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Wreck injures six Clarendon College basketball players

Six members of the Clarendon College Bulldog basketball team were injured in a one-vehicle rollover last Thursday, November 6.

The team was traveling to a tournament Garden City, Kansas, when one of the two vans they were traveling in left the pavement 18 miles north of Clarendon on Texas Hwy. 70 at the intersection with Interstate 40.

The passengers received numerous cuts and bruises, and one freshman player received a serious foot injury.

By Monday afternoon, all of the injured players had been released and were reported to be doing fine.

Injured were: Kendrick Monson of Memphis, Daniel Owiti of Nairobi, Kenya, Ryan Ross of El Paso; Antonio Williams of Tulsa; and Paschal Ike of El Paso. The sixth student was unidentified.

The team was traveling north on Hwy. 70 when the driver lost control of the van.

The vehicle was apparently going too fast when it hit the curve on the north side of the overpass at I-40.

The van rolled more than three times, taking out three directional chevron signs in the process. Glass and debris littered the scene of the accident.

Another van, driven by Coach Joe Mondragon, was leading the second van, driven by a student, and was not involved with the accident.

"Clarendon College is a close-knit school to begin with," said CC Public Information Coordinator Christi Ross, "and a moment like this only draws everyone closer."

Ross also said there has been a lot of concern for the students and offers of help coming from the community.

"We've had a lot of support from the community, alumni, and friends of the college," she said.

"You know that we truly live in a great community and that the students go to school in a wonderful place when people care that much."

The accident forced the Bulldogs' withdrawal from the Garden City Classic, and a Lady Bulldog game to be played at home the day of the accident was canceled also.

Both teams will be back in competition this weekend for the Coca-Cola Bulldog Classic tournament, Friday and Saturday, November 14 and 15. Games start at 6 p.m. and 8 p.m.

The CC men and women will also be playing at home next Thursday, November 20, in a match-up with Redlands College.

Broncos close-out football season with loss to White Deer

Clarendon finished up its season with a 27-6 loss to the play-off-bound White Deer Bucks Friday in White Deer.

The Broncos concluded the season with a 3-7 record and 0-5 in District 2-2A.

White Deer relied on the muscle of their workhorse Craig Urbanczyk, who rushed for 260 yards on 27 carries and two touchdowns. He also kicked three PATs.

The Bucks built up a 27-0 cushion before Kareem Abdullah caught a 21-yard TD pass from Scotty Elliott.

"In the fourth quarter, (Abdullah) ran a good fade route and took it away from the defender," head coach Tooter Draper said.

"(White Deer's) running game was real good. They had trouble

throwing the ball, and we felt like they would work on their passing game (for the play-offs)."

Draper cited junior quarterback Elliott (12-25-0) for great play despite intense pressure from White Deer's defensive ends. Abdullah, who pulled in eight passes for 69 yards also played well, Draper said.

"Brent Gaines had a good game defensively - he had a couple of great hits and also an interception.

"Cael Shields ran the ball real well, but we just couldn't get untracked with the running game. (White Deer) was real strong in the line. They were a little stronger than we were."

Elliott led the Panhandle in passing in Class 2A and Abdullah was the receiving leader. Gaines was in the

middle of the pack in the area in the receiving corps.

"Looking at the whole season, we improved every game," Draper said. "Being so young, the experience ought to carry over into the next year."

Although Clarendon lost more games than it won, many of the losses were by a few points, Draper said. "The only blow-out was Spearman, and we played really well the first half. That shows a lot of character.

"I can't say enough about the seniors. We had 10 and some had never played before or hadn't played in awhile. We just appreciate them and the leadership they gave. They're always welcome back any time.

"I also want to commend the coaching staff on the job that they did."

Thornberry votes for IRS overhaul, plans for to hold town meeting in Amarillo

WASHINGTON, DC — US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted November 5, for a bill which will curb the power of the Internal Revenue Service and give taxpayers more rights when dealing with the agency. The legislation passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 426-4.

"Since I took office in 1995," Thornberry stated, "it seems that not a week has gone by without someone contacting me with a complaint or concern about the IRS. Many of these concerns have to do with the service - or lack of - which the IRS provides American taxpayers. But I've also heard a lot of concerns about the inordinate amount of power the IRS wields, the agency's ability to turn a person's life upside down.

"The bill we voted on Wednesday is meant to address some of these concerns and help make sure the IRS is there to serve us, instead of the other way around."

