### CLARENDON COLLEGE COMES ALIVE AS STUDENTS ENROLL FOR 1996-1997

Fall semester starts Monday, general and off-campus registration August 26-27

College Hill is bustling with activity as Clarendon College gears up for the fall semester beginning Monday, August 26.

New students will start the semester with a two-day course, Freshman Orientation, which provides an opportunity to get-to-know the faculty, staff, and campus. Freshman Orientation is a one-hour credit and is required for graduation.

Students will be provided mini-classes on subjects which are very important not only to their academic life but also to their future careers. Topics to be covered include time management, study skills, note taking, and stress management. A how-to session on the college's Learning Resource Center will be given as well.

A first for Clarendon College, student ambassadors will be available throughout Freshman Orientation to assist in answering questions, provide insight, and welcome new students. Twenty outstanding students have been chosen to serve as PAW Pals (Peers Advising and Welcoming students).

Parents of students are invited to

the first-ever Parents Orientation. This educational event will be held Sunday, August 25, in the Bairfield Activity Center from 3-4 p.m.

General and off-campus registration will be held Monday, August 26, and Tuesday, August 27.

Registration in Childress will begin at 6 p.m. on Monday, August 26, in the high school library.

Registration in Wellington will be in the junior high annex at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, August 27. Payment is expected at the time of registration.

Students are also required to have copies of their high school transcript, college transcript(s), ACT/SAT scores, TASP scores, or GED certificate.

Clarendon College will also offer a variety of continuing education classes this fall. Most classes cost \$15 and are offered as a service to the community.

#### Several continuing education courses being offered during this semester

- **Personal Financial Planning** October 1, 3, 8, and 10 from 7-9 p.m. in the CC Administration Bldg. Mark Mann of First Bank & Trust of

### Clarendon listed among nation's 'decent' towns

Clarendon is a decent place to live.

That's the judgment of an article, "Decent Places Off The Beaten Path," in the March-April issue of the bimonthly journal, *Small Town*.

The list of towns was compiled in response to *Money* magazine's annual listing of the 300 best cities in America.

The article by Everett G. Smith states that *Money*'s list is a "spurious, if not superficial, business," and that people continue to look for alternatives to "high costs of housing, mounting traffic, and other dangers and inconveniences of big city living."

The article also criticizes the book, *The 100 Best Small Towns In America*, for defining small towns as having up to 15,000 people and for trying too hard to evenly distribute the 'best' towns around the nation.

Smith, who is Professor Emeritus in the Department of Geography at the University of Oregon, set up three criteria for selecting America's decent places.

• **Population:** Towns had to be incorporated and contained between 2,000 and 5,000 people in 1990, held at least

1,200 people in 1950, did not double in population between 1950 and 1990 and changed less than 20 percent in population during the 1980s. (Smith says these figures assure an adequate housing stock and indicates that population levels have been steady.)

• **Location:** Towns were over 80 road miles from centers of metropolitan areas exceeding a million people, over 50 miles from centers of metropolitan areas with populations in 1990 between 250,000 and one million, over 30 road miles from centers of smaller metropolitan areas, and over 20 road miles from cities over 10,000 in population and below the metropolitan threshold of 50,000, and over 10 miles from cities between 5,000 and 10,000 in population. (These distances allow cities to preserve their autonomy and reduce the influences exerted by larger cities, Smith says.)

• **Local Functions:** Places had to have multiple functions and most had either a courthouse or a hospital.

All in all, 479 towns in America were listed as 'decent' places. Most of these were concentrated in the Great Plains or Heartland states.

Texas topped the list with 56

towns listed.

Eight states had no towns on the list: Arizona, Connecticut, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, and Rhode Island.

Clarendon and the other towns listed contain "positive qualities relative to the cost of living, to appearance, to ease of getting around, and to attending to day-to-day tasks," Smith states in the article. "Further, decent places are free-standing, relatively independent congregations of people, and they represent distant, rather than near, satellites of metropolitan centers. A decent place can supply the basic needs of individuals, families, and the larger community."

Other towns from the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle making the list were: Muleshoe, Shamrock, Spearman, Tulia, and Wellington.

*Small Town* is published by the Small Towns Institute, a nonprofit corporation which studies and communicates ideas concerning the issues and problems facing small towns and nonurban areas.

#### ELC balloting begins, return date coming up

Ballots for Expanded Local Calling (ELC) began arriving in Clarendon last week, giving local telephone customers the opportunity to vote for this new service.

The ballots must be returned by August 27, 1996. No ballot will be counted with a postmark later than August 27.

GTE customers can vote on ELC services to Amarillo, Pampa, Lakeview, Memphis, and Wellington, and each community must be voted on individually.

Whether one or all five exchanges pass, there will be a monthly fee of no more than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The results of the balloting will not be known until probably the middle or end of September.

If passed, ELC will allow toll-free, two-way calling between Clarendon and these other communities for a low monthly fee. At least 70 percent of the ballots returned must be in favor of the new service.

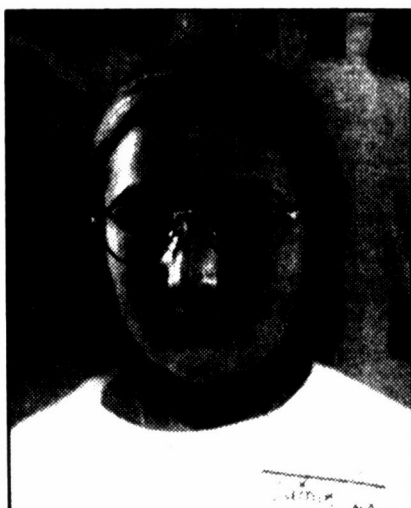
#### Local girl attends Lions Camp

Jamie Simmons, the nine-year-old daughter of JEM and Karen Simmons of Clarendon, recently attended the Texas Lions Camp in Kerrville.

Sponsored by the Clarendon Lions Club, this camper participated in classes designed to teach insulin dependent children to manage and understand their diabetes. Jamie also took part in summer camp activities such as horseback riding, swimming, field sports and a challenge course program.

Doctors, nurses and dietitians, supervised by Dr. Steve Ponder of Scott and White Hospital, taught campers about dietary exchanges, testing blood sugar levels, and the effects of exercise on blood sugar levels. In addition, campers learned to give their own insulin injections.

A well-trained staff supervised each camper to activity with a ratio of one counselor to two campers. Located on 500 acres of Texas Hill Country, the camp serves diabetic children ages 7 to 17.

