## CHS One Act Play advances to region

Clarendon High School's One-Act Play will compete in regional competition April 24 on the Abilene Christian University campus for the chance to advance to state competition.

The actors and actresses will perform one last dress rehearsal Tuesday at 7 p.m. in the Clarendon High School auditorium. The public is welcome to attend the 40-minute presentation.

If Clarendon places in the top two in regional competition, they will advance to state competition May 7, 8, and 9 in Austin.

"I think their chances are just as good as they were anywhere else," Clarendon ISD Drama Teacher Dennis McMenemy said. "It's really a subjective thing. The judges there (at regional) might not like the play we're doing, and it's kind of their own opinion. Hopefully they appreciate good theatre."

The play "The Shadow Box" won the District 2-2A competition over runner-up Panhandle and tough competition from White Deer March 26 at Clarendon College's Harned Sisters Auditorium. It was the first time a Clarendon One-Act play has won the district meet in more than a decade, McMenemy said.

The play depicts three family groups and how they deal with death in a hospice situation.

"It's three families facing three different types of cancer and how they react," McMenemy said. "They react within their different groups and all their different relationships."

McMenemy chose the play because he participated in the performance in college.

"I thought it was a quality show with a lot of emotion, and the judges want to see that. They want to see a serious-type drama where the kids are thinking. Anybody can make anybody laugh, but it's hard to make you think."

At district, Laura Finch was named as All-Star cast alternate; Jason Archuleta and Nicki Lumpkin were selected as part of the All-Star cast; and senior Lindsey Eads was named Best Actress - one of the top two awards presented at contest. McMenemy owes the group's success to their commitment to the project.

"The group is really focused on what they're doing and they have done a wonderful job," he said. "Looking at the other plays in area and district they were funny, and there were only a couple of serious plays at area contest."

Clarendon competed against six of the area's finest Class 2A schools April 9 in Canyon and placed first. Eads was selected as alternate All-Star cast; Lumpkin, All-Star cast; Jason Bailey, best technical lighting; and Jason Archuleta, Best Actor.

Members of the play are Chris Johnsen, Archuleta, Lumpkin, Kareem Abdullah, Finch, Pat Church, Melissa Campbell, Eads, and Kim Alexander. Members of the technical staff are Bailey, Chris Bruce, Brent Gaines, Blake Bass, and Christina Wooten.

## Service with a Smile

Amigo's marks one year of serving fine Mexican cuisine



Jesus Hernandez perfected his traditional Mexican kitchen skills by observing the two best teachers in his world - his mother and his grandmother.

He also owes them his sales ability which he honed while hawking their fresh tamales and other Mexican specialties to passengers on the trains running through Chihuahua City, Mexico, as a 6-year-old.

Those two characteristics have helped Hernandez open and succeed in the restaurant business in Clarendon at Amigo's Mexican Restaurant on Highway 287 East.

Amigo's will celebrate its one-year anniversary Saturday from 12 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the restaurant. The ribbon cutting ceremony will include free gifts, lunch specials, door prizes, give-aways, and drawings every 30 minutes.

"I'm very excited (about the one-year anniversary)," Hernandez said. "When I started, I didn't know how it was going to go. Many restaurants open and close. That kind of scared me."

"I feel more relaxed now. I know the people of Clarendon won't let me down."

Opening a restaurant was something Hernandez never set out to do, but his deep roots in the food business kept tugging him back in this direction. At 16, he crossed the border and attended school in Greeley, Colorado, where he earned a language award. He left school before graduation because he was itching to make a living. He worked for the railroad in Wyoming want to "discover the world and see what it was like."

"I think (America) is the best country to live in."

The restless Hernandez moved back to Mexico for a few years and returned to Amarillo nearly 20 years ago and never left until moving to Clarendon last year. Immediately, he entered the Amarillo restaurant business at Furr's moving from dishwasher to cook. Then he moved onto La Fiesta before leaving to work construction.

"I heard about construction that you make a lot of money, and I felt I was never going to make enough money in the restaurant business to start my own business," he said.

Hernandez worked construction to put aside money for his dream, but he kept leaving the hard manual labor and returning to the restaurant business especially when the weather was miserable.

