





The Congress recently passed another measure that would help the Postmaster General in holding these publications which appear to him to be obscene, lascivious, lewd or fraudulent. All Americans believe in freedom of speech and freedom of the press, but they do not believe such freedoms give filthy-minded people a license to circulate literature conceived by

"fire" in a crowded theater. It is difficult to conceive a worse crime than to contaminate the mind of the youth. Every effort should be made on a Federal, State, and local level to rid this country of the literature which is contributing to the juvenile delinquency problem and to rid this country of those who are responsible for the circulation of that literature. I say "hurrah" for Postmaster General Summerfield, and more power

THE VETO

President Eisenhower suffered his first setback at the hands of the Congress when his veto of the Public Works appropriations bill was overridden by the Congress. The vote in the House was 280 to 121. The vote in the Senate was 72 to 23. Under the Constitution, a two-thirds majority is required to override a Presidential veto. President Eisenhower had successfully vetoed 145 measures without one having been overridden. However, he pushed his luck too far on the last bill. The fact is that this bill was approximately \$100,000 below the budget estimate furnished the Congress by the President and his Budget Bureau. The fuss between the President and the Congress was a difference of opinion as to which projects should be commenced and where the money should be spent. 

#### Soil Bank Regulations Eased

With the deadline nearing for farmers who are interested in the 1960 conservation reserve, Mr. Cooke, Chairman of the Donley ASC County Committee, an-nounced two changes in Soil Bank regulations that should make farmers eligible to partici-

One change affects situations where a tenant leaves the farm voluntarily and the owner takes over the operations. The other covers situations where land has been lost for public use under eminent domain procedures. The new provision permits a contract with a land owner where a tenant leaves the farm voluntarily and the owner finds it necessary to take over the operation. In such a case, a conservation reserve contract for non-tenant operation may be entered into for 1960 provided it can be established definitely that the tenant left the farm of his own accord. This may be proved either through a statement signed by the tenant or sharecropper or, if he is not available, through statements signed by three disinterested Everybody's Business
