## Mobil X-Ray Unit To Be In Clarendon August 22 & 23rd

Dr. J. Gordon Stewart has announced that arrangements have been completed for the state financed Mobil X-Ray Unit to visit Clarendon two days, August 22nd and 23rd and at Hedley for the first time for a one day stop over on August 27th.

The unit will be set up at the Estlack Machinery Co. building in Clarendon and at the Lions Club den at Hedley. The free chest X-Ray will be taken from 8:30 til 5:30 each day. This is a tax paid service and is not financed by the TB stamps which are sold each year. There is absolutely no cost to any person and everyone is urged to plan to use this service.

The X-Ray is regarded as a Chest Pathology inasmuch as it reveals any type of disease or abnormality in the chest. Last year only about 40 percent of Clarendon's population took advantage of this free service and it is hoped that at least 60 percent or more will have the X-Ray made. It only takes a few minutes and the results of your X-ray will be mailed to you a short time after it has been developed and read in Austin. Start making your plans now to visit the unit either here or at Hedley.

## Annual Country Club Barbecue, August 5th

The Third Annual Barbecue for members and guests of the Clarendon Country Club will be held this year on August 5th.

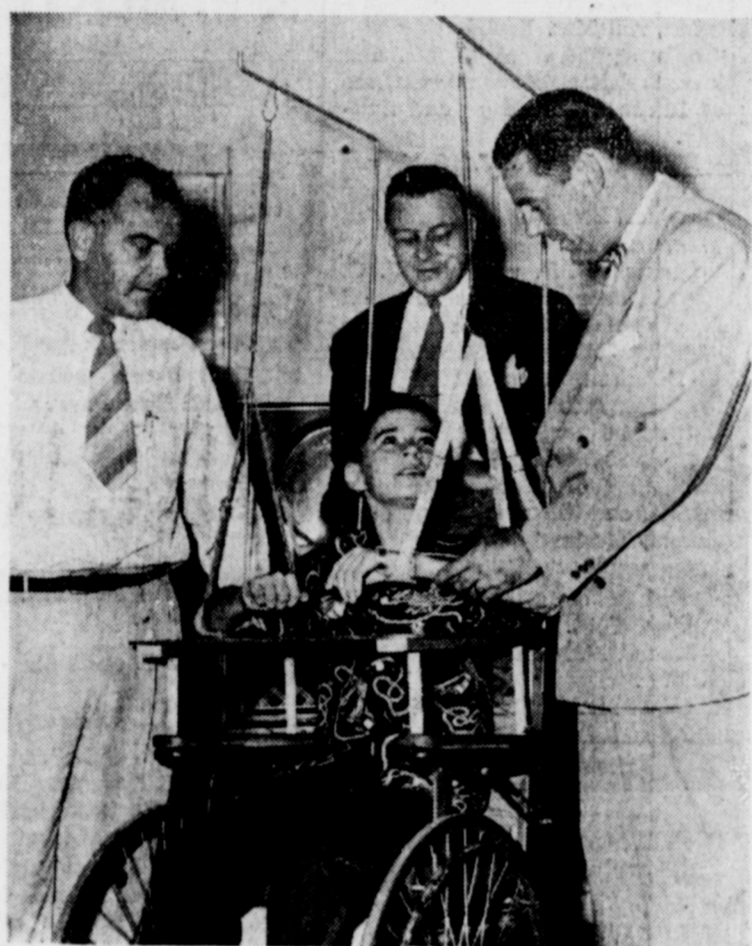

## School Taxes To Be Increased

According to a notice being published in the Leader for four consecutive weeks, it is necessary for school taxes to be increased for the coming year. We understand this will be an across the board increase of 10% on valuation. The notice states that it will be necessary to increase tax valuations from 60% of the 100% valuation, to 70% of the 100% valuation. This increase has been brought about due to the increase in amount to be paid into the Foundation program under the present State School set-up.

The Board of Equalization started their check of the tax rolls yesterday and will sit as a board to hear any personal objections on August 2nd at the School Tax office. The school board member in charge of securing personnel to sit on this board reported that it was very difficult to secure men to do the job. Cards announcing the across the board raise were mailed to all taxpayers this week.