When he accumulated enough money, he waited for the right opportunity. When the De La O family put their Pepito's restaurant in Clarendon up for sale, Hernandez called.

"I thought it was a good place to be," said

Hernandez during a break from cooking last week.

"It was very important for me to be in a town my children liked. They made some friends, and they want to stay here forever."

The children adapted easier than their father, who had never owned his own restaurant before.

"It took awhile to get used to it," Hernandez said. "It was different. I would worry about pleasing my customers, but they give you compliments and that made me feel comfortable."

Hernandez wants to offer traditional Mexican foods but also is committed to experimenting and adding new dishes. His latest creation is the "Dorita's" named after his wife and full-time cook, Dora. The sopapilla is filled with meat, covered with sour cream sauce and smothered with melted cheese and was created to show Dora "how much I appreciate her."

Amigo's is a family operation. Hernandez and Mrs. Hernandez share cooking responsibilities and their 11-year-old daughter, Jessica, is an invaluable waitress and cashier. Six year old, Jesus occasionally helps with the trash but spends most of his time playing around the restaurant or watching TV and videos in a back room, Hernandez said.

The restaurant does well because Hernandez provides customers with food made from the freshest ingredients, he said. "We make it fresh every day. Some things you can't, but we try to make it homemade."

Hernandez now knows how much work it was for his mother to cook for a family of eight boys and two girls, and cooking for people for extra income. With all the time she spent in the kitchen, Hernandez "saw the way she made everything." Many of those principles he still employs today.

And what would his mother and grandmother think about his restaurant?

"They would say we were doing good. I think she would say we're already where she's at (skill-wise). I have done my homework."

## Clarendon Bands get high marks

The Clarendon Bronco and Colt Bands participated at UIL Concert and Sight-Reading contest in Boys Ranch last Tuesday and Thursday.

The Bronco Band, which performed on Tuesday, narrowly missed a "Sweepstakes" trophy while receiving the highest ratings in Clarendon history. The three judges in concert competition (Phil Anthony, Harold Bufe, and Ben Hoaldrige) gave them a "split" - II, II, I; and, in sight-reading competition the Broncos received straight I's (from Barry Hurt, Willis Giddens, and Jim Priest). For the year, the Broncos received the best concert ratings in Clarendon history, which tied Phil Anthony's 1966-67 Bronco Band's ratings.

The Colt Band competed in front of the same panel of judges on Wednesday and received the second ever "Sweepstakes" ratings in Clarendon history. The first Clarendon Band to achieve this was the 1995-96 Colt Band. In Junior High, bands must receive I's in concert and sight-reading competition. High School must receive I's in marching as well as concert and sight-reading.

Both the Bronco and Colt Bands performed very well and represented our school and community superbly.

## Credit Fair organizers hope to teach money skills

Paying the bills and having money left until the next paycheck are real concerns for most Americans.

Consumer debt is growing at twice the rate of wages across the nation, according to Sue Church, family and consumer science agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Yet, only 52.3 percent of credit card holders normally pay off their bills in full each month. Often the skills needed by the public to get control of their finances are easily learned," said Church, who is one of the organizers of a new money and credit management program, Money 2000 Plus, scheduled here April 23.

Donley County is the sole site in this region where the new program will be held this year. The education event and credit fair will be offered from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the Bairfield Activity Center on the campus of Clarendon College.

The Money 2000 Plus program is being sponsored by the Extension Service, through partnerships with regional financial institutions and credit counseling experts, to aid the public in facing many of the financial challenges of

today's fast paced world.

"There will be a series of exhibits, seminars, knowledgeable speakers, and video presentations designed to help interested individuals and families increase their skills in managing money and credit," said Church.

Extension's regional partners in this area include Clarendon's Community Bank, Donley County State Bank, Herring National Bank, Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Amarillo, and Clarendon College.

Credit fair goers will see money management exhibits and materials. Banking and credit counselors will be available to answer questions. Participants can obtain free computer budget analysis and free \$10 coupons to open savings accounts at participating local banks.

