## Bronchos Take First Win From Turkey

The Clarendon High School Bronchos broke into the win column for the first time this year last Friday night when they turned back the big Turkey Turks by a score of 8 to 0. The Bronchos threatened several times and finally scored midway of the fourth quarter. Turkey fumbled on their own 11-yard line and the Bronchos recovered. Four plays gained them a first down on the Turkey one yard line and on the next play Quarterback Neel Carter plunged over for the touchdown. Dewey Wilson ran over the extra points and that was the extent of the scoring for the game.

The two teams were pretty evenly matched although Clarendon led slightly in the statistics. The Bronchos made ten first downs to seven for Turkey and gained 180 yards rushing to 123 for the Turks. Clarendon completed two of ten pass attempts and Turkey failed to connect on nine tries.

It was Clarendon's first taste of victory since their 24 to 6 win over Memphis on October 10, 1958.

**Marketing Cards Mailed**  
Cotton marketing cards have been mailed to all producers. Please take care of these cards so that you will have them when needed to market your cotton. If you fail to receive your card, please check with the ASC office.

**Conservation Reserve - Soil Bank**  
Please come to this office and sign CSS 320 "Application for Annual Payment." We will make payment for those farms who are in compliance after October 1st.

The closing date for making a 1960 application for rates has been extended to October 9, 1959. Application for contract is still the same date, which is October 16th. Keep both of these dates in mind if you are interested in the 1960 Soil Bank program. Important change in the Soil Bank Program removes requirement for establishing fair rental value. The annual payment rate shall not exceed the maximum rate which the county committee determines for such land under the 1959 conservation reserve program.

## Wet, Cold Weather Halts Harvest

Rain and cold weather the past several days has brought crop gathering to a standstill with more inclement weather in prospect. Crop gathering had just begun last week when a heavy downpour of rain moved in Thursday and Thursday night leaving nearly 2 inches of moisture over most of the county. The Country Club area received 4.40 inches during the week for the big total.

The totals for last Thursday night were Clarendon 1.76, Ashtola 1.76, Lelia Lake .90 and the Country Club 2.30. Tuesday night of this week 1.7 was recorded here in town while Ashtola received .36 inch, and Lelia Lake .25.

A low of 40 degrees was recorded here Wednesday morning with a prospect of frost scheduled for Wednesday night. The low temperature for the month so far was 38 degrees on the morning of September 12th. The average frost date is October 20th but it sure looks like we may have an earlier frost this year.

## District 2-A Conference Games Will Begin This Week

The District 2-A Conference games will begin this week with the Clarendon Bronchos opening with the Panhandle Panthers. The game will be played in Panther Stadium in Panhandle starting at 7:30 p.m. All games throughout the remainder of the season are scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

This game should be a toss-up as both teams are having rather poor seasons. Panhandle has lost four straight games so far this season although they, like Clarendon, have tangled with some pretty tough teams. They have lost to Childress, a very respectable Class AA team, along with three highly rated Class A teams, Gruver, Stinnett, and Sunray.

If comparative scores mean anything, the two teams should be about even. Panhandle lost to Gruver, 26 to 6, and to Stinnett, 40 to 8. The Bronchos lost to Gruver, 32 to 20, and to Stinnett, 34 to 6. The Bronchos hold only one win over the Panthers in the last four years, that a 31 to 0 win in 1957. Last year the Panthers defeated the Bronchos, 18 to 6.

The starting line-up for the Bronchos will probably be about the same as last week: Philip Abel and either Bill Hermesmyer or Don Hudgins at ends; Jerry Gray and Lynn Spier at tackles; Dennis Bradshaw and Charles Percival at guards; Ronnie Tycar at center; Neel Carter or Dwight McAnear at quarterback; Jim Robinson and Wayne Mann at halfbacks and Dewey Wilson at fullback. Jerry Allen and Leon Gibbs will see service in the line and Eddie Tipton will probably see some action in the backfield.

