The tax is now 11/2 % each for employer and employee, and 21/4% for self-employed people. Under the law, rates are scheduled to increase to 2% each for employee and employer, and 3% for self-employed people, on January 1, 1954.

The Executive Secretary suggested that persons might well make a few exploratory runs with their new equipment before risking the lives of others going along as passengers. He counseled that persons unable to swim should always be equipped with life preservers.

Many boats, according to the Executive Secretary, are considered unsinkable but when burdened with heavy motors might not remain bouyant especially with boat occupants clinging to them. The recent near tragedy involving two fishermen was attributed in part to the fact that the motor was too big for the boat, both as to power and as to bouyancy when the craft upset.

He said most boating tragedies usually develop from some form of carelessness such as faulty maneuvering or overloading or from persons standing in the craft.




