Ask For Increase of Cotton Acreage Allotment for 1954

Farm Bureau Votes to

The board of directors of the Donley County Farm Bureau met in Clarendon January 18th with President Henry Moore presiding. The meeting was held in the office of the county agent. Lee Shaller, secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting and they were approved. A delegation of farmers met with the board and a discussion on increase of cotton acreage allotment was held. The board voted to ask for an increase of cotton acreage allotment for 1954, using the years of 1951, 1952 and 1953 and being allowed to plant 70% of the average of these years. They also asked that farms alloted a cotton acreage allotment on which no cotton will be planted in 1954, be returned to the county total and then alloted to bonified cotton farmers on a basis of year

Mrs. Mildred Ritter of the PMA discussed how cotton allotments . were arrived at for the county and gave the averages of the past three years.

The Farm Bureau directors submitted petitions to the Hon. Walter Rogers, congressman; Hon. Lyndon Johnson, senator; Hon. John C. White, commissioner of agriculture in Texas and also to Mr. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau. The letters of the above were accompanied with a photostatic copy of a petition bearing the names of 500 cotton farmers of Donley County asking for the increase in cotton acreage allot-







Winter Weather Can Be Deadly

"In nearly one out of five fatal accidents in 1952, according to the (52-p) National Safety Council, the road condition was wet, muddy, snowy or icy," he said. "And in one out of eight fatal accidents, the driv-

"About two-fifths of these obstructions to vision were reported as rain, snow or sleet on the windshield, "Col. Tilley explain-

"You have to see danger to avoid it," he said, "and you have No investment needed except to have your car under control at all times if you are to stop in time to prevent an accident."

He listed six basic rules for winter driving to help counteract these dangers. The rules are:

1. Accept your responsibility. Always be prepared to meet the hazards of winter driving. You can't expect the weatherman to take the blame for your accidents. 2. Get the "feel" of the road.

When you are driving slowly, away from traffic, try brakes occasionally to find out just how slick the road is. And above all, drive slowly, adjusting your speed to road and weather condi-3. Keep the windshield clear.

ice or snow on the roads. Reinforced chains will cut stopping distances about half.

5. Pump your brakes rapidly to slow down or stop. Jamming on the brakes when roads are slippery can throw you into a dangerous skid.

6. Follow at a safe distance. Keep well back of the vehicle ahead so that you will have plenty of room to stop in an emergency. Remember that even with tire chains it takes more than a twice the distance to stop on snow