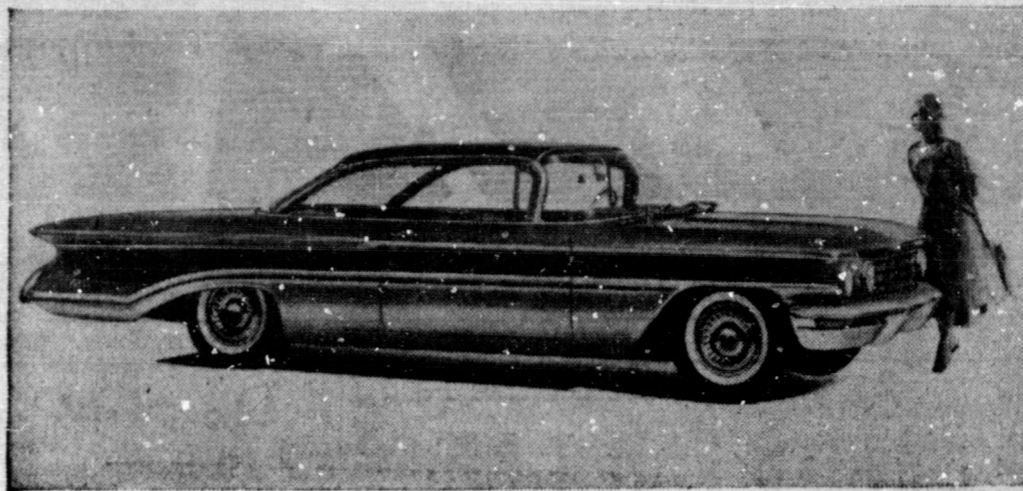

Editor Don Robinson of The American Press observes: "Having kept up fairly well with the so-called progress of our educational system in small-town America, as reported in country newspapers, I am becoming increasingly convinced that all the fancy school buildings, the demands for more and more extra curricula facilities, the unimaginative requirements for teachers, and the insistence upon higher education for all nit-wits, has resulted in little progress. . . . In my opinion, a group of fifteen or twenty children, gathered together in a small building for the sole purpose of learning, and taught by a teacher who is more concerned with their welfare than her own, would still get a much finer education than is available in our present million-dollar monuments to learning."

**GOOD POSTURE GIVES BRIGHT NEW OUTLOOK**  
(Texas State Dept. of Health)  
Does your body profile look like the bent part of a Capital "D"? Would you like to acquire a bright new outlook on life? Then get rid of that pretzel posture.

Good posture is the starting point of good health and appearance. Luckily, it is fairly easy to attain. Here's how:  
Hold your head high and pull your chin in until your eye level is parallel to the ground. Pull your shoulders back and make the shoulder blades form as near a flat surface as possible.

Raise your chest up and push it forward until the buttons strain. Draw your abdomen up and in, and when you breathe make sure it's your chest that

risers and falls and not your abdomen.  
Flatten the lower part of your back, tucking the buttocks as close under the hips as possible. Tip your hips down in the back. Hold your knees straight but not stiff. Put your feet parallel, with the weight evenly balanced.  
Be careful not to revert to the old slouch when you sit down. Be conscious of good posture at all times, and the first thing you know it will be second nature. You'll begin to feel uncomfortable in a bad posture.  
The old saying that "there is a place for everything" is doubly true for the human body. Each organ has a specific place in which to function, and functions best in that space. Vital organs—heart, lungs, abdomen, etc.—tend to be cramped when the body is slumped or slouched over.  
Cramped lungs cannot deliver a full supply of oxygen. Circulation is slowed down when the heart is cramped. And a cramped stomach impairs digestion.

The advantages of good posture go far beyond the purely physiological. Standing straight and tall, relaxed and comfortable, will give you a brand new outlook on the world. You'll get a "lift" far out of proportion to the little bit of conscious effort it takes to assume a correct stance and make it a permanent habit.  
Try it the next time you walk by a plate glass window. Glance at your reflection—chin up, chest out, shoulders back and stomach flat, stretched to your full height. What a fine figure you cut!