Seminar topics and speakers will include Dr. Lynn White, Extension Service family economics specialist from College Station and a native of Clarendon, who will discuss Extension's role in the Money 2000 Plus program and the impact the agency hopes it might have across the state. She will also be

speaking on "Tax Breaks For Those Earning Less Than \$28,000."

Mike Isely with the Credit Bureau of Amarillo will discuss credit readiness and money management issues. Dan Allen, a consultant who leads successful money management seminars across the country, will address the six main reasons why people fail financially.

Jerry Courtney and Jim Shelton, local attorneys, will discuss the importance of having a will and legacies to protect loved ones.

Money matters and credit information for today's consumer is the topic for Mika Clay with Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Amarillo. Bobby Burrus of Herring National Bank and Sun America Securities will discuss strategies for building wealth into the next century.

Janna Serrano with Better Business Bureau of Amarillo will discuss buyer awareness issues. Jim Van Pelt with Herring National Bank will discuss the hidden costs associated with automobile purchases.

Knowing your rights as a consumer will

be discussed by Gregg Haire of the Texas Attorney General's Office.

Other presenters include David Magar, Herring Bank, who will discuss the credit application process needed for bank loans.

Cynthia Ewing, Clarendon College business and computer science instructor, will demonstrate the advantages of using the popular Quicken money management and budgeting software for individuals and families.

Church said this year Money 2000 Plus will be conducted in 15 counties across Texas. Extension is seeking partnerships among a host of financial institutions as well as money and credit management organizations in each region where the seminars and credit fairs will be offered.

"We want to offer 'real world' education and counseling to help the public achieve successful solutions to their financial problems," she said.

But the national debate misses the whole point. The root problem isn't the fairness or the complexity of the issue. Taxes are too high. Period.

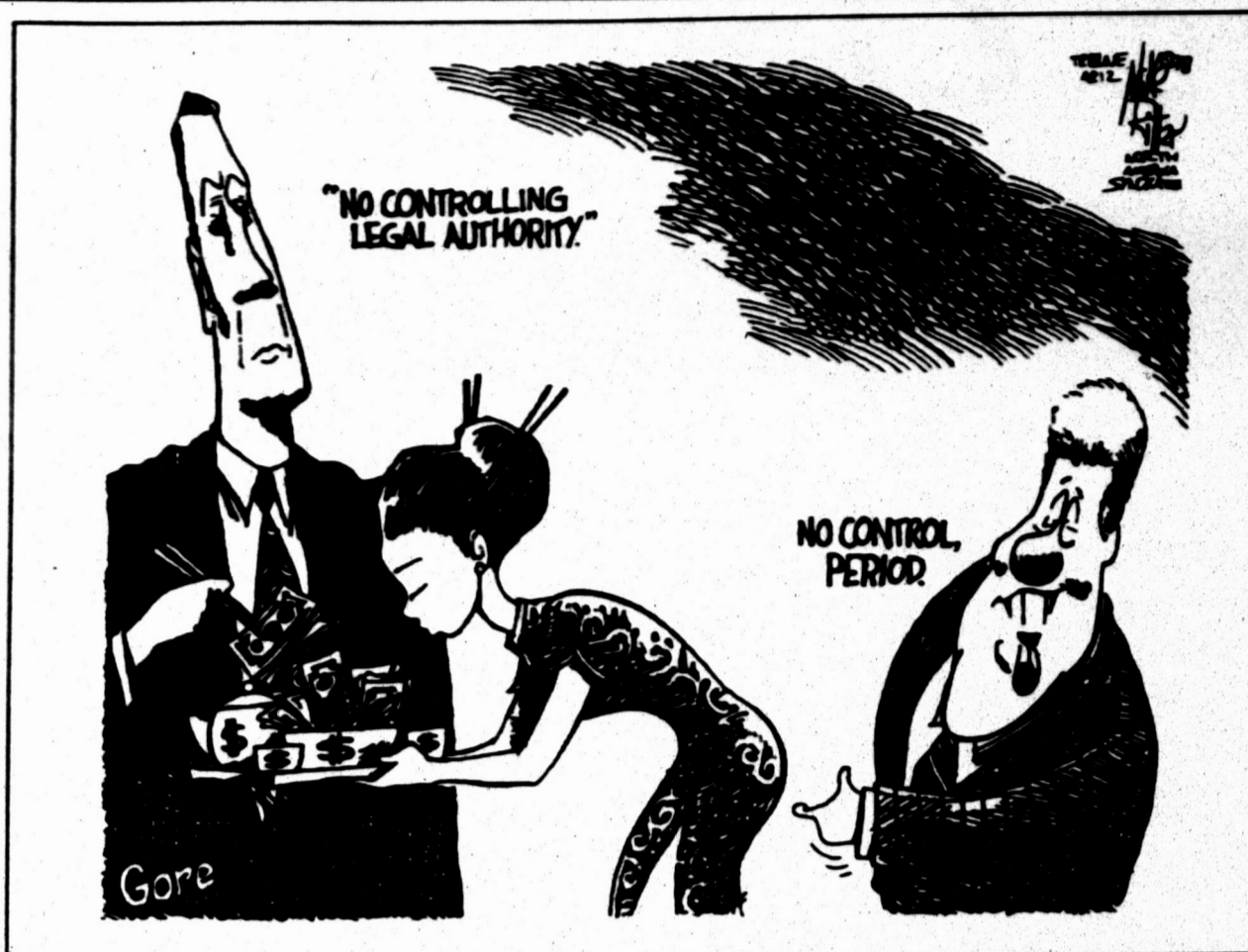
Payroll taxes and self-employment taxes are eating small business owners alive, and all the \$500 per child tax credits in the world won't make a bit of difference in those areas.

