### day at Harian's Flowers Fire Department Beneficiary of Fire Aid

The Howardwick Volunteer Fire Department recently qualified for a free 1 1/2 ton flatbed truck and two 600 gallon tanks. The equipment aid came through the **Rural Community Fire Protection** (RCFP) program, a federal-state cooperatively funded program administered by the Texas Forest Service. The department's latest equipment was acquired by the state forest resource and rural firefighting agency as Federal Excess Personal Property equipment and transferred to the rural fire department at no cost.

Other types of free equipment may be available to rural firefighting organizations, depending on the equipment that has been released through the excess property program.

Fifty percent cost-sharing aid, up to \$5,000, is also available to qualified departments towards the purchase of trucks and slip- on pumping units. County or multicounty radio systems also may qualify for \$5,000 in cost-sharing and through the cooperative fire program. In addition the rural fie protection program cost- shares the purchase of dry hydrants, which can provide water sources for rural firefighting efforts.

Aid requests from fire departments greatly outnumber the number of vehicles and the amount of cost-sharing aid available, so equipment and funding is made available on a prioritized

Over 3,100 trucks, slip-on pumping units, dry hydrants and other fire apparatus have been placed with rural fire departments and firefighting associations with cooperative fire program aid since the program's inception in 1973. Early this year rural fire department purchases of discout-priced firefighter clothing, tools and water handling accessories through the state forestry agency's Fire Safe program topped the \$2 million mark. Over \$500,000 worth of Fire Safe items were purchased by rural fire departments within the last 12 months alone, a new agency record.

# Austree, A Tree **For all Reasons**

The Austree is an excellent tree for windbreaks, hedges, shelterbelts, snow fences, noise an dust barriers, shade trees, general landscaping, wildlife habitat, erosion control, and privacy screens. The Austree naturally grows in a dense formation, however, it can easily be pruned for a shade tree. No pruning should be necessary for the first season. In the spring of the second season, simply find the tallest and straightest main leader. Cut all other limbs at ground level and discard. You can prune all small branches from the ground up, about 1/3 of the height of the trees. For example, if you have a six foot main leader, you could prune all lower branches up to two feet.

Austrees are a very fast growing tree. They usually grow 8-10 feet in the first year. The Austree will top out at 50 to 70 feet depending on soil, weather, and water con-

# **Pathfinder Club Enjoys Guest Day**