Very few people need to be reminded that Saturday is election day for the way state and local candidates have been making the rounds, voters have had little opportunity to forget.

Political fever in several state races as well as six county races has reached a high pitch and will continue today and tomorrow. There has been more campaigning and more interest in all contested races this year than in several years and voters in Donley County as well as all over the state are expected to go to the polls almost 100 percent.

For the convenience of all voters that you may look over the entire list of candidates, a sample ballot is being published on page three of this issue of the Leader through the courtesy of the Clarendon Furniture Company. The election board with county returns will be displayed in front of the Rexall Store and all returns will be brought or phoned into the Lane & McCully Insurance office. You can watch this board Saturday night and see what the outcome may be. Your vote will be important so be sure to go vote.

In downstate races, Allan Shivers seems to be holding his own as the favorite in the Governor's race; Ben Ramsey seems to be the top candidate in the race for Lt. Governor and Price Daniel is expected to be elected U. S. Senator without a run-off. In a local survey, the following were the top candidates in their respective races: John C. White for Commissioner of Agriculture, Bascom Giles for Commissioner of General Land Office, Kenneth K. Woodley for Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals, Olin Culbertson for Railroad Commissioner, Herb Petry, Jr. for Congressman-at-large, Jonn Ben Sheperd for Attorney General, Glenn R. Lewis for Associate Justice of Supreme Court Place 1, Graham B. Smedley for Associate Justice Place 2, Joe S. Moss for Associate Justice 7th district.

In the state Senator's race 30th district it looks like a close race: A. J. Andy Rogers of Childress is receiving heavy support throughout the district and is expected to lead the ticket here in Donley County. Harold M. LaFont of Plainview is his opponent and is also receiving considerable support in this area. Clarendon folks have considerable interest in the State Representative 88 district race. James E. Jimmy Faulkner, our own local candidate for this office, has been making a whirlwind campaign since the 4th as he had his hands full helping put over the big celebration here before that time. Jimmy is expected to receive heavy county support in the voting Saturday. The vote in Hall and Childress counties will tell the difference. As far as we can learn, Clarendon has never had a representative in Austin and now would be a good time for us to elect a home-town candidate to represent us down there.

The district attorney race has produced lots of campaigning by both candidates. Both candidates, Allen Harp and Sheffy Mahan are from Childress County and have been working the district thoroughly. A local survey gives Harp the nod to lead the ticket in this county.

In the various county races there is a possibility of a run-off in three different races. There are three candidates for county judge, four candidates for commissioner Precinct No. 1 and five candidates for commissioner Precinct No. 2. Other contested offices is for Sheriff, Assessor & Collector with Guy Wright and Truett Behrens making it a hot race this time; C. Huffman and R. C. Hill have been doing some

stiff campaigning in the Constable of Precinct No. 2 race and from all reports F. M. Murray and M. E. Foster are making it a good race in the east side of the county in the Precinct 3 race for commissioner.

There's one main thing to remember if you are a qualified voter - - when Sunday morning rolls around be sure you are able to say that you voted for your favorite candidate in Saturday's election whether they won or lost. Your vote may be the deciding vote that will elect the person you think best qualified for the job.

\*Walker Lane reported Wednesday morning that a total of 48 absentee ballots had been cast which is under the usual amount cast in a first primary election. It looks like the majority of people are staying at home so can join the crowd at the polls Saturday. Be sure and Vote.

Well, we did go on that trip through Mama's Oklahoma. On top of that we took in a part of Uncle Bill's Arkansas and some of Grandpa's Missouri. Now here we are back home tired and happy. I promised to tell about the trip and here it is almost too late

to make the deadline on the papers. Anyway, we will tell some about it this week and finish up next time. Politics and the conventions will just have to wait, and what can I do about it even if I tried, so, we'll talk about the trip.

My, but it was good to get home; crawl between the sheets of my own bed; sit in my own favorite chair, before my own coolest window. We wonder sometimes why we run all over the country to be miserable when we can be miserable right at home. True, there were rough spots on the trip but we just have to have changes I guess, and all in all it was wonderful. It rained almost every day and that is good for any West Texan.

