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## Officers find stolen goods same day

Quick action on the part of two Texas Panhandle law enforcement agencies resulted in the prompt return of stolen goods to a Donley County man last week.

On Wednesday, November 25, the Donley County Sheriff's Department was alerted to a burglary at Jack Barton's tack room. Sheriff Jimmy Thompson and Deputy Jake Longan investigated the robbery and obtained a description of two saddles and several items of tack that were missing.

This information was reported to Kelly Rushing, who is a brand inspector for the Texas Southwest Cattle Raisers Association.

Meanwhile, Officer Anthony Everhardt of the Stinnett Police Department pulled over a motorist in Hutchinson County for drunk driving. Everhardt discovered the driver was in possession of a great deal of tack and reported this to his supervisor. Stinnett Police Chief Randy Hooks called Inspector Rushing with a description of the items - a description which matched one he had just received from Donley County.

The Stinnett Police arrested the driver, one Mark Dewayne Hawkins of Guymon, on charges of DWI. That same evening, Deputy Longan obtained a warrant and a complaint and drove to Stinnett with Mr. Barton. Once there, Mr. Barton identified his property and returned home with it.

At press time, Hawkins had posted bond in Hutchinson County.

"We want to recognize everyone involved with this operation," said a Donley County Sheriff's Department spokesman. "The work of Jake Longan, Kelly Rushing, Randy Hooks, and Anthony Everhardt helped solve this case quickly."

## Aldermen hold regular meeting

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met a regular meeting November 24, 1998, at 7 p.m. in the Board Room of City Hall.

Jim Roberts reported on the progress of the new street signs and the work being done at the sewer plant.

The contract with the Pampa Landfill was approved as long as there was no binding amount of loads to be hauled.

Park improvements were discussed, and a letter is to be written to the party wanting to make a donation. Also, the city secretary is to look into possible grant funding.

Flood structures were discussed, but no action was taken.

Motion was made by Alderman Mac Stavenhagen, seconded by Alderman J.T. Morrow, to have the Christmas dinner at the Clarendon Country Club. Motion carried.

## Remember Pearl Harbor December 7

As veterans, we of the Veterans of Foreign Wars have seen, firsthand, the tremendous cost for freedom. For that reason, we are reminding you to honor and pay tribute to those who have paid so dearly for our freedom.

Fifty-seven years ago on December 7, 1941, the sky over Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, was filled with Japanese planes. When the last wave of attacking aircraft rejoined the Japanese fleet, 11,178 lay wounded and 2,403 lay dead or dying. A great portion of the US Pacific fleet was in shambles.

Thus began America's entry into World War II - 5 years that changed the world. The United States returned from World War II as the world's greatest military and economic power. America was the world's peace-keeper and a symbol of freedom and liberty for all. But, today we are paying homage to those who paid the price for America's greatness.

That first morning at Pearl Harbor, men were killed as they ran to man their battle stations. Families across the nation listened in horror as the radio announced the destruction and death. For those men and women and their families, we are remembering this day.

For the next forty-four months, spouses and children watched their fathers and mothers answer the call to arms. 292,131 of those men and women never saw their families again. For those and their families we are remembering this day.

Beginning at Pearl Harbor and throughout World War II American soldiers, sailors, marines, and airmen suffered injuries, many that they carry today. It is for those we are remembering this day.

For those who escaped death and physical injury, World War II has also changed their lives forever. It is for those that we remember this day.

So as we pause and remember those on this anniversary of Pearl Harbor, it is time to say thank you. Thank you to those 2,404 for whom the beginning was also the end. To also say thank you to every man, woman, and child who paid a price so that we might enjoy our freedom.

As living veterans of foreign wars, we all have paid the price to enjoy the freedoms of today. We ask you to join us in our grief over friends lost and in our sympathy for the servicemen and their families who have suffered. Join us in recalling their sacrifices, their bravery, and their commitment. But also join us in our joy for having served the greatest nation on the face of the earth. For all that have served, for all that have suffered, and for all who have died, join us as we say, "May almighty God bless them. And may God bless America."

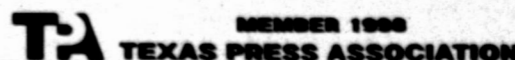

## Obituaries

### Jack Weldon Edwards

Jack Weldon Edwards, age 91, died Monday, November 23, 1998, at his residence in Abilene. Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, November 25, 1998, at Hillcrest Church of Christ Chapel with Don Stone and Jarrell Edwards officiating. Burial followed in Hawley Cemetery under the direction of Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home.

Mr. Edwards was born in Bowie in Montague County, Texas, and moved to Big Spring at the age of 13. He attended Center Point School north of Big Spring and later attended Wesley Junior College in Greenville.

He was a self-employed farmer for over 50 years. Mr. Edwards farmed north of Olton for 38 years before his retirement. He bored his first irrigation well in 1946 and in 1953 fitted his farm with underground pipe, the first in the neighborhood. In 1974, he and several others north of Olton put sprinkler systems into operation to save both labor and water in crop production. That same year, he bought his first motorcycle, which he also used, in his farming operations. Mr. Edwards used his sprinkler system only one year before retiring from active farming operations in 1975. He later moved to Clarendon where he also had farming interests and lived for a number of years before moving to Abilene in 1993.

He married Mary Elfreda Murphy in Big Spring on December 19, 1936. Mr. Edwards was a member of Hillcrest Church of Christ in Abilene. He had been a faithful member of the Main Street Church of Christ in Olton, of which he was a deacon, became an Elder in 1967, and taught classes in Bible Verse Memory.

In addition to his wife, who died in 1996, two brothers, Rex Edwards and James Edwards, and two sisters, Elizabeth Cathey and E. Josephine Creighton preceded him in death.