Terry Bernabe and Doug Lock spoke on putting in Internet service for the city. The board accepted the offer to connect the city to the system at their expense.

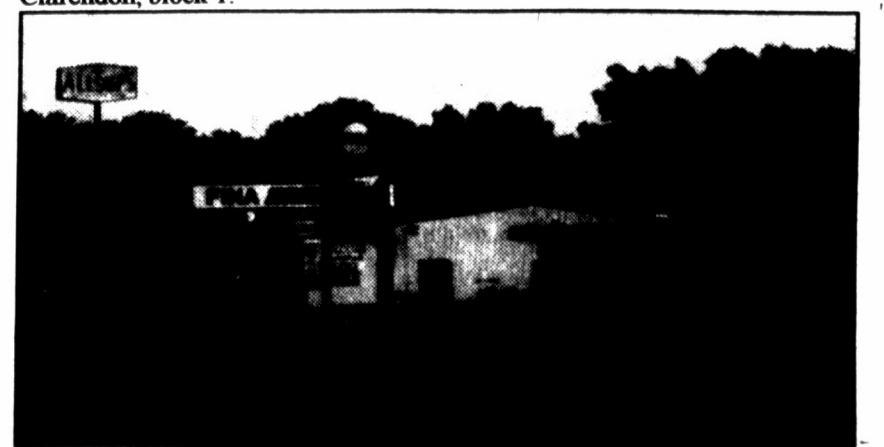

**Exit Level TAAS and TEAMS offered at CHS**

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) exit level tests will be offered this fall at Clarendon High School.

Any qualified individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and who wish to register to retake the TAAS (or TEAMS) tests may pick up a registration packet from the Counselor's office located in the Clarendon CISD Jr. High building at 822 West 5th.

Currently enrolled Clarendon High School juniors and seniors who have not mastered the Exit Level TAAS will also test, but do not have to register.

The testing schedule will be as follows: TAAS Writing - Tuesday, October 22, 1996; TAAS Math - Wednesday, October 23, 1996; TAAS Reading - Thursday, October 24, 1996; TEAMS Math - Wednesday, October 23, 1996; TEAMS English - Thursday, October 24, 1996.

Since completed registration forms must be received by the testing center in Iowa by September 20, 1996, any qualified individual wanting to take the tests needs to pick up a registration form as soon as possible. "New Beginnings"

As the cliché goes, one can make any day the "first day in the rest of your life."

Yet, there are times that provide us with special opportunities for renewal. One of those times is the start of a school year.

This Friday, with the advent of our employee in-service day, the beginning of a new school year dawns at Clarendon College. The Clarendon Independent School District has already cranked up its 1996-97 campaign.

The start of any school year is full of anticipation. For some college freshmen, it marks their first time to be away from home for an extended period - a chance to make new friends. Some cope well with their newfound freedom; others kind of stub their toes.

Although a lot of things have changed, one that hasn't is that people are still judged, in no small measure, by the company they keep. In fact, I believe people are not only judged by the company they keep, but are profoundly influenced by that company.

So, the start of a new school year ushers in an opportunity to reestablish one's priorities - a chance to gravitate toward positive activities and peer groups.

Whether high school or college, there are hard choices to be made. And those choices very often define the difference between leaders and followers, winners and losers.

Nowadays, an older student is truly empowered in our society. He or she legally can purchase alcohol for minors or can persuade them to take illegal drugs. Therein lies an opportunity for leadership - one way or the other - leadership in refusing to buy alcohol for minors or in steadfastly encouraging them not to take drugs.

When a young person declines to go out and drink or do drugs with others, he or she may endure criticisms and chastisement. Heck, young people are even harassed for making good grades these days. I'm not familiar with contemporary name-calling, but the monikers bandied about in my generation included "Chicken," "Square," and "Momma's Boy."

Today, I think they call you things like "Nerd" or "Dork."

Perhaps the real translation of such mudslinging is, "I'm jealous of you. I wish I could be more like you."

Those who succumb to peer pressure are often heard to employ such phraseology as "Everybody else does it." Whenever I tried that on my Dad, he'd counterpunch with, "If everybody jumped off a bridge, would you do that, too?"

Sometimes we forget that a good synonym for "everybody else" is mediocrity, and the world is just chock

full of it. When someone asks you to engage in any activity that diminishes you as a human being, the translation to those requests is, "Hey, I'm a loser. Come be a loser with me."

Some of the biggest "squares" in my graduating class are today making a lot of money and, more importantly, blessed with loving families. On the other hand, some of those I thought were the real "neat" guys, members of the "in crowd," if you will, have been divorced two or three times or, much worse, are in jail.

So, why did I so desperately want to be like them? I thought they were really funny at the time, I suppose. They were the centers of attention, but I didn't realize the difference between laughing with someone and laughing at them.

None of those stellar fellows have much to laugh about now.

Yes, a new school year marks an opportunity for renewal. School is serious business, yet it can be a lot of fun. A balance must be struck, and in that balance lies a major key to success.

I have asked my children to make academics their first school priority Sunday evening through Friday afternoon. Then from Friday-afternoon through Saturday night, I believe, the emphasis can turn toward good, clean fun and frolic. Then on Sunday morning, hopefully there's a little time for the highest priority of all.

Of course, maintaining that kind of order in one's life is easier said than done. Those who are able to do so are often anointed with such titles as valedictorian, salutatorian, class president, team captain, honor roll student, or "most likely to succeed."

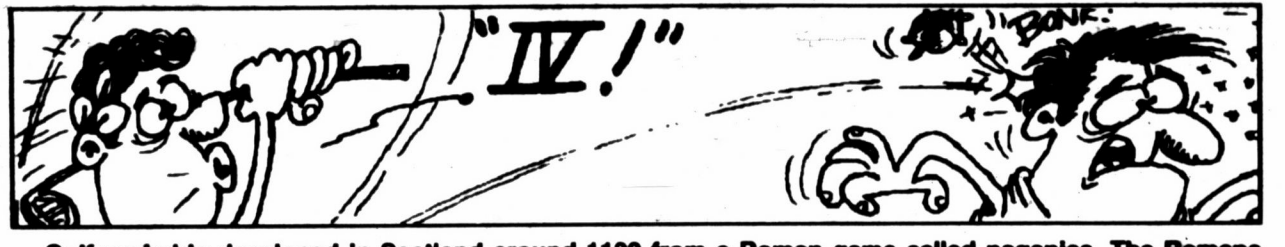
Truly, I hope our new students at Clarendon College and our local public school students are successful in striking that balance. It took me a long time to achieve that kind of balance in my life, and, in fact, it remains a trial. I find that my priorities are still out of whack sometimes.