Riding through Oklahoma we were impressed by some of the names of the little towns; mostly they were named some Indian name, but we would find many named after the little things that must have been so very important to them when they named the town. There they were, such names as Corn, Alfalfa, Sickle,

Cache, etc. Everywhere the people were smiling because of the rain; it had been somewhat dry all over; now the skies had opened up and people were happy. It made you realize again how deeply our hopes are centered on water for our crops.

Being a Texan I naturally hate to admit that we are behind in anything, but as you travel thru eastern Oklahoma and Arkansas we just have to admit a few things. For instance the creeks and rivers; when God made those beautiful streams for these people He really finished the job. Beautiful trees on each side; with a winding creek or river making its way down the slopes, and the thing that was so different to the panhandle was the fact that water; in many cases beautiful clear blue water filled their banks. Beautiful, is hardly the word for many of the streams in the Ozarks and in other spots as well. Deep and clear; blue like the sky. How anyone could help loving to visit in the Ozarks is beyond me. Many of the much more publicized spots in the country just couldn't have anything on them. The beautiful old town of Eureka Springs makes you pinch yourself to see if you are dreaming; built on mountain slopes that you couldn't climb on foot, you almost have to have a map of the town to get anywhere even though it is small. No matter how many stories a building has in most cases every floor has a ground entrance; one large hotel has one on each story. To me this town could be put among the worlds wonders. Have you ever bought a new book and as you read it you would just seem eager to turn a page and see what was in store for you. Somehow, this is the way you feel in Eureka Springs; anxious to turn the next corner; impatient to see what names could be around the next moun-

tain. Yet, you have to tell yourself that you are coming back before you want to move on. I couldn't imagine how a person like myself could make a living there, and I will probably never try to learn but I do want to go back for a week again and maybe again.

In eastern Oklahoma and Arkansas we see both sides of humanity. We see the Cadalacs and the Lincolns. We see rock homes and every indication of wealth and luxury. And then we see the poor. We see them with their simple and everyday life; maybe not too many belongings but with a deep love for each other and for their country, for the things of nature of which God has given them such a goodly supply. You see the simple log cabin; even the wagon and mules; maybe Papa hasn't shaved either yesterday or today; perhaps Mama has kicked off her shoes, but somehow you wouldn't want to change them. I would have loved to take some pictures of some of these scenes but it seemed wrong to invade their world with curious eyes. I don't know whether they are poor or not.

I will close for this week with this sign that I saw along the road and it made me think; "Drive like Hell, and you'll get there." If by next week the convention hasn't wrecked my memories I will tell some more about the trip.

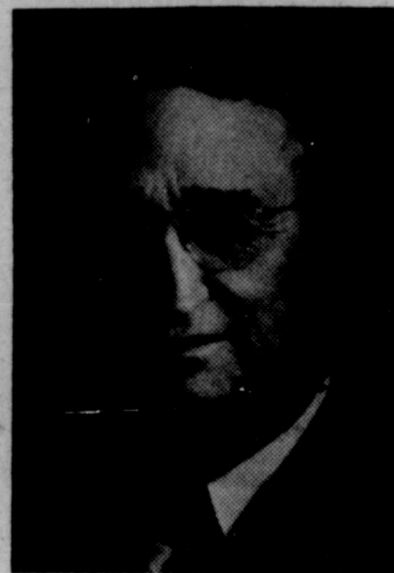

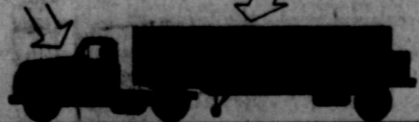

### Special Notice To All Youths of Draft Age

CANYON—If you're draft age and plan to start college this fall, you'll find it to your advantage to consider Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC), and particularly the new unit at West Texas State College.

You may get yourself a draft deferment during your four years at college, may earn your degree as well as a commission when you finish. At West Texas State, where the new "Branch General" will be in operation this fall, all young men take the first two years of ROTC, and then may elect the advanced training program for the final two years if they desire.

At West Texas, the training is a general program, and those men taking the advanced or senior ROTC training may choose their own branch of the service from among the 16 different divisions of the Army. The selection is made in the senior year, and the candidate takes a three-month course in one of the Army's special service schools after graduation from WT. If a commission is accepted, the candidate serves two years of active duty, if needed, and serves six years in the reserves after active duty.