The legislation is HR 2292, also known as the IRS Restructuring and Reform Act. The first comprehensive reform of the Internal Revenue Service since 1952, the bill is based on the recommendations of a bipartisan

commission and built upon three basic principles:

- American Taxpayers shouldn't be treated worse than common criminals. Under civil tax law, a taxpayer is liable until he or she can prove the IRS is wrong. HR 2292 reverses this by shifting the burden of proof to the IRS. In other words, the taxpayer is innocent until proven guilty - an integral feature of our criminal justice system, but a feature lacking from our current tax system.

- The basic rights of American taxpayers need to be strengthened. This bill establishes 28 new rights for taxpayers, including letting people recover attorney's fees if the IRS audits them and is wrong and making it easier for taxpayers to recover legal fees and costs incurred in disputes with the IRS.

- The IRS needs to focus on providing better service. HR 2292 prohibits IRS employees from being evaluated solely on their enforcement results. It also shifts control of the IRS from the Treasury Department to an independent oversight board comprised of private citizens.

In addition to voting Wednesday for the IRS reform bill, Thornberry also announced plans to hold a special "Tax Reform Town Meeting" in Amarillo on Saturday, November 15. The purpose of this town meeting will be to give people in the area an opportunity to discuss the issue of tax reform and the various plans being discussed. Just as important, he added, it will give him an opportunity to listen to what people have to say.

"If we're going to have a debate about scrapping the tax code and replacing it with something else," Thornberry said, "then I think it's critical that we hear for the ones who will be affected most - the American people themselves. I'm holding this town meeting to listen to what people have to say about the issue of tax reform, and to learn more about what they'd like to see done."

The "Tax Reform Town Meeting" will begin at 10:00 a.m. on Nov. 15, and be held in the Commissioner's Chambers at City Hall, located at 509 East 7th Avenue in Amarillo.

Trees available from the SCS

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District is once again offering trees and shrubs for sale. This program is offered as a service to residents of Donley County, and anyone may purchase these trees.

The purpose of this program is to offer high quality, low cost trees for use in establishing windbreaks, wildlife plantings, and for home landscaping. There is a wide variety of trees available including deciduous trees and shrubs, evergreens, and fruit trees. Most of the trees are available in three sizes: seedlings, one-gallon potted, and five-gallon potted.

Large potted trees are available in one-gallon and five-gallon container sizes. These are sold individually and will cost \$5.00 per tree for

the one-gallon size and \$14.00-15.00 per tree for the five-gallon size.

Seedling trees come as bareroot deciduous trees and shrubs or evergreen trees in small tarpaper pots. The bareroot trees and shrubs cost 70 cents per tree and are sold only in bundles of 25 or 50.

The potted evergreen seedlings cost \$1.60 per tree and are sold in quantities of 20 or 30.

Reform Bill Will Strengthen Taxpayer Rights, Shift Burden of Proof to IRS

This week, the House will vote on a reform bill that could prove to be the first step toward ending the Internal Revenue Service as we know it. Based on the recommendations of a bipartisan commission, the plan will help level the playing field by strengthening taxpayers' rights when dealing with the IRS.

Among other things, the bill would shift the burden of proof in IRS cases from taxpayers to the IRS. That means that if the IRS believes you didn't pay all the taxes you owe, it's up to them to prove it - rather than you having to prove that the amount you paid was correct. The bill would also give people the right to recover up to \$100,000 for negligent IRS actions.

In addition, the bill tries to change the focus of the agency from enforcement to service. Over 80 percent of the revenue owed to the federal government is paid voluntarily, while just under four percent is paid after the IRS becomes involved. The IRS needs to focus more on providing right answers and better service to these 80 percent who pay their taxes on time. This bill will help do that.

Finally, the bill shifts control of the agency from the Treasury Department to an independent oversight board that's comprised of private citizens - not bureaucrats.

Will this legislation solve all of our problems? No. But it is a step toward making the IRS more accountable to the American people. Even more important, it takes us one step closer toward reforming the tax code itself - which is the root of the problem, and the next major issue Congress needs to address.