I remain guilty of sometimes yielding to those influences who seek to turn winners into losers. Such is the struggle they call life.

The greatest hope of any generation, such as mine, is that the next one will represent real improvement, real hope. That hope seems to be advancing from computer technology to the best time in the 100 meters. Surely, the character of man can catch up.

This school year would be a good time to start - for all of us.

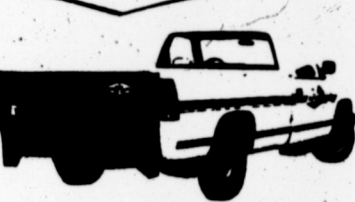

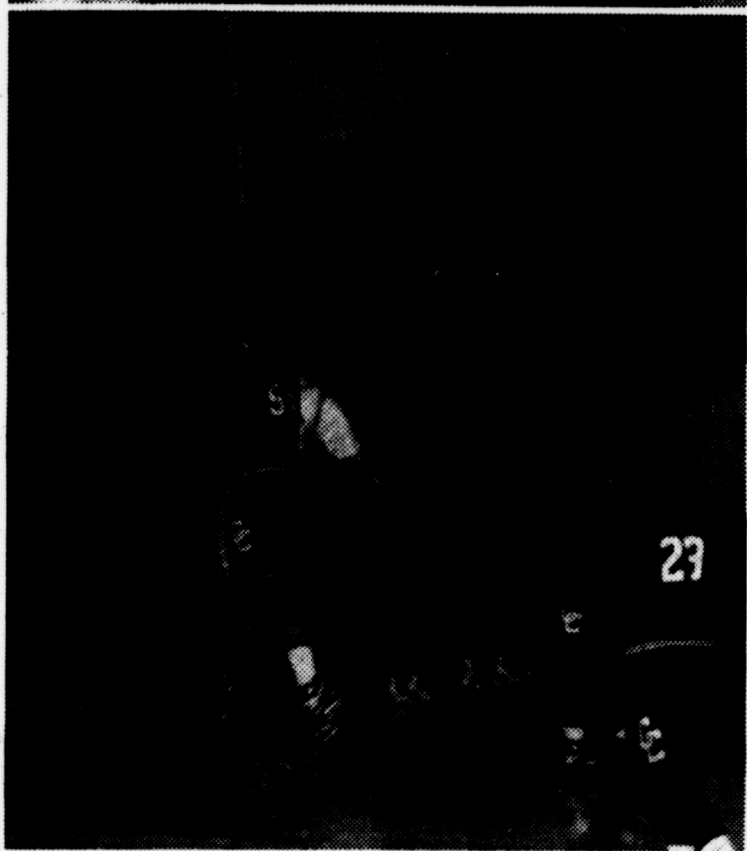

A Pee Wee Football program is being organized in Clarendon for boys in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th grades.

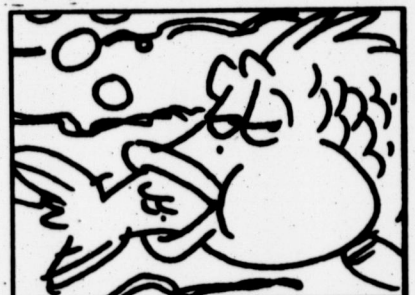
It is anticipated that Clarendon will join a pee wee league consisting of approximately six surrounding towns. The program will allow the young players to wear full pads and learn the basics of football.

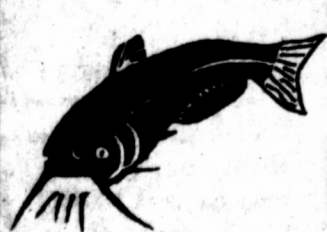


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## The Lions Tale

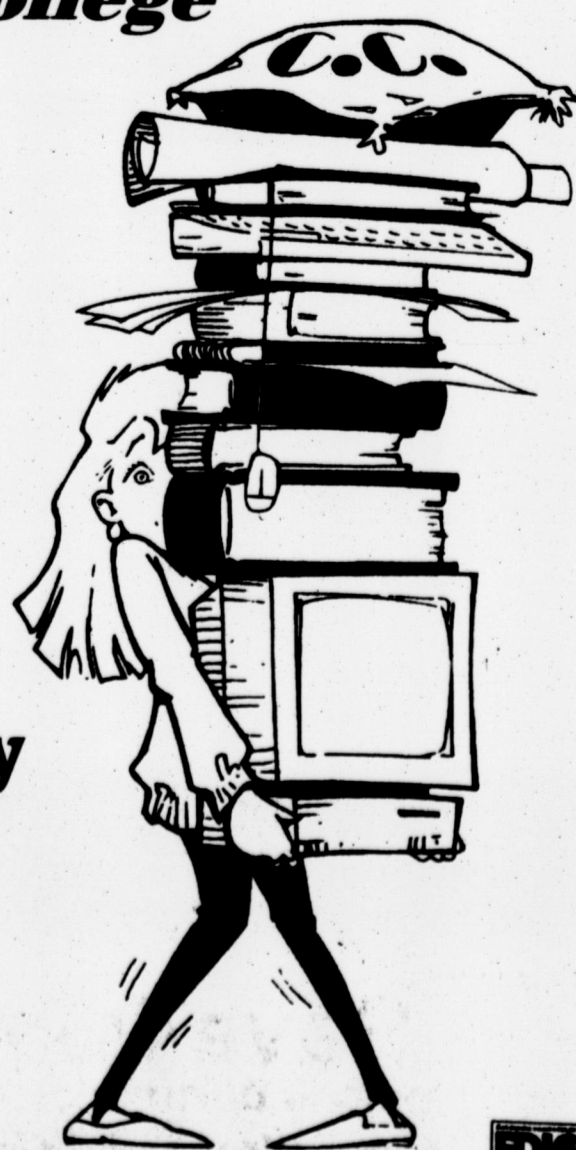

Opening session speakers included Jon Randles, popular motivation speaker and head of Randles Evangelistic Association of Lubbock and Joe Frank Wheeler, manager of the Berger Chamber of Commerce and local training and motivation seminar specialist.

Dr. Margaret Hale, assistant director for family and consumer science programs with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in College Station; also addressed the full convocation. Hale was appointed as a headquarters staff administrator in July 1995, where she directs the activities of county agents serving 254 counties statewide.

