## Archeologists uncover earliest Clarendon residents' artifacts

Part of our local history was brought to light last week as the Texas Archeological Society (TAS) held its 1996 Field School at Greenbelt Lake. The school excavated Indian dwellings at the Greenbelt Site overlooking the confluence of Carroll Creek and the Salt Fork of the Red River.

Discovered and originally recorded by Dr. Jack Hughes and Bill Harrison in the 1960s, the site is recognized as one of the premier cultural resources in the region. It was designated as a State Archeological

Landmark in 1994.

The name of the Indians who lived here has been lost to history, but the site is believed to have been occupied from about AD 1250 to 1450. Their presence predates by nearly 430 years the arrival of Rev. L.H. Carhart and his group of Christian colonists who settled Old Clarendon literally just down the hill.

The Indians lived in houses partly dug into the ground and covered with a thatch roof. They hunted buffalo, practiced agriculture, and traded with other Indians possibly as far away as the Gulf and Pacific Coasts.

Some of the artifacts TAS members uncovered were stone and bone tools, bison butchering areas, bone and shell ornaments, four

houses, and some pottery shards.

In addition to the Indian ruins, TAS members excavated portions of a home from Old Clarendon. The remains of a stone wall was uncovered that was believed to have been either the foundation of a house or a partial wall of a half-dugout. The home could have been built as early as 1878, the year Clarendon was settled.

The artifacts recovered from the sites will be cataloged and studied, then stored in the Panhandle/Plains Museum in Canyon. The Canyon museum is the nearest facility which is qualified to house artifacts from State Archeological Landmarks. It may be possible for some of the items to be returned on loan and displayed in the Saint's Roost Museum.

## Local bone marrow drive being planned to help Roy Lee Helms

A bone marrow drive is being conducted by the National Bone Marrow Donor Program at Cook Children's Medical Center in Fort Worth. Locally, the drive is being promoted on behalf of Roy Lee Helms by his friends and family.

In order to be tested for the National Bone Marrow Donor program, you must be between the ages of 18 and 60 and in good health. Some health conditions which cannot be tested are: Hepatitis C (A & B are acceptable), rheumatoid arthritis, insulin dependent diabetes, heart problems of any kind, cancer of any type, chronic medication-dependent asthma.

If you do not qualify to be tested, please consider making a donation to help defray the expenses of those who can be tested.

If you are eligible to be tested, please sign the registration sheet and a time it would be convenient for you to come. (Example: 1 p.m.-2 p.m.) Places and dates to sign up are: Wednesday, June 19 - B&R Thriftway; Friday, June 21 - First Bank & Trust, Donley County State Bank, and Community Bank in Hedley; Saturday, June 22 - B&R Thriftway; Monday, June 24 - First Bank & Trust, Donley County State Bank, and Community Bank in Hedley; Wednesday, June 26 - B&R Thriftway; Friday, June 28 - First Bank & Trust, Donley County State Bank, and Community Bank in Hedley. Please indicate if you are of ethnic background as you may qualify for free testing. This includes American

Indian, Hispanic, Afro-American, or Oriental. No written proof is required, only the statement that you have such a family background.

All others tested will require a fee of \$20.00. However, they hope to reduce that amount substantially with donations and fund raising. A benefit bake sale will be held on Saturday, June 22, at B&R Thriftway. Donations will also be accepted to help defray the cost of being tested. Those who are unable to be tested because of health conditions are asked to help pay for those who can. Arrangements will be made to cover those who are willing to be tested but need help with the fee.

Their main concern is that a match be found for Roy Lee, but all who are tested will be entered into the National Bone Marrow Registry, which is continually searching for matches for others who are desperately in need of transplants. These are critically ill children and adults whose lives are dependent on bone marrow transplants. You may be the one who can save a precious life. It's your choice. Please help.

