Scams Hurt Legit Research

Ann Landers, Attorneys General in several states, many medical doctors and numerous newspapers have issued warnings against organizations which claim to support cancer research, but actually expend only a few percent on research. Generally the person operating the scam gets a big salary, while the research gets almost nothing.

These scammers seem to be well organized. They often contact cancer victims or relatives of cancer victims. They have obviously

developed some way to secure the names, addresses and phone numbers of cancer patients.

At least one scam has tailored its requests for money to sound like a nationally-organized foundation. It has sent a letter to a Clarendon resident soliciting funds for "the Donley County Area Cancer Drive".

None of these fly-by-night operators should be confused with the American Cancer Society.

Virtually the only legitimate nation-wide cancer research organization is The American Cancer Society. The trademark for the American Cancer Society is a stylized sword of Aesclepius, the Greco-Roman god of healing. If the fund raising effort has the sword and the words "American Cancer Society", then a person can be sure that most of his gift will go for research. If it lacks those marks, then a potential donors should be exceedingly skeptical.

At least one scam operator makes a practice of moving every three or four months, and changing the name of his organization with each move. Presumably he leaves each state one jump ahead of the sheriff.

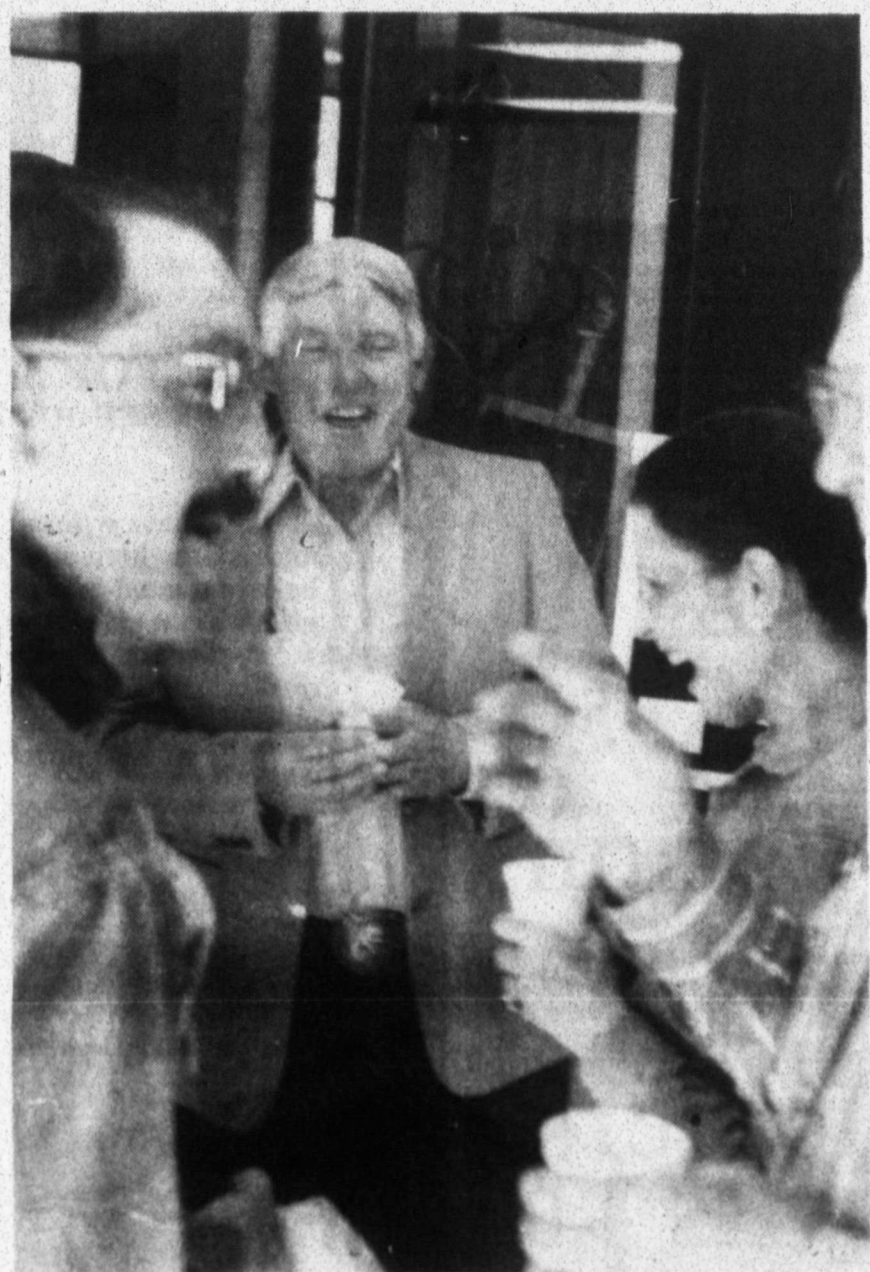
Friendship Club Met

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Free Cancer Clinic Offered

On May 7, 1994, Amarillo area dermatologists, the Don & Sybil Harrington Cancer Center, and the American Cancer Society will be conducting a free skin cancer screening clinic from 9:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The clinic will take place at the Don & Sybil Harrington Cancer Center, 1500 Wallace Blvd., Amarillo, Texas. Six Amarillo Dermatologists will be participating in the screening: Dr. Elizabeth Archer, Dr. Turner Caldwell, III, Dr. William R. East, Dr. Randal E. Posey, Dr. Larry C. Roberts, and Dr. Jack D. Waller. The free clinic is open to the public.

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer that occurs in humans. It is estimated that 627,000 cases of skin cancer occurred in the United States during 1990. About three out of every eight new cancers is a skin cancer.

