State Economy Good: Donley County, Too.

According to the latest figures from the State Comptroller's office, the Texas economy is improving. And Donley County's retail sales are up, too.

"For the eleventh consecutive month, employment in Texas has increased by three percent of more, and consumer confidence remains strong," John Sharp said.

This month's (August's) payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and quarterly filers for April, May June and reported to the Comptroller in July.

The State's sales tax receipts were up 9.07 percent compared to August of last year, and up 10.58 percent compared to last year's Year-to-Date figures.

Donley County's figures were up 9.27 percent for August and up 7.44 percent for the Year-to-Date.

Clarendon climbed 10.77 and 6.95 percent. Hedley improved 30.06 percent for August but only 1.96 for the YTD. Howardwick was off -19.56 percent for the month, but still managed a gain of 14.63 for the Year-to-Date figure.

Armstrong County soared by 35.16 percent for the month, but only racked up 7.45 YTD. Briscoe County accumulated positive figures both periods, 9.81 and 3.01 respectively. Carson County's sales grew by 6.24 and 2.36, inspite of negative numbers from White Deer. Panhandle helped that county's average with 10.43 and 6.09.

Childress County grew by 8.91 and 6.77 percent, but Collingsworth County did not fare so well. Wellington built only a .82 percent over last August, but declined by 2.54 for the longer period.

Hall County's figures were skewed by a sales tax increase in Memphis. Estelline slid down -11.60 for the month, but was up 8.08 percent for the YTD. Lakeview's economy improved by 38.61 and 20.63 percent. Turkey sank by -11.66 and -1.90.

Quanah pulled Hardeman County up. County figures were +52.20 and +49.27. Chillicothe deteriorated -12.28 for the month but still managed a positive 9.82 for the YTD. Quanah gained 61.73 and 55.47. That appears to be one of the best performances in the state.

Hemphill (Canadian) sagged -3.52 and -1.01 percent, but that was better than Kent County (Jayton) which was ill to the tune of -41.79 percent and -21.09 percent.

Motley County had a motley economy, -15.21 and -17.99. Matador did manage an improvement of 4.10 percent for the month, but subsided by -1.34 for the YTD. Roaring Springs dropped -37.21 and -31.34.

Amarillo turned in more encouraging figures. Potter County: +11.00 percent and +10.98. Randall County: +12.76 and +5.32 percent.

Roberts County suffered in August by -6.81 percent, but still grew by 2.71 percent in retail sales for the Year-to-Date.

Every large city in Texas was up on both figures. There does not seem to be any pattern to rural communities, either by region or by economic base. Most rural counties posted gains; a few declined.

Athletic Attendance Policy Announced For Students

In order to provide a safer, more responsible situation at athletic events in the district, Clarendon CISD announced the following policy for students attending athletic events this year.

Students in Grade 6 and below must be accompanied by a parent, guardian, or responsible adult to attend athletic events at Clarendon CISD. Students must be accompanied by a responsible adult when leaving an athletic event. Otherwise, the student must pay an admission charge to return to the event.

Student spectators that are expelled from an athletic event may not attend other events in that same sport for the remainder of the season. The district asks for the cooperation of the students and parents in making attendance at athletic events a safe, enjoyable experience for everyone.

Noted Veterinarian to Speak at Regional Cattle Seminar

Charles E. Deyhle, Jr., DVM, Deyhle Veterinary Services, Clarendon, Texas, will be a featured speaker at an upcoming seminar titled "Managing Pasture Cattle for Maximum Profit." He will be speaking on the new Texas A&M Value added calf Management program. This special A&M program was developed to help ensure production of a high quality beef product and, ultimately, profitability for cattle producers.

A member of the team that developed this program, Dr. Deyhle will review the proper management techniques to use before shipping calves to the feedyard. He will provide an overview of preshipment procedures proven to improve return in fed cattle.

The seminar, which is free and open to cow/calf and stocker producers throughout the region, is sponsored by Roche Animal Nutrition and Health. In addition to Dr. Deyhle, four other speakers will make presentations at the event which is scheduled for August 29, 1994, between 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo.

