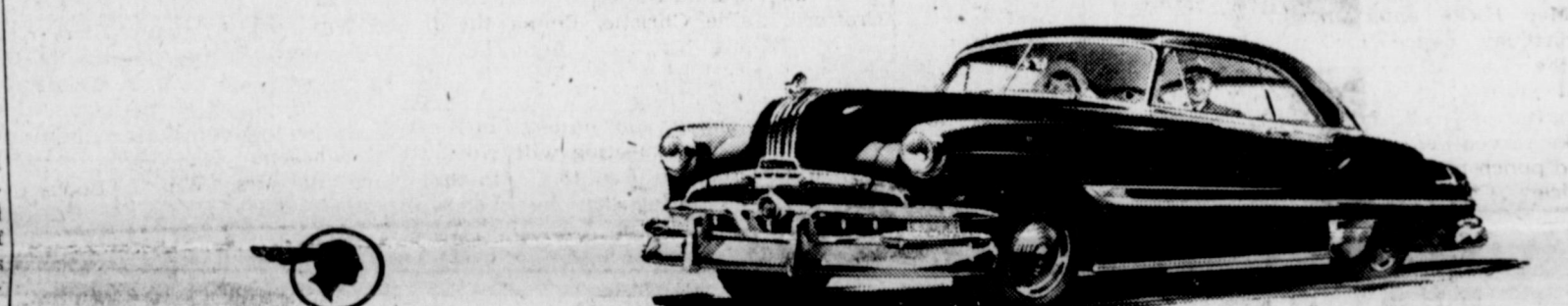

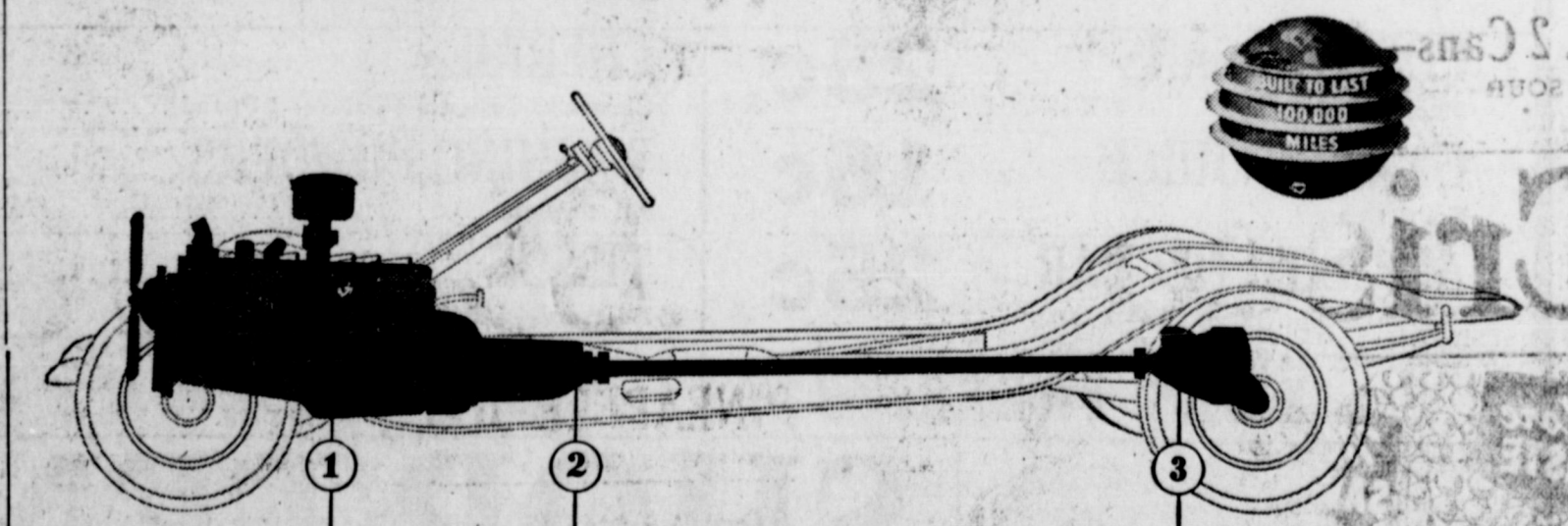

Many Television Stations May Soon Be In Texas

Texas soon may have twice as many television stations as any other state. It now has transmitters in only three places. If every station allotted to Texas by the Federal Communications Commission is built, it will have 176 in a few years, according to an article in the December issue of Popular Science Monthly. The entire country now has only 108 television stations. In a relatively short while it will have 2000, the article states.

This dramatic move toward letting everybody sit in television's ringside seat on the world is made possible by invading the ultra-high frequency range of radio waves. Television now uses the very-high frequency range, where radio waves are four to 18 feet long and travel about 40 miles. Ultra-high frequency, or UHF, waves are so short they act almost like radar, and travel only 15 miles. Shorter waves make it possible to have more stations.

Television pictures that travel on UHF radio waves will look just the way they do now. Popular Science reports. They can be either in color or black-and-white. There is one complication. Since UHF behaves like radar, it is more easily blocked by buildings and even by the leaves of trees. On the other hand, it is freer of interference from electric signs and machinery than present sets are.

Leading manufacturers have already built converters, expected to cost from \$20 to \$75, to enable owners of VHF sets to tune in on UHF programs. Some of the converters stand on top of

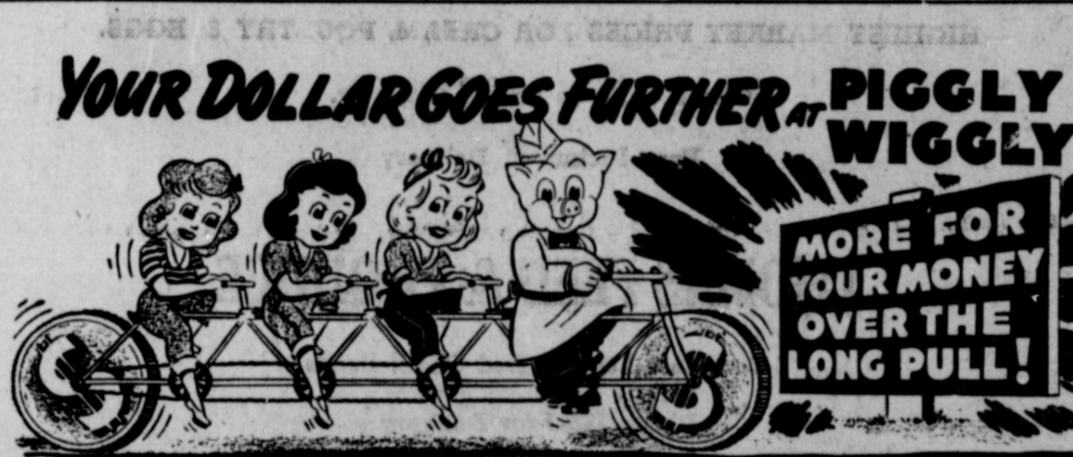

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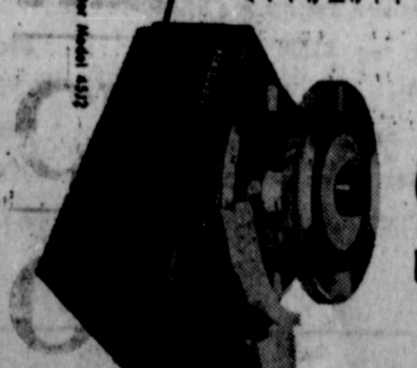
