Death Claims Pioneer Hedley Resident

William Clyde Bridges, a Donley County resident since 1910, died early Wednesday morning, July 22, at his home near Hedley. He was 60 years old.

Mr. Bridges was born at Blooming Grove Nov. 25, 1892. On Oct. 4, 1914, he married Miss Mabel Rains. The couple had lived near Hedley since then.

He was a member of the Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge, in which he held a life certificate. He also belonged to the Hedley Lions Club.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Mabel Bridges; a daughter, Mrs. Monks Jeffreys, Amarillo; a son, Billy B. Bridges, Amarillo; two brothers, Carl Bridges, Fort Worth, and Homer Bridges, Caney, Kan.; a sister, Mrs. H. F. Curtis, Amarillo; and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m., Thursday, July 23, in the Hedley First Methodist Church. Rev. W. M. Culwell, minister, officiated, assisted by Rev. I. E. Biggs of Clarendon and Rev. O. L. Jones of Hedley. Burial was in Rowe Cemetery, Hedley, under the direction of Murphy-Spicer Funeral Home, Memphis.

Hedley Defeats Dusters, 9 to 5

Hedley moved into Duster Field Sunday afternoon with the determination of defeating the Dusters again to bring their standing back up in the Caprock League—and they did just that—by a tune of nine to five. It seemed to be an off day for the Dusters in practically every department with errors in fielding and a low batting average throughout the game.

The Dusters did fine through the fourth inning and were leading 4-0 and then Hedley broke loose and brought in five runs in the fifth to go ahead. They kept up their steam and drove in an additional four runs in the seventh to clinch their win. The Dusters rallied in the ninth to bring in one more run but Hedley put out the fire and came out victorious.

At the same time that Clarendon was taking a drubbing, Groom was receiving the same treatment by the hands of the Amarillo AFB although their scores were lower. The outcome was 3-1 in favor of the AAFB. This places the Dusters, Hedley and Groom back in a three-way tie. The outcome of the games previously played this year between these three teams show that the Dusters have defeated Groom twice, Groom has defeated Hedley twice and Hedley has defeated the Dusters twice. Quite a mix-up for the boys but this tangle will be ironed out when these same teams will probably be battling it out in the play-off series at the end of the season.

Free Chest X-ray Eliminates Doubt

It is important for everyone over 15 years of age to have their chest x-rayed at least once each year as the x-ray report will remove any doubt whether you might have TB or not. This x-ray service is free to the public and is being done by the State Tubercular Survey Service. They will have their mobil unit in Clarendon August 11th and 12th at the Estlack Machinery Co. building. The hours will be from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. both days. It is not necessary to undress for the x-ray and it takes only a few minutes of your time. The x-ray report is confidential and is mailed direct to you from Austin a short time after the x-ray is taken. Plan now to have your chest x-rayed while this mobil unit is in Clarendon. It will be in Hedley August 14th and 15th at the Lions Den.

FARM NEWS

from the County PMA Committee

PMA OFFICE GATHERING COTTON FARM FIGURES:

The work of gathering acreage and production figures on farms growing cotton in Donley County is underway, advises Mr. Ross Springer, chairman of the Donley County Production and Marketing Administration Committee. The records are needed, the chairman explains, in case cotton marketing quotas are proclaimed for the 1954 crop.

At this time Communities A, B, C & D and possibly others. We want to ask each and every farmer to be on the lookout for the crop reporters as they will be coming to your farm in the very near future and will be needing your help.

Chairman Springer points out that the survey will be completed by September 1, and the figures and information for each farm will be assembled so that if and when marketing quotas are proclaimed the acreage allotment for each farm can be determined. If marketing quotas are proclaimed the law requires that this be done not later than October 15 and that a referendum for cotton growers be held on or before December 15.

The information being obtained in the survey includes the 1953 cotton acreage, the acreage devoted to other crops specified by law to be used in determining the adjusted tilled acreage, the acreage devoted to corn and other crops used on the farm and the 1953 acreage that is tilled annually or in regular rotation.

Your cooperation with the reporters will certainly be appreciated.

Former Resident Dies At Wellington

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the First Methodist Church in Wellington for Walter L. Hagler with Rev. J. F. Michael officiating, assisted by G. B. Stanley, Minister of the Wellington Church of Christ.