Survivors include two sons, Jarrell Edwards of Abilene and Don Edwards of Mobeetie; a daughter, Welda Campbell of Hawley; a brother, Charles Buren Edwards of Hobbs, NM; three grandchildren; four great grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.

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**SWCD: Evergreen trees make good wind breaks**

For a tree row to be an effective wind break or barrier, species selection is critical. Evergreens should be used exclusively in windbreaks made up of only one or two rows of trees.

Since evergreen trees are densely branched and retain their foliage in winter, they provide year-round protection. For maximum protection it is

important to select a tree that also retains its branches to the ground line. Pine trees such as the Ponderosa, Austrian, and Afghanistan pines all have a tendency to shed lower branches that allow the wind to pass freely underneath.

Other evergreens, particularly Arizona Cypress, Eastern Redcedar,

and Rocky Mountain Juniper maintain their lower branches and thus provide better protection. All three of these dense evergreens grow well in our area. They are all drought and heat tolerant and will survive our winters. Of these three, Arizona Cypress will grow to be the largest in our area reaching a height of 50 feet. The other

two will grow up to 35 feet high, Arizona Cypress does best on deep soils while the Redcedar and the Rocky Mountain Juniper grow well on poor sites.

All three are generally available through the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District; however, the Arizona Cypress is usually in short

supply. The Texas Forest Service usually sells out before we can place an order; therefore, if you are interested in placing an order for evergreen trees, especially the Arizona Cypress, please call Heather at 874-3576 ext. 101 or come by the NRCS office at the corner of 4th and Sully as soon as possible.

### Lady Broncos to play in Floydada Tournament

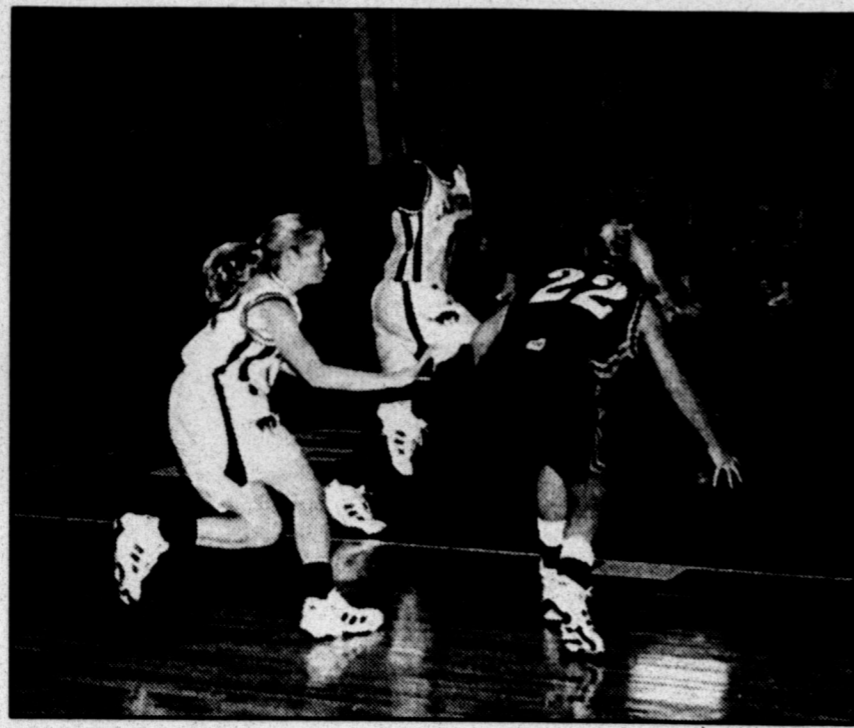
Cold shooting and foul trouble seemed to plague the Lady Broncos as they lost to the River Road Lady Wildcats 52-64.

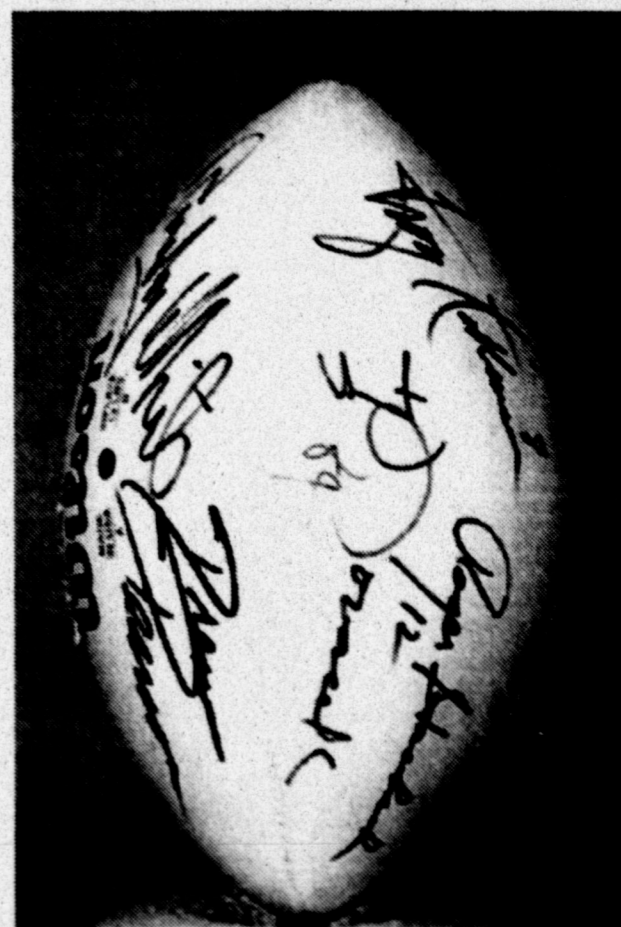
