Former publisher enters hall of fame

Former local publisher G.W. "Red" Estlack was inducted into the Panhandle Press Association's Hall of Fame during the annual PPA convention in Amarillo Saturday.

Estlack grew up in his father's printing business in Clarendon and began learning the newspaper business from the ground up in 1929 when his father founded *The Donley County Leader*.

In 1942, G.W. assumed the newspaper's management, and he became the sole owner of the *Leader* in 1959. He sold the newspaper in 1974 and retired from the family printing business in 1992. He died in 1994.

During his career, George Wayne served as secretary, vice president, and president of the Panhandle Press Association and as a board member for the Texas Press Association. He received first place awards for editorials on both the PPA and TPA levels. He was recognized by the Vo-Ag Teachers of Texas, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, the Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts, and the Texas Department of Health and Human

Services. He was also an active member of the Clarendon Lions Club.

His wife, Ruby Dell Estlack, accepted the posthumous award during ceremonies Saturday. "The newspaper was his life," she said. "I'm so happy for this honor."

Also inducted into the Hall of Fame were H. Deskin Wells of *The Wellington Leader*, Bill Cox of *The Amarillo Globe-News*, and Kenneth Towery of the *Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon*.

Fellow hall of famer Bill Cox said Saturday that Estlack and Wells "were two of the finest newspaper men I've ever known."

Estlack leads A&M team to championship

Russell Estlack placed second nationally in the Southern Collegiate Poultry Judging Contest held at Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, LA on April 2-3, 1998, and led the Texas A&M University Collegiate Poultry and Poultry Products Evaluation Team to a national championship. Russell needed only seven additional points out of 1400 to receive the rank high individual.

Russell is a graduate of Clarendon High School where he was on the high school FFA poultry judging team. He presently is a senior in Poultry Science at Texas A&M University where he is an honor student.

Estlack is the son of Allen and Helen Estlack of Clarendon.

When Russell was asked what he planned to do upon graduation, he said he is trying to decide between an executive position in one of the large poultry companies, most of which are corporate, or continue his education toward a Ph.D. in some scientific area of poultry science.

Russell has several hobbies, but the one that excites him the most is breeding Black and Silver Laced Cochon bantam chickens. He and his father Allen produce national champion bantams.

The A&M Poultry Judging team is coached by Dr. W.F. Krueger and other team members include Jessica Andrews, Jack Higgins, Micah Bishop, and alternate Lisa Carter.

There will also be a presentation on Variety Trial Results and management tips.

Speakers will be Dr. Jim Leser, Extension Entomologist, Cotton, TAEX Lubbock, and Dr. Ruddy Boman, Cotton Specialist, TAEX Lubbock.

This should be a very timely and informative meeting, especially in light of the numbers of Boll Weevils we experienced last year and the anticipated numbers for this coming season.

Enterprise Office Director Cheryl Johnson accepted the awards on the newspaper's behalf.

The PPA Contest was judged by members of the South Texas Press Association. Nineteen area newspapers competed in the weekly division. *The Canadian Record* took home the

Money 2000 Plus program coming to Donley County

Whether you're interested in learning about debt reduction, saving money, leasing a car or simply balancing a bank statement, the Donley County Agricultural Extension Service has a plan for you.

Its objective is for families to increase their savings or reduce their debt by \$2,000 by the year 2000 — plus do a little bit more. Donley County is currently the only county in the Panhandle participating in this project.

Money 2000 Plus is a program that is targeting a number of audiences. This program can help young, single adults, working families, and retirees. Information made available through the program teaches participants money management, using credit re-

sponsibly, increasing savings, investing and financially planning for the 21st Century.

On April 23rd, Donley County Extension Service, working in partnership with Community Bank, Donley County State Bank, Herring National Bank, the Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Amarillo and Clarendon College, is sponsoring a Money 2000 Plus Credit Fair for individuals in the greater Panhandle area. We're rich economically, but morally we're falling behind

The shootings at an Arkansas school last week are hard to understand.

It's clearly a tragedy. And when you consider that it's the third such incident in less than six months, it also gets you wondering whether there's an underlying thread joining them all together, or whether each one is just a senseless act of violence unique in its own right.

Some people are putting the blame on the upbringing of the young boys involved. Some of the

national media suggest that because the boys were raised around guns, they were somehow more likely to commit this kind of heinous act. Well, I was brought up around guns, and I know a lot of other people in our part of the country who were as well. So I just don't buy it.