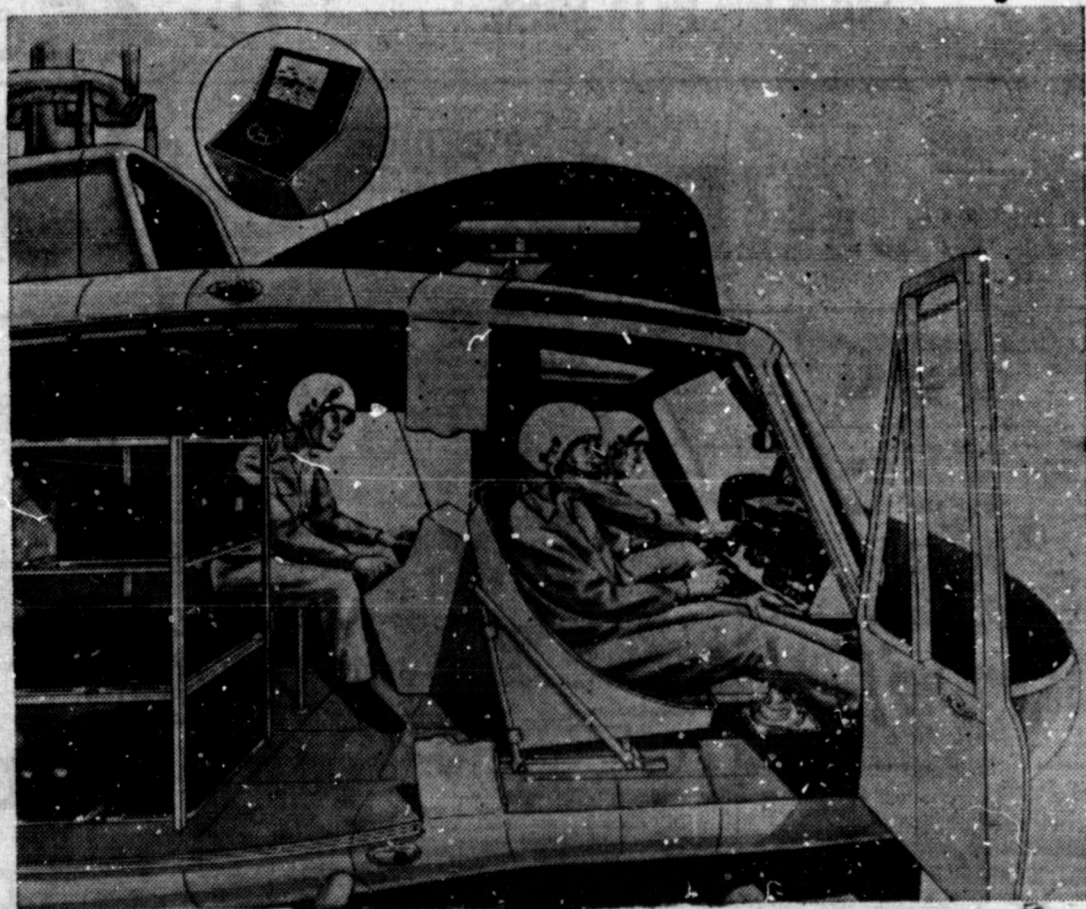

### HUNTSVILLE RODEO TO HAVE BIG NAME STARS

HUNTSVILLE (Sp.) — Inmate contestants, plus a host of the nation's topflight television and recording stars will be the bill of fare for the 29th annual Texas Prison Rodeo here in the prison's \$1,000,000 stadium each Sunday in October.  
Big name stars such as James Arness, of the TV series, "Gunsmoke," along with Johnny Cash, popular country-style singer, open the 1959 series on Oct. 4, Dale Robertson of "Tales of Wells Fargo," and Tommy Sands, sensational singing idol of the teenage crowd, appear on Oct. 11, while Steve McQueen of "Wanted—Dead or Alive," teams with Singer Johnny Horton of "The Battle of New Orleans" fame on Oct. 18.  
For the October 25 performance, prison rodeo officials say they will produce two additional nationally-known stars for the closing of the 1959 series.  
In addition, there will be other outside acts, rodeo clowns, inmate entertainment groups and mounted quadrilles from Pasadena and Bellville. The Houston Range Riders also will appear and for the first time the rodeo will feature a girl's barrel race event.  
H. H. Coffield, Rockdale businessman, who serves as chairman of the Texas Board of Corrections and its rodeo committee, said, "We are doing everything possible to present the best entertainment feature found anywhere."  
"We are of the opinion that a well-rounded show will attract more people to this unusual rodeo which benefits around 12,000 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections."  
Coffield explained that net proceeds from rodeo ticket sales are placed in the prisoners' welfare fund which is used to supply rehabilitative services not furnished by the Texas Legislature.

### SHIPPING FEVER VIRUS ISOLATED

College Station.—A virus that is one of the causative agents of shipping fever, a costly and prevalent respiratory disease of cattle, has been isolated by USDA veterinarians, reports Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian. This discovery, he adds, represents a breakthrough in the knowledge of this highly complex disease.  
To date, scientists at USDA's Agricultural Research Center, Beltsville, Md., have isolated the Para-influenza 3 virus (designated SF-4 virus) from nasal mucus of calves showing signs of shipping fever; produced mild cases of shipping fever by spraying this virus into the noses of healthy calves; and have grown the virus in tissue culture, and produced anti-serum, he says.  
Also, the scientists isolated infectious bovine rhinotracheitis (IBR) virus from calves with shipping fever, but found that SF-4 anti-serum has no effect on the IBR virus. In some instances SF-4 and IBR viruses produce similar symptoms, and both appear to be a part of the shipping fever complex. The scientists also isolated another virus, as yet unclassified, from cattle with shipping fever, Patterson notes.  
Pasteurella (bacteria) were isolated from 65 percent of cattle in herds with shipping fever and from half the cattle in herds without the disease. In some cases these bacteria cause a secondary infection that determines the severity of the shipping fever.  
Patterson adds that the number of infectious agents isolated from cattle affected with shipping fever may some day be comparable with the number isolated from humans affected with respiratory infections. He feels that much more will have to be learned about this disease complex before an effective shipping fever vaccine can be produced.