To qualify for ROTC training at West Texas State, the student must be accepted by the college, maintain acceptable grades, be able to pass the standard Army physical examination, and not less than 14 years of age and not more than 23 years of age when he enrolls.

The advanced ROTC student will be paid a regular monthly salary, in addition to receiving his uniforms and textbooks free. Freshmen and sophomores receive the uniforms and books, but

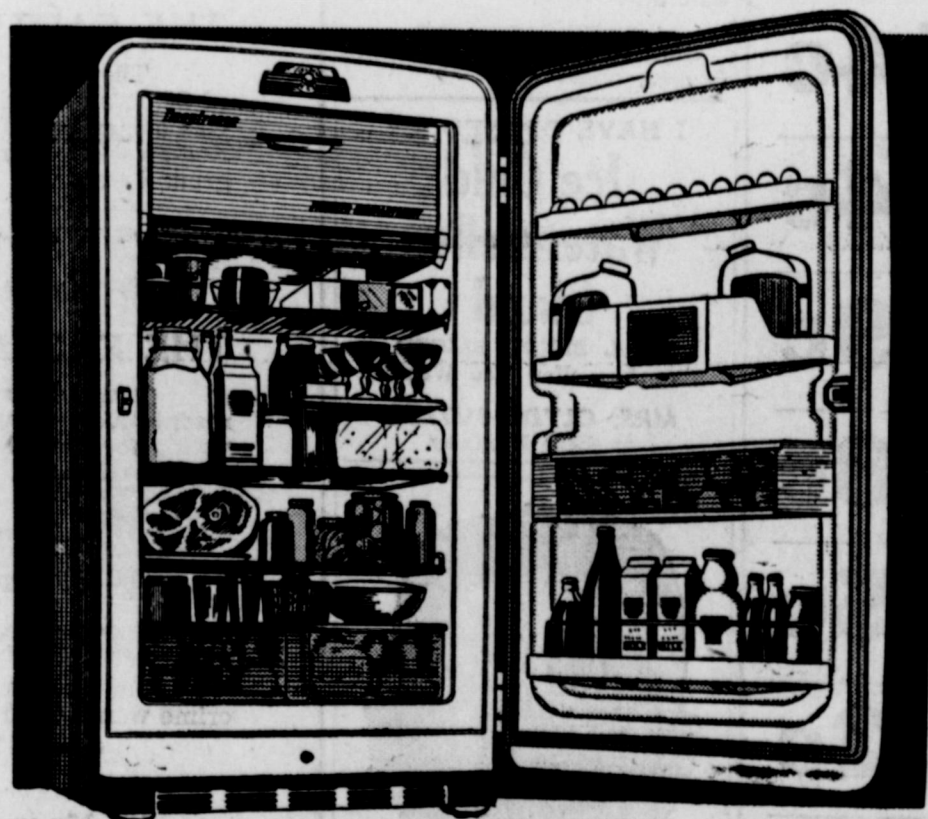

FARM NEWS From the County PMA Committee

ACP PRACTICES HELP KEEP SOIL HEALTHY:

Sick and hungry land cannot meet the production challenge of the future any more than sick and hungry people can develop and maintain a strong and prosperous country. The two go together, sick and hungry people and the purpose of the Agricultural Conservation Program is to help farmers in the never-ending effort to keep their land strong and productive.

Under the 1953 program, PMA committeemen will make farm-by-farm contacts to help each farmer check his farm, field by field to see what needs to be done to cure its ills and improve the and wherever possible. The most urgently needed conservation will be given first attention.

Erosion in general is usually the result of a breakdown of soil structure and the loss of organic matter. The soil becomes more and more compact, less water soaks in, and cracks appear when the surface dries out. While the symptoms vary with different types of soil, they are indications that the land is in failing health.

Grass and legumes in permanent pasture or in rotation is usually the remedy. When lime and phosphate are needed to make the grass and legumes grow better, these materials play an important part in the soil improving process. Construction of terraces, contour farming and other devices play a part in holding the soil in place. All are emphasized in practices for which assistance is available under the Agricultural Conservation Program.