Skin cancer is usually discussed in terms of either melanomas or nonmelanomas because of the striking differences between melanomas and other skin cancers. Whereas nonmelanomas skin cancers are the most common, melanomas are far more deadly. Nearly three quarters of all deaths from cutaneous cancers are due to malignant melanoma, and the rate of increase in the number of deaths from malignant melanoma is second only to the rate of increase

in lung cancer. Almost all of the remaining deaths from skin cancer are due to squamous cell carcinoma.

The risk of nonmelanomas skin cancer is increasing, probably due to increased exposure to UV-B, a form of ultraviolet radiation. Even though basal cell carcinoma rarely metastasizes and is readily cured, one out of sixteen squamous cell carcinoma metastasize, and 40% of patients with metastatic squamous cell carcinoma will die of the disease. More ominous is the increasing risk of developing malignant melanoma over one's lifetime. Since 1935, this risk has increased from 1 in 1500 to an estimated risk of 1 in 90 for Caucasians born in the year 2000. It is probable that in sunburn, rather than total sun exposure, is an etiological factor for malignant melanoma.

Many skin cancers can be prevented by avoiding, as much as is practicable skin-damaging UV-B Radiation. Persons who will be out in the sun should wear protective clothing, such as a hat, and apply sunscreen with a protective (SPF) of at least 15 to all exposed skin. This SPF level allows a person who would normally begin to burn in 10 minutes of sun to remain exposed for up to 150 minutes without burning. For persons at high risk cancer, sunscreen should be a part of daily

hygiene. People should also be discouraged from using artificial sources of ultraviolet light such as those used in tanning salons.

Sunscreen come in a wide range of sun protective factors. It is generally acknowledged that people should use sunscreen with at least an SPF of 15. To achieve adequate sun protection, sunscreen must be applied generously and evenly on all exposed skin-including the backs of necks and chests of people wearing t-shirts. The sunscreen should be re-applied about every 2 hours if the wearer is perspiring or swimming. Those who will be perspiring heavily or swimming should consider using waterproof formulas.

Awareness of skin cancer, is essential to prevention of unnecessary morbidity and mortality. Knowing to use sunscreen of SPF 15 or greater and to monitor any moles for change can assist people to help themselves prevent disease that is highly curable when found in the early stages.

