## States Tighten Livestock Entry Requirements

$\mathbf{O}_{\text {n }}^{\text {Friday, July 21, the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) reported the state's first case of Vesicular }}$ orthwest of Abilene. livestock on 1127 premises now are under quarantine. Arizona has one case, and Colorado has four premise quarantined, all due to infection in horses.
"With a laboratory confirmed case in Texas, many other states will add extra health restrictions on livestock from Texas." said Dr. Max Coats, state epidemiologist for the TAHC, the state's livestock health regulatory agency. Most states will require a certificate of veterinary inspection (health paper) for the animal, with a written statemen rom the veterinarian that the animal haven't been exposed to Vesicular Stomatitis, or been on or within 10 miles of an infected premise within the past 30 days.

For several weeks, TAHC inspectors have been working at inspection sites on roads in West Texas to check incoming livestock and health papers and are assisting show, fair, and rodeo officials with livestock inspection. Dr here quarantined infected premises and restricted animal of and there qu

${ }^{\text {Vadius. }}$ Vesicular Stomatitis can affect horses, cattle, sheep, goats, and deer, causing blisters in and around the animals' mouths, on their tongues, hooves, and teats. When the blisters break, large sections of skin slough, leaving painful open lesions. The animals become lave and unable to eat or drink until healing begins. Infection lasts animals usually display symptoms animals usually display symptoms To prevent the spread of infection, affected livestock must remain under quarantine until 30 days after their last lesion has healed.
"The infected horse in Fisher County apparently was exposed to the virus at an out-of-state event by an infected and contagious horse that was not yet showing symptoms," aid Dr. Coats. "The

## Panhandle Ground Water District Board Meets

$\mathbf{A}^{\text {t the Board of Directors' meeting on August 2, 1995, Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District }}$ considered an application for Permit to Transport Water from QUIXX Corporation/Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. QUIXX/CRMWA had requested up to 65,000 acre-feet of water per year. The permit conditions, from the proposed Roberts County well field. Under unusual or emergency conditions, the permit will allow up to 45,000 acre-feet per year, calculated as three-year rolling average.
The Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA) proposes to buy water rights on 42,765 acres in Roberts and Hutchinson counties from QUIXX Corporation, a subsidiary of Southwestern Public Service
Company. Plans are to drill wells, build a new aqueduct and mix the water from these counties with water fity Company. Plans are to drill wells, build a new aqueduct and mix the water from these counties with water from Lake Meredith. Ultimately, the water would be used to improve water quality and quantity for the authority's
eleven member cities. Under conditions

Under conditions of the permit, the permittee must establish a network of five monitoring wells and provide the District with information from these wells quarterly, they must not drill any wells closer than one-half mile from the perimeter boundary of the well field within the District, and they must provide water conservation and drought drought management plans mustes, and for the member cities receiving the water. These water conservation and Development Board. Also, groundwater to meet the needs of CRMWA's member cities' total water demands and the requirements of state and federal drinking water standards.

This permit will be issued subject to the rules of the District and to the Continuing right of the District to
ervise and regulate the depletion of the aquifer within the Districts boundaries supervise and regulate the depletion of the aquifer within the District's boundaries.

The Board also considered an application for Permit to Transport Water from the city of Amarillo. Amarillo's applications requested 2,645 acre-feet of water annually. The permil granted by che Board will allow County, Texas.

This water will be used as additional municipal supply for the city of Amarillo.
Under the conditions of this permit, the City wili implement a water conserving rate structure and file and TWDB. They will also furnish the District annual water level measurements for each producing well and by the of any results of chemical analysis, water quality, or hydrologic conditions regarding the well field.

In addition, when water becomes available from the CRMWA Roberts County project, the City must use its best efforts to reduce the total permitted amount of its groundwater production from the Carson County Well Field by up to 35 percent.

 George was the one who hired the honsehold staff$H^{\text {ow }}$ many umes have you seen the wife of the United States President oatelevision or read about her in various publications? Her appearances are taken for granted, but obviously, it wasn't always that way.
in her book, First Ladies, author, Betty Boyd Caroli has related "an intimate look at how 36 women (from Martha Washington to Nancy Reagan) handled what may be the most demanding, unpaid, unelected job in America." She interestingly conveys the story of how the role of our nation's First Lady evolved from only a
ceremonial situation to prominence as a public world figure. ceremonial situation to prominence as a public world figure.

