## Lady Bulldogs defeat Frank Phillips, 74-69

The Clarendon College ladies team pulled off a huge 74-69 win Nov. 18 against Frank Phillips Junior College in front of a raucous home crowd.

Clarendon led, 31-28, 17 seconds before half behind Brandy Thomas' 10 points, but the Lady Bulldogs made a few mistakes, and Frank Phillips entered the locker room tied, 31-31.

Thomas shot two treys and two field goals in the first half.

Clarendon's defense stepped it up in the second half as Charmaine Alfred lit up the scoreboard going 4-for-6 in the second half.

"Our defense really took control," head coach Joel Zehr said. "We were running a trapping defense, and they just started turning the ball over. We were scoring on lay-ups and working the ball and taking good shots."

Alfred had nine rebounds and Andrea Watson pulled down 7 boards in the contest.

Scoring for the Lady Bulldogs were Alfred, 22; Watson, 17; Thomas, 14; Maxie Flores, 8; Becky Soto, 6; Angie Kepley, 3; Jodi Card, 2; and Trish Castillo, 2.

Monday's contest with Ranger Junior College was cancelled and this weekend's Thanksgiving Classic in the Clarendon College Gym is set for Friday at 7 p.m. and Saturday at 2 p.m. against Hardin Simmons.

## CYFL announces \$5,000 winner

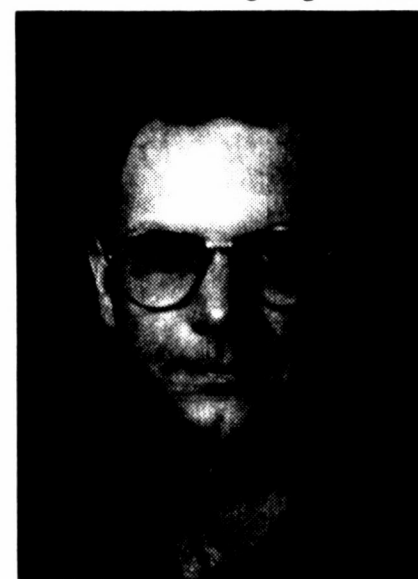

## JV Lady Broncos improve record to 4-0

The junior varsity Lady Broncos improved their record to 4-0 after wins last week against Tulia and Amarillo River Road.

Clarendon travels to Canyon Dec. 3 for a 5 p.m. tip-off.

Four Lady Broncos scored in the opening quarter Nov. 19 against River Road leading 8-5 heading into the second quarter.

Tonya Wilson put in two baskets, and Lindsay Green connected on a field goal in the second quarter. Jill Hicks hit a trey, and America Santos was 2-for-2 from the charity stripe as Clarendon led 19-16 at intermission.

Clarendon outscored River Road 10-6 in the third quarter as Santos hit a three-pointer, and Niki Carter was 3-for-4 from the free throw line.

Six Lady Broncos scored in the

fourth quarter as Clarendon overpowered River Road, 13-11, in the final period for a 42-33 final.

Scoring for the Lady Broncos were Carter, 10; Wilson, 7; Cat Chamberlain, 6; Santos, 6; Hicks, 5; Stephanie Smith, 4; Lindy Helms, 2; and Green, 2.

Clarendon got off to a sluggish start in their Friday contest with Class 3A Tulia but still led 6-4.

Carter hit two field goals in the second quarter to lead Clarendon to a 14-point scoring spurt and holding Tulia to 12 points for a 20-16 halftime advantage.

The Lady Hornets outscored Clarendon in the third quarter, 4-3, as Smith put in a field goal and Tracy Hankins hit one from the charity stripe.

Clarendon's defense held Tulia to

three points in the final period as the Lady Broncos went on a seven-point scoring spree for a 30-23 win.

Scoring for the Lady Broncos were Carter, 10; Chamberlain, 5; Santos, 5; Smith, 4; Paula Jackson, 2; Wilson, 2; Hankins, 1; and Green, 1.

## Junior Varsity Broncos

Clarendon's junior varsity boys lost a nailbiter, 44-42, in the final seconds against Class 3A Amarillo River Road Nov. 19 and were overpowered, 43-29, Friday by a tough Tulia squad.

## Henson Family Celebrates 50 Years of Serving Clarendon

For 50 years, A.R. "Redell" Henson has believed that his purpose in life has been to serve his friends in Donley County through Henson's - the family's hardware, tire and fine gifts store.

