Several plants (pictured), drug paraphernalia, and hot house equipment were seized in the raid.



Relax. Several experts at Southwestern University have pooled their pearls of wisdom about how parents can survive their teenager's first year away from home, what they can do to help, and when they need to take a

Dr. Dale Knobel, provost and dean of the faculty; Sherri Babcock, vice president and dean of students; Dr. Lee Edwards, director of counseling services; Dr. Nick Sikes, professor and chair of the Education Department; and Betsy Barnhart, associate dean for academic services, offer some down-to-earth advice to parents of first year college students:

- Realize that things have changed enormously since you were seventeen. You may like it, you may hate it, but it's true. 2. If you did your job as a parent, your teen-
- ager was ready to leave. 3. Allow your student to experience making decisions on his or her own. Freedom is one thing - being able to set limits has

- own checking account. It provides a sense of money management.
- Regarding finances, provide your student with what is needed and a little more without allowing irresponsibility. Make surprises treats rather than bail-outs.
- a friend or surprise your student with something he or she wants or needs that isn't part of the support you promised. Most importantly, send mail.
- The hardest thing for parents to do is to let go. Don't meddle. Be willing to leave your student alone.
- Don't insist on a career choice that fits your values and interests.
- 9. For a student trying to settle upon the choice of a course of study, the best advice is and always has been, "Do what you enjoy the most." Students pursuing areas of real interest always do their best, and doing well always opens the most doors in the long run
- Don't be shocked when your son or daughter questions values that you cherish. It's a natural part of developing his or her own values
- Parents need to find ways to take care of 20. themselves. It is vital to the health of a son or daughter that parents don't continue to make the student the center of
- Ask your daughter or son about something other than grades. Encourage a balanced lifestyle, paying

- Encourage your child to stay on campus until Thanksgiving. This will give him or her time to develop relationships, plan weekend activities, create a new community. Well, maybe Thanksgiving is a little too far off. At least don't let your child come the first weekend. Or the
- Expect to see some changes in your daughter or son. College is and should be a time of growth, exploration, and questioning for a young person. It is part of growing up into an educated and selfconfident adult
- There is no way to prepare yourself for the mood swings you'll feel as a parent, except to recognize that you'll have
- Don't foster guilt for how much you are spending on education
- Don't change your student's room into a sewing room until at least the sophomore or junior year. Make sure there is a place to come home that is familiar.
- You've raised a child who can go out into the world and make new friends, new mistakes, and new discoveries. The most positive thing parents can do is convey to their students that they trust them, love them, they are there for them, they believe in their education, and they are proud of them.

High school and college students might want to take advantage of the Social Issues Resource Series (SIRS) when discussing important social issues confronting citizens today. SIRS include 26 gray and two red looseleaf binders dealing with the following issues: alcohol, crime, drugs, family, mental health, pollution, sexuality, youth, and Third World. The two red binders are entitled AIDS in Crisis. Included in the SIRS collection is a study guide. Each indexed article makes it convenient to locate a certain aspect of each

Seven volumes of Chilton's Auto Repair Manuals, approximately 1,500 pages each, give multiple information on mechanical system of automobile from American Motors, Chrysler Corporation, Ford Motor Company, and General Motors. These manuals cover the years 1964-1971 and 1980-1992

Handguns of the World by Edward C. Ezell contains research of the years 1870-1945. It begins with military weapons from which many handguns have evolved. Over 1,000 photos and drawings accompany the written information on 692 pages.

A beautiful reference describing masterpieces and curiosities with 1,050 illustrations 608 of which are in color, is Artist's Handbook of Materials and Technique. Information concerning oils, tempera, mural painting, pigments, water color, mediums, sculpture, and synthetic materials is interestingly expressed by author Ralph Mayer to sharpen artist's skills.

International Encyclopedia of Music and Musicians, edited by Oscar Thompson, includes a list of over one hundred names of those who have contributed vast musical knowledge to readers

College students, when you check references at our county library, ask Librarian Mary Green to show you the 1915 Wester, Clarendon College's annual in the rare article case. It might be interesting to compare your 1997 organizations with 1915 clubs. Also, there are jokes of the day and a review of three prominent college sports, baseball, tennis, and football. You'll enjoy a humorous report concerning a big football rivalry during a certain 1914 game

Additional reference material will be discussed in my next article. In the meantime, why not check it out?

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog to permit or allow such dog to run or be at large on any property of the Authority. ARTICLE 2 DEFINITIONS