### Selected roadside bailing allowed to help with drought

Due to the continuing drought, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is making some of its right-of-way available for ranchers for mowing and bailing of roadside grasses. Under authority granted by the Texas Legislature in 1977, TxDOT can allow ranchers to mow and bale vegetation along the department's 77,000 miles of highway.

Written permission from the appropriate TxDOT district engineer is required before any mowing and baling take place. Owners of property adjacent to the right-of-way have the right of first refusal before others are allowed to mow or bale. The district engineer has the authority to deny any request.

Persons granted permission to mow or bale must not receive compensation for performance of these operations but may use or dispose of the hay or other materials produced. Mowing and baling will be limited to appropriate rural roadways.

For more details on mowing or baling right-of-way grasses, call the TxDOT Childress District office or a TxDOT county maintenance office.

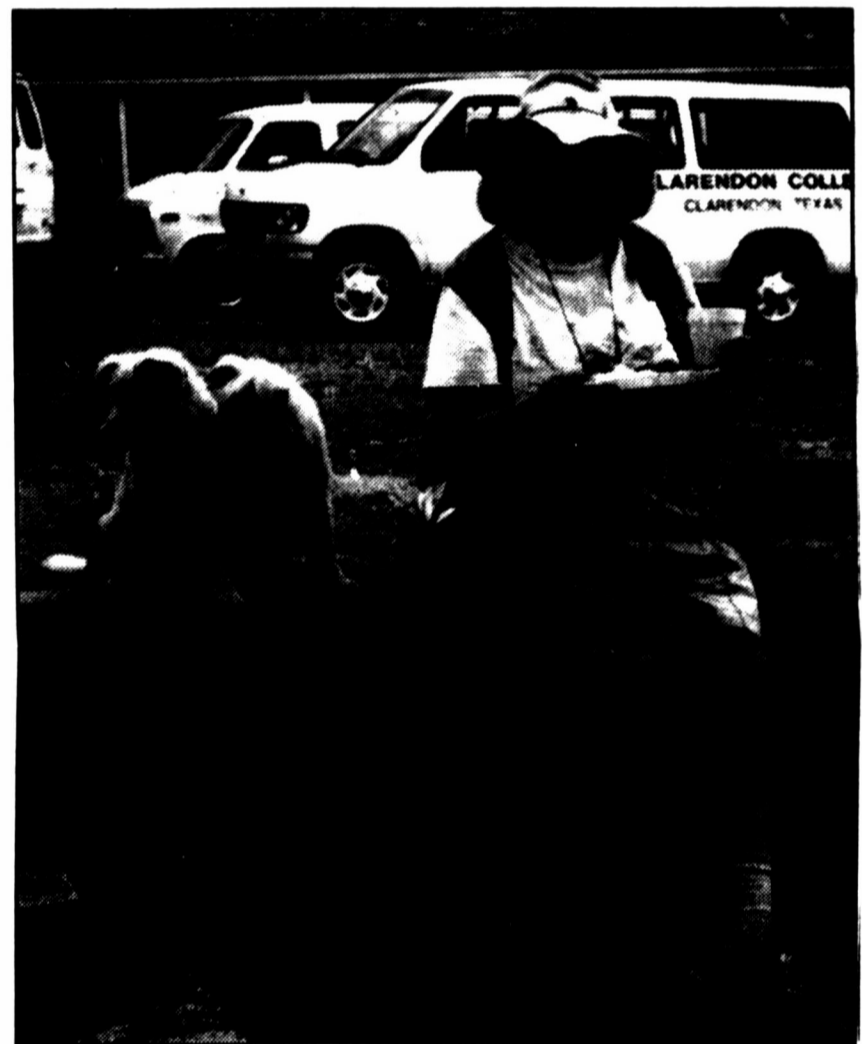

## Public meeting to be held on proposed CHS gymnasium expansion

A public meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 2, at 7:00 p.m. in the Clarendon High School Auditorium providing the public an opportunity to respond to a proposal for an additional gymnasium in the Clarendon Public Schools. Phil Barefield, superintendent, stated that the facility needs of the district have been studied for at least three years. Two years ago, a Facility Needs Committee placed a high priority on providing additional gym space for seating purposes as well as for elementary physical education needs.