I tend to agree with Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee, who was asked whether he thought the boys' experience with firearms could have led them to commit such a crime. He replied, in effect, that he believed that what's in a person's heart is more important than what's in their hands. I couldn't agree more.

We live in a society where young people are bombarded with televised images of violence from nearly the moment they are born ... where too many

parents are afraid or unwilling to teach their kids the difference between right and wrong ... and where too many kids find a greater sense of belonging in gangs than they do in their own families.

We're rich as a Nation economically - the budget is balanced, unemployment is down, and the Dow is closing in on 9000. But morally, we're falling behind.

We may never know what caused the shootings last week in Arkansas. But I do know that if we don't do a better job teaching our children about values and being positive role models in their lives, more young people will be lost and a tragedy like we saw last week could happen yet again.

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative breaks ground on power plant

DENVER CITY — Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc., headquartered in Amarillo, opened a new chapter in its proud history of service to customers in Texas and Oklahoma when it broke ground on April 2 for Mustang Station, a \$145 million electric generating plant near Denver City.

The first phase of the 486 megawatt plant will produce some 285 megawatts and is expected to be in service in the spring of 1999. The second-phase addition will begin production in January of 2000. Mustang Station will be fueled by natural gas and will eventually require about 20 employees.

"This state-of-the-art facility will equip us to meet the needs of our member-consumers for years to come," said Robert W. Bryant, president of Golden Spread EC. "It truly is a power plant for the 21st century."

The primary customers for

Mustang Station will be the 100,000 member-consumers served by the 11 Golden Spread member cooperatives in the South Plains and panhandles of Texas and Oklahoma.

Golden Spread's subsidiary, GS Electric Generating Cooperative, will purchase a 50 percent interest in Mustang Station when the generating units are completed. Denver City Energy Associates is the plant developer and will own 50 percent upon completion. Denver City Energy Associates is an equal partnership formed by Quips Corporation of Amarillo, an affiliate of Southwestern Public Service Company and LS Power, an independent power producer based in New Jersey.

At a time when electric utility restructuring is moving forward at the federal and state level, and, with the Texas Legislature expected to consider restructuring during the 1999 legislative session, Golden Spread is

adopting innovative approaches to power supply. Its new power supply portfolio and member sales agreements are designed to lower costs for consumers and enhance the competitive position of the electric cooperative and its members. Mustang Station is critical to Golden Spread's future success as a competitive electric supplier in the marketplace.

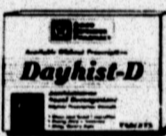

Hedley Aldermen hold regular meeting

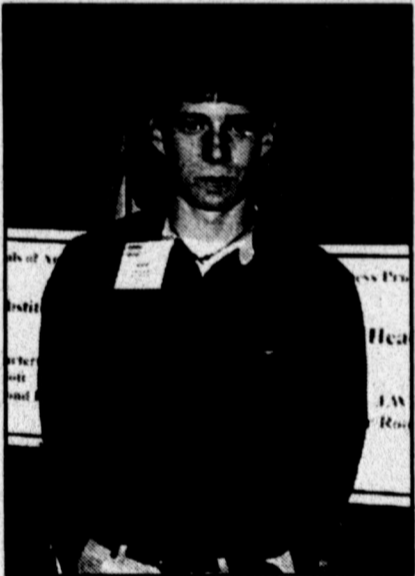
The Board of Aldermen of the City of Hedley met in regular session April 2, 1998, at 7 p.m.