The swat got his attention, and he understood that I was serious.

smile at you as I was 'sicking' my beloved and very over-protective Doberman Pincher on you. I was to put in nicely, a little heathen. My mom and dad tried the stand in the corner bit and it wasn't effective. (I did get good at counting the lines in the wood paneling, though!)

However, most of the time my parents would bust my behind. The spankings hurt my pride more than my rear-end. And it hurt me in knowing that I had hurt my parents. The whippings were quick and to the point. I still would bet that my Dad could remove a belt faster than anyone else!

With each spanking came a lesson; I was always told why I was getting a spanking and what I should have done. Sometimes the spankings were for my own safety, like the time I hopped the fence and decided to play in the bullpen by the barn. Or the time that I pried open my bedroom window and climbed onto the roof. And the list goes on and on.

As with all forms of punishment, spanking can be misused. Not every person administers it correctly; and, unfortunately, these are the people who are used as examples when this subject comes up for debate.

**Highway bill shows pork barrel politics is alive, well**

The House of Representatives approved a highway spending bill last week intended to fix bridges and patch roads around the country.

There are some good things in this bill. For instance, Texas will get more of our tax money back. Where we used to get 76 cents back for every highway dollar we send to Washington, we'll now receive around 90 cents. This is an improvement that's long overdue.

But in the end, I couldn't support this bill because it busts the budget and was filled with pork. Congress passed a balanced budget plan last summer that set strict spending limits to eliminate the deficit. Now that we've achieved a budget surplus, this highway bill spends \$26 billion more than was budgeted. To make matters worse, the bill provides no clue as to where the extra money will come from. It only says that spending offsets will be figured out down the road, which may mean more cuts in agriculture and defense.

And as for the money that is being spent, not all of it is going to fix bridges and patch roads. Nearly \$10 billion dollars in the bill will be spent

on 1,467 "special" projects around the country. These projects include \$3 million for a PBS documentary on "infrastructure awareness" and \$7 million for a train museum in Allentown, Pennsylvania. In addition, more money will also be spent on bike trails and mass transit.

Fortunately, the Senate passed a better plan — so there's still a chance that a reasonable highway bill will make it to the President's desk. But in the continuing battle to change the way Washington works, last week's debate — and the spending and pork barrel projects that went along with it — shows that we've still got a long way to go.

**Producers to get tips on battling Boll Weevils**

LUBBOCK—Ways individual cotton producers can adjust their production systems this season to better manage boll weevils will be presented during a special 3-hour workshop April 17 at the Texas Cotton Ginners Conference at the Lubbock Civic Center.