Currently, elementary students

must cross a farm-to-market road in order to use the old gymnasium for their classes. This has been a major student hazard. Barefield said the Clarendon Board of Trustees has employed a structural engineer and architecture firm to present possible solutions to this situation. After reviewing the various proposals, the board and administration are recommending that a new gymnasium be constructed by attaching to the north side of the current high school gymnasium and extending north into the north parking lot. This alternative would provide an excellent solution at the lowest cost.

Current proposals call for a stone/metal structure with spectator seating on both sides of the gym floor. It would also include an entrance area with concession and restrooms. The dressing rooms of the current gymnasium would be used for the new gym as well. Costs are estimated in the \$800,000 range. Barefield stated that the district could currently build at this cost without raising taxes. He said that many in the community have expressed much support and excitement about the prospects of having a new facility.

Community members are invited to attend this information meeting to learn more about the gymnasium proposal and to provide their thoughts regarding the proposal.

### Howardwick City Council met recently

The Howardwick City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, June 11, 1996 at 7 p.m., in Howardwick City Hall.

Judge Christal and Ernie Johnston presented the master emergency management plan for the county, with a joint resolution for Ordinance #70 to be signed by the Mayor. At this time, the Mayor and Councilmembers discussed the application for the Co-ordinator for the City of Howardwick. This job was appointed to Millie Dishong.

# Sharp proposes five specific steps to help ease drought burden on state's farmers and ranchers

Austin - State Comptroller John Sharp delivered to state leaders a special economic report on Texas' continuing drought and proposed specific steps the state should take to help farmers and ranchers weather the dry conditions in the coming months.

"The hardworking folks who put food on our tables deserve the full range of available assistance to see them through these trying times," Sharp said.

Sharp called on state officials to insist that the US Department of Agriculture extend the federal Emergency Livestock Feed Program. The program, which provides up to 50 percent of feed costs in time of crisis, is scheduled to end on August 31. In addition, Sharp said, 24 Texas counties dropped from the program on May 31 should be readmitted.

Sharp also announced that the Texas Department of Transportation, at his request, has directed its district engineers to promote their discretionary program allowing farmers and ranchers to cut and bale grass from state right-of-ways.

"The severity of the current drought clearly calls for making a significant effort to inform the agricultural community about this potential source of feed," Sharp said.

Sharp's report notes that the state's cattle raisers have been particularly hard hit by the drought, losing thousands of acres to grass fires fueled by high winds and dry conditions, as well as incurring financial losses by being forced to sell off cattle at a time of low market prices. Sharp also noted that wheat

farmers have been especially affected, with production levels expected to be 24 percent lower than last year.

In addition, Sharp urged state leaders to renew their effort to market the Agricultural Water Conservation Loan Program, a state program that makes funds available for equipment, labor, and other costs to improve water-use efficiency in irrigation systems.

Texas should encourage broader marketing of its Linked Deposit Program, too, Sharp said. The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority has funds available for water conservation loans but lends most of its money to diversify crop production and expand processing.

"These are worthwhile projects during normal times," Sharp said. "But without rain, farmers, and ranchers won't have much to diversify or process, and they deserve to know that there are funds available for water conservation."

Finally, Sharp suggested that the state's Legislative Budget Board consider additional funding for the Small Community Emergency Loan Program administered by the Texas Water Development Board.

"Rural communities and water districts are often the least prepared to handle emergency repairs to overburdened water systems," Sharp said. "Depending on the extent of the drought, more than the \$500,000 currently available may be required."

Earlier this year, Texas A&M predicted that Texas farmers and ranchers could pump \$15 billion into the state's economy during 1996.

"A drought of this magnitude has inevitable economic consequences," Sharp said. "According to the experts at Texas A&M, the total agricultural value this year could fall by as much as \$2.4 billion unless the skies open soon."