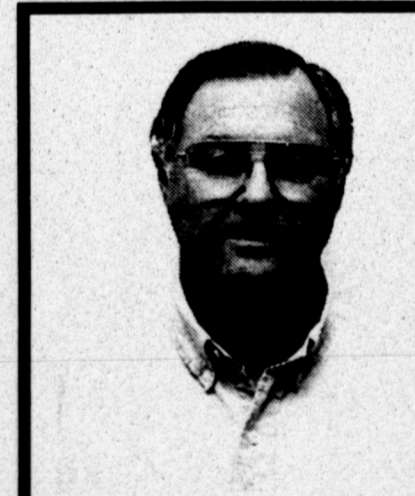

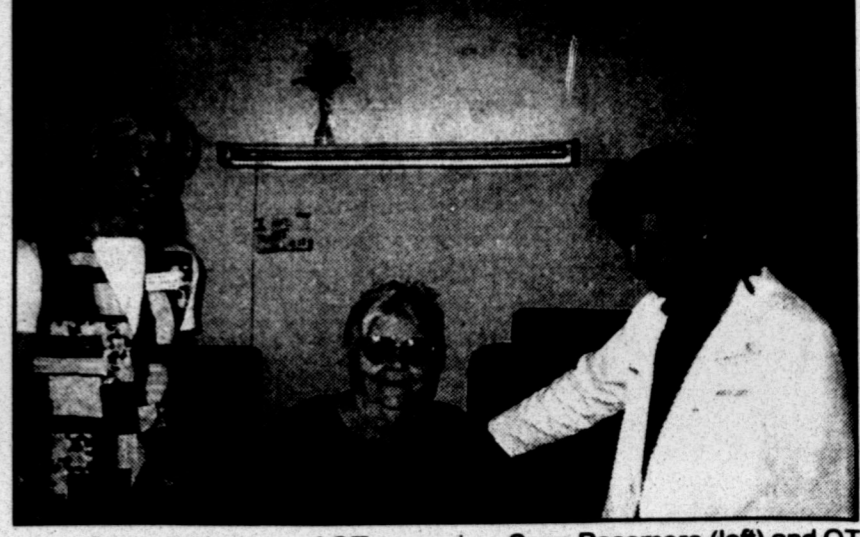
April is National Occupational Therapy Month. It is a time when Occupational Therapists seek special opportunities to share the wonder of their work with their communities and professional counterparts.

Lady Broncos finish second in Groom Relays

Clarendon's Lady Broncos finished second behind Panhandle - winning two relays and placing second in another - for a team 101 points during the Groom Tiger Relays Friday and Saturday in Groom.

First-place Panhandle rounded up 195 points.

The Lady Broncos will participate in Thursday and Friday's Amarillo Girls Relays at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo.

Field events and preliminary running events begin at 3 p.m. Thursday. The running finals are slated for 1 p.m. Friday.

"Because of the Easter break, we're taking only about half the team, but we still expect to do real well," head coach Steve Schmidt said. "It should be a good tune-up before next week's district meet at Panhandle."

The team of Kathy Bryley, Kim Alexander, Stephanie Smith, and Clarissa Smith ran a 51.44 for first place in the 400M relay.

"They looked really good and were not pushed, winning easily," Schmidt said. "I'm excited to see what happens this week against some good competition."

The 800M relay squad of Bryley, Alexander, Butler, and Clarissa Smith was pushed and Schmidt said it paid off with a 1:49.13 time and another gold medal.

"The girls dipped down below the 1:50 mark for the first time this year. Panhandle won state in that event last year so it was nice to beat them."

Panhandle ran a 1:49.84 pace for second. The mile relay team of Bryley, Clarissa Smith, Alexander, and Butler placed second with a time of 4:19.74 behind Panhandle.

The Lady Panthers ran a 4:18.37 for first place. The mile relay team took off 5 seconds from its previous best time, Schmidt said.

"Alexander ran well for her first time to run it this year. It was only the second time (Clarissa

Smith has run it so they've really made great progress.

"I think all three relays have a good chance to advance to regionals and possibly state. We're getting closer to these big meets. It's starting to get exciting now."

Senior Kasi Ashcraft placed second in the shot put with a throw of 34-1, while Alexander threw the shot 32-7 for fifth place. Freshman Lindsey Shelton also competed.

"Ashcraft continues to pick up the medals in the weight events," Schmidt said.

Ashcraft finished first in the discus with an attempt of 92-5. Shelton and Shannon Cooper also participated. In the triple jump, Clarissa Smith placed third with a distance of 30-5, while Stephanie Smith finished fifth with 30-1/2. Butler was right behind in sixth place with a distance of 29-4 3/4.

Freshmen Butler and Jamie Sawyer participated in the long jump, while Johnnie Sparks,

Jamee Sparks and Danielle Holden competed in the high jump.

Lindy Helms and Holden were competitors in the 3200M run. Sawyer placed sixth in the 800M run with a time of 2:53. America Santos and Jamee Sparks also competed in the race.

