# U.S. HWY. 287 PROJECT UPDATE



"Expect to see the rehabilitation project of US 287 through Clarendon to begin as early as the middle part of the next week," said Danny Brown Area Engineer with the Texas Department of Transportation in Childress.

According to Brown, contractor Darrin Riley said they should start erecting signs this week and begin construction activity next week.

"Right now we are trying to finish the project east of town by Saturday and hopefully no later than Monday," Riley said. "Then we can concentrate our efforts on the project through Clarendon."

American Land Sovereignty Act will Strengthen Private Property Rights

If you look at some of the things that have made America the great country it is today, one of the key factors has got to be the protection of private property rights. From the Declaration of Independence on, protecting the rights of citizens to own and use property has helped make us the greatest country in world history

This is especially true in our area. We've got a great heritage of people earning their living off the land. And yet- little by little -these rights are being eroded away. For example, a growing amount of public lands in America have been included in international land use programs without the approval of Congress - or the American people.

These programs include two operated by an arm of the United Nations called UNESCO. The programs are called the Biospheric Reserve and World Heritage Sites There are currently 47 UNESCO Biospheric Reserves and 20 World Heritage sites in the United States. accounting for more than 68 percent of the land in our national parks. preserves and monuments. These sites weren't designated by Congress, and they weren't designated with input from the states and local communities who are affected. Instead, they were designated by the U.N.

The American Land Sovereignty Act would put an end to that. It's a bill I'm cosponsoring, and one for which I plan to vote. The reason is simple. We can't allow the United Nations or any other foreign entity to have a say in how we conduct our public lands policy.

It's a threat to our Constitution, a threat to private property owners, and a threat to one of the things that has made our country great.

"Mr. Buckley has tied my hands, but maybe rightly so"

Back in the dark ages, colleges operated a lot differently than today. less responsible for the care of the young people entrusted in their care by well-meaning parents.

The principle was known as en loco parentis, which I believe in Latin means "in place of the parent." Over the generations that philosophy changed. Young folks going off to college for the first time were no longer considered one step removed from high school, still in need of a lot of guidance and TLC. Rather, they were regarded under the law as responsible adults, ready to sink or swim on their own merits.

This new school of thought peaked, if you will, along about 1974 with the passage of what has become known as the Buckley Amendment or, more formally, the Family Education Rights & Privacy Act Public Law 93-579). To me, the Buckley Amendment is a double-edged sword. There are times when I consider it the worst legislation ever to come down the pike, that is, Pennsylvania Avenue. There are other times when logic dictates and demands respect for the

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
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



The prolonged drought over this section of the country was dented Wednesday morning when the first measurable showers fell since the latter part of July, and then it wasn't much to crow about over most of the county.

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




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