Mr. Hagler, age 53, died in a Wellington hospital Wednesday evening of a heart ailment. He had been a resident of Wellington the past ten years and was a former long time resident of Clarendon. He was married June 11, 1933 at Lelia Lake to Miss Alma Smith. Mr. Hagler was a member of the First Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mary Esther of Wellington; and a brother, W. M. Hagler of Beaumont.

Burial was in Citizens Cemetery, Clarendon, with the Kelso Funeral Home of Wellington in charge of arrangements.

Thirty men representing Clarendon, Hedley, Wellington, Memphis, Quanah and Paducah, met Tuesday night, in Hedley and showed great interest and enthusiasm in the Upper Salt Fork Project. A project which has been kept alive by the efforts of a few men in Clarendon, who can foresee the benefits of such a project.

After the details of the preliminary report, by A. H. Woolverton, Consulting Engineer on the project, were explained, the men showed greater interest, many not realizing until that time that the project showed such promise and was as large a project as it has developed into. Spokesmen from all the cities represented expressed a desire for water that could be supplied by such a project. Buel Handley, City Manager of Wellington, stated that although most of the towns present had enough water to fulfill their immediate needs they did not have what could be considered an adequate supply and certainly not an abundant supply of water. None of the towns had enough water to support industrial growth or any great increase in population.

A project such as the Salt Fork project would mean a growth in wealth and population. The estimate has been made that the project would support a 500% population growth in the cities involved. The project would serve to balance our economy, conserve vast amounts of water and top soil that is otherwise lost to the Gulf of Mexico or irrigation projects between us and the Gulf.

our water and top soil that is either lost or enriching the soils in other areas. Then the dividends that would be realized from furnishing municipal water, irrigation water, and water that would support industrial growth should be considered seriously with a balanced economy in mind. Then a Dam capable of backing up 100,000 acre feet of water would be very worth while from the recreational standpoint serving the people in the area as well as attracting people from great distances giving the area an added income from tourists.

After considering the promise of the project as a factor in balancing the economy, serving to combat economic disasters that an Agricultural areas is subject to, the men present expressed the desire to keep the project alive and active. Andy Rogers, State Senator for this district, expressed his desire to support the project in every way possible and further stated that it showed more promise and was of as great if not greater importance to the State as well as the area, than any project of its kind that had come to his attention in some time.

Another meeting of those interested in the project will be held in the near future at Wellington and all interested in the project are urged to attend, for Mr. Woolverton, Consulting Engineer on the project, will be present to answer the many questions that might arise that only he could answer. The date of this meeting will be announced later.

Stop Taking Harsh Drugs for Constipation

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AUSTIN—While Governor Al-

lan Shivers was considering what the state could do to aid drought-beset farmers and ranchmen, he received a report saying that he can declare an emergency and get a \$5 million program going.

The report came from Attorney General John Ben Shepperd who, on the governor's request, had been digging into the legal as-

pects of the situation.

Action is authorized, said Shepperd, by the state civil protection act of 1951.

Much could be done without calling the Legislature into session, said the report, and there are other things that could be done only by legislative authority.

At least \$5 million could be raised, said the attorney general, by means of contributions from the cities, counties, and local government agencies, including water and other special districts; by using the balance in the governor's deficiency appropriation and by calling upon the public to put in \$500,000.

"It is our opinion," said the report, "that you are authorized to mobilize and utilize the manifold services, equipment, and facilities of extending state agencies and political subdivisions to as-

sist in a drought relief program."

The federal government is speeding up the job of getting money to Southwestern farmers and ranchers.

President Eisenhower asked Congress for \$15 million to finance a lending program. The Department of Agriculture already had \$16 million available for the purpose.

It was expected that local committees would be ready to pass on loans by the end of the month.

Application blanks were being sent to Farmers Home Administration offices and, in some instances where the demand for loans will be heavy, to banks and Production Credit Administration offices.

Meanwhile, the United Livestock Producers Association, with members in five states, decided to send two association officers to Washington to ask for direct federal price supports on cattle.

The representatives are S. E. (Eck) Brown, president of the association, and O. H. Finch Sr.,

a director, both of Dalhart.