The TAEHE banquet held August 1 featured keynote speaker, Sarah Gill, a poet and humorist from Miami, who entertained the audience with examples of her work which has appeared in *Country Woman*, *County Progress* and two anthologies, *Texas Rib Ticklers* and *Best of the Southwest Cowboy Poets*. Officer installation and a president's council reception ended the evening's events.

## Southwest Outdoors

### Sticker Shock

September 1, 1996: a day that will go down in history as the start of a taxpayers' revolt. Hunters and anglers across Texas will be forced to endure yet another dramatic fee increase while the free-loading environmentalists continue their insidious scheme of turning hunting and fishing into the recreation of the wealthy.

During 1996, it was not enough to increase boat fees by \$4.6 million and state park entrance fees by \$12-17 million. Now the money hungry bureaucrats in Austin want to reach into the pockets of Texas anglers and hunters to extract an additional \$10 million.

Conservative figures from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department estimate that these additional taxes will pump more than \$27 million into the coffers of TPW.

Does TPW need more money? Perhaps, but I have never met a bureaucrat who didn't want more money. Under the leadership of Executive Director Andrew Sanson, the recent history of the TPW reveals a shameful record of spiraling fee increases. In 1993, Texas licenses were increased by 63%. A fishing license went from \$8 to \$13.

Were the bureaucrats satisfied? No way. For three years, they whined, whimpered, and finally, got their way. Effective September 1, 1996, the over-taxed, over-regulated, and under-paid citizens of Texas must pay \$19 to go fishing and another \$19 to go hunting. (Don't forget to buy the appropriate stamps, but that's another column.)

Can it get any worse? What about the free fishing and hunting for our senior citizens over 65? Before the arrival of Mr. Sanson, our senior Texans were permitted free outdoor recreation, but even that courtesy has fallen victim on his altar of higher taxes. All senior citizen anglers who turned 65 after September 1995 were forced to purchase a \$6 special resident fishing license. From zero to \$6 in one year, with plans to go to \$9 — the bureaucrats love it.

Finally, in all honesty, I must admit that even if the TPW increased the fees to \$1,000 I would still go fishing and hunting, but it would be a sad and lonely experience without seeing my kids or senior citizens enjoying the fun of the great outdoors.

We need more recreational opportunities for all Texans not higher taxes, more bureaucrats, or quarterly newsletters catering to the whims of the environmentalists.

# US Post Office announces new security changes in mail collection procedures

The US Postal Service announced today changes in mail collection procedures that will increase security of commercial airlines carrying US Mail.

"The changes are designed to enhance security measures and to protect the traveling public, postal employees, and postal contractors who transport US Mail," said Postmaster General Marvin Runyon.

Runyon added that the changes exceed FAA requirements and are one of several important steps the Postal Service is "prepared and willing to take to improve the level of safety and security of the airlines and the mail."

Officials declined to discuss all of the security measures planned or already in place.

The typical consumer or business will notice very few changes, nor will there be any impact on service. Express Mail service is not affected.

The changes, effective August 16, affect packages mailed to international or domestic addresses deposited in mail collection boxes, such as street mail boxes, lobby and apartment drop boxes/receptacles, even rural customer mailboxes.

Customers will have to bring to post offices for entry with retail clerks:

- domestic mail bearing stamps and weighing 16 ounces and over, and
- all international mail or military APO/FPO mail weighing 16 ounces and over and which in some cases may also require a customs declaration form.

The Postal Service will retain a record of the international and military APO/FPO mailing and the customer will be advised of this when the item is mailed.

Packages found in collection boxes will be returned to the sender if

the addressee is outside the local area identified for overnight First-Class Mail.

Packages returned to senders will have an accompanying explanation advising them in the future to deposit this mail at the post office. Previously applied postage may be used when the item is re-mailed at a post office.

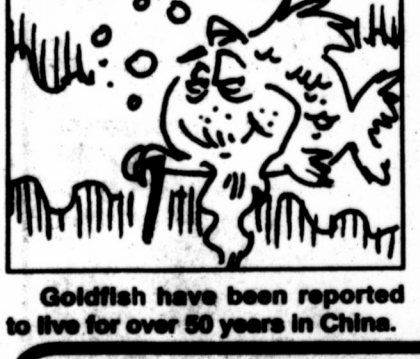

## Clarendon listed among nation's 'decent' towns

Clarendon is a decent place to live.

That's the judgment of an article, "Decent Places Off The Beaten Path," in the March-April issue of the bimonthly journal, *Small Town*.

The list of towns was compiled in response to *Money* magazine's annual listing of the 300 best cities in America.

The article by Everett G. Smith states that *Money's* list is a "spurious, if not superficial, business," and that people continue to look for alternatives to "high costs of housing, mounting traffic, and other dangers and inconveniences of big city living."

The article also criticizes the book, *The 100 Best Small Towns In America*, for defining small towns as having up to 15,000 people and for trying too hard to evenly distribute the 'best' towns around the nation.

Smith, who is Professor Emeritus in the Department of Geography at the University of Oregon, set up three criteria for selecting America's decent places.

- **Population:** Towns had to be incorporated and contained between 2,000 and 5,000 people in 1990, held at least

1,200 people in 1950, did not double in population between 1950 and 1990 and changed less than 20 percent in population during the 1980s. (Smith says these figures assure an adequate housing stock and indicates that population levels have been steady.)

- **Location:** Towns were over 80 road miles from centers of metropolitan areas exceeding a million people, over 50 miles from centers of metropolitan areas with populations in 1990 between 250,000 and one million, over 30 road miles from centers of smaller metropolitan areas, and over 20 road miles from cities over 10,000 in population and below the metropolitan threshold of 50,000, and over 1 mile from cities between 5,000 and 10,000 in population. (These distances allow cities to preserve their autonomy and reduce the influences exerted by larger cities, Smith says.)
- **Local Functions:** Places had to have multiple functions and most had either a courthouse or a hospital.

All in all, 479 towns in America were listed as 'decent' places. Most of these were concentrated in the Great Plains or Heartland states.

Texas topped the list with 56

towns listed.

Eight states had no towns on the list: Arizona, Connecticut, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, and Rhode Island.

Clarendon and the other towns listed contain "positive qualities relative to the cost of living, to appearance, to ease of getting around, and to attending to day-to-day tasks," Smith states in the article. "Further, decent places are free-standing, relatively independent congregations of people, and they represent distant, rather than near, satellites of metropolitan centers. A decent place can supply the basic needs of individuals, families, and the larger community."

Other towns from the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle making the list were: Muleshoe, Shamrock, Spearman, Tulia, and Wellington.