Dr. Matthew Cravey, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will review the most recent results of the "Ranch to Rail" study. Mr. Jim McAdams, Spade Ranches, will present an overview of the "Standardized Performance Analysis (SPA)" programs developed by the national Cattlemen's Association. Mr. Don McCasland, Wheeler Feed Yard, will focus on successful risk management approaches and Mr. Bill Weatherly, Nutrition Service Associates, will address the need for pasture nutrition programs.

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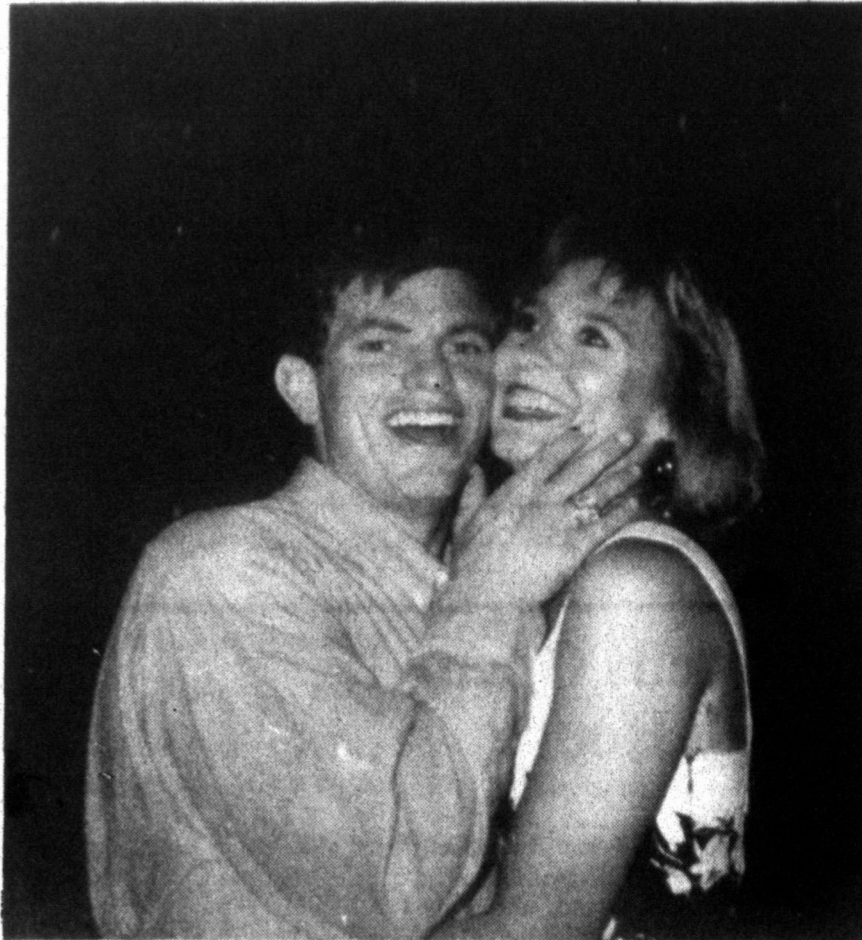

In either case, Louis L'Amour may be one of the first names that comes to mind when you're looking for good western writing. You'll be pleased to know that Burton Memorial Library has all of his books which number over 100. This outstanding western collection was donated to the library by Cleo Russell. Thanks, Cleo, for providing so much western excitement for our community's readers from one of the world's best selling authors in modern literary history. Many of us are aware Louis L'Amour's talent as a novelist, but may not realize his poetic ability as proven in *Smoke From This Alter*, his very first published book which is available at the library. The poems are heroic, humorous, and adventurous as one might expect from this writer.