ACP PRACTICES:

Money is available to carry out any practice, which is an approved practice in Donley County.

Two things to remember when asking for assistance to carry out a practice:

- (1) Please report your ACP practices as soon as they are completed.
(2) Don't forget to ask for an approval before starting a practice.

**Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law; "Shall Change It or Repeal It" He Says**  
 By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

**Soil Conservation District News**

Farmers in the Donley County Soil Conservation District need to start making plans now for planting winter cover crops this

fall.

Land in cotton this year is the land that will be most likely to blow next spring.

This is especially true in the sandy areas where emergency tillage is not effective.

Adapted winter cover crops are wheat, rye, Austrian winter peas, and hairy vetch.

Seeding one or a mixture of these crops in the cotton middles in late August or September is the best method for getting a

cover crop on this land.

The District has two drills especially designed for planting cover crops in cotton middles. These drills may be rented at 25 cents per acre. From all indications these drills will be in great demand this fall. Farmers desiring to use one of these seeders, should leave his name at the Soil

Conservation office.

The District has employed Johnnie Johnson to rebuild these seeders to plant four rows in each middle instead of two.

These machines will no doubt be more popular and will be used more as a result of this change.

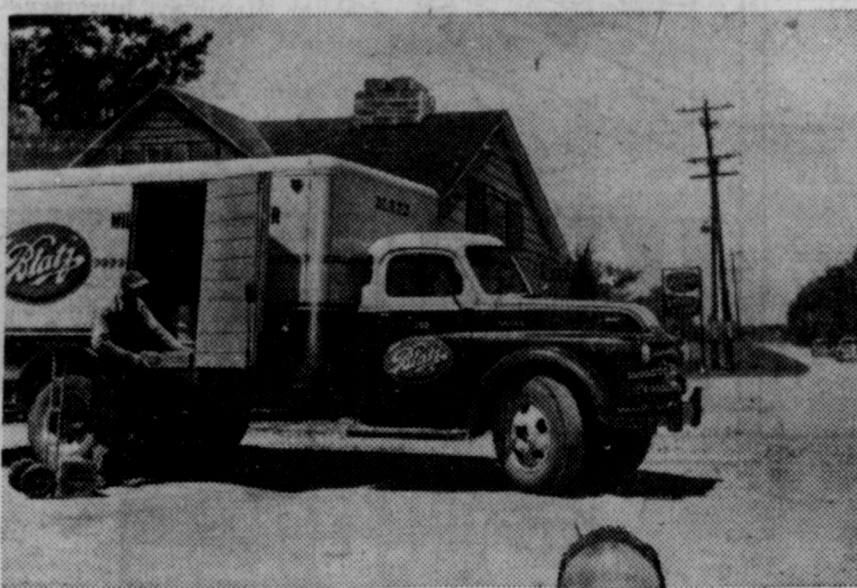

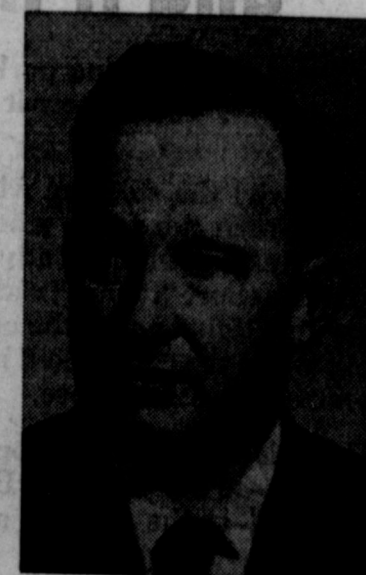

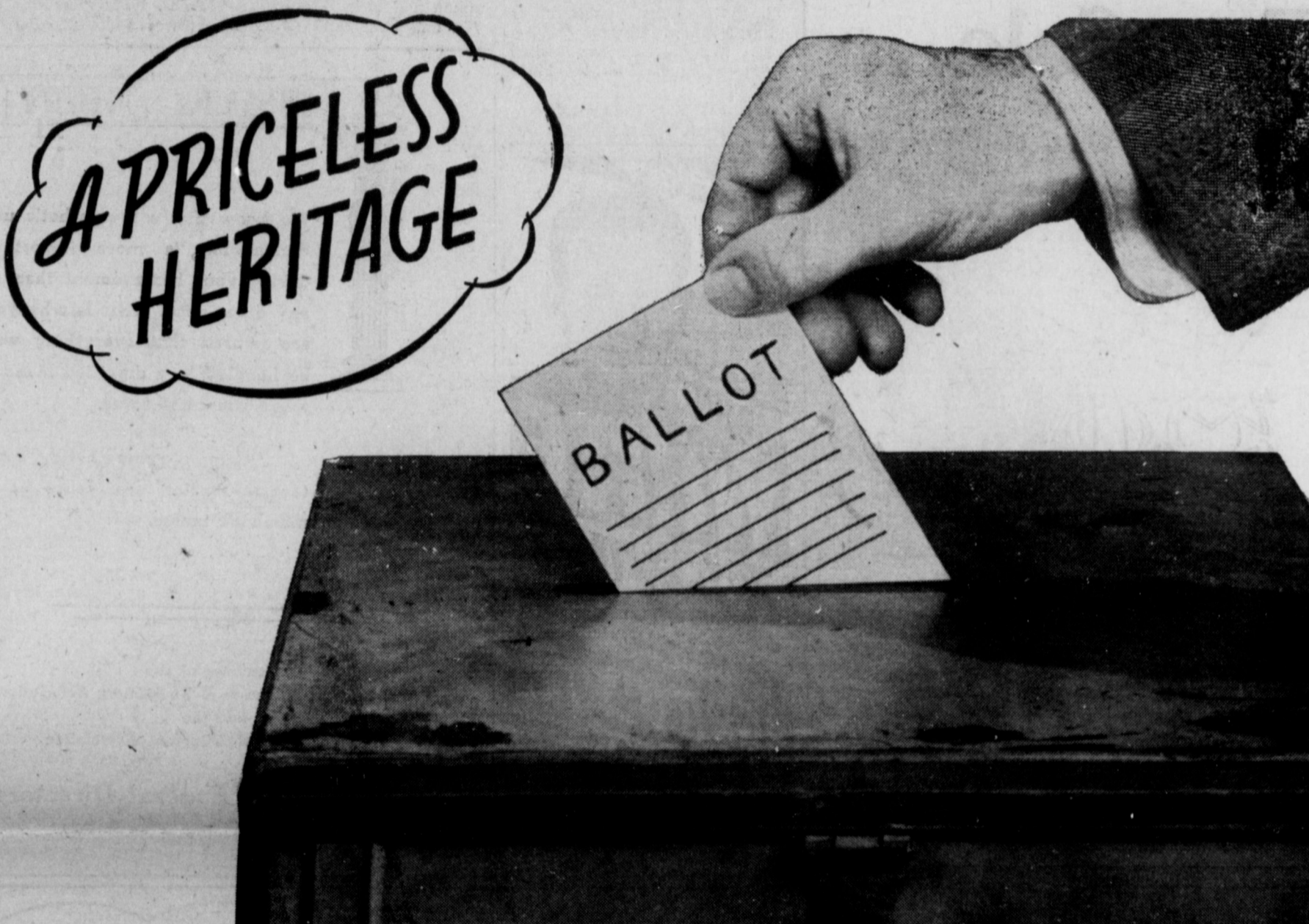

Up through the long centuries the common man has struggled against old and well entrenched powers and ideas. On June 15, 1215, the barons of England met King John at Runnimeade and wrested from the hands of the king his "divine right" to do as he pleased. Every man who throws away his opportunity to vote is unworthy of the heroic souls who suffered to give us the privilege. Every woman who excuses herself from taking time to vote betrays the cause of Woman's Suffrage.

Ours then is a high duty to vote. Vote for conscience' sake; vote for humanity's sake; vote for justice' sake; vote for the sake of the community; vote for the sake of the nation; vote for your own sake. Vote as you think and believe; vote for good men to rule us; vote for high causes in which we shall share; vote to determine how the affairs of the town shall be conducted. The ballot is our weapon against every evil thing which threatens the body politic. Use it under God; it is your divine right.

