## College supporters turn out for celebration

College Hill was abuzz this past weekend as alumni, faculty, and students gathered to celebrate the centennial of the Athens of the Panhandle.

Saturday, September 5, marked one hundred years to the day that Clarendon College first opened its doors to students.

The Centennial Celebration began with registration in the Bairfield Activity Center where television crews from Amarillo interviewed Hazel Brandon of the class of '32 and Minnie F. Halbert of the class of '16.

A delicious barbecue luncheon was hosted by the CC Ex-Students Association, and the Saints' Roost Band provided entertainment during the meal.

At 3 p.m. the historic race to be Clarendon College's first student was re-enacted on the college track. In 1898, Harwood Beville raced another boy for the sole purpose of having the honor to be the first to enroll. The 1998 re-enactment was held with two young men - Jody McQueen of Lone Oak and Tommy Mather of Hereford - and one young lady - Christine Sanchez of Belen, New Mexico. Jody McQueen crossed the finish line first and won \$100 from *The Clarendon Enterprise*. Christine came in third but received a nice consolation prize when the audience took up a collection for the "girl winner."

The festivities continued Saturday evening with the Centennial Banquet. Barbara Collins of Hedley provided entertainment for the evening. She sang several songs and, in keeping with the college's origins as a Methodist school, she led the crowd

in singing "I'll Fly Away."

One hundred one-year old Minnie F. Halbert gave a salute to the college. A graduate of the class of 1916, Mrs. Halbert spoke of the commitment of those who built Clarendon College and reminded everyone of those early citizens who subscribed money so that the school could open. Urging everyone to remain committed to the college, she said, "Every age requires a commitment and leaves behind a contribution."

Next, Michael Crocker, who graduated in 1970, spoke on his times at Clarendon College and said that everything he has become was due to his time at Clarendon College. Today, Mr. Crocker is an expert on Middle Eastern affairs and was an advisor to President George Bush during the Persian Gulf War. Citing his personal experiences with Tex Selvidge and Beryl Clinton, he said that people and their personal touch are what have always made Clarendon College a great school.

US Representative William "Mac" Thornberry gave the evening's Keynote Address. Rep. Thornberry reflected on how times have changed since 1898 and the state of our nation today compared to the turn of the century. The congressman marveled at the fortitude of those early pioneers who settled Clarendon not long after the Indians had been vanquished from the plains. He commemorated those early citizens who had the determination to build a college so that their children would have the benefits of an education.

