County Agent Warns Against Grasshopper Infestation

Now is the time to watch for the hatch of young grasshoppers says county agent H. M. Breedlove. Recent rains and then hot weather will make for ideal conditions for the hatch. It is hard to tell at this time just how severe the infestations might be this year but a close watch and early poisoning is a good safeguard against a serious outbreak. Most likely places for the hoppers to hatch are in low places where water has stood and where there is a great deal of vegetation, along fence rows and in pastures. The hoppers will hatch in bed areas and this is the place to poison them while they are concentrated on the hatch area and are small and before they start to leave the hatch area. Good poisons for the grasshoppers is aldrin and toxaphene. The instructions for the mixture of poison is on the container. If you need any help on insect problems call by the county agent's office.

23, at 2:30 p.m. at the Soil Conservation Service offices in Clarendon. The purpose of the meeting was to determine the present land uses by acreage and the needed and expected land use changes by 1975.

Conservation needs estimates are utilized both in the day-to-day operations as well as the long-time program objective in all soil conservation activities. They serve as a basis for developing goals as well as a yardstick to periodically measure the rate of conservation accomplishments.

All agricultural agencies and local organizations and individuals interested in agriculture are presently making an inventory of the conservation needs in Donley County.

A meeting was held on April

This inventory is being carried out on a nationwide scale. It will be consolidated into state and then a national report. A figure will then be available as to what we will have and need by 1975. The report is to be realistic and will be kept current. Local customs and habits and agricultural trends as well as research and experience serve as a background to reflect needs.

Another meeting to further develop this analysis will be announced next month.

Those making up the Conservation Needs Committee for Donley County are the Board of Supervisors of the Donley County Soil Conservation District, the ASC County Committee, the County Extension Service Agent, Vocational Agriculture Department of the public school, the County Farmers Home Administration supervisor, the head of the Soil Conservation Service office, the ASC county office manager, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Research Coordinator for West Texas, and the local game warden. Anyone else interested in helping with the inventory is welcome.

Keep Tab On Farm Costs Keeping close tab on money spent running a farm and farm home and getting a large part of the family food from the farm itself are marks of efficient farming.

Besides lending money to farm families, Mr. Gouley said, his agency helps them with farm and home planning problems and supplies technical aids in farm and home management so they can make the most of their land and family labor resources and pay their debts.

Farm families are consumers as well as producers, he said, and families with Farmers Home Administration loans call on the supervisor for aid in planning expenditures. He helps them get started on keeping farm records, and those records usually show that family living items can easily amount to one-fourth of the gross farm income.

A good farm garden, when feasible, is an essential part of every farm and home plan for the family that is seriously trying to save money, make the best of opportunities, and repay debts he added. He pointed to butchering home meat supplies, producing their own milk and eggs, and proper conservation of all home produced food as being among other factors in efficient farm and home planning.

He said a good garden can save a family anywhere from \$100 to \$500 a year. FHA makes loans to farm families to improve their farming operations, or to buy, improve, develop, or enlarge their farms, and under certain conditions, to meet emergency needs. The loans do not compete with commercial or cooperative credit but it supplements other lenders' services by providing credit to farmers whose credit needs cannot be met from other sources.

These families are helped to improve their farming and farm income to the point where they can graduate to the use of regular credit sources.

FARM NEWS

From the County ASC Committee

ASC Head Announces New Farm Definition

A new definition of a farm, which is uniform throughout the country for purposes of the acreage allotment and soil bank programs, takes effect this year, according to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The new definition, the committee said, places emphasis on farm operation. In general, a farm is defined as:

1. All adjoining or nearby and accessible farm, wood, or rangeland under the same ownership which is operated by the same person; and

2. All additional farm, wood, or rangeland under different ownership which is operated by

that same person provided it is nearby and easily accessible, is approximately equally productive, and has been operated as part of the farm for the past two years or will be so operated for two years in the future.

Under this definition, the operator of a farm means the person who is in charge of the supervision and conduct of the farming operations.

To be considered easily accessible and nearby, tracts of land should be close enough together so that farm labor is or could be freely interchanged and machinery could be moved between them under its own power during farm operations.

Tracts under different ownerships will not be combined, the committee said, where one is primarily irrigated land and the other is primarily non-irrigated or where the tracts differ so widely in productivity that crop allotments likely would be shifted from one tract to the other.

Any land which was properly identified as a "farm" under previous definition will continue to be classed as a farm until a change in operating arrangements occurs. If a change is necessary, the new definition will be used in all cases.

Farmers or others interested in farm real estate who have questions about applications of the new farm definition may get detailed information at the county ASC office.

Participants in the Soil Bank program are reminded that they must not plant crops for harvest in excess of their permitted acreage. If there are any questions concerning your permitted acres, come by the ASC office for further information.

MOSS AWARDED TROPHY FOR ACHIEVEMENT BY REXALL

Bob Moss, owner of Bob Moss Pharmacy, Clarendon, Texas, is one of a selected group of Rexall druggists to receive the new Mortar and Pestle Trophy, presented by the Rexall Drug Company as an annual award to outstanding member druggists.

The award is an authentic replica of a mortar and pestle dating back to Germany in the 17th century. It was presented May 1st by Rexall Representative J. C. Gosch, Jr., at the Rexall store here.

The historical mortar and pestle, still an important implement in the druggist's profession, is an ancient symbol of pharmacy. Its use for pulverizing medicinal herbs is recorded in the histories of ancient Egyptians, Hebrews of Biblical times and the Roman era.

The 1958 trophy award has a flaring neck inscribed "Gott Alein Die Ehr"—Honor to God Alone. The two top handles are made with the design of dolphins, which denote diligence or swiftness, sometimes used on the bronze cannon of that era.

Antique mortars and pestles with distinctive characteristics are widely sought by collectors, often bringing as much as \$2,500 and more for an unusual specimen.

The Rexall replica of this prized antique is mounted on a black walnut pedestal with a plaque inscribed with Mr. Bob Moss's store name, and signed by John Bowles, president of the company's Rexall Division. It is on display at the store's prescriptions department.

Donley County Included In Screwworm Program

Livestock producers of the southwest should be interested in a recent U. S. Department of Agriculture announcement which said that coordinated field studies of the screwworm have been organized by Mexico and the United States. The joint effort is part of the Mexican-U. S. program of cooperation discussed by the Presidents of the two countries in their meeting in Acapulco, Mexico last February.

Personnel assigned by USDA's Agricultural Research Service are working with Mexico and the states of Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona and California, to learn more about the habits of the screwworm fly, and to determine if the method of combatting the screwworm, now being used in southeastern states, can be applied in Mexico and the southwest. County Agent H. M. Bredlove says that Donley County has been surveyed and will be included in the program of control.

This method involves use of radioactive cobalt to make laboratory-reared screwworm male flies sterile. When sterile male flies are released in large numbers over infested areas they mate with the native flies and thereby prevent them from producing fertile eggs. The program in the

southeast has been underway for about a year and has resulted in less than 100 cases where normally thousands of cases are reported each month in warm weather.

The survey will serve to determine where the screwworm overwinters in the southwest and Mexico and how terrain and climate or other natural factors affect the habits of the fly. Too, information on the numbers and kinds of animals attacked and the relative abundance of infestations during each season will be obtained.

The information collected will be correlated with topography and climate to reveal any pattern of the fly's habits that will make it susceptible to the sterile fly method.