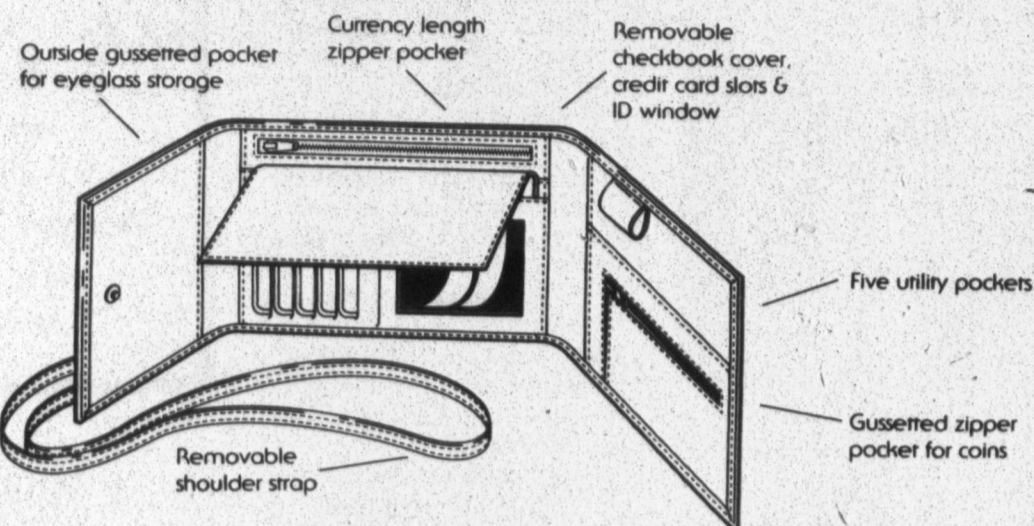

Minding Your Own Business

BETTER BUSINESS WRITING

A good business letter can win a new customer, line up a job interview or make a friend for life. It can create a positive impression

on the reader and make us appear competent, articulate and professional.

On the other hand, bad business correspondence can blow a deal, destroy a good image and cost us money. Why, then, are so many bad or mediocre business letters written? I believe there are three reasons: 1) We don't care, 2) we feel too busy to compose good letters, or 3) we don't know the basics of effective written communication.

The majority of us probably fall into the last two categories. We care about our business image but are busy and haven't developed good writing skills.

Because of our hectic pace, we need a simple method of learning and remembering the basics of effective business writing. With that thought in mind, we developed the WRITE method. WRITE is an acronym in which each letter serves to remind us of one of five elements of good business writing.

The "W" reminds you to ask "why" you are writing the letter. Each piece of business correspondence should have a purpose and an objective. What do you want the letter to do? Thank a customer? Schedule an appointment? Resolve a problem? Inform the reader of your services or products? If your objective is unclear, the reader may discard the letter or delay action on it.

The "R" reminds you to get "right to the point." Begin with the person's name and title, spelled correctly. Next, get right to the subject in the first paragraph. A good opening paragraph captures

the reader's interest and shows why the letter is important.

The "I" in the "WRITE" method stands for "identify" key information. If referring to an order, use the invoice number and date. If you are writing a response, include the date of the original letter. If you mention a third party, give enough information to ensure that the reader will know to whom you refer. For example, write "Mr. William Jones of the ABC Company," instead of "Mr. Jones."

Letters that lack key information are a major cause of delays and the need for additional communication. When you give your readers all of the facts, it is easier for them to give you the desired

results. Be sure to answer any questions that were raised in previous correspondence. A busy person wants to get the entire picture in the first reading.

The "T" should remind you to write like you "talk." Use natural, everyday language. Typically, business letters take on a strange and cold formality. They are often filled with jargon and pompous phrases. Don't assume that the more you write, the more intelligent you sound. A trite, wordy letter can produce the opposite effect.

Each letter should communicate with the reader in simple, straight-forward terms. With a little practice, you will be surprised at how simply you can state important points.

The "E" represents "editing" and "ending." Edit letters carefully. Eliminate misspelled words, improper grammar and excess words. For example, "eliminate any and all words believed to be irrelevant or thought to be unnecessary" can be edited to "eliminate unnecessary words."

Devise a pleasant way to conclude your letters. If you are requesting an action, restate it in friendly terms in the closing para-

graph. The reader should know exactly what you expect of him or her by the end of the letter.

Try the WRITE method on your next few business letters. You may find that you are writing less and enjoying it more. The real proof, however, will be in the results. You will accomplish your goals and experience fewer communication foul-ups.

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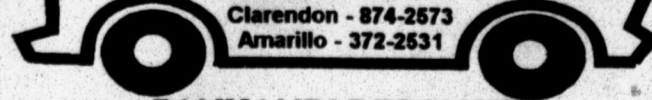

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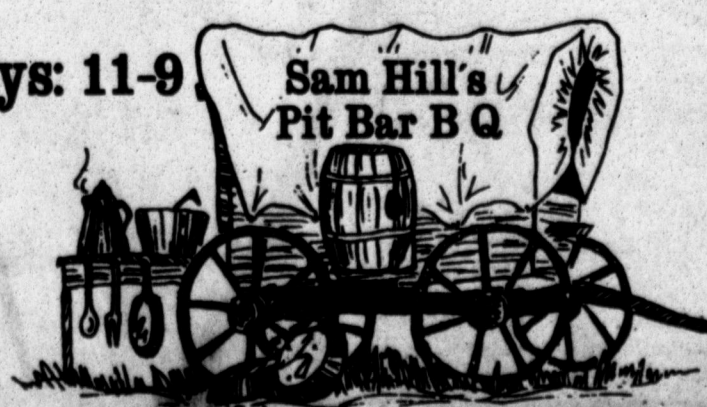
