



Cap Morris, Jimmy Faulkner and Lee Shaller attended a meeting in Hollis, Oklahoma, January 31st at which Mr. Ford Hubbard explained the formation of "rainmaking districts". Mr. Hubbard, who is from Houston, also explained the process of saturating moisture bearing clouds with silver iodide. "We can't make rain, we can only cause more rain to fall from moisture-bearing clouds over a given area, provided nature produces the clouds."

Mr. Hubbard is the Texas associate of Dr. Irving P. Krick, Meteorologist of Denver, Colorado. Dr. Krick's group has been engaged in their experiments in the Guymon, Oklahoma area for about the past eight months. Regularly employed farm workers, and household employees who came under Social Security last year need social security account number cards, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

"If the worker does not have an account number, or has lost his original card," Sanderson says, "he should get one from our office."

Sanderson points out that farm and household workers who became covered under Social Security now earn Old-Age and Survivors Insurance benefits along with other workers in business and industry. "Benefits are based on wages and the worker needs to get credit for every dollar he earns up to \$3600 in a calendar year. So that he may obtain proper credit for his wages. the worker should show his social security account number card to his employer the first day he goes to work," Sanderson concluded.

The prolonged dry weather has resulted in the designation of eighty-nine counties in Texas as disaster areas. No estimate is available of the actual losses sustained by farmers and ranchmen losses, but L. J. 

The 1952 dividend for policy holders who are not in active military service and who apply for payment in cash will be paid Gabie Betts Burton which these policy holders pay premiums.

Eligible policy houders in ac-14 tive military service who request the dividend payment in cash & will be paid by Central Office in Washington, D. C.

This represents a further change in the manner of paying dividends because the first two dividends were paid entirely by Central Office. VA said it believes the change will speed payments to eligible applicants.

Although Public Law 36 requires only that policy holders who wish to receive their dividend in cash must so notify VA, the NSLI Act of 1940, as amended, provides policy holders with two other options:

1. On permanent plans only (such as ordinary life, 20-pay life, 30-pay life, and endowment policies), policy holders may request VA in writing to place their 1952 dividend on deposit at interest, with the aggregate to be included in the calculation of cash value at time of lapse.

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

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How "big" should government be?

Lincoln was President at a time when the federal government had to take away from its citizens more rights and liberties than ever before.

But he didn't like it. He believed, with the writers of the Constitution and the Declaration, that our government should protect people's independence, not push people around.

"In all that the people can individually do as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere," Lincoln once said.

Lincoln never let Americans forget that. He kept reminding the nation that the government's wast wartime powers must be only temporary.

He made powerful enemies. For there are always those who want to see the government run things - and run people-permanently.

We have them today. They think up all kinds of reasons why the federal government should take over this or that business, industry, or service. They never say they want socialism. Maybe they don't even realize it. But that's actually what they

Most Americans don't want socialism any more than you do. The job is to recognize it-and halt it-no matter what disguise it wears!

The people who plan and work for a socialistic U. S. A. know that permanent control of a few key industries and services will give government the power to take over just about everything. One of the key industries that they're trying to take over is electric light and power.

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
