The program simply includes taking a sample of the individual blood, determining the type, and issuing a card with the individblood type which can be carried at all times. A nurse will be with the unit to take the blood sample and the members of the sponsoring Beta Sigma Phi Chapter will do the clerical work.

"Blood typing an individual will take from three to five minutes. The main topic of discussion in Clarendon the past several days has been too much water instead of a water shortage. Water consumption for the current month of July was the highest in the history of the local water department and this was evidenced by water statements which were week end. The water department reported an all time high pumping record for a 24 hour period one day last week, pumping a total of 1 million, 250 thousand

One of the main points entering into the discussion regarding water bills was the increase in cost. New rates were put into effect along with the 50 cent additiin which was voted to go on the minimum charge in the recent bond election. City officials stated that the increase in rate was necessary in keeping with the increased cost of production.

The increase in rates was decided upon at a regular meeting of the City officials July 7th. The meeting was attended by Major B. Hudson, Mayor, Willard Skelton and Noel Cudd Jr., Commisney, Orville Housden, Water Superintendent and P. C. Messer, city clerk. The minutes showed that Noel T. Cudd Jr. made a motion to adopt city water rates

Therefore the adjournment sine die left the present state of the Tidelands bill in the hands of the man who vetoed it. If the Congress had recessed, rather than adjourned, we would have had a good chance for the Senate to override the veto this year. The last report is that the proponents of the bill only lacked two votes having enough to override the veto in the Senate. It can easily be overridden in the House. If the President fails to call the Congress back, it will mean that the battle for the tidelands must begin anew in 1953. It is a definite certainty that the battle will begin and will not be relaxed until these lands are returned to the states. We shall never give up.



Insects are present in granaries most of the time and unless tiveness and freedom from toxic bins are thoroughly cleaned out hazard, cost only 36 cents for suf- and sprayed, can migrate into the grain when it is put in storage. Chief contributor to this situation is the cadelle, a beetle which bores into the wooden structures of granaries, leaving tunnels and burrows in which other insects can take refuge.

Under provisions of the U. S. grain standards in wheat, grain is called "weevily" if a 1,000-gram sample (about 2.2 pounds) contains two or more live weevils, five or more live bran beetles, or one live weevil and three or more bran beetles.

The mere presence of insects in large numbers may cause even more serious damage. Heat and moisture created by their body processes develop hot, moist spots in the grain. When cool weather comes in the fall, the water vapor rising from these spots condenses in the cooler surface grain, causing it to rot, mold, or sprout. This condition calls for a U.S. grade of "sample," which means the grain is no longer fit for food products and must be sold at livestock feed prices. This means a loss of from 50 to 80 cents a

Clean, dry grain, stored in clean, sprayed bins, which have been rendered rodent proof, is an essential step toward combatting this insect problem, said to be costing granary operators of the nation an estimated \$600,000,000 annually.

"Our agriculture is caught in the march of science and mechanization, and within our own lifetimes I can see our whole agricultural landscape changed beyond recognition," Wooten said. "Our banks-all of them, the big ones and the little oneshave a vital responsibility. The challenge to us is through sound financing to speed this inevitable change which will raise the level of living on the land by increasing its dollar productivity."

Wooten's remarks are contained in a January issue of the "Texas Bankers Record". Wooten said that he is very much interested in the crusade which Texas Research Foundation is leading to build back our agricultural economy and put farming on a permanently productive basis.

#### State Constitutional **Amendments**

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be subraitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment pro-

Each voter shall mark out one of said elauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISATURE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to rend as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."