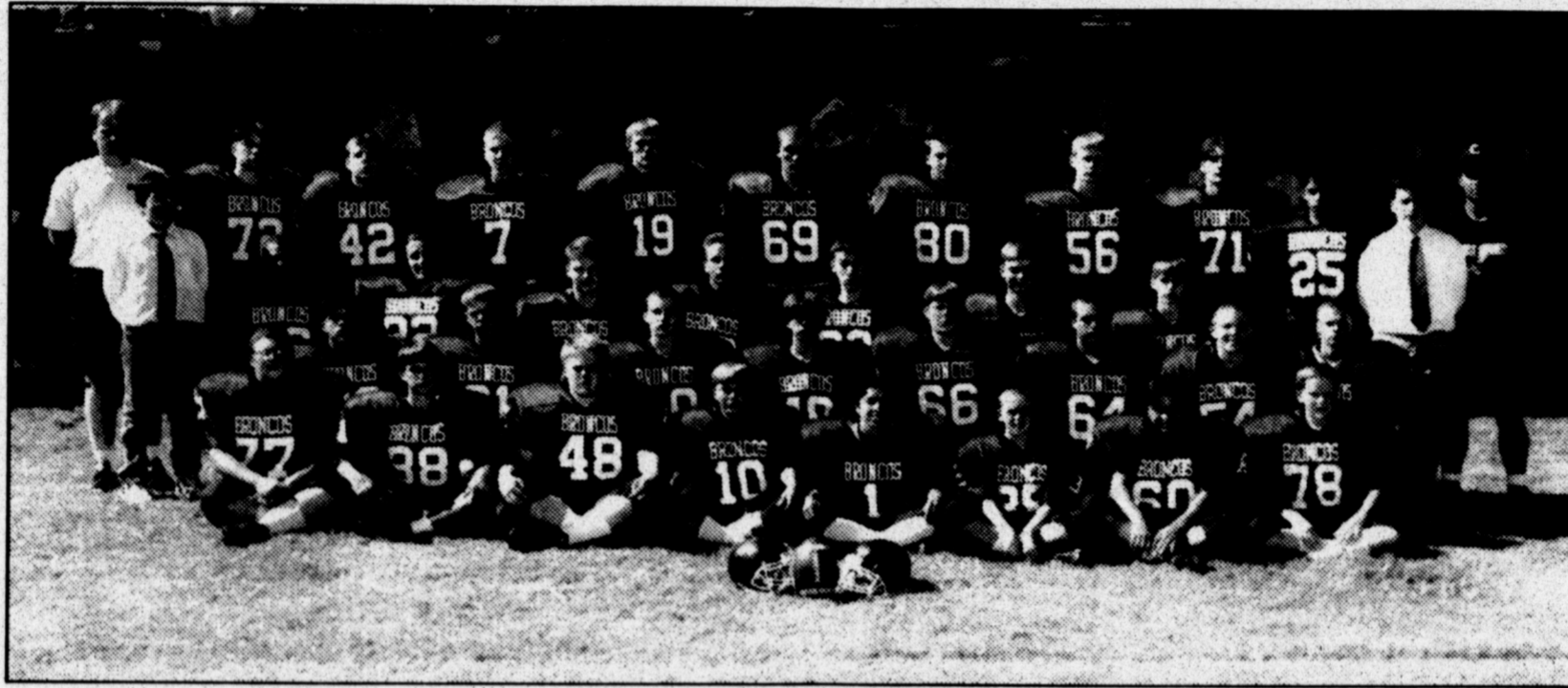

Sharp: Texans' votes mean preservation of Texas Tomorrow Fund for future

AUSTIN — "When Texas voters overwhelmingly approved Proposition 13 on Election Day, they sent a loud message to future legislatures — keep your hands off the Texas Tomorrow Fund," state comptroller John Sharp said recently.

"Over the next few years, the fund will reach a billion dollars in assets, making it a tempting plum for cash-strapped legislators looking for a quick financial fix," Sharp said. "But,

with constitutional protection now assured, the money in the fund will always be protected. It will be ready to pay for tuition and required fees when your child or grandchild is ready for college."

Currently, the fund has \$230 million in assets, with 65,000 contracts worth \$625 million sold during the first two enrollment periods.

"The Texas Tomorrow Fund will now have the same footing as the

state's other constitutionally protected funds, including the Veterans' Land Program, the Employees Retirement System, and the Teacher Retirement System," Sharp said.

The fund's current enrollment period runs through April 1, 1998.

Extension Service sets Cow-Calf Nutrition Workshops

Area cow-calf producers and ranchers are encouraged to participate in a four-part series of workshops focused on cow-calf nutrition issues.

All workshops will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Ranch and Feedlot Building on the campus of Clarendon College.