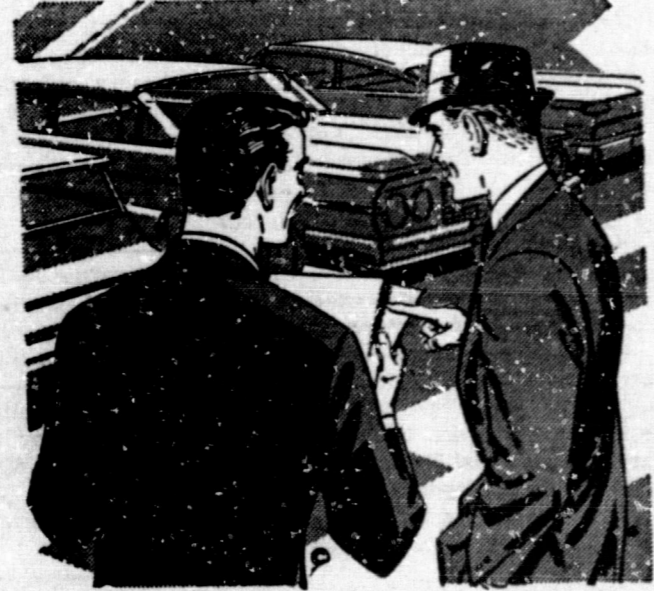

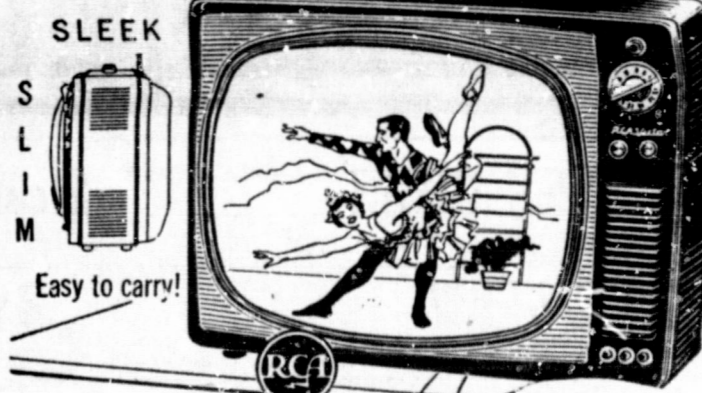

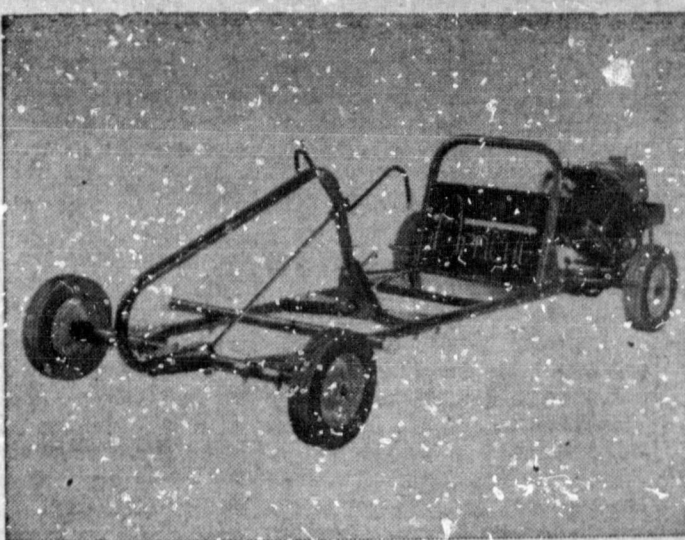

nearly 20 years and were about ready to give it up. Pete, however, agreed to stay on when the Foundation acquired the worn-out blackland farm as a soil conservation demonstration unit.

As reported by Soil and Water, the publication of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts, this demonstration landlord-tenant arrangement is now in its sixth year. It has turned out to be the means of keeping the Pilkinton family profitably on the land, where they feel they belong, and has pointed the way to others toward a practical application of a farming system especially drawn up to fit the particular needs of limited, eroded acreage.