*Small Town* is published by the Small Towns Institute, a nonprofit corporation which studies and communicates ideas concerning the issues and problems facing small towns and nonurban areas.

## ELC balloting begins, return date coming up

Ballots for Expanded Local Calling (ELC) began arriving in Clarendon last week, giving local telephone customers the opportunity to vote for this new service.

The ballots must be returned by August 27, 1996. No ballot will be counted with a postmark later than August 27.

GTE customers can vote on ELC services to Amarillo, Pampa, Lakeview, Memphis, and Wellington, and each community must be voted on individually.

Whether one or all five exchanges pass, there will be a monthly fee of no more than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The results of the balloting will not be known until probably the middle or end of September.

If passed, ELC will allow toll-free, two-way calling between Clarendon and these other communities for a low monthly fee. At least 70 percent of the ballots returned must be in favor of the new service.

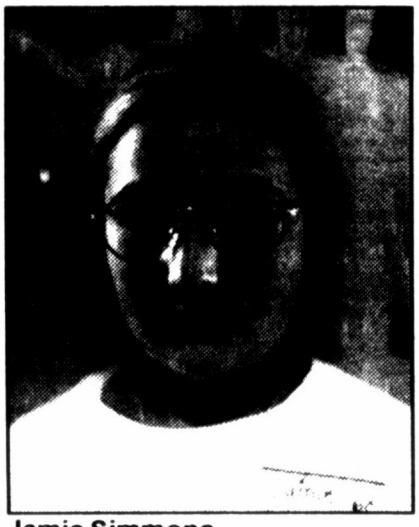
## Local girl attends Lions Camp

Terry Bernabe and Doug Lock spoke on putting in Internet service for the city. The board accepted the offer to connect the city to the system at their expense.

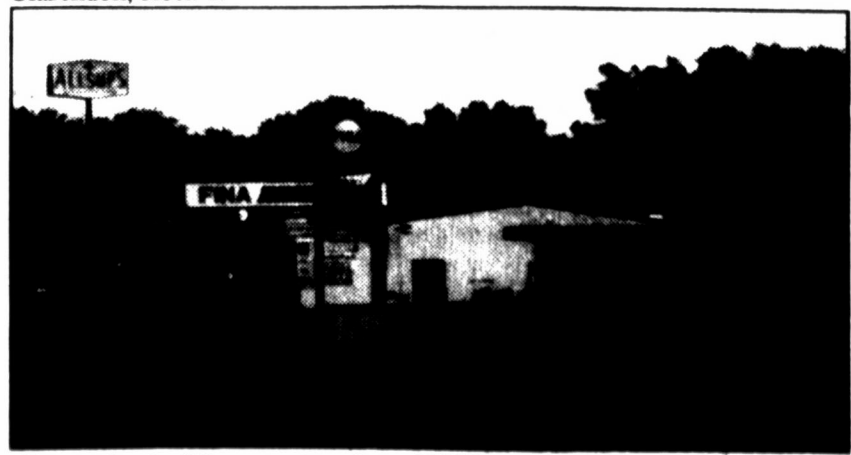

When a young person declines to go out and drink or do drugs with others, he or she may endure criticisms and chastisement. Heck, young people are even harassed for making good grades these days. I'm not familiar with contemporary name-calling, but the monikers bandied about in my generation included "Chicken," "Square," and "Momma's Boy."

Today, I think they call you things like "Nerd" or "Dork."

Perhaps the real translation of such mudslinging is, "I'm jealous of you. I wish I could be more like you."

Those who succumb to peer pressure are often heard to employ such phraseology as "Everybody else does it." Whenever I tried that on my Dad, he'd counterpunch with, "If everybody jumped off a bridge, would you do that, too?"

Sometimes we forget that a good synonym for "everybody else" is mediocrity, and the world is just chock

full of it. When someone asks you to engage in any activity that diminishes you as a human being, the translation to those requests is, "Hey, I'm a loser. Come be a loser with me."

Some of the biggest "squares" in my graduating class are today making a lot of money and, more importantly, blessed with loving families. On the other hand, some of those I thought were the real "neat" guys, members of the "in crowd," if you will, have been divorced two or three times or, much worse, are in jail.

So, why did I so desperately want to be like them? I thought they were really funny at the time, I suppose. They were the centers of attention, but I didn't realize the difference between laughing with someone and laughing at them.

None of those stellar fellows have much to laugh about now.

Yes, a new school year marks an opportunity for renewal. School is serious business, yet it can be a lot of fun. A balance must be struck, and in that balance lies a major key to success.

I have asked my children to make academics their first school priority Sunday evening through Friday afternoon. Then from Friday afternoon through Saturday night, I believe, the emphasis can turn toward good, clean fun and frolic. Then on Sunday morning, hopefully there's a little time for the highest priority of all.

Of course, maintaining that kind of order in one's life is easier said than done. Those who are able to do so are often anointed with such titles as valedictorian, salutatorian, class president, team captain, honor roll student, or "most likely to succeed."

Truly, I hope our new students at Clarendon College and our local public school students are successful in striking that balance. It took me a long time to achieve that kind of balance in my life, and, in fact, it remains a trial. I find that my priorities are still out of whack sometimes.

I remain guilty of sometimes yielding to those influences who seek to turn winners into losers. Such is the struggle they call life.

The greatest hope of any generation, such as mine, is that the next one will represent real improvement, real hope. Everything seems to be advancing from computer technology to the best time in the 100 meters. Surely, the character of man can catch up.

This school year would be a good time to start - for all of us.

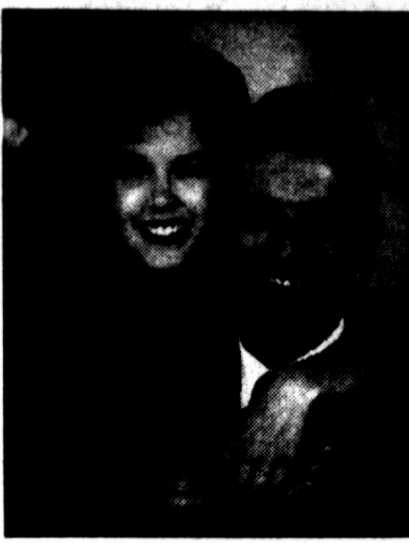
Her sheer cathedral length illusion veil was gathered onto a bandeau of matching jeweled Alencon lace.