Texas Agricultural Agent, Leon Church, and Dr. F.P. Ted McCollum, area beef cattle specialist, will conduct the workshops.

Program topics include nutrient requirements of beef cows, selecting supplements (including forage quality), mineral nutrition, and health issues. Producers will be offered training in the use of proven decision-

aids such as forage testing and fecal sampling. Additional presentations will provide demonstrations on several computer software programs currently available to the cow-calf producer. Body condition scoring techniques will also be demonstrated.

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JV Broncs finish near perfect season

Caprock's freshman team was the spoiler in the Clarendon Bronco Junior Varsity's nearly perfect season.

The J.V. Broncos finished the year 9-1, losing 24-14 to the Caprock freshmen, Nov. 5, in Bronco Stadium.

"We didn't really have as good a game as we've had in the past," offensive coordinator Wade Wilson said. "We weren't real sharp. We couldn't run the ball against them real effectively. Their defensive line was real big and strong."

The Class 4A school scored first, but Clarendon retaliated with two scores. Josh Williams scored a TD on a long pass from quarterback Colt Floyd, and Shannon Martin rambled for a TD run.

Floyd scored the two-point conversion as Clarendon led 14-12.

But it was all Caprock after that. "It was one

of those deals where they had a real good receiver and a good quarterback, and they got the breaks," Wilson said.

"We went on fourth down and one, and they stopped us at the end of the game on the 50-yard line. And we stopped them again. We punted and tried to throw a pass, and they intercepted it. Three plays later they hit the bomb on us.

"We came out and turned the ball over again. By the time we got it back again, there wasn't time to get it back again."

But the J.V. Broncos shouldn't be remembered for their one loss during the 10-week campaign, Wilson said.

"It was a great season. It beat every expectation when we started the year out, and when we had to move up Dee (Thompson) and Sam (Holton) and G.J. (Martindale) broke his leg - and those are three

quality athletes in that class - we had other kids who could step up."

The loss could help the Broncos in their off-season training, Wilson said.

"It's going to be a good jumping-off point when we're lifting weights, and off-season and we're getting ready for next season. We have to remember the Caprock game as far as work ethic. We came up short, but of course Caprock was a 4A school and had some quality athletes.

"I had a great time and I think the kids did too. It was real enjoyable. It's always fun to win that many games, and I'm looking forward to those kids coming up and playing varsity one of these days."

Clarendon's junior high teams combined forces against the White Deer seventh and eighth grades. They lost 22-0.

Broncos to open basketball season with scrimmage Nov. 13

The Clarendon Bronco boys basketball team will scrimmage Claude and Vega Thursday, Nov. 13, in the Clarendon gym in preparation for their Tuesday opener with West Texas High in Stinnett.

The Junior Varsity "A" and "B" teams will scrimmage for 20 minutes continuously beginning at 4 p.m. in the Colt Gym.

Clarendon's varsity will tip-off at 5 p.m. with 20-minute games in the new gymnasium.

The Broncos open up their season with an 8 p.m. tip-off with West Texas.

"This is the first time we've played West Texas (early in the season) since I've been here," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "We've had them scheduled every year but they've

been in the football play-offs."

The last time the two teams met was in the bi-district round in 1995, when Clarendon advanced to the area round before bowing to eventual state finalist Springlake-Earth. "Maybe (West Texas) will remember that and really step it up against us," Avery said. "I know they'll be competitive. They have a lot of tradition."

Expect seniors Kareem Abdullah and Brent Gaines to lead the Broncos, along with 1997 Newcomer of the Year Scotty Elliott.

"We have three starters back and a bench loaded with guys with plenty of strength and experience," Avery said. "We lack size, so we'll have to depend on our speed."

"Our times were OK, but to compete with the best you have to come up with the best race - not just average," Schmidt said. "I know our

youthfulness (4 freshman and 1 sophomore - first time to run there) had something to do with it.

"I just hope the girls who will be with us next year will come out and be determined to improve upon their showing and not be so scared in '98."

The Lady Broncos ended their cross country season not quite as successfully as they wanted but had a good year overall, Schmidt said. "We had overwhelming competition and some sickness. Some nervousness led to unfulfilled goals.

"We had a lot of bright moments this year. And we are very excited about our potential for next year. (Smith) and (Bryley) have been good, strong leaders for us - we'll miss them. I'm very appreciative of the commitment they've shown.