One of the major objectives of the demonstration farm has been to show that a progressive landlord-tenant agreement can develop a complete soil and water conservation program which will pay its own way. Even though the operation was initiated in one of the worst possible weather cycles in Texas farm

history — just as one of the longest of the long dry spells was getting well under way — it has never failed to show an attractive profit.

During the extremely difficult four-year period from 1954 to 1958, the farm has shown an average gross annual income of \$12,859.82. In 1958, when the weather situation combined with the previous four-year development program to give the operation its first really favorable season, the gross income rose to \$16,155.05. Indications are that 1959 will turn out even better.

Those 309 blackland acres in Collin County may point the way toward proving to many another Texas family that successful farming is still not entirely a big business proposition.

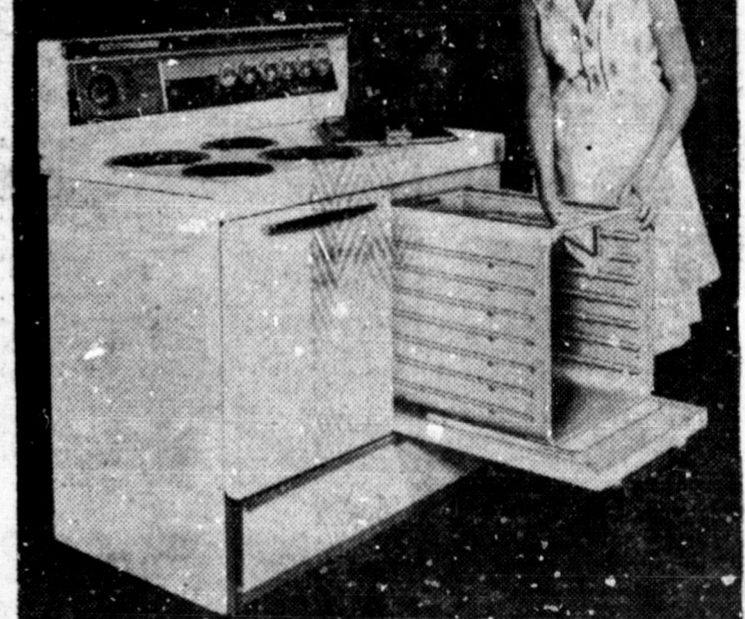

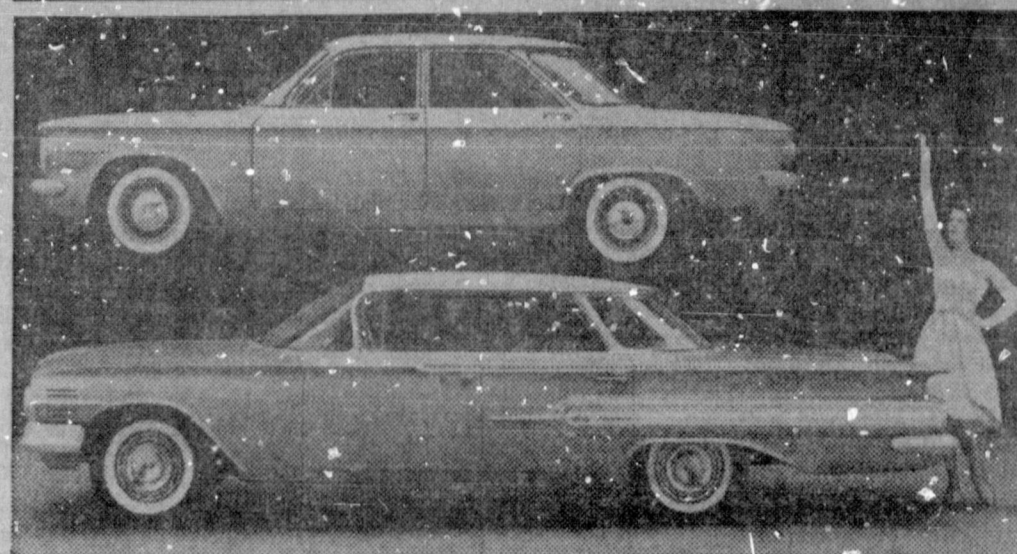

Another item which should be explained has to do with the adjournment of Congress. However, the work at hand did not permit this. Once this was realized every effort on the part of the Members of the House and Senate was aimed at trying to adjourn at the earliest possible time. This was certainly indicated by the fact that once we got to where adjournment was in sight, we stayed in continuous session all night long in order to get it done.