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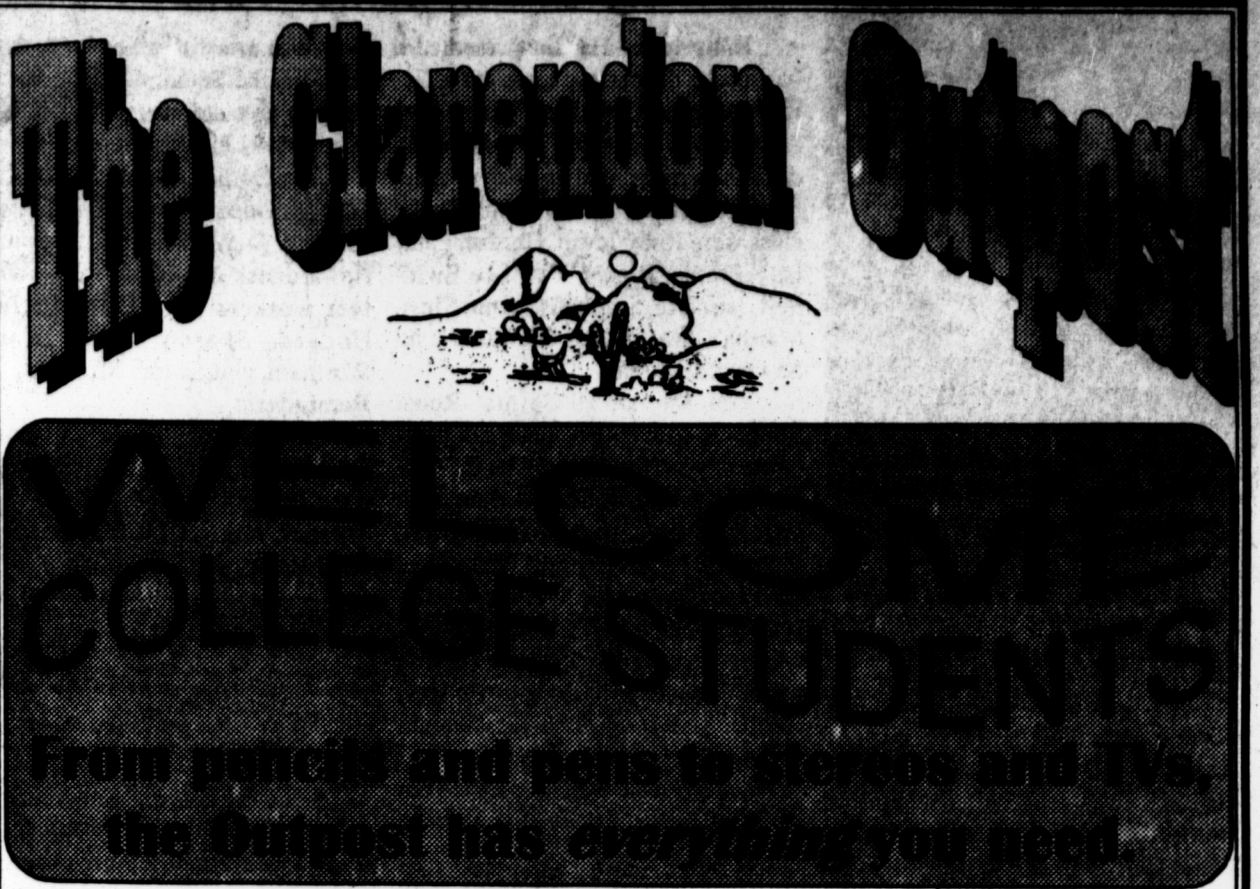

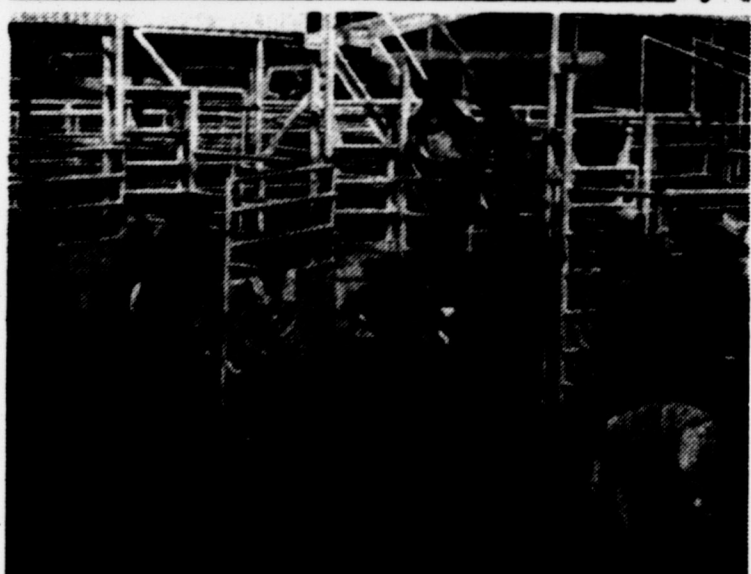
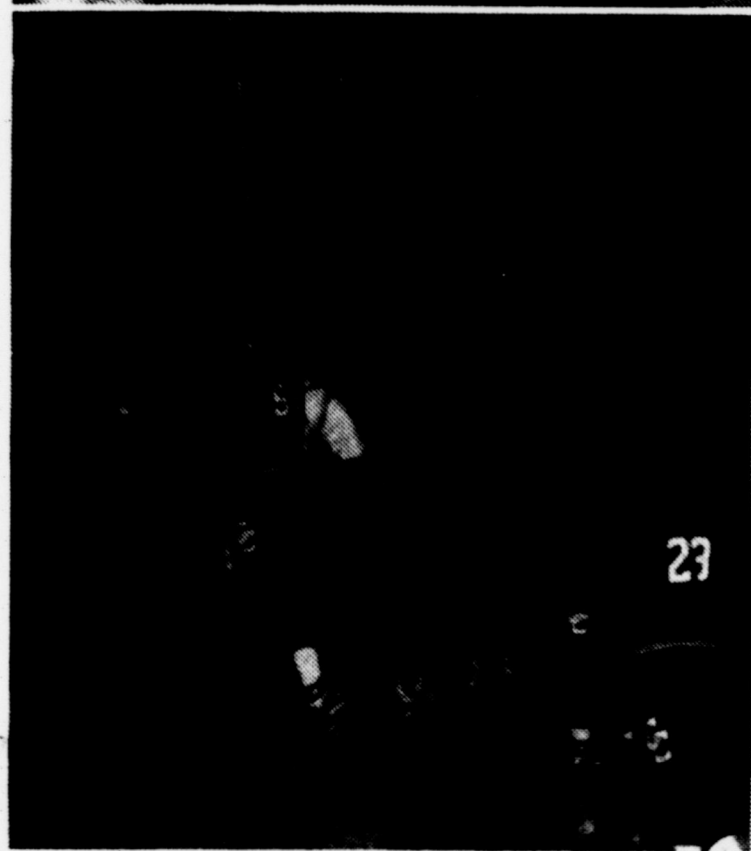

A Pee Wee Football program is being organized in Clarendon for boys in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th grades.

