



Issue Update with Mac Thornberry

It's clearly a tragedy. And when you consider that it's the third such incident in less than six months, it also gets you wondering whether there's an underlying thread joining them all together, or whether each one is just a senseless act of violence unique in its own right.

Some people are putting the blame on the upbringing of the young boys involved. Some of the

national media suggest that because the boys were raised around guns, they were somehow more likely to commit this kind of heinous act. Well, I was brought up around guns, and I know a lot of other people in our part of the country who were as well. So I just don't buy it.

I tend to agree with Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee, who was asked whether he thought the boys' experience with firearms could have led them to commit such a crime. He replied, in effect, that he believed that what's in a person's heart is more important than what's in their hands. I couldn't agree more.

We live in a society where young people are bombarded with televised images of violence from nearly the moment they are born ... where too many

parents are afraid or unwilling to teach their chills the difference between right and wrong ... and where too many kids find a greater sense of belonging in gangs than they do in their own fami-

We're rich as a Nation economically - the budget is balanced, unemployment is down, and the Dow is closing in on 9000. But morally, we're fall-

We may never know what caused the shootings last week in Arkansas. But I do know that if we don't do a better job teaching our children about values and being positive role models in their lives, more young people will be lost and a tragedy like we saw last week could happen yet again.

Donley County Senior Golden Spread Electric Cooperative breaks ground on power plant

DENVER CITY — Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc., headquartered in Amarillo, opened a new chapter in its proud history of service to customers in Texas and Oklahoma when it broke ground on April 2 for Mustang Station, a \$145 million electric generating plant near Denver City.

The first phase of the 486 megawatt plant will produce some 285 megawatts and is expected to be in service in the spring of 1999. The second-phase addition will begin production in January of 2000. Mustang Station will be fueled by natural gas and will eventually require about 20 employees.


"This state-of-the-art facility will member-consumers for years to come," said Robert W. Bryant, president of Golden Spread EC. "It truly is a power plant for the 21st century."

The primary customers for

Mustang Station will be the 100,000 member-consumers served by the 11 Golden Spread member cooperatives in the South Plains and panhandles of Texas and Oklahoma.

Golden Spread's subsidiary, GS Electric Generating Cooperative, will purchase a 50 percent interest in Mustang Station when the generating units are completed. Denver City Energy Associates is the plant developer and will own 50 percent upon completion. Denver City Energy Associates is an equal partnership formed by Quips Corporation of Amarillo, an affiliate of Southwestern Public Service Company and LS producer based in New Jersey.

At a time when electric utility restructuring is moving forward at the federal and state level, and, with the Texas Legislature expected to consider restructuring during the 1999 legislative session, Golden Spread is
