Broncos, Lady Broncos win District 2-2A

Clarendon rolls over Memphis, 57-50

Clarendon seized its first District 2-2A championship in three years with emotional wins against Wellington and Memphis in the last week of district action.

The Broncos defeated Wellington, 64-62, in overtime Feb. 4 in the Bronco Gym and then downed Memphis, 57-50, Feb. 7 in the Cyclone Gym to end with a 9-1 loop record.

Clarendon advances to a bi-district tilt with District 1-2A runner-up Spearman Feb. 20 in the Pampa Harvester Gym. The time is tentatively scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

"They are big, very methodical, and very deliberate (in their play)," head coach Jimmy Avery said of Spearman. "We need a faster-paced game. We don't need to try and slow down against them. Their size will hurt us."

"To neutralize their size, we're going to have to turn this thing into a track meet."

The Broncos will warm up for the play-offs with a 6 p.m. tip-off Thursday, Feb. 13 at Clarendon College with Trinity Fellowship. Their second warm-up game will be 1 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 15 in White Deer against the Class 1A Gruver Greyhounds. Gruver, formerly a Class 2A team, eliminated Clarendon in overtime in the 1996 bi-district round.

Claude travels to Clarendon College Monday, Feb. 17 for a 4 p.m. warm-up game with the Broncos.

"Fans are really an important part of our game, even for the warm-up games," Avery said. "These boys have worked awfully hard all year, and they need the momentum from these (practice) games to carry us throughout the play-offs."

Clarendon trailed 17-15 and went ahead at half, 30-25, against Memphis Friday in the Cyclone gym. Brent Gaines canned 14 points while Dean Stanzione put in nine points in the opening

The Broncos outscored Memphis, 17-16, in the third quarter for a 47-41 lead. Scott Bivens, who played tenacious defense, stole the ball and went coast to coast against two defenders for a basket bringing the crowd to its feet and the momentum the Bron-

Kareem Abdullah knocked in a trey, a field goal, and a free throw while Scotty Elliott hit all net from behind the arc and was 2-for-2 from the charity stripe.

It was all Elliott in the fourth quarter, who knocked in a basket and was 4-for-4 from the free throw line. Elliott also grabbed a career-high 10 boards in the contest.

"Memphis is a very talented team and gave us their best shot," Avery said. "(Elliott) had a great game, probably his best game

Lady Broncs to take on Spearman Friday

Clarendon's Lady Broncos finished the District 2-2A race with a perfect 10-0 record with wins last week over Wellington and Memphis in preparation for their bi-district match-up Friday with Spearman.

The game is expected to tip off at 6:30 p.m. at Borger High School. Their highly anticipated match-up could be the first half of a doubleheader depending on the outcome of the Wellington-Panhandle Feb. 11 play-off game.

Results of the game were not available at press time.

Spearman suits up a deep line-up with two players who top six foot, head coach Steve Schmidt said.

"They play a lot of players, and they've got good depth with a lot of juniors and seniors. It's a mature ball club. They're really patient on offense. They try to go inside as much as possible and have good shot selection.'

Schmidt plans on using a transition running game because Spearman is used to playing a slow-paced game.

"We want to keep playing the way we have been playing. We might push the tempo up. Because they have such maturity, we won't be able to rattle them; we'll just stick with what we've been doing."

If Clarendon prevails in their Friday tilt, they will face the winner of the Hale Center-New Deal bi-district contest.

The last time the Lady Broncos won a bi-district game was during the 1961-62 campaign, according to yearbook records.

"The crowd has really been strong the last few games. We need them to keep encouraging us," Schmidt said.

Clarendon's game with Wellington was nip-and-tuck with the Lady Skyrockets holding onto a 10-7 first quarter lead, but Clarendon pulled even, 22-22, behind Kasi Ashcraft's 10 points in the second quarter.

Wellington led 39-38 after three quarters, but Clarendon outscored the Lady Skyrockets, 20-15, for the 58-54 win. Melisse Campbell put in six points while Korey Knorpp and Eads hit five in the final period.

"Lindsey (Eads) hit a three that got us going," Schmidt said. "I think Wellington played with a little more intensity than we did. It was more important for them (to win) than for us, and we played that way until the fourth quarter. We didn't quite have at spark that they did."






In other city business, the Aldermen unanimously decided to put two computers up for bid.

Breast Cancer Screening Clinic set in Clarendon

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Clarendon on February 25, 1997.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram, and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a lowcost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in selfexamination by a registered nurse. The total cost is \$70. A minimum of fifteen women needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only. 

Memorial services for B.J. Hamilton, age 17, were held at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, February 10, 1997, in the First United Methodist Church in Clarendon with Dr. James Bell. Pastor, and Rev. Terry Tamplen, Pastor of the Kingswood United Methodist Church in Amarillo, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors, Inc.

B.J. died at 2:33 p.m. on Friday, February 7, 1997, in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo from injuries sustained in a sledding accident. He was born April 1, 1979, in Memphis, Texas, and had lived in Clarendon all of his life. He was a Senior at Clarendon High School where he had participated in football, band, basketball, track, and FFA where he was on the judging team. He was a former Boy Scout and had planned on attending Wyoming Technical Institute after graduation this year.

Cotton researchers team up for answers

COLLEGE STATION - A unique link between industry and researchers from various public entities is yielding significant progress for cotton crop improvement just one year since it began.

The project is TxCOT, a \$1-million effort funded by the Texas legislature to use biotechnology to find ways to enhance the competitiveness of Texas cotton around the world.

Cotton is the leading cash crop in Texas, generating nearly \$1.6 billion for its producers in 1995. Already, virtually every agency involved with TxCOT has reported significant findings and successes including the transfer of genes for herbicide and insect resistance into Texas cotton varieties with field testing, progress in the transfer of a fiber strength gene from Sea Island cotton to Texas cotton, identification and transfer of a gene into cotton that may reduce gossypol in cot-