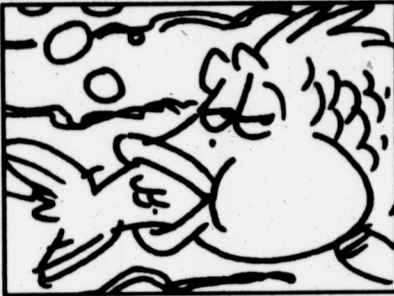
It is anticipated that Clarendon will join a pee wee league consisting of approximately six surrounding towns. The program will allow the young players to wear full pads and learn the basics of football.

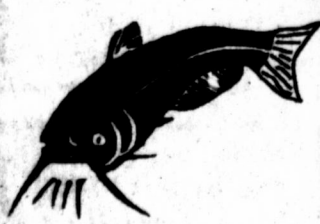

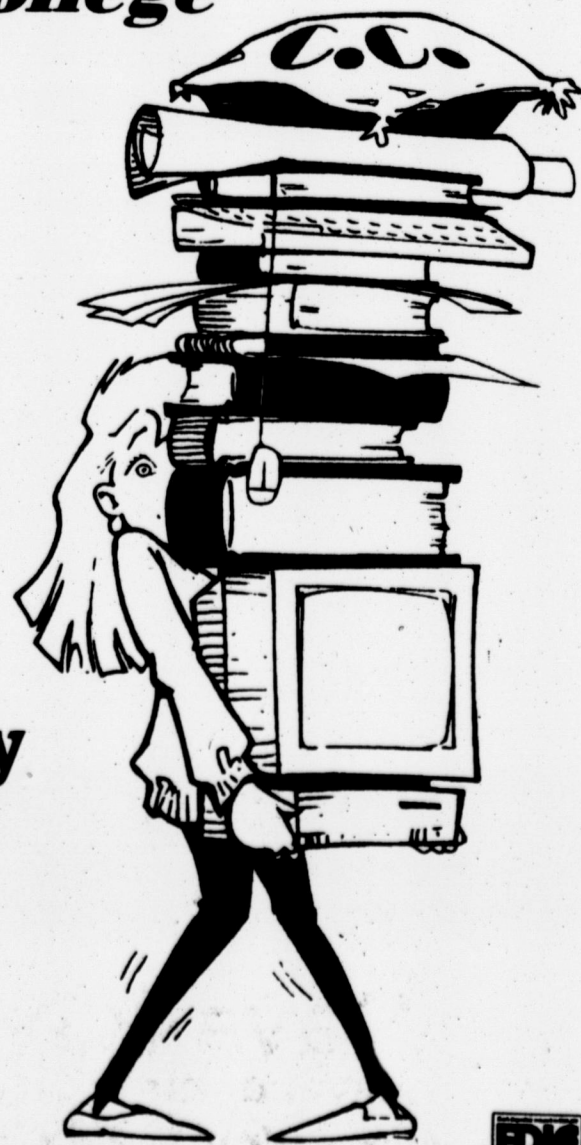

Opening session speakers included Jon Randles, popular motivation speaker and head of Randles Evangelistic Association of Lubbock and Joe Frank Wheeler, manager of the Borger Chamber of Commerce and local training and motivation seminar specialist.

Dr. Margaret Hale, assistant director for family and consumer science programs with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in College Station; also addressed the full convocation. Hale was appointed as a headquarters staff administrator in July 1995, where she directs the activities of county agents serving 254 counties statewide.

The TAEHE banquet held August 1 featured keynote speaker, Sarah Gill, a poet and humorist from Miami, who entertained the audience with examples of her work which has appeared in *Country Woman*, *County Progress* and two anthologies, *Texas Rib Ticklers* and *Best of the Southwest Cowboy Poets*. Officer installation and a president's council reception ended the evening's events.

Agents heard a briefing by Texas Agricultural Extension Service director, Zerle Carpenter of College Station, who outlined several new directions and challenges for Extension programs for the future.

During the last day sessions, Ronda Mikles, Mikles Marketing and Management in Elk City, Oklahoma, discussed multiple project management strategies.

A self-esteem program assessment presentation for agents who teach youth and adults was led by two officials with Texas Department of Criminal Justice Nathaniel J. Neal Female Unit at Amarillo - Dr. Alma McArthur, principal of Windham School at the unit and at the senior warden, Wilhelmina Adams. Dr. Joyce O'Rear, a licensed psychologist and specialist in marriage and family therapy, offered the final workshop on key concepts in eating disorder education programming.

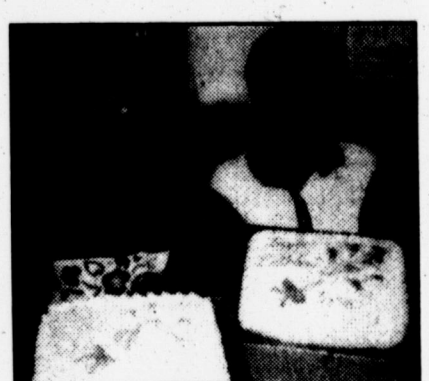

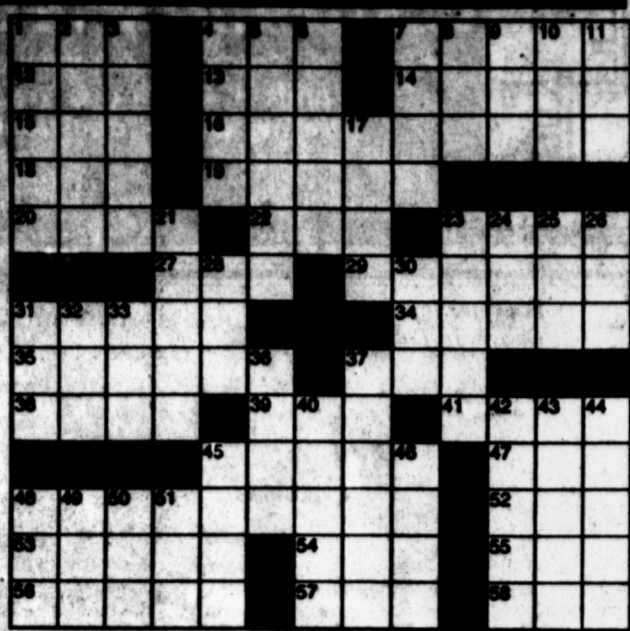

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# US Post Office announces new security changes in mail collection procedures

The US Postal Service announced today changes in mail collection procedures that will increase security of commercial airlines carrying US Mail.

