The most important hunting season is the quail season. Donley County hunters may kill more quail during the regular season than has ben permitted for many years.

According to a recent proclamation by the Texas Game and Fish Commission, the daily bag limit for wild quail will be 15, and not more than 45 during any period of seven days. Prior to this, the limit was 12 per day.

The open season for quail has been set from Dec. 1, 1959, to January 16, 1960, both days inclusive. These dates were announced to clarify rumors and published information which pointed to an earlier date this year. A proposal was made during the summer drouth to extend the hunting season on quail. Since the rains, it has been definitely set for the 32-county area of the Panhandle, which includes Donley County, as stated above

INDOOR 'COPTER-This helicopter flight simulator is being used by the Army-Navy Instrumentation Program's project human engineers to evaluate new controls and instruments before installation in research helicopters. Capable of reproducing all motions, sounds and vibration of most helicopters under laboratory controlled conditions, engineers monitor tests from control panel at left while the pilot "flies blind" in enclosed cockpit at upper right. Moving platform was designed by Franklin Institute of Philadelphia. Bell Helicopter of Forth Worth, Tex., designed and built the generator, cockpit and controls.



OUT IN SECONDS-Firemen at Fort Belvoir, Va., where the new chemical compound was developed, use "monobromotrifluromethane" to extinguish a fire. Considered twice as effective as any other extinguishing agent against liquid fuel and electrical fires, the compound has been adopted for emergency uses by the Army.

Mixed with helium or nitrogen it will create a combustion-free atmosphere for dangerous jobs. It can be used in temperatures of minus 65 degrees, particularly useful in the Arctic where fire is a crucial problem. Non-toxic and non-corrosive, it can be safely used in homes.