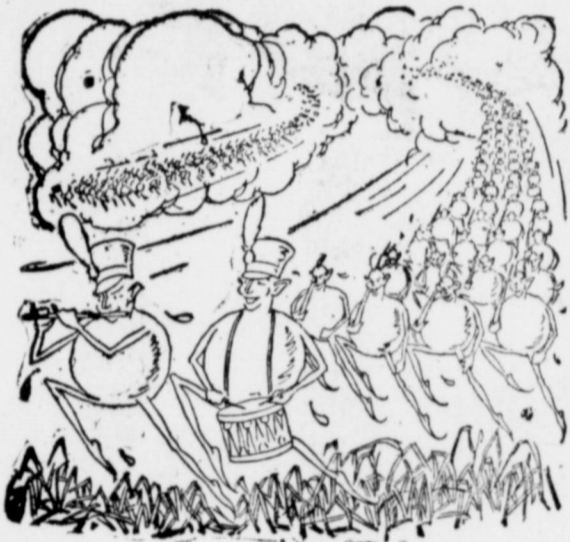

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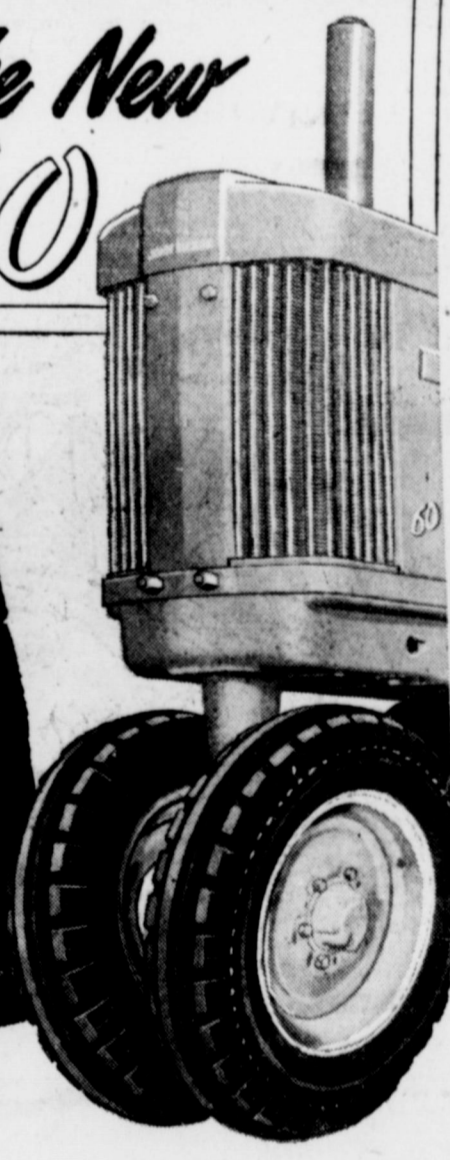

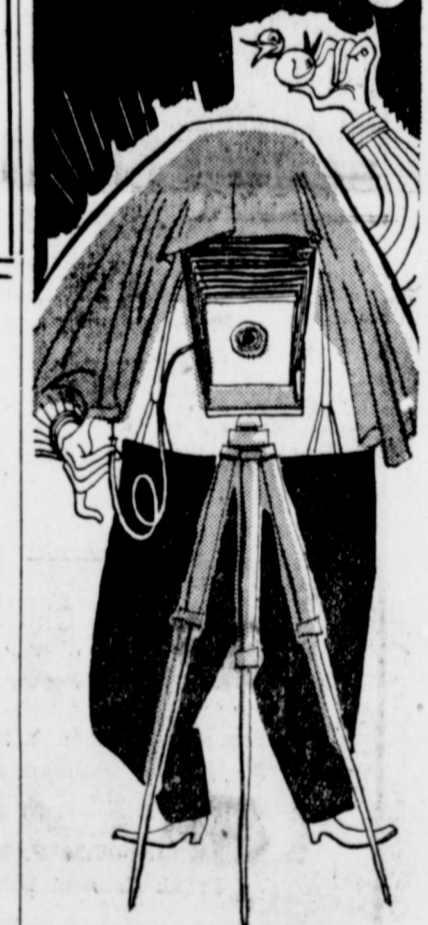