As Martha Washington stepped acertainty surrunding the new in Manhatian that May morning in 1789 with her husband, there was included the first purrounding the new government's activity. The ritual, ceremomial aspects of the presidency
there were few. Martha, content to play the hostess role was nev seliccted guest lists for social functions of which a gracious lady, regardless of her husband's title, return all calls of women who left calling cards (there was profuse curiosity concerning the First Family), so Mrs. Washington resolved to return each visit within three days. She displayed a character of meekness, and never involved herself in political debates of the day.

Martha's successor, Abigail Adams, with a sharp toaguc and strong vicws, was quite oppositc. Accused of playing politics, she stepped beyond the proper bounds for women. Her husband, John discussed many important problems with her. When some, in favor of opinionated women, desired the President's approval, they occasionally went to his wife first.

Even though a few of the First Ladies were outspoken through the early nineteenth century, most lived a domestic role. Some of them made themselves nearly invisible in Washington, pleading poor health and often sending substitutes to preside over social gatherings. Not so with lovely popular Washington hostess, Dolley helped widowed Thomas Jefferson entertain during his Presidential term. During her husband's two terms, she demonstrated "uncanny ability to use social occasions to his political advantage," after which, she continued to unofficially tutor young White House hostesses. Incidentally, she introduced ice cream to America. Aren't we glad?
Around 1861, Mary Lincoln, Sarah Polk, and Julia Grant instigated a turning point when they willingly obliged reporters and photographers with information and pictures.

At the beginning of the twentieth century, evidence showed that the First Lady's job was changing. They gradually began to hire separate staffs, become more involved in public policy, and lead important reform movements.
After Woodrow Wilson's stroke during his 1915-1921 administration, his wiff, Edifich controlled flow of communication between him and Eleanor Roosevelt and Bess Truman were named among the most owerful people in Washington. Until well into the twentieth century women's campaigning was considered inappropriate, but Rosalyn Carter went off on her own in a quest for Jimmy's votes fourteen months before the 1976 nomination.

Hair-dos of early president's wives never made the Colonial Gazette, but I'm sure there are readers of this article who haven't forgotten the
dominance of Mamic Eisenhower's bangs in beauty salons during Ike's ominance of Mamie Eisenhow
dministration during the 1950's.

Q. Is retention in the same grade advisable for any child, other than the late bloomer? How about the slow learner?
A. There are some students who profit from a second year in guideline regarding failure to whom something will be different next year. A child who is sick for seven months in one academic year might profit from another runthrough when he is healthy. And again, the late bloomer should be held back in kindergarten (or the first grade at the latest) to place him wilh younglers of comparable development.

For the slow learner, however, no was failing the fourth grade in June, grade in September. It is not often realized that the curricular content of each grade level is very similar to the year before and the year after. The same concepts are taught year after year, the students in each grade are taken a little farther, but much of the time is spent in review. The arithmetical methods of
addition and subtraction, for example, are taught in the primary years, but considerable work is done on these tasks in the sixth

## Parents Can Get Children Back Into Routine

Temple, TX- For children the difference between summer vacation and school days is like comparing Teras to get their school-aged child back on a regular routine after two and a half months of staying up, sleepping late, Lo get their schooi-aged chis
and dodging school books.

So, how can a parent re-establish routines after the summer slack?
Constance J. Paurnier, PhD, a psychologist in the Soott \& White Division of Child and Adolescent Mental Health, advises parents to plan ahead by establishing routines, staging a practice run-through before school starts and keeping the lines of communication open between children and teachers. Dr. Fournier is also assistant professor with the Texas A\&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine.

Scott \& White Memorinh Hospital and Clinic is one of the nation's largest medial centers, with more than 440 physicians. Scott \& White's mission is to deliver high-quality, comprehensive, personalized heallth care eahanced by education and rescarch. The institution consists of the main site in Temple, and 14 regional clinics situated throughout Central Texass, including Bellmead, Belton, Brownwood, College Station, Gatesvill, Hewitt, Killeen, McGregor, Moody, Round Rock, Taylor, and Waco.
"Parents heve to help tha
nes to get their syted pheir children adjust; parents have to move their children's schedule back a few time pones to get heir systems ready for school time," she said. To get youngsters back on track, Dr. Fournier advises children to adjust to the schedule change by setting firm times for bedtime schedules and routines. The more children are on a schedule, the better off they are," she said. "Setting a regular routine before school starts help gets their bodics attuned to the schedule."