"At a time when farmers and ranchers are working hard to improve their production, broaden their markets and keep Texas an agricultural leader around the world, this continuing lack of rain threatens to hit the overall state economy as hard as the peso devaluation."

In December 1994, Mexican officials devalued that country's currency, devastating retail sales along the border and slowing Texas

exports to Mexico.

"Each year, some part of Texas experiences unusually dry conditions," Sharp said. "The difference this year is that the entire state is in a drought."

"That's why we need a statewide response to help pull our agricultural communities through," Sharp said.

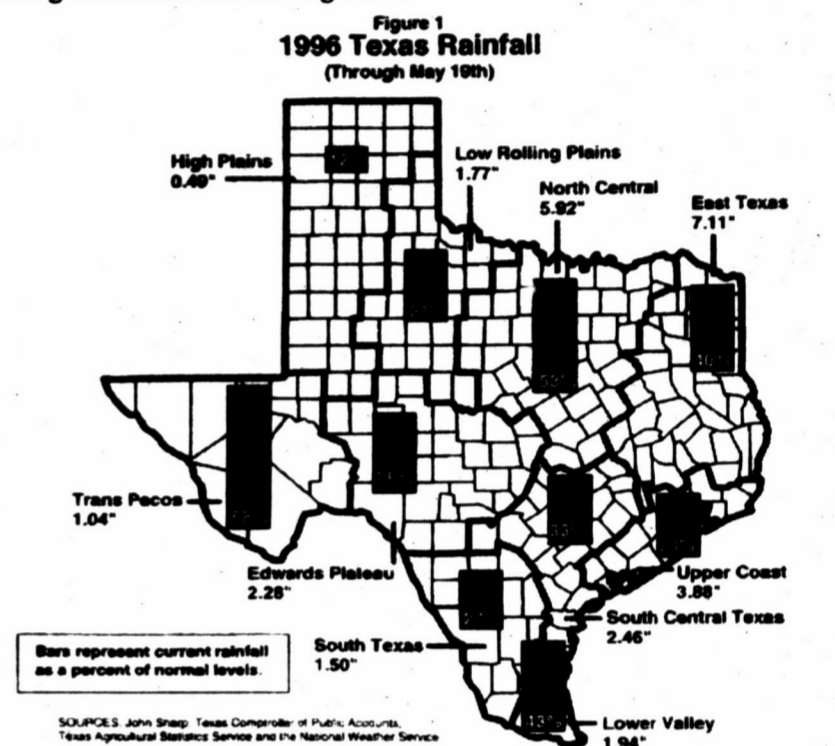

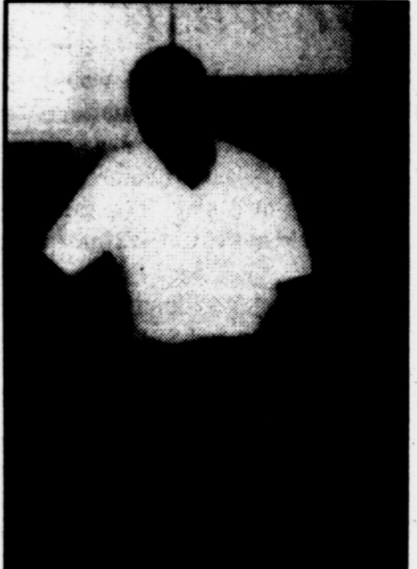

## Southwest Outdoors

### IT'S TIME FOR MR. WHISKERS

While some anglers dedicate their lives to catching one species of game fish no matter the season, other anglers have decided to take advantage of nature's annual cycle and pursue the fish that are most active during each season.

In 1996, we have experienced a strange weather year with an extremely mild winter followed by a lingering spring that saw water temperatures remain in the fifties and sixties as a series of cold fronts blasted their way through our region. The walleye and smallmouth fishing on most Panhandle lakes was excellent from mid-February through early June.