"The changes are designed to enhance security measures and to protect the traveling public, postal employees, and postal contractors who transport US Mail," said Postmaster General Marvin Runyon.

Runyon added that the changes exceed FAA requirements and are one of several important steps the Postal Service is "prepared and willing to take to improve the level of safety and security of the airlines and the mail." Officials declined to discuss all of the security measures planned or already in place.

The typical consumer or business will notice very few changes, nor will there be any impact on service. Express Mail service is not affected.

The changes, effective August 16, affect packages mailed to international or domestic addresses deposited in mail collection boxes, such as street mail boxes, lobby and apartment drop boxes/receptacles, even rural customer mailboxes.

Customers will have to bring to post offices for entry with retail clerks:

- domestic mail bearing stamps and weighing 16 ounces and over, and
- all international mail or military APO/FPO mail weighing 16 ounces and over and which in some cases may also require a customs declaration form.

The Postal Service will retain a record of the international and military APO/FPO mailing and the customer will be advised of this when the item is mailed.

Packages found in collection boxes will be returned to the sender if

the addressee is outside the local area identified for overnight First-Class Mail.

Packages returned to senders will have an accompanying explanation advising them in the future to deposit

this mail at the post office. Previously applied postage may be used when the item is re-mailed at a post office.

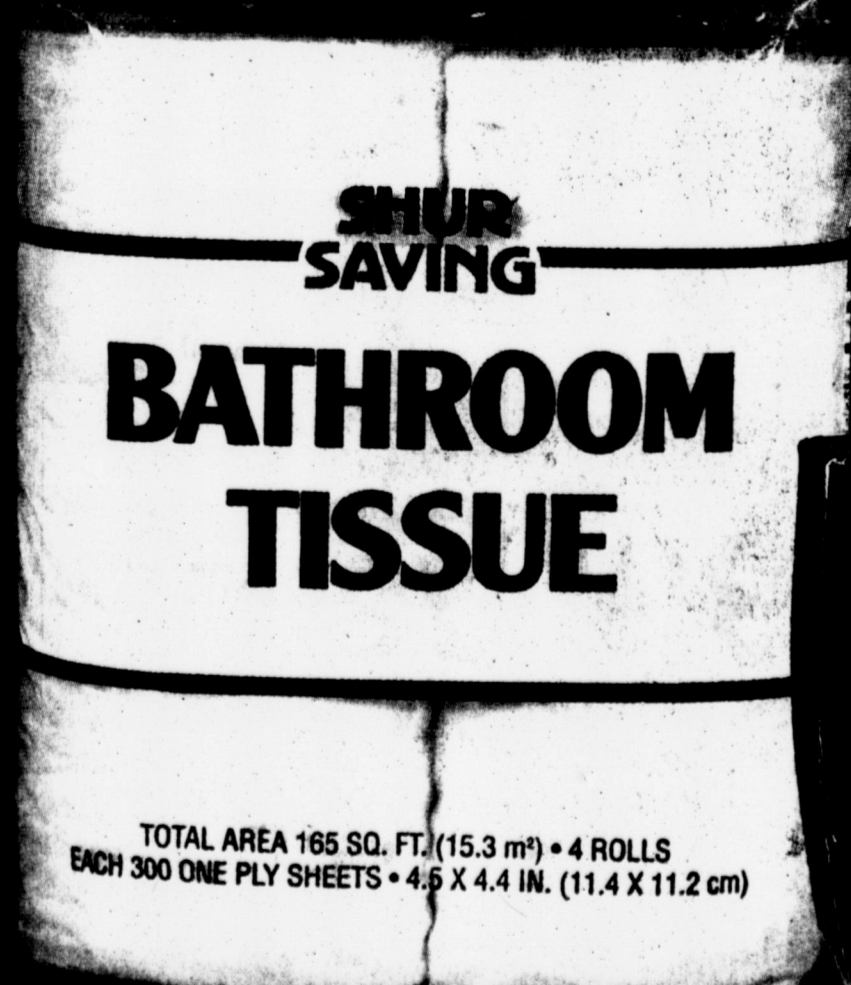

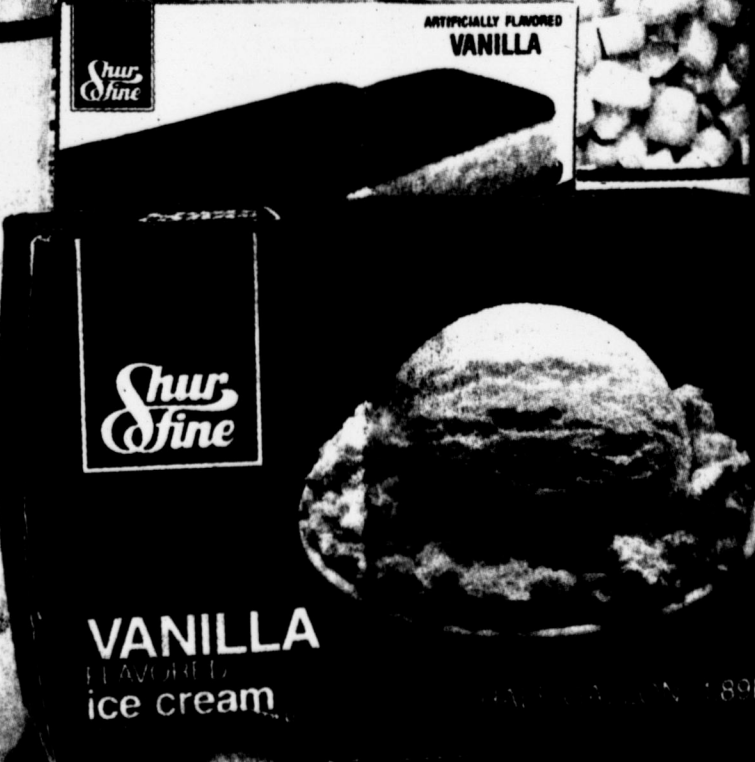