What time should a child go to bed? "That depends on the child's age and the child's individual needs. The parent is the best judge," Dr. Fournier said. "If you have any doubts about how much sleep your child needs, talk to your child's doctor."

Every younsster has a repertoire of stalling tactics to push bedtime: A drink of water, one more story, an interesting television show. Be fir on weckdays and flexible on the weckends, said Dr. Fournier. Thanks to the
miracle of video recorders, a child' favorite show can be taped and viewed at another time niracle of video recorders, a child' favorite show can be taped and viewed at another time.

Parents and children need to renegotiate routines each year. What worked last year may be obsolete this year. "For example, routines change as a child gets older. Older students or teenagers may want to spend more time in front of a mirror for such activities as fixing their hair. This becomes important at certain ages. So, make
sure the child wakes up a few minutes earlier to allow eatra time before the mirror ${ }^{n}$ she said sure the child wakes up a
Visting the school

Dr. Fournier also advises parents to arrange a visit to the school before the start of the school year. This is especially beneficial for kindergartners or first graders heading to school for the first time, or when children are danscroomes on wew schools. "If possible, arrange a visit with school officials so that your child can learn where ne are," she said.

Builiding a team wiah the teacher
Dr. Fournier, a former school teacher, encourages parents to meet early in the year with the child's teacher. "Parents usually meet the teacher on the first dy of school, but that's an extremely hectic day," she said. Instead, parents should arrange to meet or telephone the teacher during conference period, when the teacher is free for phone calls or a visit.
"This first meeting may be intimidating at first for some parents, but remember teachers teach because they ceally enjoy children. They want your child to have a good education. That's what they are there for," she added. Parents should ask what they can do to help their child and the teacher. "They are team members in the
childs education" Dr Fournier said "Some parents may have fexible time during the dey to child's education, Dr. Fournier said. "Some parents may have flexibile time during the day to help during school a parent could offer to cut out or gather pictures for bulletin board displays arrange to provide cookies for shool events or volunteer for weckend work sessions such as cleaning up the school years." This week we will look at the various problems that can arise from the bites of dogs and cats.
There are 52 million dogs, and 55 million cats in peoples homes in this country. Some 4 million people cost of treating people for the

Lets look at the potential consequences to us of the bites of these animals. Dog bites occur more frequently to males, and most frequently involve the extremities, except in children who tend to be bitten more frequenth does the biting or scratching. Eighty to ninety percent of the bites that occur are serious enought to require medical care. Bites can cause immediate injury in terms of damage to skin, blood vessels, bone, nerves, joints, and occasionally, internal organs. Puncture wound bites are the most likely to become infected because of the favorable setting for bacteria introduced by the bite to grow in the wound. Bites of the hand are particularly risky in terms of risk of damage to tendons and joints. Cat bites are usually of the puncture variety with dog bites being either puncture or tearing in form.

The cat puncture bite that is deep enough to reach bone is more likely to cause bone infection (osteomyelitis) because of the type of bacteria found in the cat's mouth. It is generally well recognized that dogs and cats can major source of rabies infection due to inadequate rabies immunization of the dogs. Eighty-five percent of the cases of rabies that do occur in this country arise from the bites of wildife. The sites of a bite by a rabid animal makes a difference with bites on the head and face being statistically more likely to result in clinical rabies than bites of the extremities. This is important because of the greater tendency for children to be bitten about the face which puts them at greater risk.

Dog bites can also transmit tetanus and it is important that a person whose tetanus immunization is not current, and who sustains a dog bit, should be sure to have their tetanus immunization updated. Tetanus is a particular concern for adults because seventy percent of the cases of tetanus in this country occur in people ove 0 years old, as a result of incomplete immunization.

Cat bites and scratches can cause tularemia and cat scratch disease. Cats acquire the tularemia organism in the course of hunting and feeding on infected animals. Dogs don't transmit the tularemia organism by their bites each year. The organism that causes this disease has only recently been successfully identified and it causes an illness in humans that appears as a persistent unilateral or solitary enlargement of lymph nodes. This presentation frequently seen in children, is a source of concern until more serious potential causes of enlarge lymph nodes are ruled out.