When he was a young teenager living north of Ashtola, a cyclone picked up the living quarters that Henson and his brother were living in and carried it several hundred yards before the building exploded, dumping the two brothers into vacant farmland.

They both escaped with minor cuts; but since that day, Henson has searched for a reason his life was spared.

"I was spared for a special purpose; and ever since then, I asked what it was," Henson said. "I finally figured out that it was to serve the people - my friends in the community. I took an obligation 50 years ago to use the strength and wisdom to do that."

"I feel that's what keeps me going."

Henson's official grand opening was Dec. 13, 1946 - after Henson returned from combat in the Pacific as a radio operator in the U.S. Air Force.

Frankie Henson's father (Frank Hommel) was operating a service station, and Goodyear Tire Co. asked him to open a Goodyear dealership. Mr. Hommel declined but suggested his son-in-law and daughter, who started dating in high school, would do a good job.

They began business in the old Rattan TV Building (south of the present location of the *Enterprise*) with gifts, tires, and appliances. Thick, black tires were scattered among the fine china for several months until the display cases were shipped in, the pair remembered with a laugh.

Apparently, Henson's found a niche in the market that had been missing, Frankie Henson said. Eventually, they added a fine jewelry department, and their son Wes, and daughter-in-law Susan, the perfectionist in the family, attended school to learn jewelry repair.

"We just didn't like how the jewelry turned out when we sent it off," Frankie Henson said. "We weren't satisfied, so we decided we'd do it ourselves."

And Frankie Henson adds that it is easy to purchase merchandise for the store.

"I buy what I like," she said. "If people can find it in a discount store, then we don't buy it."

Their son, Wes, openly adds that "we don't buy junk."

Henson's has kept its doors open by giving people what they want. "If we're servicing their car - we leave it the same way as we would want our car," said Wes Henson, who has worked alongside his mother and father since graduating from college and bringing his family home to raise in Clarendon.

The advantages of owning a store in a small town are numerous, the Hensons say. They have friends instead of customers, and they were able to raise their children in a small-town atmosphere.

Both children - Wes and Sharron - learned to roller-skate and work in the store. Their favorite job was to watch the toys and make sure "none of the other children" played with the toys, the Hensons laughingly remembered.

Frankie and Redell have seen a lot of changes during their 50 years at the helm. Many big companies that have supplied merchandise have shut down over the years because the public doesn't need the product anymore.

And just because they've been in business 50 years doesn't mean they have the corner covered in knowledge.

"We feel like we learn something new every day," Henson said. "And because of that we hope to give better service the next day."

The only drawback is when people think they must travel to Amarillo for merchandise, they said. "We are definitely for trading at home," Henson said.

Redell and Frankie Henson slowly have switched some of the responsibility of running Henson's to Wes and Susan Henson. "It's satisfying to know that one day the store will still be here, and Hensons will be running it," Henson said.

With tears in her eyes, daughter-in-law Susan Henson summed up why Henson's has survived for 50 years. "Frankie and Redell have put their heart into it," she said.

"We're a close family - as close a family as you can find," Henson said. "We feel just as close to our customers. We were that way the first day. We care as much today as we did that first day."

Three employees over the past 50 years have made a difference in Henson's life. "We owe a lot of credit to three of our many employees," Henson said. "They are Eddie Floyd, who worked for us as a kid; Dorisene McAnear, who is retired but still helps out; and James Ashcraft."

## DPS urges safety on the highways during the Thanksgiving holidays

When traveling this Thanksgiving weekend, Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety, asks you to consider that we have some of the best roads in the country and motor vehicles today have much better safety features than vehicles most motorists started driving in.

Snider states that fatal accidents are lower than a few years ago, yet the number of injury accidents continue to rise.

Trooper Snider advises that nearly all traffic accidents are caused by one or more driving errors, which often offset vehicle safety features.

Common driving errors are: failing to yield right of way, following too closely, wrong side of road, speed too fast for conditions, and cutting into closely when passing along with nu-

merous other hazardous errors which often result in accidents with injury or death. Many of these errors are a result of fatigue, alcohol, and other drugs including prescriptions and over-the-counter medicines, trying to make time, and inattention.

Motorists should be aware that DPS Troopers along with local and area agencies will be on alert for these and other traffic violations to curb the rising number of injury causing accidents. They will also be looking for motorists needing help.