In the 100M, Stephanie Smith was fourth with a time of 14.06, and Sarah Kidd was fifth with a time of 14.36.

Catherine Chamberlain placed fourth in the 400M with a time of 67.2, while Sawyer was right on her heels with a time of 69.9 and fifth place. Cooper also participated.

"Chamberlain tried a new event this week (400M) and did fabulous," Schmidt said. "Sawyer also competed well, running the 800M and the 400M - two very tough races and she ran them within an hour, probably."

Stephanie Smith finished fifth in the 200M with a time of 30.5. Kidd also participated. Chamberlain and Holden also ran in the 1600M.

Bronco track and field athletes finish third in meet

Five varsity Bronco track and field competitors garnered enough points for third place in last weekend's Groom Tiger Relays in Groom.

Clarendon amassed 65 points, compared with winner Panhandle's 240 and second place Wheeler's 125.

Clarendon travels to Panhandle April 17 and 18 for the District 2-2A meet.

Sophomore Hunter Spier got a nod to compete on the varsity level and won the contest with a throw of 43-6. He was seventh in the discus.

"He did real well," head track coach Darryl Cash said. "He'll probably compete at the varsity level at the district meet."

"All the boys that ran on the varsity level scored points for the team. We had some great individual efforts and had some personal best

jumps and times."

Clarendon's mile-relay team of Sam Holton, Colt Floyd, G.J. Martindale, and Carey Thornberry ran their season-best time of 3:49.56.

"(Floyd) ran probably the fastest leg that he's ever run. He did real well."

Floyd also placed fourth in the high jump. The sprint relay squad of Martin, Floyd, Shields, and Dee Thompson placed second with a time of 47.06.

"Thompson placed first in the long jump (19-4)," Cash said. Thompson also was fourth in the 200M with a time of 25.87.

"Martindale ran the 800M (2:10.29) and came in second and ran the best time that he's

ever run."

The freshman also was sixth in the triple jump and seventh in the long jump. Brandon Word was fifth in the shot put and competed in the discus, as did David Hall and Tyler Lane. Josh Williams jumped a distance of 35-10 for fourth place in the triple jump and was sixth in the high jump, and competed in the 1600M.

Michael Lane and Nathan Floyd were competitors in the 1600M and 3200M runs, and Greg Leeper competed in the 3200M. Aaron Kidd ran a 2:22 in the 800M and competed in the 110M high hurdles.

Sam Holton placed fifth in the 300M hurdles with a time of 45.37 and competed in the 110M high hurdles. Zack Butts competed in the 110M high hurdles, and Martin participated in the 100M and 200M. Thornberry competed in the 400M.

TDA re-opens public comment period on Boll Weevil Eradication Zone

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Agriculture announced recently that it is formally re-opening the public comment period on a proposal to create a new boll weevil eradication zone for the Northern Rolling Plains. The comment period is being re-opened to allow additional

opportunity for cotton farmers within the proposed zone to offer their input on the recommendation.

Written comments will be accepted through May 11. The initial public comment period ran 32 days from Jan. 30 to March 2.

The proposed zone, the Northern

Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, would consist of approximately 237,000 acres of cotton in 14 counties: Childress, Clay, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, Foard, Gray, Hall, Hardeman, King, Wheeler, Wichita, Wilbarger, and a portion of Archer.

The zone's proposed boundary lines were recommended to Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry by the Northern Rolling Plains Interim Advisory Committee on Boll Weevil Eradication. The proposal made by the interim committee would simply create a zone but would not put an eradication program in place.



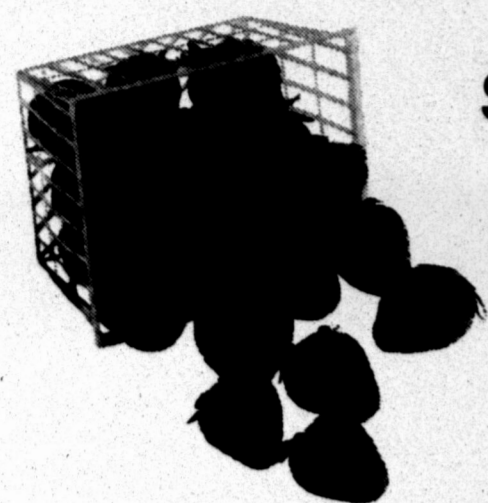
