takes office in Hedley

The Hedley Board of Aldermen now has the youngest member of any local government in Donley

When the board met in regular session at 7 p.m. on November 5, 1998, Bruce Howard made a motion to appoint 18-year-old James Lee Potts to the Board of Aldermen for the position vacated by Kari Lindsey. Shauna Monroe seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Potts, who graduated from Hedley High School last May, was sworn into office that same night.

"I was kind of surprised when they asked me to serve," said Alderman Potts, "but I think it's a big honor."

City Secretary Randy Shaw said he is unsure whether Potts is the youngest person ever to hold a Hedley alderman's position but he is sure that Potts must be pretty

"The board felt that he would be a good alderman and that it would be a good experience for him," Shaw said.

Potts is 23 years younger than the next youngest member of the board. The average age of the other aldermen is about 44 according to Alderman Shauna Monroe. But Potts doesn't think the difference in age will affect his interaction with other board members.

"I'm friends with all of them," he said. "I was very comfortable with them at the first meeting, and they seemed comfortable with me."

"He was very excited and very attentive during his first meeting," Monroe said of Alderman Potts "He's a fine young man... very conscientious."

"I just want to serve and help the community all I can," said Potts

In other city business, the board voted to contribute \$1,000 to the county's effort to purchase a new radio system for use by the Sheriff's Department and other emergency personnel. The board also authorized the City Secretary to spend up to \$300 for the purchase of the vacant lot next to City Hall.

this year at The Donley County State Bank, The Herring National Bank of Clarendon, and Community Bank.

As last year, local banks are making 0% loans, up to \$3,000, available for "Christmas Cash."

Interested parties must make application for a loan with any of the participating banks. Once your Christmas Cash loan has been approved, you will be issued specially printed Christmas Cash Dollars, which may be spent like U.S. currency toward new purchases of products and services (excluding Lottery tickets, gasoline, and tobacco products) at all of the participating businesses. Businesses display posters indicating they are participants of the promotion.

There will be no exchange of U.S. currency

"Christmas Cash" loans are available again to make change. For example, if you purchase items valued at \$72.95 and you give the merchant \$80.00 in Christmas Cash, the merchant can give you \$7.05 in-store credit. You may also pay \$70.00 in Christmas Cash and the remaining \$2.95 in U. S. currency.

> Christmas Cash Dollars are available in three denominations: \$10, \$20, and \$50. There are two signature lines, the same as there are on traveler's checks. Your signature is placed on the signature line before you leave the bank and then you must sign on the endorsement line when you spend your Cash.

> Christmas Cash must be spent at the participating merchants by December 31, 1998. Unspent Christmas Cash may be applied toward your 0% loan at the bank through January 5,

This cash may not be used as a regular monthly loan payment. It can only be applied toward the principal amount due at the end of the Christmas Cash note. Christmas Cash notes are paid back in ten equal monthly installments. After January 5, 1999, Christmas Cash becomes worthless.

It's amazing the variety of products you can purchase with your Christmas Cash. Some of the items purchased in years past include: replacement windows, vehicle repairs, groceries, furniture, entertainment equipment, cook-tops, dry cleaning for summer bedrolls, catered goodies, Christmas dinner, car stereos, special gift items, centerpieces, clothing, and much more.

The Donley County State Bank, The Herring National Bank, and Community Bank will buy Christmas Cash from participating merchants a rate of 95¢ for every \$1.00. Participating businesses are "interested in keeping your business here in Clarendon."



Budget or Bust: Making holiday shopping a success

By Dr. Lynn White

pecialty shop and stores in search of the perfect Christmas gift, an economist recommends ways to stay on budget. "First, set a budget for total gift giving. Make a list of all gifts to be bought and decide before you begin shopping how to divide gift money," recommends Dr. Lynn White, family economics expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Next, make a list showing the money allotted for each gift. When shopping, keep the money for each gift in mind — don't look at items outside the budget limit. If a special buy that saves money on a gift is found, keep track of savings and decide how to use these savings. You may add them to other gifts or give she says.

As shoppers hit malls, outlets, the whole family a gift of extra savings for the year," White offers.

Look for unique gifts that minimize cost. "For example, give older family members a special calendar with dates marked when you will do something special with them. Give children savings banks with quarters inside to encourage them to save and plan to use their money for something special they want," says White.

If a gift is expensive, make sure it's something that will be used long enough to give full value for the cost paid. Purchase something that won't break easily or be outgrown quickly.

Shop alone when possible, advises White. It's easy for someone else to divert you from your strategy,

When shopping for older children, remember that cash is always a great gift! Buy prepaid long distance phone cards for parents or friends who don't call because they can't afford to. "Put your number or special family member's or friend's phone number with the card," White says.

Grandparents could give their children a certificate for nights or weekends out when they will keep the grandkids. Spouses might give each other gift certificates for one evening a month for a date away from the children, a free Saturday to do something they usually can't find time to do.

Another special gift grandparents can give is one that comes straight from the heart and mouth. "They can make tapes for loved ones to share what they remember about their first or early holiday experiences, and special holiday memories over the years as a family. Oral and video family history will be treasured for years to come.

Nothin' says lovin' like the oven. "Bake special breads, cookies or candies for gifts. Involve other family members and let them wrap the items to be given to people like teachers and neighbors," White says.

Remember to shop early enough to avoid buying under pressure, she adds. Keep receipts for all purchases so items that don't work or don't fit can be returned. Keep track of accomplishments and stay on course. When challenged by one gift choice, remind yourself of your other successes.

The best part of planned, budgeted holiday shopping is that more thought is given to each gift, increasing the returns from your efforts," notes White.