Precaution tips suggested by Snider are to schedule adequate time for travel, be rested and alert, be clear of medications and or alcohol, and have all occupants to use safety belts. These will help everyone to have a weekend of "thanks" rather than the regret of a driving error.

Although the store prepares items for schools, clubs, organizations, and businesses, individual orders are welcome. Berry will carry a variety of transfers and handle embroidery orders. He has a limited amount of in-house stock, but will expand as the business grows.

When asked why he moved to Clarendon, Jody said he likes the people here. Of course, being part of the Cospers family was a strong influence for locating in Clarendon. Berry is married to the former Whitney Cospers, daughter of Sherman and Barbara Cospers. He is the son of Mary Johnson of Amarillo and Frank Berry of Weatherford, Oklahoma.

## Broncos squash Amarillo River Road

Amarillo River Road jumped to an early lead Nov. 19, but Clarendon outlasted the visiting Wildcats, 69-59, while a deep Tulia squad blew away the Broncos, 60-47, Friday in the Clarendon gym.

The Broncos meet Canyon Tuesday at 8 p.m. in Canyon.

Clarendon trailed River Road, 19-11, at the end of the opening quarter. Brent Gaines chipped in four field goals and grabbed some key rebounds, and Derek Shields threw in a trey for the Broncos score.

The Broncos edged River Road right before halftime - 30-29 - behind Scotty Elliott's two three-pointers and five points from Gaines and four from Roy Williams.

"We were down early," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "We weren't playing with Dean (Stanzione) because he was still out with a head injury, and Scotty (Elliott) had been coming off a serious illness."

"I thought they did well in the first half after they adjusted. (Brent) really rebounded well early on and helped us in the scoring department."

River Road outscored Clarendon, 18-16, in the third quarter leading, 47-

46, entering the final period. Williams led all scorers with eight points.

But Clarendon's defense held River Road to 12 points in the final quarter and erupted for their most productive quarter putting in 23 points.

"(Shields) sparked us with his two three-pointers, and we finally wore them down. I was real proud of how we stuck in there."

Scoring for the Broncos were Gaines, 19; Williams, 16; Elliott, 11; Shields, 9; Jason Archuleta, 8; Nathan Sears, 4; and Scott Bivens, 2.

Class 3A Tulia reeled off 12 unanswered points Friday before Clarendon scored in the opening quarter.

"Their press was really difficult to break," Avery said. "We finally settled down and became competitive against a really good team. Having everyone out and then (Shields) and (Williams) were sick. I thought we did well under the circumstances."

Tulia led 16-9 after the first quarter and increased the lead to 33-17 before half.

Gaines connected on two field goals, and Elliott hit a trey in the third quarter as Clarendon scored 13 points

to Tulia's 16.

The Broncos outscored Tulia 17-11 in the final period.

"I thought we played really well against a 1996 play-off team," Avery said. "We got some great experience and I was proud of how they came back. They didn't give up. (Sears) had his best game of the year, and (Shields) got a chance to show his poise."

"Archuleta had 11 rebounds and Williams and Sears had eight apiece. (Gaines) also grabbed nine boards. We need to do a better job of rebounding."

Scoring for the Broncos were Gaines, 15; Williams, 9; Sears, 8; Elliott, 5; Archuleta, 5; Shields, 3; and Bivens, 2.

"We had too many turnovers. We turned the ball over 26 times. That's too many times against a great team."

Next up is Canyon, a team Clarendon upset in Canyon's own tournament last year in a nailbiter win. Avery expects another close contest and hopes to have Stanzione back.

Junior point guard Kareem Abdullah is expected to be released in less than two weeks after recovering from a broken foot and should be a great asset to the team, Avery said.

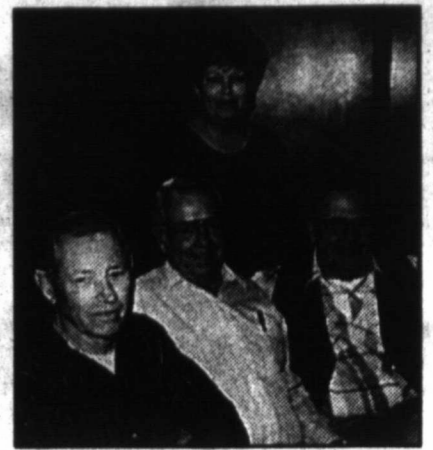
