As shoppers hit malls, outlets, the whole family a gift of extra savspecialty shop and stores in search of the perfect Christmas gift, an econo-
mist recommends ways to stay on budget. "First, set a budget for total gift giving. Make a list of all gifts to be bought and decide before you begin shopping how to divide gift money,"