After the banquet, the crowd ad-

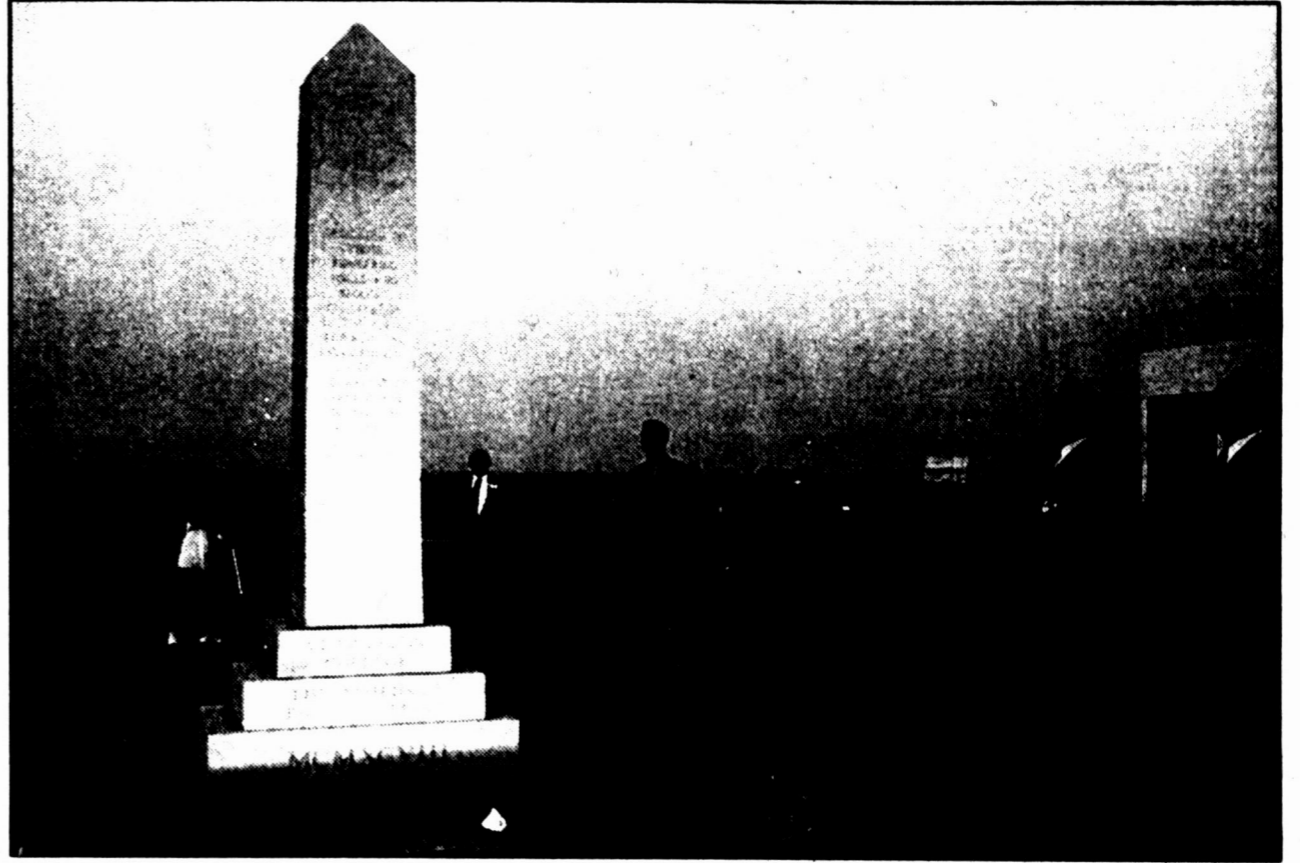
joined to the east lawn of the Bairfield Activity Center for the unveiling of the Centennial Monument. CC Interim President Raymond Hawkins presided over the ceremony as President Emeritus Kenneth Vaughan, Board of Regents Chairman R.L. Gilkey, and Rep. Thornberry unveiled the monument.

Sunday saw another historical re-enactment as several folks gathered in front of Clarendon High School, which now resides on the original campus of Clarendon College. Students of the Methodist college were required to attend church services and each Sunday they formed a processional down Fifth Street to from the college to the Methodist Church. This year's re-enactment was led by Minnie F. Halbert and Jack SoRelle, who graduated in 1921. In keeping with the original tradition, ladies were sequestered to the south side of the street, and the men stayed on the north side.

Special services were conducted at the church in the spirit of turn-of-the-century Methodism, and Dr. James Bell delivered an excellent sermon.

The celebration was capped with a special presentation from the First United Methodist Church of Clarendon to Clarendon College - a handsome plaque created by Cleo Russell featuring a Bulldog and the old block, interlocking C's.

The Clarendon College Centennial Committee plans to remain active throughout the school year and will meet later this week to bury a time capsule to be unearthed in 2098.

### Breast cancer screening clinic to be in Clarendon

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Clarendon Medical Center Nursing Home, Hwy 70 North, Clarendon on September 28, 1998.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a registered nurse.

The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen women needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only.

### TPMHA forming support group in Clarendon

The Clarendon Center of Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority (TPMHA) in collaboration with the Family and Community Education Department at TPMHA is hosting a support group meeting for families with an adult who has severe mental disorder, for the mentally ill adult, and any interested friends of people who suffer with neurobiological disorders. The group will meet at the TPMHA Clarendon Center, 111 S. Kearney Street in Clarendon on Monday, September 14, from 3-5 p.m.

