CISD to receive \$88,000 tech grant

AUSTIN - Clarendon CISD has received a ago." Technology Advancement Grant in the amount of \$88,000 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board.

"We've worked several months on this grant, starting with technology committee meetings last fall," said CCISD Superintendent Phil Barefield. "We'll use this grant money to add classroom computers, more network drops, and a new network server for the elementary.'

Clarendon schools are still way ahead of the met in regular session October 1, pack in terms of technology according to Barefield. "Other schools our size are just now getting

Judge Jack Hall informed the networked computers," he said. "We installed our first network in the elementary over six years ago and in the high school and junior high three years

Barefield said this grant will enable CCISD to stay ahead and to meet new curriculum requirements for some new high school classes.

Technology Advancement grants were designed to allow schools to establish a local area network or expand a current network. Grants for up to \$100,000 have been awarded in this area for the purchase of computer equipment networking materials, and other related telecommunications costs

The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) was established in 1995 by the Texas Legislature and is expected to receive \$1.5 billion in revenues from telecommunications assessments over a ten-year period.

The TIF Board is responsible for disbursing approximately \$1.44 billion in grants and loans to emony at Clarendon College's assist in developing telecommunications capabilities in public schools, not-for-profit healthcare providers, institutions of higher education, and public libraries

Clarendon CISD fulfilled a series of TIFB re- ken series of weather observations quirements in order to receive funding. Some of the TIF Board requirements included creating a technology task force consisting of teachers, administrators, students, and community members, and committing to provide matching funds. The district committed over 10 percent in matching funds to the project.

Saye receives prestigious NWS award

Tommie C. Saye was presented Tuesday with the prestigious Thomas Jefferson Award for dedicated service to the National Weather Service above and beyond the call of duty.

Saye is the only cooperative weather observer to receive this national award in the entire southern region of the United States for the 1997 award year.

The National Weather Service Cooperative Weather Observer Program, with more than 11,000 volunteer weather observers recording daily temperature and precipitation data, has given scientists continuous observational data since the program's inception more than 100 years ago.

Only five individuals are selected each year to win this award. The Thomas Jefferson Award originated in 1959 as way for the National Weather Service to honor cooperative weather observers for unusual and outstanding achievement in the field of meteorological observations. It is the highest award the service presents to volunteer observers.

The award, presented in a cer-Bairfield Activity Center, is named for Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States. Jefferson, the statesman/scientist, made an almost unbrofrom 1776 to 1816.

Saye started his cooperative observer duties on March 1, 1955, and has maintained an unbroken record of outstanding service for over fortyeight years. Once a day, seven days a week and 365 days per year, Saye and all other cooperative observers freely dedicate their time to the service of their country and their community.

Thornberry backs ag disaster relief plan

WASHINGTON, DC - US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R- House of Representatives Friday afternoon by a vote of Clarendon) voted last week for a disaster relief plan that will provide farmers and ranchers with more than \$4 billion dollars in federal assistance to help them cope with the drought and low commodity prices.

"In the time since we introduced this plan two weeks ago," Thornberry stated, "I've heard from a lot of producers who had thoughts and concerns about various components of the package.

"For example, a number of folks expressed concern that the \$75 million for livestock feed assistance wasn't going to be enough. I agreed with them, and we were fortunately able to add additional \$100 million in this area to the bill.

When you combine this relief plan with the tax bill the House passed last Saturday, I think you're talking about a very solid package that will provide producers with assistance both in the short term and the long term."

The disaster relief plan was approved as part of the agriculture appropriations bill for 1999, which passed the 333-53. According to Thornberry, the bill contains several key provisions which will benefit farmers and ranchers

These provisions include \$1.5 billion for payments to farmers for natural disaster losses, \$1.65 billion for loss markets, \$675 million for multi-year losses, \$175 million for livestock feed assistance, and \$200 million for other emergency-related aid.