"I appreciate all the parents for their support they've given and the administration for their backing, and Assistant Coach Katie Vanzee for everything - especially running with the "Big Dogs" during my injury-plagued season."

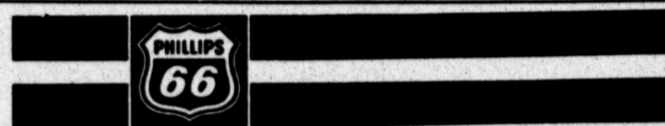

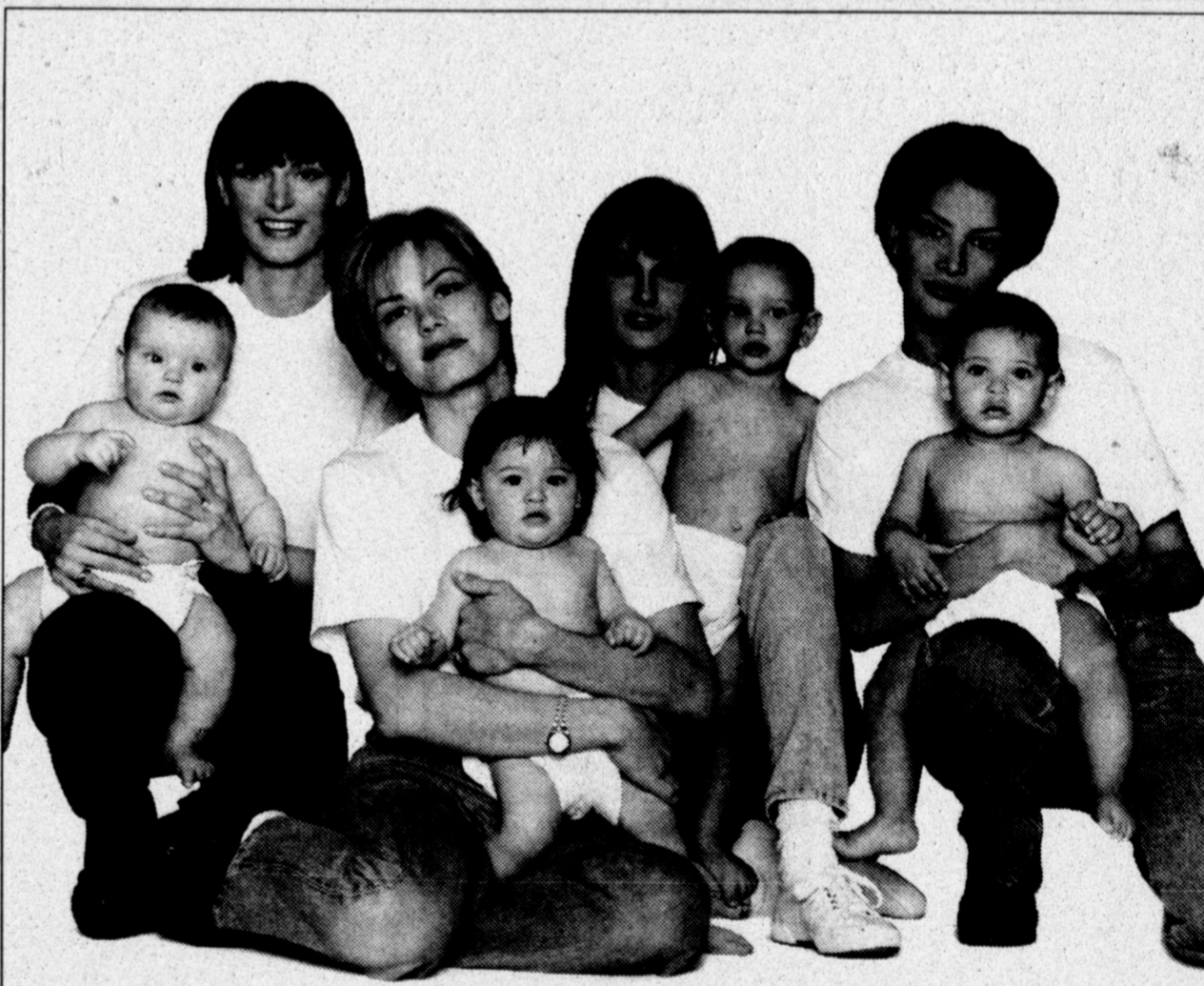

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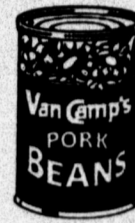