This group will become an affiliate along with 45 other Alliances for the mentally ill scattered throughout Texas. Meetings are designed to educate family members and patients how

to cope positively with their mutual challenge of living with a severe mental disorder.

"The diagnosis of a severe mental illness in a member of family throws the whole family into a chronic grief cycle," said Carol Ann Vaughn, B.A., speaker at the meeting. Vaughn has been employed with TPMHA for nearly three years as the Family & Community Education Liaison for adults. She was formerly president of the Panhandle Alliance for the Mentally Ill. Her younger son was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia 12 years ago; however, he was actively sick for two-plus years before being diagnosed, but she nor her family had any idea what was causing his behav-

iors. Support group members unite to help each other cope with mental illness, educate the public and themselves, advocate for mental health services, and support research into causes and treatment of neurobiological disorders. "The emotional support and practical information that one receives from being with other people who are experiencing similar challenges are invaluable," further stated Vaughn.

Any interested persons in the Clarendon area as well as families and clients receiving services at the Clarendon Center are invited to attend.

In other city business, Randy Shaw reported on the health insurance for the city employees.

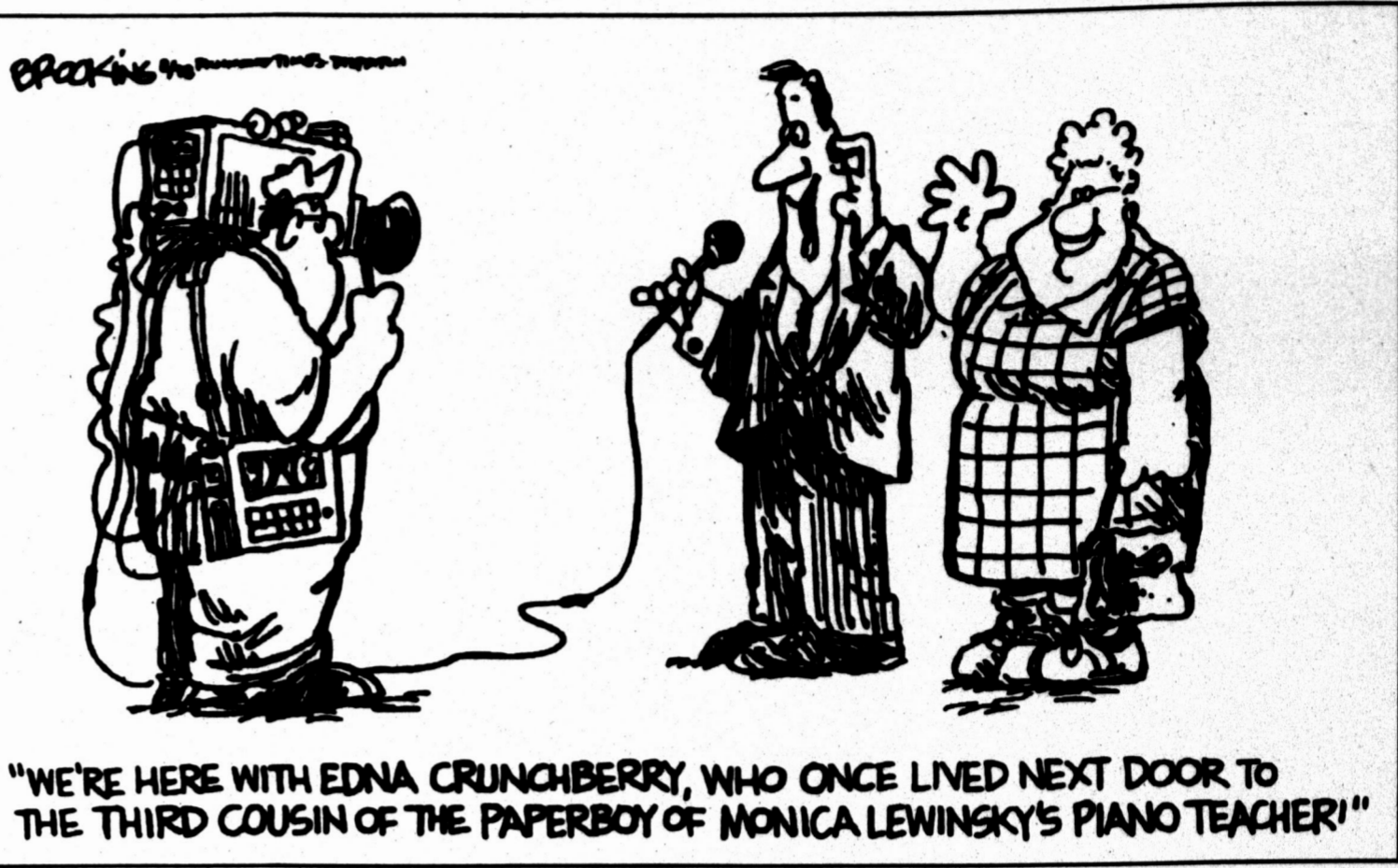
## Clarendon trustees meet

## U.S. Needs to Move Ahead and Build a National Missile Defense System

Fifteen years ago, Ronald Reagan first proposed developing a shield that could protect our Nation from incoming ballistic missiles.

A lot has changed since then. One thing that hasn't changed is that the world is still a dangerous place. In many ways, it's even more dangerous than before. For although the Soviet Empire has fallen, there are still many countries who have

missiles that could reach our shores today.

Russia has a superpower arsenal with a very unstable government and economy. We know for a fact that China has a number of missiles aimed our way. We also know that North Korea and Iran are improving the range of their missiles. Other nations — and terrorist groups — are also in the hunt. In the face of this threat, it's more important now than ever to follow through on President Reagan's vision and build a national missile defense system.

Now, some critics say we should move slowly in this area, while others say we shouldn't build

such a system at all. But the fact remains that we are currently defenseless against a threat to our own people at home. And the number one responsibility of the federal government is to keep our Nation secure. We so not just have an obligation to build a missile defense system. It is our duty.

That's why I'm pushing a plan that would make it the official policy of our government to do just that, and why I believe that building a missile defense system is something that's not just in our national interest, but it is something that just can't wait.