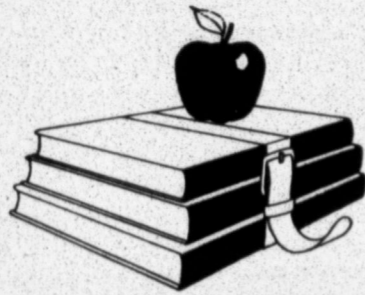
The unique style of Carmac McCarthy has caused his book, *All The Pretty Horses*, to be considered a masterpiece by many. This is the first volume of a set known as *The Border Trilogy*. He has written five previous novels depicting western culture including the award winning *The Orchard Keeper*.

In March of this year, I had the opportunity to hear western writer, Ralph Compton, speak. The manner in which Mr. Compton, with his colorful personality, related the experiences in his books and his own experiences while writing was, indeed, an inter-

esting and pleasant story within itself. I am in the process of reading Book I of his Trail Drive series entitled *The Goodnight Trail*. Charles Goodnight introduces himself on page three followed by trail blazing adventures of our western culture. Other books in this series are *The Western Trail* and *The Chisholm Trail*. Since the writing of this trilogy, *Bandera Trail* and *Shawnee Trail* have been added to this list. It should be noted that even though many of the characters, events, and dangers are real, fictitious ones created by the author have been accurately portrayed. Mr. Compton informed us of his plans for a new book concerning the only man who ever beat Crazy Hors. As far as I know, it has not yet been released. It promises to be another western adventure to which we can look forward. Why not check it out?

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Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

QUESTION: What does a man experience during a full-fledged mid-life crisis?

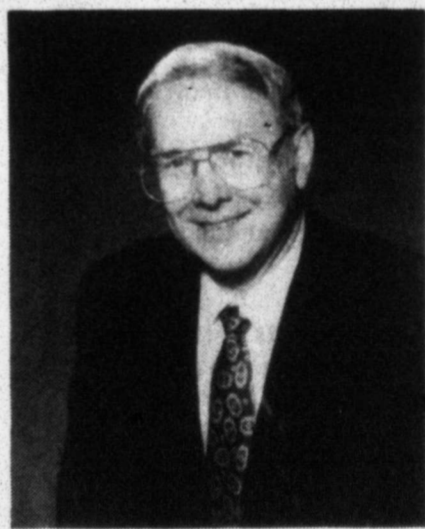
DR. DOBSON: Dr. Jim Conway has written a book called *Men In Mid-Life Crisis* (David C. Cook, 1978), which I highly recommend. In it, he identifies four major "enemies" that plague a man entering this stressful period. The first is his own body. There is no doubt about it; that guy they called "Joe College" just a few years ago is now growing older. His hair is falling out, despite desperate attempts to coddle and protect every remaining strand.

Then he notices he doesn't have the stamina he once had. He begins getting winded on escalators. Before long, words assume new meanings for O' Joe. "The rolling stones" are his gall bladder, and "speed" (which once referred to amphetamines or fast driving) is his word for prune juice. The cells in his face then pack up and run south for the winter, leaving a shocked and depressed Joseph standing two inches from the mirror in disbelief.

To summarize this first great concern of the mid-life years, a man approaching 40 is forced to admit: 1.) He is getting older; 2.) The changes produced by aging are neither attractive nor convenient; 3.) In a world that equates human worth with youth and beauty, he is about to suffer a personal devaluation; 4.) Old age is less than two decades away, bringing eventual sickness and death.

The second enemy facing a man in his mid-life years is his work. He typically resents his job and feels trapped in the field he has chosen.

The third enemy that rises to confront a middle-aged man is, believe it or not, his own family. These stormy years of self-doubt and introspection can be devastat-



ing to his marriage. Such a man often becomes angry, depressed and rebellious toward those closest to him. He resents the fact that his wife and kids need him.

The fourth and final enemy of a man in mid-life crisis appears to be God himself. Through a strange manipulation of logic, man blames God for all his troubles, approaching Him with rebellion and anger.

Let me give this latter point the strongest possible emphasis. One of the most common observations made by relatives and friends of a man in mid-life crisis reflects this sudden reversal of personality and behavior:

"I don't understand what happened to Loren," a wife will say. "He seemed to change overnight from a stable, loving husband and father to an irresponsible rogue."