Black bass anglers observed an unusually long spawn that saw a few big females on the nest as early as March, with additional spawning occurring under every full moon until June.

Finally, summertime and seventy degree water temperature arrived, and the easy fishing for walleye, smallmouth bass, largemouth bass, and crappie slowed down to a seasonal norm.

But wait, the easy fishing is still here. It's just switched from bass and walleye to the tasty catfish. Yes, Mr. Whiskers has finally started his nocturnal cruising in the shallow waters.

A boat is nice but certainly not necessary to catch a legal limit of catfish. NOTE: Both channel and blue catfish must be at least 12 inches long with a daily limit of 25, while flathead catfish must be at least 18 inches long and the daily limit is 5.

Best spots for catfish are big shallow flats near a flooded creek channel. Many expert catfish anglers wait until sunset and set out several rods baited with minnows, worms, smelly blood bait, shrimp, or livers. In Texas, anglers are limited to fishing with no more than 100 hooks, so it is not unusual to see one angler with dozens of poles lining a prime catfish feeding flat.

Congratulations to Terry Tips of Fritch for winning the June Fun Fishing Tournament at Lake Greenbelt with a three-bass limit weighing 7.10 lbs. Tipps squeaked out the second place finisher Jim Simpson of Canyon by .01 of a pound, and won \$440 and a nice trophy. Simpson earned \$220 for catching 7.09 lbs. Third place and \$110 went to Berger's Rodney Sweet with a total weight of 5.92 lbs. Most productive bass lures at Greenbelt were chartreuse buzzbaits, blue fleck PowerWorms, and white spinnerbaits worked on the edges of the emerging moss beds.