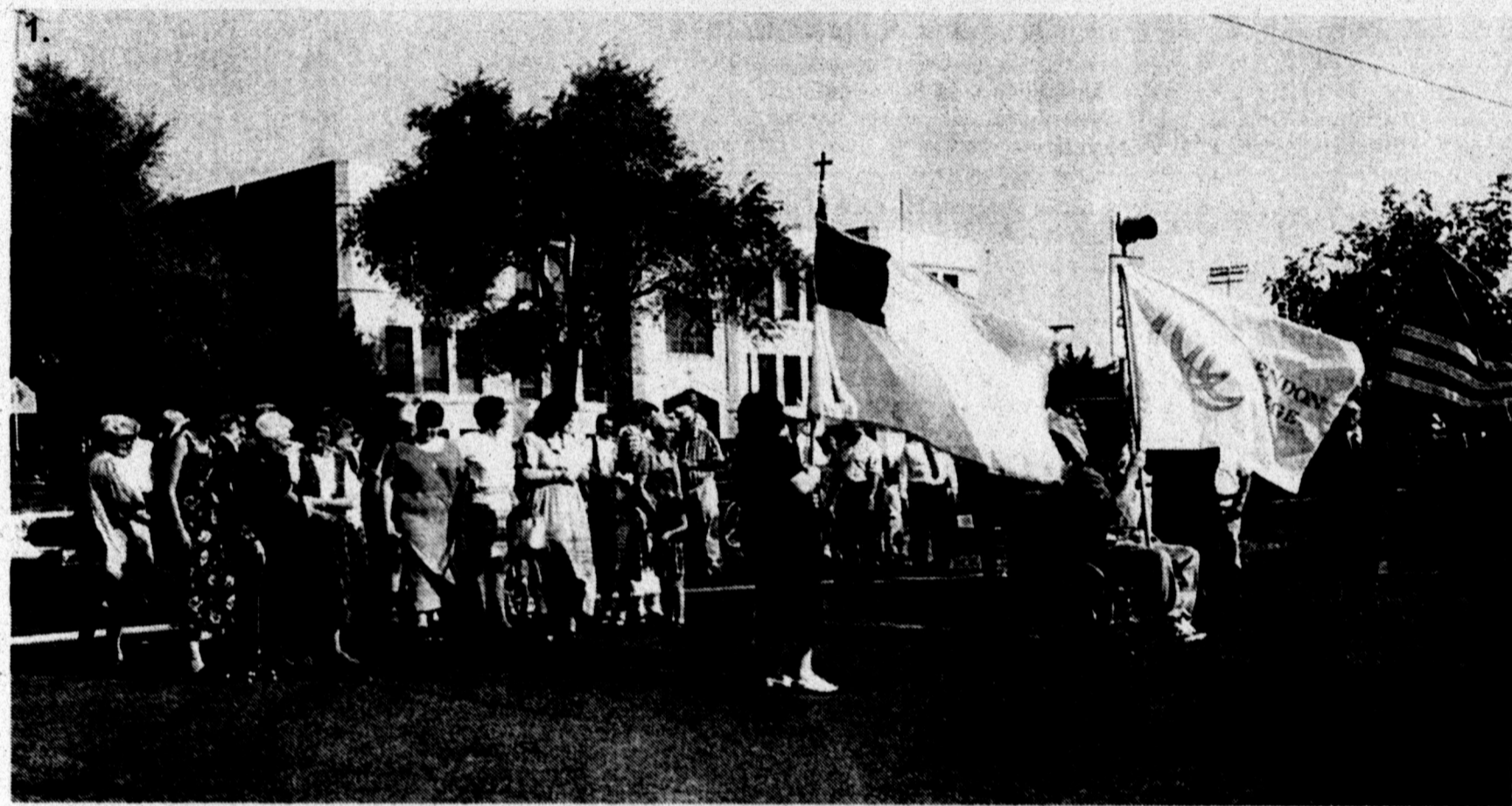

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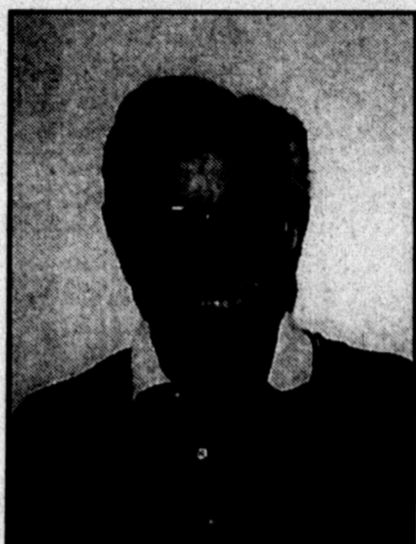

**Broncos look to regroup after first loss**

The Broncos met a good Claude Mustang team last Friday night. The Mustangs capitalized on several Bronco turnovers and mistakes to hand Clarendon their first loss of the season, 28-0.

With one game behind them, the Broncos are looking to regroup and head to Shamrock, 0-1, this Friday night at 7:30 p.m.

Head Coach Mark Howard plans to stick to the fundamentals and keep pushing towards district play. "We just need to go and keep working on all the things we've been working on all along. We need to be fundamentally sound in everything we do. Last night everything that could go wrong, did go wrong. Right now we aren't good enough to overcome that many mistakes, but we need to be good enough to be consistent," Howard said.

The young Bronco team did have costly mistakes, including four lost fumbles and two interceptions. There were many reasons for the errors.

"I think it was a combination of nervousness, not really knowing what to expect. And I'm not sure the guys were really ready (mentally) like they should have been. When we came out of the locker room, we were really quiet," Howard said.

During the second half the Broncos were more fired up and aggressive.

"I think the kids, after halftime, decided to make a little better showing. And they did. Our second half effort was a lot better than the first half. However, we decided we will just chalk this up as a learning experience and go on from there."

