Replacement Of Lake McClellan's Ruined Spillway Given Priority

Replacement of Lake McClellan's ruined spillway will be given priority over other Panhandle dam projects by the severalcounty committee at the present

This action was taken by the newly organized Lake McClellan Improvement Committee during a meeting last week, in the club house on the lake's shore.

Because the present condition of the spillway poses a hazard to the lives of residents below the dam and to property, the members of the committee indicated their unanimous belief that its

replacement is almost mandatory. However, the group will take up problems at other Panhandle lakes when replacement of the McClellan spillway is well under

On a suggestion by Rex Baxter, manager of the Amarillo Cham-1952 budget of the Soil Conservaseek approval by the Bureau of the Budget in Washington; and third, work with senators and representatives to pass the appropriation next year.

Representatives from Borger, Amarillo, Wheeler, McLean, Alanreed, Clarendon, Shamrock, and Pampa attended the meeting.

Soil Conservation Service engineers have already completed plans for the new spillway and have only to submit them to Washington. Findings by the engineers brought out that the spillway was poorly designed from the beginning and is next to irreparable. The new spillway, which would be moved further south, will be almost twice as big as the present one. Its width alone would be 160 feet instead of

Following the meeting the group toured the spillway site and part of the surrounding shoreline, then adjourned to the picnic ground for a barbecue supper sponsored by the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

"IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL FOR ANY REFUND DEALER OR ANY EMPLOYEE THEREOF TO PREPARE OR NOTARIZE ANY CLAIM FOR RE-FUND OF TAX PAID ON MOTOR FUEL PUR-CHASED FROM SAID REFUND DEALER, OR TO ACT IN ANY CAPACITY as AGENT OR EM-PLOYEE OF ANY CLAIMANT FOR REFUND OF THE TAX PAID ON MOTOR FUEL PURCHASED FROM SAID REFUND DEALER BY KEEPING HIS BOOKS, RECORDS, REFUND CLAIM FORM OR OTHER DOCUMENTS TO BE USED OR INTEND-ED FOR USE BY SAID CLAIMANT IN THE PRE-PARATION OF HIS TAX REFUND CLAIM."

The law states that the dealer or seller cannot have in his possession Invoices of Exemption more than seven days from date of delivery. Therefore, the buyer should make provision for suitable container to be placed near his gasoline storage tank, in order that seller may leave Invoice of Exemption at the time of each delivery.

All customers should go to Oil Company with whom they are dealing and either have Affidavit of Claims made out, or pick up all Invoices of Exemption, prior to September 1st, 1951.



Please Notice

Effective September 1st 1951, a new law regarding the 1.1% auto sales tax. This law is made to be very complicated on any and all transactions on automobiles. The sales tax affidavit, as has been the law for the purchaser to sign, must be signed both by the purchaser and the seller regarding the sale price and the amount of tax to be paid, if the joint affidavit is in-correct the seller of said vehicle is subject to fine.

There will be a \$5.00 tax on all even trades, whereas the present law does not require tax to be paid on an even trade.

There will be a \$10.00 tax on a bona fide gift, the present law does not require tax to be paid, on Bona Fide gifts.

On any and all out of state vehicles purchased and brought into Texas to be licensed, the purchaser must present either a Title or manufacturer's certificate. Some states do not have the Title law or do not have the manufacturer's certificate. In this case the auto must be licensed in the state purchased, and then will be licensed in Texas.