Brown berated the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association for its "inability to work for the best interests of all livestock growers, big and little alike, to relieve price conditions."

The T&SCRA is opposed to direct federal price supports on cattle.

South Texas politics and the name of George Parr, sometimes called boss of a big part of that area, came up in a Supreme Court hearing on whether District Judge C. Woodrow Laughlin of Alice should be ousted from his position.

Eleven lawyers who practice in Judge Laughlin's 79th district charged, among other things, that the judge had ordered ballot boxes and election material delivered to the sheriff of Duval County, Parr's nephew.

Clint C. Small, representing Laughlin, told the court, "Apparently those who want Judge Laughlin removed were more interested in keeping George Parr from seeing the election returns than they were in prosecuting election irregularities."

It was the view of State Sen-

ator William H. Shireman, speaking for those who want to oust Judge Laughlin, that delivery of the election material to Parr was "in itself a corrupt proposition, making it possible for Parr to know how the voters voted."

The Supreme Court will study a case involving the entire procedure of the Texas Employment Commission in computing employers' taxes for unemployment compensation.

The court granted a writ of error to Todd Shipyards Corporation, which had sued for recovery on \$106,260 in unemployment taxes paid from 1948 to 1951. The rate, the corporation contended, was higher than it should have been.

Judge J. Harris Gardner in district court here ruled for the

company, but his decision was reversed by the Third Civil Appeals Court in an opinion by Associate Justice Robert G. Hughes, who said that if the Todd claim were upheld, charges and rates of every other firm in the Todd category would have to be recalculated and federal recognition of the state employment law might be withdrawn.

The law providing jail sentences on the first offense for driving while intoxicated is valid, Attorney General John Ben Shepperd ruled.

The law calls for a mandatory 10-day jail term, plus \$100 fine on conviction, but the judge has authority to put the offender on probation for six months.

Larger Demand For Long-term Loans

Mr. Rayburn L. Smith, Secretary-Treasurer of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association, has recently received a communication from Mr. Sterling C. Evans, President of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, concerning the drastic increase in demand for long-term farm mortgage loans in Texas.

Mr. Evans stated that a greater volume of loans has been closed during the first six and one-half months of 1953 than was closed in any single year for twenty-nine of the Bank's thirty-six year history. He believes one of the controlling reasons for this increase is the desire of farmers and ranchers to consolidate their short-term debts on a long-term basis. He also felt that the fact loans are still being closed at a 4% interest rate, regardless of the rather sharp increase in the cost of money, is having some effect.

The Bank now holds about 25% of all of the farm mortgage debt in the State. Mr. Evans further stated that the Land Bank is now closing about 35% of the total number of loans being made in Texas.

The Donley County National Farm Loan Association is one of the 141 associations located throughout the State of Texas that are sole owners of the Federal Land Bank. These associations in turn are owned by local farmers and ranchers.

Messrs. J. R. Gillham, W. H. Moss, F. J. Hommel, C. B. Morris, and C. L. Harris are directors of the local association.

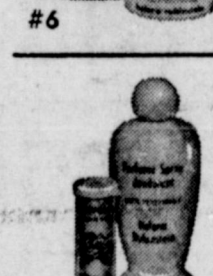

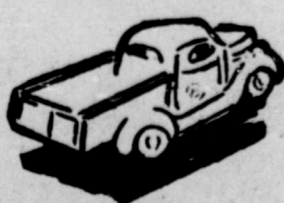

Highway Road Condition Bulletin Will Be Issued Every Two Weeks

Every two weeks a highway road condition bulleting will be issued as a special service to the motoring public, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced today in Austin.

"We are spending a large amount of money for maintenance and reconstruction this year and feel that motorists should be provided with information on the location of these projects for driving convenience, economy, and safety," he said. Greer explained that these road conditions will be reflected on a small map showing the principal highways with symbols indicating the location and type of construction that would be encountered on various routes. These road condition bulletins, he continued, will assist motorists in steering clear of construction work and as a result, keep traffic at a minimum through construction areas. This will enable highway maintenance workers to complete a job in a minimum time with a maximum of safety.

Greer concluded that these road condition bulletins are available free in the Highway District Offices and Travel Information Bureaus, or they can be obtained direct by writing the Traffic Services Division of the Highway Department in Austin.