The Broncos were dealt a big blow by losing Senior D.J. Edwards to a strained ACL just before the half. D.J. is expected to return in approximately two weeks if everything goes according to the doctor's plan.

Although it was a tough night for the Broncos, they did have a few highlights.

"I think the brightest spot of the night was our quarterback (Colt Floyd). I think he did a better job of reading the veer than he had done in the past, as far as execution and the mechanics goes. I think he gained more confidence. One thing about (our scheme) is that we put all the pressure on the quarterback to make the right decision. And the one thing I noticed about (Colt) is that even after a turn over he didn't hold his head down when he came to the sideline. I know he felt bad, but he didn't feel sorry for himself. You have to be able to bounce back and recover from those

things by competing," said Howard. Defensive Coordinator, Roger Hoeltzel, was a little disappointed in the Bronco defense's technique performance.

"We had pretty good effort, but our technique was lacking. We have a lot of work to do on our technique," said Hoeltzel. "Every week we continue to try to improve upon what it is we want the defense to accomplish. Our kids don't have as good a picture as they need to perform well. So, we will continue to work on our tackling technique, lining up correctly, and being a lot more aggressive."

The Broncos travel to Shamrock this Friday evening. The CHS coaching staff expects our athletes will bounce back and give an even better effort in their second game of the season.

"I really think our guys will be ready. I think they grew up some. We'll see Friday night. It will be a good test for us to see how we do recover. Shamrock has a pretty good football team. We just need to be consistent and not make mistakes in what we do," stated Howard.

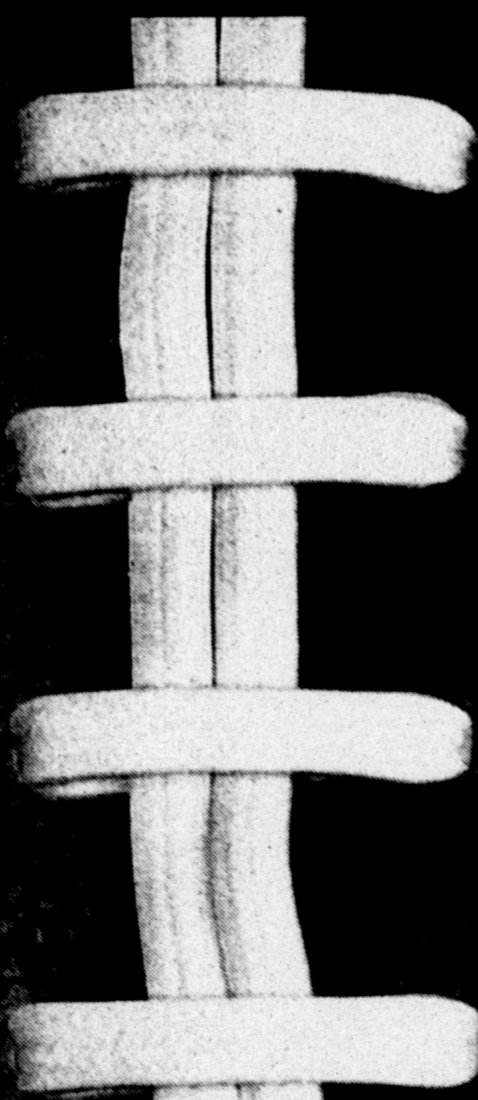

## Guest speaker to address Archaeological Society next Monday

Historian Alvin Lynn will talk about his research and field findings on a Kit Carson trail at the monthly meeting of the Clarendon Archaeological Society. The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Monday, September 14, at 416 S. Kearney.

Born and raised in Motley County near Matador, Lynn received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in geology from West Texas A&M Uni-

versity. He taught school for more than 31 years and field geology at WT for three summers.

"Archaeology and history have been a lifelong interest to me," said Lynn in a press release. "Growing up on Middle Pease River in Motley County afforded me areas rich in both history and archaeology.