This man's problem is basically spiritual in nature. As his system of beliefs disintegrated, the result was a rapid and catastrophic change in lifestyle which left his family and friends in a state of confusion and shock. This pattern has occurred for thousands of families in recent years.

QUESTION: How should I respond if my child says, "I hate

you!" when he is angry?

DR. DOBSON: If my child screamed his hatred at me for the first time in a moment of red-faced anger, I would probably wait until his passion had cooled down and then convey this message in a loving and sincere manner:

"Charlie, I know you were very upset earlier today when we had our disagreement, and I think we should talk about what you are feeling. All children get angry at their parents now and then, especially when they feel unfairly treated. I understand your frustration. But that does not excuse you for saying, 'I hate you.' You'll learn that no matter how upset I become over something you've done, I'll never tell you that I hate you. And I can't permit you to talk to me that way.

"It hurt me for you to say that you hated me, just as you would be hurt if I said something like that to you. You can, however, tell me what angers you, and I will listen carefully.

"You are free to say anything you wish to me, but you will never be permitted to scream, call names and throw temper tantrums. If you behave in those childish ways, I will have to punish you."

ORDINANCE NO. 301 AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING ITINERANT MERCHANTS TO OBTAIN PERMITS AND BONDS AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. License required. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Clarendon, Texas, soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, without having first applied for and obtained a license to do so from the City Secretary of said City. It shall also hereafter be unlawful to sell or solicit in said City as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soliciting or selling.

SECTION 2. Application for license. Any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Clarendon, Texas, to sell or solicit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, shall make written application to the City Secretary of the said City for a license so to do, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents and the kind of goods offered for sale, and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said City.

SECTION 3. Bond required. The application mentioned in Section 2 hereof shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00, signed by applicant and signed, as surety, by some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the final delivery of goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, magazines, and newspapers in accordance with the terms of any order obtained prior to and all defects in material or workmanship that may exist in the article sold by the principal of said bond, at the time of delivery, and that may be discovered by such purchaser or customer within 30 days after delivery, and which bond shall be for the use and benefit of all persons, firms, or corporations that may make any purchase or

give any order to the principal on said bond, or to an agent or employee of the principal. Provided that in case applicant is a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaging in any activity mentioned in Section 1 hereof through one or more agents or employees, such persons, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall be required to enter into only one bond, in the sum of \$1,000.00 as above required, which bond shall be made to cover the activities of all its agents or employees.

SECTION 4. Itinerant merchant or vendor defined. An itinerant merchant or an itinerant vendor as the terms are used in this article shall be held to be any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 1 hereof.

SECTION 5. License fee. The license fee for an itinerant merchant or itinerant vendor shall be as follows:

- Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per day;
- Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per month; or
- Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per year.

The fee will be made payable to the City of Clarendon, Texas, and shall be for the purpose of defraying expenses incidental to the issuing of said licenses.

SECTION 6. Exemptions. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the following:

- (a) Sales made to dealers by commercial travelers or sales agents in the usual course of business;
- (b) Sales made under authority and by order of law;
- (c) Sales made by local church, school, or non-profit groups or organizations; and
- (d) Sales made by any person, firm, or corporation maintaining a permanent office, store, business, or shop in Clarendon, Texas.

SECTION 7. Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this Ordinance or failing to observe any provision hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined a sum of not less than \$50.00 and not more than \$500.00, and each and every day or fraction of a day during which the Ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION 8. Emergency. An emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of the general welfare of the public that requires this ordinance to become effective immediately; therefore, it shall be effective on and after the date of its passage.

PASSED AND APPROVED by vote of the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas, on the 26th day of July, 1994.

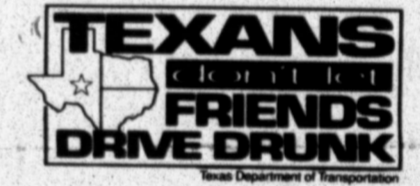
