An extract from a letter written by Mr. John Wesley, Jan, 21 1780, sayss
"Suppose every word of Pope Bius'es creed to be true; suppose the council of Trent to have been infallible; yet, I insist upon it that no government, not Roman Catholic, ought to tolerate men of the Roman Catholie per suasion. I prove this by a plain argument; let him answer it that argument; let him answer it that

does or can give security for his does or can give security for his allegianee or peapeable behavior, I prove this, It is a Roman
Catholic maxim, established, not by private men, but by a public
council, that no faith is to be kept with heretics." This has been openly avowed by the council of Constance; but it never was
apenly disclaimed. Whether openly disclaimed. Whether
private persons avow or disavow private persons avow or disavow
it, it is a fixed maxim of the Church of Rome. But as long as it is so, it is plain that the
members of that church can give members of that chureh can give
no reasonable security to any government, of their allegiance or peaceable behavior. Therefore,
they ought not to be tolerated by they ought not to bovernment, Protestant, Moany government, Protestant, Mo-
hammed, or Pagan. You may
say 'Nay, but they will take an say Nay, but they, will take an
oath of allegiance. True, five hundred oaths; but the maxim, 'No faith is to be kept with her-
etics' sweeps them all away as a etics' sweeps them all away as a
spider's web. So that still, no spider's web. So that still, no
governors that are not Roman governors that are not Roman
Catholics can have no security for their allegiance. "Again, those who acknowledge the spiritual power of the pope-can give
no security of their allegiance to no security of their allegiance to
any government; but all Roman any government; but all Roman
Catholics acknowledge this; thereCatholics acknowledge this; there-
fore, they can give no security fore, their allegiance. The powe
of granting pardons for all sins past, present, and to come, is and has been, for many centuries, one branch of his spiritual power.
But those who acknowledge him But those who acknowledge him to have this spiritual power can
give no security for their allegigive no security for their allegi-
ance; since they believe the Pope ance; since they believe the Pope
can pardon rebellions, high treasons, and all other sins whatsoever, The power of dispensing
with any promise, oath or yow, with any promise, oath or vow,
is another branch of the spiritual is another branch of the spiritual
power of the Pope. And all who acknowledge his spiritual power must acknowledge this. Bu
pensing power of the Pope ca aive no security for his allegiand promises are none; they are light as air; a dispensation makes
lise are them all null and void. Nav, not only the Pope, but even the priest has the power to pardon ins, This is an established docrine af the church of Rome.
But they that acknowledge this annot passibly give any security or their allegiance to any govinment, Oaths are no security at all; for the priest can pardon ooth perjury and high treason, plain, that upon principles of eason, no government ought to merate men who cannot give ny security for their allegiance Romanism has not changed her: oed, cannot change, because of the infallibility of the pope and councils-one of the most gregious falsehoods that has
ever been propagated; this couped wich the doctrine of popish and priestly pardons, absolutions and dispensations is enough to make angels blush, and a Hotentot point to the place in the head where the sense ought to
be. Of course, all Protestants re heretics, and no faith is to be kept with them; all governments are an acted lie, unless headed by the Holy Father, the Pope. Believe these things or be damCanadian J. L. Hollers.