"Several historic roads ran within

a few miles of my home. The Rath Trail from Dodge City to Fort Griffin ran through Tepee City a few miles to the east. The Texas-Santa Fe expedition passed very near Matador. The stop for the Childress-Whiteflat state line was on the place where I lived and the Mackenzie Trail was along the Ca-prock about 15 miles to the West."

Living in Dumas allowed Lynn the privilege of studying other historic

roads because the Canadian River was the lifeline for early travelers crossing the Panhandle from the east to the west.

Lynn is mapping the historic roads of the area with an emphasis on the road used by Kit Carson in 1864.

## Texas Stock Index shows impact of weak stock market

AUSTIN — The latest Texas Stock Index shows the impact of a generally weak stock market during the month of July. The TSI dropped 20.6 points, or 2.3 percent, to 632.4. Standard and Poor's 500 index dropped 1.2 percent during the same period.

"Despite its July setback the TSI remains 182.6 points above the level of one year ago," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Despite the Index's overall decrease for July, the TSI's technology sector defied market trends and soared to a new record high, Sharp said. "Texas technology stock prices rose 277.6 points, or 10.2 percent and, during the last 12 months, the overall stock value of Texas technology companies has risen 1,435.7 points, or 92.4 percent."

Dell Computer Corporation and

Compaq Computer Corporation had a particularly good month. Dell's stock price was boosted by continuing good news concerning company profits. Compaq Computer Corporation's stock value rose amid news of increased profits due to its acquisition of Digital Equipment Corporation. Tandy Corporation's stock price rose on news of sales growth at company stores. Other technology companies whose stock prices rose include Texas Instruments, DSC Communication Corporation, and Tech Sym Corporation.

The TSI's general business sector dropped 26.3 points, or 8.2 percent in July, but prices of general business stocks remain 43.1 points above the level of one year ago. Despite the overall weakness of the sector, several stocks did well. Share prices in-

creased for Southwest Airlines; GNI Group, a waste management services company; Oshman's Sporting Goods; NCH Corporation, a manufacturer and marketer of maintenance, repair, and supply products; and Valhi Inc., a holding company with interests in waste management, chemicals, and component products. The general business sector has lost two companies-clothing manufacturer Farah Inc. and La Quinta Motor Inns-to acquisitions.

Share prices for finance, insurance, and real estate stocks dipped 9.3 points, or 2.0 percent in July, but prices are up 63.3 points compared to one year ago. A bright spot in this sec-

tor was the Centex Corporation. The Dallas-based homebuilder had a good month because of the strong housing market.

The TSI's energy sector continues to suffer from a worldwide weakness in oil prices. Energy stock prices dropped 23.9 points, or 16.5 percent. Stock prices dropped for all seven companies in this sector. Prices are down 17.1 points or, 12.4 percent, compared to one year ago.

The Comptroller's office produces the monthly Texas Stock Index to help gauge investor confidence in Texas-based businesses. The TSI is one of 10 components of the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators

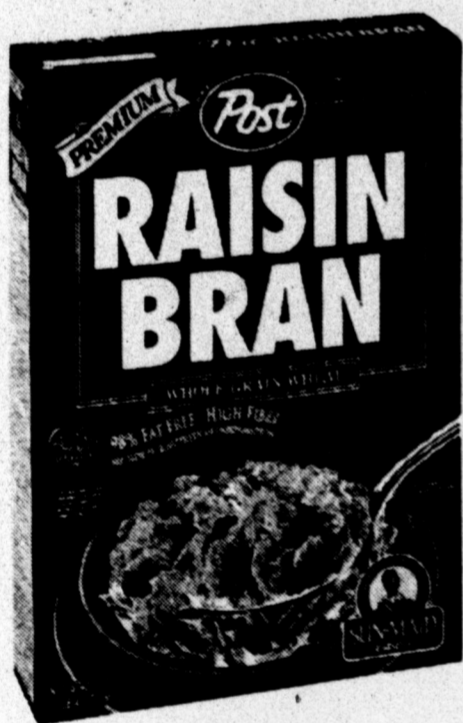