In addition to these provisions, Thornberry noted that the tax bill passed last weekend by the House also included a number of producer-friendly provisions, including: expanding the health insurance deduction for selfemployed individuals to 100 percent; making income averaging for farmers permanent; increasing the net operating loss carry-back period for farmers; providing an immediate \$25,000 per small business expense deduction; and providing an immediate increase in the inheritance tax exemption to \$1 million dollars.



Texas employers are now federal agents

Just call me "Marshall Roger."

As of October 1, 1998, myself and every other employer in Texas have been drafted into the service of the federal government.

Now you may ask, "How can this be? What's he talking about?" I'm glad you asked that. Let me elaborate.

In 1996 our friends in the US government passed the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act. Part of this act is a crack down on deadbeat dads (and moms) and an effort to collect overdue child support payments.

Without a doubt, this is a noble and laudable goal. The means to this end, however, stinks.

The federal government is now operating a National Directory of New Hires. To fill the rosters of that directory, the feds have coerced the states into requiring employers to file a report every time they hire or rehire an employee.

Within 20 days of bringing on a new worker, employers are mandated to furnish the state with that person's name, address, and Social Security. (They would also like to know the employee's date of birth and salary, but reporting that information is optional... for now.)

The state will take this data, put it in the National Directory, and, as soon as deadbeat dad Joe Blow turns up, see to it that the sorry cuss pays his child support.

To accomplish this, we get a new bureaucracy in Austin - The Texas Employer New Hire Reporting Operations Center - and another national database which is keeping track of your personal business.


Nothing I've received so far outlines the penalties for failing to report new hires, but when words such as "required," "mandatory," "comply," and "submit" are used by any government agency, you can be sure they don't mean maybe.

What really bites about this new law is that the state already has this information. Employers are required to file quarterly reports for their state unemployment insurance. On that report is the name and Social Security number of every employee working at that establishment along with how much they make.

Why can't the feds just call up the Texas Workforce Commission every three months and say "Hey, let's see the names and numbers of everybody in Texas who has had a job this quarter." The government could still get what they need to track down people behind on their child support, and we wouldn't have to waste everybody's time filling out a bunch more paperwork. As a bonus, they would know where everyone is working and not just the people who have been hired since the start of the program. As it is now, all the deadbeat parents who had a job before October 1, 1998, are safe, and they can keep avoiding the responsibilities associated with being a parent.

Unfortunately, using a system that's already in place doesn't have the same political flare as starting a "bold, new program" to crack down on this "crisis" afflicting our nation.

So there you have it, my friends. The story of how a mild-mannered publisher of a major metropolitan newspaper is helping to fight the battle for Truth and Justice through his secret identity as a federal agent. Think maybe I can call up a posse or throw people in the slammer now?



Despite headlines about scandal, nation's business continues

If you believe what you hear on the national news, the only thing being discussed in Washington

these days is the scandal involving the President. Well, that may be the only thing the Washington media is talking about, but the fact remains that the business of the country is going on.

For example, two weeks ago, the House passed a plan that will give parents more control over what

their children learn in school. The plan — called The Dollars to the Classroom Act - will require that 95 percent of federal education tax dollars be spent directly on students in the classroom, rather than on bureaucrats in Washington.

Last week, Congress approved two defense bills that will boost military pay by 3.6 percent, and provide important funds for Sheppard Air Force Base, the Pantex Plant, and the V-22 Osprey. The weekend before last, the House approved a plan designed to strengthen Social Security and lower taxes on working families. And as of this past Friday, the House was set to vote on a bill

containing nearly \$4 billion in disaster relief for farmers and ranchers hit hard by the drought and low commodity prices.

So in short, the business of the country is going on --- we're just not seeing or hearing much about it. The scandal involving the president is important, and something we should all take seriously. But taxes are still too high, defense spending is still too low, and farmers and ranchers are still waiting for help to arrive from Washington.

These issues may not make it into tomorrow's headlines. But they will make a difference in our lives, and are ones we cannot ignore.





Degrees were officially conferred on 274 West Texas A&M University graduates at the Aug. 15 commencement ceremonies. The University awarded master's degrees to 92 graduates and bachelor's degrees to 182 graduates.
