Campers also learn abou exercise and nutrition, and perhaps
most importantly, they meet other children learning to cope with diabetes.

Summer camps often turn ause of cause of their medical and dietary
needs. But to attend Camp Sweeney, the only requirement is that the child have diabetes. Founded in 1950 by endocrinologist Dr. J. This subject is important because all of us in this part of the country are at greater risk of developing one form of skin cancer or another due to our greater exposure to the sun's rays here in the Southwest.
Diagnosed skin cancer is increasing in frequency with one of every three cancers discovered in this country this year being a cancer of the si in. The projections for 1994 are that some 700,000 new cases of skin cancer

and some 15 percent will be squamous cell carcinomas. Malignant melanoma will account for the remaining 5 percent. Fortunately, all three of these skin cancers responds well to treatment if found early.
Basal cell carcinoma is the most common skin cancer with about 560,000 cases projected in this country for 1994. It is slow growing occurring commonly in areas of chronic sun exposure like the head, neck, and
hands. It rarely spreads to other parts of the body, but, left untreated, it hands. It rarely spreads to other parts of the body, but, left
can spread locally and severely damage surrounding tissuc.
Squamous cell skin cancer will be found in about 100,000 people this year. It also usually develops in areas of chronic sun exposure such as the race, lips, hands, and outer edges of the ears, etc. It is invasive, that is, it
can spread or metastasize to other parts of the body. About 1,000 of the ceople found to have squamous cell skin cancer this year will die from it peopic found to have squamous cesil skin cancer uns year wir cie from in
and it is the damage from the metastases that are usually the cause of death. The third type of skin cancer we will discuss, malignant melanoma, is the least frequently seen, but it is the one with the greatest increase in frequency. In fact, the incidence of malignant melanoma is increasing faster than any other form of cancer in this country. Some 53,000 people will be found with malignant melanoma this year and about 7,000 people will die from it. The incidence of this disease has increased from 1 person in 1,500 to 1 in 100 since 1930 . While this increased incidence is worrisome, it appears that a large part of the cause is related to our increased exposure

Texas Supreme Court Clarifies Hunting Lease Waivers
College Station - Landowners who lease their land for hunting often obtain waivers to minimize their liability. Recent rulings by the Texas
Supreme Court have clarified what a waiver should contain. Supreme Court have clarified what a waiver should contain.
"A waiver is defined as the intentional relinquishment of a known right," says Judon Fambrough, attorney with the Real Estate Center at Texas A\&M University and author of The Texas Deer Lease.
"To be effective, the release provision must be based on
"To be effective, the release provision must be based on an offer and acceptance wher
Fambrough. "For example, parents cannot release in advance a minor's right to recover for personal injuries caused by the negligence of another." Likewise, the agreement for release must be based on consideration, but it need not be monetary. An agreement not to sue in exchange for hunting rights may be sufficient.

Recently, the Texas Supreme Court added three requirements for an effective waiver agreement. First, there must be a statement in which the hunter expressly releases the landowner from any acts arising "from the landowner's negligence."

Second, the written contract must give the hunter fair notice of the release provision. The fair-notice principle focuses on the appearance and placement of the provision, not its content.
"The fair-notice requirement is not necessary if the landowner can prove the hu

Third, the release provisions must be conspicuous. The element of "consciousness" is tied to the "fair-notice" requirement.
"Basically, the release provision must be conspicuous enough to give the hunter fair notice of its existence," says Fambrough. "What is con-
spicuous? There's no real answer" spicuous? There's no real answer."

Fambrough suggests several ways to make a provision conspicuous. These include emphasizing entire paragraphs, not just a portion; placing provision at the beginning or end of the contract on a separate sheet of
paper; use of italicized headings and having hunter initial the waiver paragraph if it is part of the contract or to sign the page if it is a separate sheet.

"Unpredictable" Sums Up Spring Weather Pattern
Trying to chart the spring 1995 weather is like ures and moisture fluctuated which dramatically affected cotton germination and early season growth. "ay" says Terry Wheeler Ph D, associate profes sor of plant pathology at Texas A\&M's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock. "Soil emperatures were as low as 57 degrees and rarely reached 68. Seedling diseases often are severe when soil temperatures are less than 68 ."

A warming trend in late April was quickly erased, says Kater Hake, Extension cotton agronomist at Texa "Maywas the

May was the critical month," Hake says. "As we went into May, the first few days were fairly the soil temperature dropped to the same temperature as the water."

By the end of the first week of May, soil temperatures were 60 degrees at 8 inches and 50 degrees at 2 inches, Hake says. The second week, temperatures rebounded by about 15 degrees at 8 inches. It rained again the third week, and heavy rain the fourth week dropped temperatures
degrees at 8 inches by the end of the month.

If the seed absorbs cold water during the first ew hours after planting, chilling injury can occur and damage young seedlings.
"To summarize, we had an awfully cool spring and accumulated heat units very slowly," says Norm Hopper, Ph.D., associated professor of seed physiology at Texas Tech University and Texas A\&M's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.