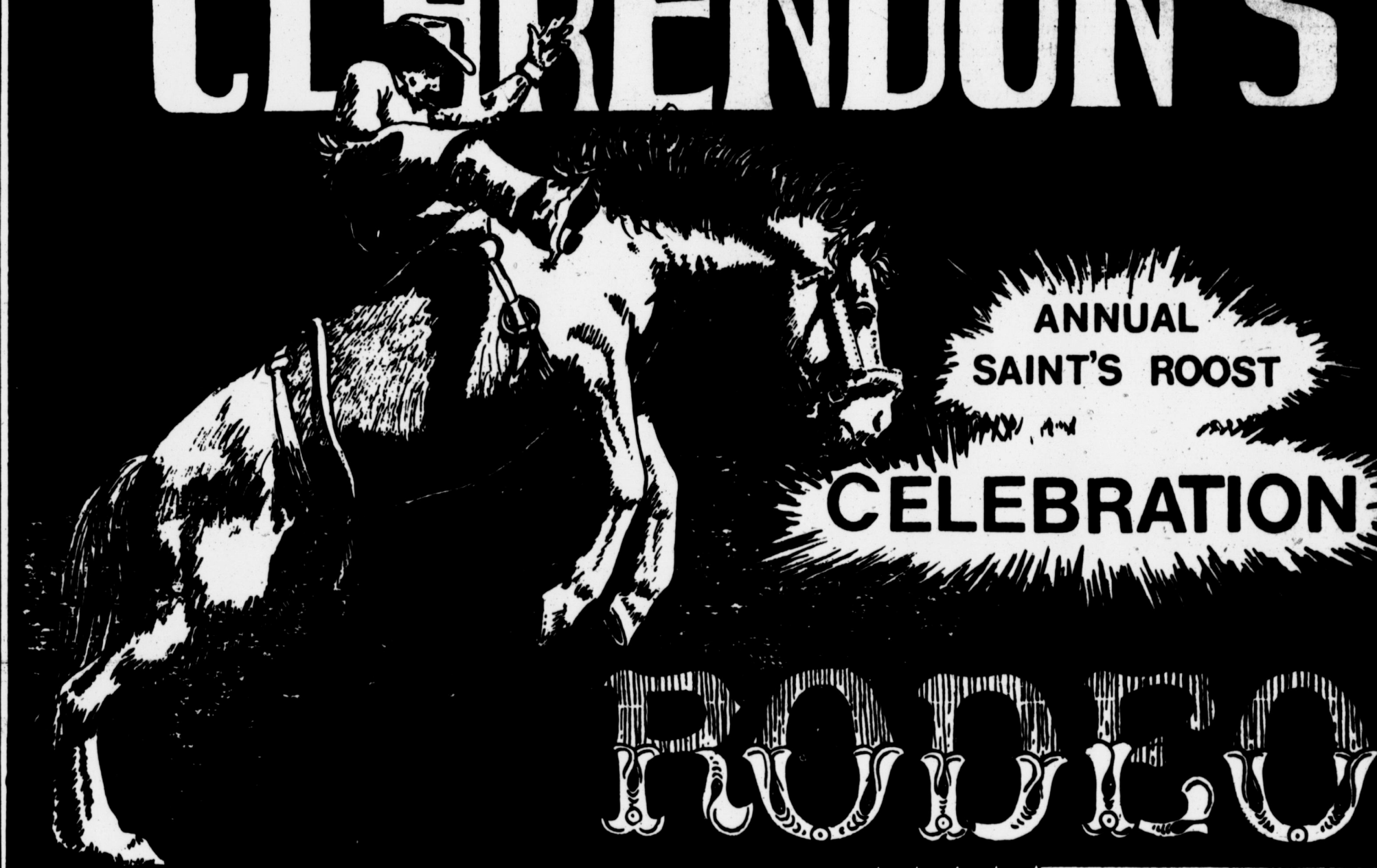

## Aldermen approve ordinance to accept 1/2 cent sales tax

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in a executive session on June 11, 1996, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room of City Hall to accept and approve the following Ordinance for a 1/2 cent sales tax of the May 4, 1996 election.

**ORDINANCE #311**  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, DECLARING AND APPROVING ELECTION RESULTS ON ADOPTION OF AN ADDITIONAL ONE-HALF OF ONE PERCENT SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY OF CLARENDON TO BE USED TO REDUCE THE PROPERTY TAX RATE

WHEREAS, an election was held within the City of Clarendon, Texas, on Saturday, May 4, 1996, at the City Hall of the City of Clarendon, located at 119 S. Sully, Clarendon, Texas; and

WHEREAS, at such election the following proposition was submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Clarendon, Texas, in accordance with law:

**Proposition**  
The adoption of an additional sales and use tax within the city at the rate of one half of one percent (1/2%), to be used to reduce the property tax rate; and

WHEREAS, the total number of votes cast for the proposition was 304; and

WHEREAS, the total number of votes cast against the proposition was 195; and

WHEREAS, the total number of votes by which the proposition was approved was 109.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: An election held on Saturday, May 4, 1996, at the City Hall of the City of Clarendon, Texas, was held in accordance with law and the above quoted proposition was submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Clarendon, Texas.

Section 2: The results of said election are as follows:

A. The total number of votes cast for the proposition was 304.

B. The total number of votes cast against the proposition was 195.

C. The total number of votes by which the proposition was approved was 109.

Section 3: The results of said election are hereby approved, confirmed, and ratified as a part of the official minutes of the City of Clarendon, Texas. It is officially declared that the election on adoption of an additional one-half of one percent sales and use tax within the City of Clarendon to be used to reduce the property tax rate passed.

Section 4: The City Secretary is hereby authorized and instructed to send a certified copy of this ordinance and a map of the City of Clarendon clearly showing the City's boundaries to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts via US certified or registered mail.

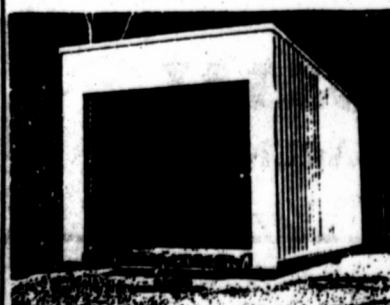
