

The Royal Court will be crowned during half-time activities. Homecoming King and Queen candidates are chosen from each high



Donley eligible for emergency **USDA** loans

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman has named 26 counties in Texas as being eligible for Farm Service Agency emergency farm loans because of losses due to various disasters, including drought, high winds, freezing temperatures, sleet and snow from June 1, 1995, through June 11, 1996, and continuing.

Gray, Kerr, Navarro, and Starr counties were named as primary disaster areas on September 3, 1996. Also eligible because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary counties, are Armstrong, Brooks, Bandera, Collingsworth, Donley, Edwards, Ellis, Freestone, Gillespie, Hemphill, Henderson, Hidalgo, Hill, Jim Hogg, Kendall, Kimble, Limestone, Real, Roberts, Wheeler, and Zapata

Farmers in all 26 counties have eight months to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses. To be eligible, they must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of normal production in a single enterprise, be able to repay the loan and any other elsewhere, have adequate security, and have multiperil crop insurance, if

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