Without a coordinated weevil eradication program in operation on the Texas High Plains, individual growers are on their own this season in battling what is shaping up as a heavy onslaught by the insects, said Dr. Randy Boman, cotton agronomist with the Texas Ag. Extension Service.

To help them and growers across Texas and neighboring states mount the best attack on boll weevils, the

Extension Service and Plains Cotton Growers are conducting the workshop from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. the final day of the conference. Producers who participate will receive continuing education units needed for state certification of pesticide applicators.

"On the South Plains, the state's largest and most concentrated cotton production region, we're looking at record numbers of weevils that went into overwintering habitats last season," Boman said. Surveys by scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service are finding the survival rate of these overwintered weevils is very high, he noted. "What this points to

is probably a record year for weevils in the Southern High Plains," he said.

The seminar will open with an overview of the weevil situation across the state by Dr. James Supak. He is the associate head of the department of soil and crop sciences at Texas A&M and former Extension Service cotton agronomist at Lubbock. Brant Baugh, Extension integrated pest management (IPM) agent in Lubbock County, will identify weak links in the weevil's biological structure.

Boll weevil management from start to finish will be covered by Phillip Kidd, Extension IPM agent in Terry and Yoakum counties. Proper timing of control efforts will be chronicled by Clyde Crumley, Extension IPM agent in Gaines County. Lubbock County Extension agent Mark Brown will discuss the importance of planting for an early crop.

In-season management will be covered by Dr. Dan Krieg, Leidigh Professor of Crop Physiology at Tech. Boman will discuss timely termination. A panel of crop consultants will present perspectives on crop management for the '98 season. Panelists will be Dana Palmer, John Hunter, Donald Kitten and Bob Glodt. Following a question and answer period, Dr. John Abernathy, dean of the College of Ag. Sciences and Natural Resources at Tech, will summarize the situation.

### Bronco basketball team ranks statewide in free throw percentages

Clarendon's boys basketball team ranked sixth in all classifications in Texas in the percentage of free throws made during its 1997-98 district championship season.

The Broncos were 301 for 453 for a 66 percent free throw average as a team.

Little Cyprus Mauriceville completed 75.3 percent of its free throws for first place making 651 for 864. Other teams finishing higher than Clarendon were Clear Lake, 74.3 percent; The Woodlands, 72 percent; Lubbock Monterey, 69.2 percent; and Everman, 66.7 percent.

"We really have improved our free throw percentage over the past few years," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "We won

a lot of games with our free throws this year and I was thrilled to know we ranked that high in the state. I owe it all to the players working hard from the line in practice."

The Texas Association of Basketball Coaches recognized the teams with leading free throw percentages with a certificate.

Clarendon senior Kareem Abdullah ranked 15th in the state in individual free throw shooters connecting on 81.1 percent of his free throws. He was 112-for-138.

The best free throw shooter in Texas was Tony Sanchez of Edcouch-Elsa who was 184-for-202 or 91 percent in his free throw attempts. Abdullah was two points away from the top 10 free throw shooters

in Texas.

"Everyone shot well from the free throw line but when it was crunch time, we all wanted (Abdullah) on the line," Avery said. "He's just a tremendous shooter, especially in emotional situations."

Abdullah also was selected to play in the highly touted TABC All-Star Basketball Game May 8 in San Antonio. The game features the best players from Class 1A, 2A, 3A, 4A, and 5A.

Abdullah was one of four Class 2A players chosen in Texas. He will play for the South team at 7 p.m. at the Blossom Athletic Center.

Most of the major college and uni-

versity coaches will attend the game, which is held during the TABC Clinic.

"I don't think people realize what an honor it is to be selected for his game," Avery said. "The last person from Clarendon to play in this game was Danny McCampbell four years ago, and he's now playing for Kentucky Wesleyan. A lot of college coaches come to this game to find players for their teams.

"I'm real prod of (Abdullah). He's worthy of the selection. You have to be an all-state selection to even be considered. Any coach who has met (Abdullah) thinks so highly of him, and I think that helped tremendously when they were choosing these teams."
